





Grand Canyon Skywalk's glass bottom being replaced with panes from Spain

After four years and 1.5 million pairs of feet, the Grand Canyon Skywalk is undergoing its first major overhaul. And a face-lift like this requires some heavy lifting. Using a 130-foot-tall crane perched beside the walkway, workers have begun replacing the 1,800-pound blocks of layered glass that form the deck of the attraction, 120 miles east of Las Vegas.

The first blocks were switched out Monday night. Weather permitting, the team of about a dozen workers hopes to finish the job in less than two weeks. The \$1.5 million renovation is being done at night so that the Skywalk can remain open during the day. The Hualapai Indian Tribe owns the U-shaped walkway, which extends 70 feet out over the west rim of the Grand Canyon and offers panoramas of the Colorado River and nearby Eagle Point. Through its glass deck visitors can look straight down to the canyon floor thousands of feet below. Lately, though, the glass has begun to look a little scuffed up. "I could tell. Tribal leaders could tell," said Ted Quasula, the Skywalk's general manager. "We want to make it crystal clear." Manuel Mojica is project manager for Executive Construction Management, the Las Vegas company that built the Skywalk and is overseeing the replacement of the deck.

He said the work will require a great deal of care and precision, as the old glass sections are lifted out and the new ones lowered into place at a work site bracketed by a sheer cliff on one side and a three-story visitor center on the other. Any mistakes will be expensive, Mojica said, because the glass is "one-of-a-kind." "Basically it's custom-made for the Skywalk," he said. The sections are 4 feet long, 10 feet wide and almost 3 inches thick. They each weigh roughly the same as an old Volkswagen bug, and they will have to be "flown out over the canyon" one at a time at the end of the crane, Mojica said.

There are 46 sections in all, and the goal is to replace at least five of them a night. The glass was fabricated in Spain and shipped to Savannah, Ga., where all 82,000 pounds of it was loaded onto a single tractor-trailer that required special permits to haul such a heavy load.

The truck arrived at the Skywalk early last week after negotiating the roughly 10 miles of dirt road leading to the site. "We didn't break a thing, thank God," Mojica said. The new glass panels come with a removable top layer light enough to be picked up by four men. That will make things much cheaper and easier the next time this sort of work needs to be done.

Visitors are made to wear cloth booties over their shoes when they walk on the glass deck, but a certain amount of wear and tear is inevitable in a desert environment filled with "minute grains of dust," Mojica said. Southern Nevada businessman David Jin dreamed up the idea for the Skywalk in 1996, while on a tour of the Grand Canyon with his family.

He eventually persuaded a group of private investors to fund the \$30 million structure and give it over to the Hualapai Tribal Nation. In return, the tribe agreed to let Jin manage the attraction and share in its profits for 25 years. The Skywalk opened in March 2007 and quickly became the centerpiece of the Hualapai's Grand Canyon West tourism venture, which offers replicas of Indian villages and tours by air, ground and water along the roughly 100-mile swath of canyon controlled by the 2,300-member tribe.

Quasula said the Skywalk has drawn more than 1.4 million paying customers in its first four years of operation. That's no small feat considering the attraction costs a minimum of \$75 and is at least a two-hour drive from Las Vegas, the closest big city. Asked whether visitation has lived up to expectations so far, Quasula said it's hard to judge because the Skywalk is unlike any other attraction.

"To be honest, I don't think any of us knew what to expect," he said. Quasula said the experience should keep getting better, thanks to the completion of the Hoover Dam bypass bridge and continuing efforts to pave the rest of the road leading to the Skywalk. Once that's done, "there's no doubt the tourist numbers would shoot way up," he said.

Quasula can't say exactly when the road might be finished, but he said the Skywalk visitor center is on track for completion within a year. In the meantime, visitors will soon have a chance to own their own piece of the Grand Canyon Skywalk. Once the renovation is complete, the tribe plans to cut up the old blocks of glass and sell the bits as souvenirs, Mojica said.

KINGMAN - More than 50 employees at the Grand Canyon Skywalk are participating in corporate training classes at the Kingman campus of Mohave Community College. This is the first time the Skywalk has participated in MCC's corporate outreach program.

The Grand Canyon Skywalk is located on the Grand Canyon's West Rim, less than a two-hour drive from Kingman. Last year, about 400,000 people visited the attraction on Hualapai tribal land.

Employees and managers are learning a variety of skills at MCC's corporate training classes, including decision making and problem solving, fundamentals of supervision, sales techniques, managing a diverse workforce, stress management and coping with job burnout, conflict resolution and how to forge professional relationships.

"We are highly impressed with MCC's corporate outreach program, and proud that more than half of our employees are taking at least one professional development course with them," said Ted Quasula, general manager of the Grand Canyon Skywalk.

"It's very exciting to see a company like the Grand Canyon Skywalk take such initiative in sharpening and enhancing the skills of its employees," said Michael J. Kearns, president of Mohave Community College. "They are learning new ways to manage employees, interact and communicate effectively with customers, and tackle problems and decisions in unique and creative ways."

Qualifications:

Applicant must have a working knowledge of Budgets (string accounts), Grants Management, Payroll Procedures and Human Resources. This person must have an understanding of Arizona state reports as pertains to a school district financial department. TEST DATES ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE AND ARE ADMINISTERED ONCE A MONTH.

COST: \$70.00 cash or money order, which is payable at time of registration. \$15.00 re-test fee for each section repeated. Thirty day wait requirement before re-testing.

- **IDENTIFICATION:** Two forms of ID are required for both registration and test taking.
 - 1 A state issued photo ID (driver's license), and
 - 2 ID must be an original and official document (SS card, Birth Certificate).
- **AGE:** You must be a minimum of 16 years of age to register for the GED test. If you are under 18 years of age, the AZ Department of Education requires that you bring the following to registration:
 - 1 A notarized statement from their parent or legal guardian giving permission to take the test.
 - 2 A withdrawal slip from the last school attended.
 - A. If the student is home-schooled, they must provide a letter from the County Superintendent's Office (700 West Beale Street, 928-753-0747).
- **TIMING:** The GED exam is 7 hours and 5 minutes in length.
- **EATING:** You may bring your own snacks or purchase them from the vending machines.
- **PERSONAL ITEMS:** Leave all personal items at home the day of testing. Cell phones must be turned off upon entering the testing room. Personal items brought from home will also be checked in upon arrival for testing. All testing supplies are provided by the GED Examiner for testing (example: calculator, pen, scratch paper, eraser, etc.).
- **CONTENT:** five subject areas: Math, Science, Social Studies, Reading, and Writing.
- **TEST RESULTS:** Unofficial test results will be mailed within two weeks of the test date.
- **EARLY START SCHOLARSHIP:** After you earn your GED diploma you are eligible for an Early Start scholar-ship for seven credit hours of free tuition at MCC.
- **GED TEST ACCOMMODATIONS:** are made for candidates who have diagnosed physical, mental, sensory, or learning disabilities and can provide appropriate documentation from a qualified professional of their impairment and its effect on their ability to take the GED Tests under standard conditions. To make arrangements contact Disability Services 928-757-0858 necessary guidelines and paperwork in advance of the testing date. Allow up to 3 months for processing accommodation paperwork.






IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR PET OWNERS AND FOR THE COMMUNITY

CONTACT ANIMAL CONTROL: Animal Control office is located at the Department of Emergency Services; to contact Animal Control you may call the Emergency Services Office at 769-2205. After hours or weekends you may contact 769-2220, law enforcement dispatch.

ENFORCEMENT: As pet owners of the Hualapai Nation, the Tribal Council passed strict ordinances regarding Animal Care, all dogs must be confined to your yard at all times, pet owners should never allow their dog to roam free. Pet owners who allow their pet to run at large will be cited for violations according to Chapter 15 of the Hualapai Law and Order Code. A maximum penalty of **FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS** for every violation cited maybe imposed upon pet owners who violate the ordinance. Animals picked up in serious incidents i.e.: dog bite incidences will be held for a mandatory 10 days observation in accordance to the ordinance with fees applied for observation, transportation, and vaccinations.

SPAY or NEUTER: You are asked to help control the pet population on the Hualapai Nation by having your pet spayed or neutered, this will help with the over population of unwanted pets and decrease the Public Nuisance complaints of pack of male dogs chasing after a female dog that is in heat. **It is also a reminder according to the Hualapai Housing Policy, you are only allowed two (2) dogs a residence, this is being enforced by the Housing Department, the Law and Order Code also has an ordinance that prohibits the owning of no more than two dogs per residence, owners who violate the code with multiple dogs are being referred to the Hualapai Tribal Courts.**

ANIMAL ABUSE: If you witness or have any information of an animal owner who is teaching their animal to fight or provoke any such action against another person or animal or conduct such illegal business of animal gaming, REPORT such incidents to the HUALAPAI NATION POLICE DEPARTMENT at 769-2220, referrals will be made to our program regarding the investigation(s) with further action brought against the violators in the HUALAPAI NATION TRIBAL COURTS.

REGISTRATION: According to the Animal Care and Control Ordinance, all pets must be registered through the HUALAPAI ANIMAL CONTROL program, the registration process is currently FREE, only for animal that a currently vaccinated with Rabies vaccine. You are encouraged to take advantage of this great incentive program for your pet. Canines that are randomly caged without a tag are held until the owner claims their pet, any animal held over seventy hours is considered stray or abandoned.

MISSING ANIMALS: To report your animal missing, you may contact the Emergency Services Office, after hours you may contact Animal Control on the next day of business at 769-2205, with complete description of your pet.

****DISEASE CONTROL:** A high number of canine deaths have been reported to animal control, most have been young dogs contracting the Parvo virus. Parvo virus is a viral disease of dogs, it affects puppies more frequently than it affects adult dogs, and in young puppies it can infect the heart muscle and lead to "sudden" death. Parvo virus is probably the most common viral illness of dogs. Veterinarians recommend vaccinating puppies every three to four weeks for this virus, starting at 6 weeks of age, until they are at least 20 weeks of age. The parvo virus attacks the lining of the digestive system. It causes dogs and puppies to not be able to absorb nutrients or liquids. Puppies are especially prone to it because they have an immature immune system. When dogs and puppies contract parvo, they usually stop eating and develop a bloody, foul-smelling, liquid stool, symptoms include high fever, depression, loss of appetite, vomiting and bloody diarrhea, in many case dehydration, shock, followed by death. More information contact your veterinarian and vaccination information for your pet.

SCHOOL and WORK: Animal Control reminds pet owners, please keep your pet at home, Also remind your children not to walk their dog to school, keep all pets at home, properly confined with food and water.

DOG BITE REPORTS: Animal Control has witnessed a decrease of Dog Bite Reports, It is our goal to be **dog bite free**, but this is not always the case, about half of all children are bitten by a dog, before their 18th birthday, here are some tried-and-true tips that all children should keep in mind when man best friend is near. **MOTHER, may I? Rule number one:** ALWAYS ask permission before petting someone's dog, approach slowly and quietly, and allow the dog to sniff the back of your hand. Pet the dog's sides or back gently. **THEY THINK THEY OWN EVERYTHING** Stay away from any dog that may be protecting something. That means not petting a dog that's eating, playing with a toy, tied up, behind a fence or in a car. **PREPARE FOR THE WORST:** If a dog growls at you or chases you, be still and quiet. Avoid eye contact with dogs; dogs often see this as a threat. Protect yourself with a backpack or bikes as a shield.

Physical:


Hitting, slapping, shoving, kicking, biting or any force used against the victims will.
