


Barbara read a book to the crowd called "I'll Love You Forever". She involved the audience by having them sing the chorus part of the story.



3. Seligman High School Administration & Booster Club - Joan Curley, Dr. Christian Rex, Leila Russell

Here to request funding from Hualapai Tribe; 29 students attending Seligman School from Peach Springs (K-12); 19 of the 29 are involved in sports, and the Athletic Department is thriving due to membership/enrollment of students attending Seligman School from the Hualapai Tribe. Athletic budget was cut by \$20,000 a few years ago, and the state has cut off funding to feed athletes because the meals are considered a gift item. Booster Club also helps to supplement funding, but can not be the only supporter for the athletic program.

R. Clark motions to provide \$3,000 to Seligman School with the info that is requested for CH's review; and that we would be able to help our athletes make it to state; second, R. Quasula; question, C. Vaughn; vote: 4 in favor; 1 oppose; 4 not voting.

- Tribal Liaison to Radio Station – Terri Hutchens

Permit for a terrestrial radio station has been filed; and tribe should be able to broadcast a regular radio station in February/March of 2015, therefore, Ms. Hutchens proposes to appoint a Liaison to help create an Advisory Board.

Vice-Chair volunteers as the liaison.

12. Chairwoman's Report

R. Clark motions to approve 100-2012 Policies & Procedures Manual; second by R. Quasula; question, Chair; Vote 9 in favor.

Minor Trust Investments materials from Lynn Rapp. Reviewed by Council Members.

Wanda explains that it would be a "pool trust" with the names of the minors who can draw their disbursement when they turn 18 years of age. Legal would be setting up a trust stipulating how it would operate, and appoint a trustee to oversee the account. Discussion with audience. It could be tailored to the needs/wants individually. Comments from audience members: Louise Benson, Mike Whatoname, Wilfred Whatoname, Ina Jackson,

pw... community loans equal \$150,000. Outstanding balances exist for people who live in low-rental homes. Child support should come from an order from the court. Louise Benson wants to hear from the Council that they will not take any money out of the disbursements [to pay back loans]. Mike Whatoname makes statements to the Council that they should not take the money from the people [who owe on loans], otherwise there could be recalled. Ina Jackson reiterates the statements of previ-

ous audience members' comments – money was for disbursement to the people without stipulations that you are making up today. rc... based on the trust he has to the people

R. Clark motions to not deduct any loans from the people; w/understanding that people pay back the loans. Discussion, C. Vaughn.

R. Clark amends his motion to state "if they want".

ch... states that there are 173 outstanding loans ranging from \$1.95 to \$20,000 for people over the age of 18 years old. Some of the loans are years old and that this issue is a political issue by the audience members who have made public threats to recall Tribal Council Members if they push the issue of deducting from disbursement toward loans. Wilfred Whatoname... doesn't think this is a political issue. The people understood that the money would be issued to them without it being deducted. It's just an understanding of the people.

R. Clark... Amend my motion with the approval of my second, to read: motion to not deduct any money from the distribution of funds; second, Ron Quasula; discussion, Hilda Cooney.

hc... states that if people are already in court to pay back the loans, they should be the one's to have their distribution's deducted.

Melissa Havatone... these stipulations were not set when they had the meeting at the gym; people will be up in arms when they go to vote and find out that there are stipulations on their distributions. Suggestion: put a letter in the checks that "a payment would be appreciated".

rq... against the council deducting any money from people's distributions.

Vote: 6 in favor, 2 oppose, 1 not voting.

R. Clark motions as of November 9th, the enrollment cut off is Nov 9th; second, R. Quasula; vote: 9 in favor. As of November 9th all enrolled tribal members receive the distribution.

13. Vice-Chairman's Report

Discussion regarding GCW profit sharing.

Patricia Cesspooch issue. V.C. feels that Tribal Council can not get involved with the Court's decision; and that Council should let Patricia know.

Met with HUD and Housing Director; HUD recommended changes within Hualapai Housing, but does not think that they are being addressed and thinks that this issue needs to be addressed. Vice-Chair recommends that they meet with Director to go over this issue.

14. Council Member's

rq... issues with programs - Cultural Resources Monitor, vehicle; individuals he has encountered in the field who do not respect his authority because he is not properly equipped. Does not have a uniform or the proper gear to represent himself in the field. Suggests that he be pulled out of the HDNR program, but to continue funding him, and put him under the supervision of Vice-Chair. Also thinks he should be commissioned to detain until officers can show up; also needs a uniform. Equip him with the right and proper equipment. Chair should be able to give a directive



Dear Parents/Legal Guardian,

It is important to inform you of some significant changes to Arizona Revised Statutes regarding the promotion and retention of third grade students. ***Please note that these changes take effect this school year (2013-14). This will be the first group of third grade students to be impacted by this legislation.*** The newly revised law states that a student shall not be promoted from the third grade if the student obtains a score on the AIMS reading test (or a successor test) that demonstrates he or she is **reading far below the third grade level.**

Beginning in the 2013-2014 school year, there are two exemptions from ARS §15-701. In accordance with the new law, a school district or governing board or the governing body of a charter school may be allowed to promote a pupil who earns an AIMS score that falls far below the third grade level for any of the following reasons:

- English Language Learners or Limited English Proficient that have received less than two years of English instruction; and
- Students with disabilities provided that the pupil's individualized education program (IEP) team and the pupil's parent or guardian agree that promotion is appropriate based on the pupil's IEP.





Grief is relieved by fond memories and knowing people care.



Excerpt from Louis' obituary

Louis Teufel-Shone (51), of Pinon and Williams, AZ died on June 5, 2013. Louis was born in Keams Canyon, AZ on April 3, 1962. His clan is Bitter Water (Todich'ii'nii), born for Towering House (Kin'yaa' aanii). Louis graduated from Chinle High School and was runner-up for State Wrestling Champion. In 1981-1986, he served in the U.S. Marines, was a Rifle and Pistol Sharpshooter and was stationed at multiple sites including Quantico, VA and carried out West Pac sea duty on the U.S.S. Ranger serving in Okinawa, Japan; the Philippines and Diego Garcia in the Pacific Ocean. He was part of the All Navajo Platoon, developed to commemorate the Navajo Code Talkers. He was also a decorated member of the U.S. Marines' Wrestling and Bull Riding teams. After his military service, he worked as an Auto Mechanic in Phoenix, AZ. In 1998-2000, he attended Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff, AZ. Most recently, he was a Fitness Trainer for the Hualapai Tribe and was a Roadman for the Native American Church. He has 2 children, a son Colton Shone and a daughter, Autumn Shone. He was a healer, philosopher and counselor and in his years as a Roadman helped many people.


