

Memorial to civil rights activist opens quietly; dedication to fall on anniversary By: Ben Nuckols | Las Vegas Review-Journal | August 23, 2011



WASHINGTON - Hundreds of people filed through the entrance during the opening of the memorial to the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., on Monday morning on the National Mall. Before reaching the sculpture, they passed through two pieces of granite carved to resemble the sides of a mountain.

About 50 feet ahead stands the 30-foot-tall sculpture by Chinese artist Lei Yixin. King appears to emerge from a stone extracted from the mountain. The design is inspired

by a line from King's famous "I Have A Dream" speech, delivered during the March on Washington in 1963: "Out of the mountain of despair, a stone of hope."

Visitor Tehran Wadley, 35, of Washington said, "I'm ecstatic. It brings tears to my eyes, just to be able to see this." King is the first person of color to have a memorial on the Mall. It is surrounded by memorials to presidents Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln and Franklin Roosevelt.

Monday's opening had little fanfare, President Barack Obama is scheduled to speak at Sunday's dedication of the memorial, which will fall on the 48th anniversary of the March on Washington. Harry E. Johnson, president of the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Memorial Project Foundation, said the group is \$5 million short of covering the \$120 million cost of the memorial.

The youth at the Hualapai Juvenile Detention (Rehabilitation (HDDRC) have been hard at work! If the youth aren't working on furthering their education by working on A Plus Curriculum, Primavera online, or their GED they are learning different skills by participating in different projects and services available to the youth.

You may notice there are changes to the facility which include the solar photovoltaic power system and a greenhouse. The HJDRC was recently the recipient of a 10 kilo watt Solar Photovoltaic power system. It was completely funded by the U.S. Department of Energy and intended to provide community education on renewable energy and enhance local employment. The installation was installed on the southwest-side of the building. The youth are able to learn about clean renewable energy and see the actual kilowatts of energy the system collected and fed to the building. The power meter is digital and provides a read out for the youth to observe and allows you to figure how much of a reduction in green house gasses the power system reduced. A story board will be installed next to the inverter and meter to explain the principles of solar energy and how it works. A residential wind turbine is also planned to be installed next to the solar panels so that this clean energy producer can show how wind power works.

The greenhouse was funded by the Green Reentry grant and construction began at the beginning of August. Levels 4 youth are participating in the construction of the greenhouse and also worked on the construction of the solar photovoltaic power system. The greenhouse will be used to grow vegetables and fruit which will be used for meals at the HJDRC. In the near future youth who have been released from the HJDRC and are enrolled in school will be given the opportunity to work on construction of a 16x16 straw bale green house outside of the Boys & Girls Club. This will give youth an opportunity to begin learning about gardening in the facility and continue in the community.

Sustainability is a component of the Green Reentry grant. The HuaJapai Tribe was one of three tribes to be awarded a Tribal Juvenile Detention and Reentry Green Demonstration Program administered through the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Program (OJJDP). The program focuses on reducing recidivism rates by involving youth in programs provided by tribal departments from the community and teaching them about sustainability. The youth are exposed and learning different skills during detention through programs provided by the Hualapai Juvenile Detention & Rehabilitation Center. Youth sentenced complete and intake to understand their needs and refer the youth to appropriate services. A Child and Family Team (CFT) meeting is facilitated with the youth, family, natural supports, and informal supports. Goals, strengths, and needs are identified during this time to define the youth's reentry plan. When released the youth is able to continue participating in programs in the community.

At the HJDRC, youth are given the opportunity to learn about the culture and language, receive individual and group counseling, gardening, how to read blue prints, cooking, carpentry, and tile work. They can also participate in Wellbriety, Talking Circle, sweat lodge, and church services. There is also week programming provided by the Boys & Girls Club. Once a month they are also given the opportunity to participate in a Hualapai Tribal Youth Council meeting which is facilitated monthly in the HJDRC.

The mission of the HJDRC is "To provide safe and secure housing for incarcerated juveniles, to encourage positive long-term behavioral changes, to reduce delinquency and recidivism, and to facilitate the learning of Hualapai and other Native American cultural beliefs." This wouldn't be possible without the support of the community and the dedication of the staff at the HJDRC. The different programs are provided by departments/programs currently in our community. 








Visitation Increase Comparison Q2 2011





The above listed youth has applied to participate in the "Each One, Reach One" Youth Radio Project. While participating the youth may be involved in the following activities: educational curriculums regarding radio operation; health issues, including heart disease, diabetes and alcohol abuse and lifeskills, which may include homework assignments; writing, producing directing and performing radio drama; use of computer and internet, including website design and management; production and performance of a social influence radio drama and other radio programming; team building exercises; travel; physical activities and related community events.



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This activity will be scheduled during after school and school closure days, with the days and times to be announced, and to take into consideration the most convenient times for the majority of the participants. The activity is anticipated to run in seasons which will be approximately 6 months in duration.

This activity will be primarily supervised by "EACH ONE, REACH ONE" staff, and may also periodically involve staff from KIDSTAR Inc., The Boys and Girls Club, the Diabetes program and qualified adult community volunteers. Transportation to and from the activity will not generally be available and will need to be provided by the youth or parents/guardians.

Participants must complete all applicable stages of the activity to qualify to receive program incentives. Participants must behave in a manner which does not interfere with the enjoyment or threaten the safety of other participants and which is respectful to other participants, staff and volunteers. Participants may not be under the influence of alcohol or other drugs or use unsuitable language while participating. Participants may be excused from the activity if they do not behave appropriately.



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The Grand Canyon Skywalk Development, LLC is exploring different possibilities in offering employment opportunities to community members. We have spoken too many who have expressed an interest in working at the Skywalk, but the long commute to the job site, and daily home life obligations create obstacles.

One way to make it more convenient for potential employees is the creation of a 30 hour work week. That means working three 10 hour days and having four days off. Health insurance benefits will continue to be available. Skywalk managers have been creative in structuring operating work hours seven days a week to make this innovative work schedule a possibility. Supervisors and managers are not eligible to participate in the thirty (30) hour work week schedule.

The following positions will be offered a thirty (30) hour work week program:

- Food and Beverage prepares food, washes dishes, sweeps floors, wipes down tables, handles cash appropriately, loads and unloads delivery trucks and checks inventory.
- Customer Service greets customers, answers customer questions, coordinates with retail and photo sales to exceed guest expectations, acts a tour guide when necessary, and assists guests with special needs or requests. Ensures guest safety.
- Sales maintains retail and photo sales areas, conveys the story of the glass bridge to guests, and operates all systems in the sales department including photo sales stations and cash retail registers.
- Drivers drive a 14 passenger van from Peach Springs to Kingman to Skywalk and return.

Minimum Qualifications:

PRESCOTT, Ariz.—Yavapai College, in conjunction with Arizona Department of Economic Security, will conduct a no-cost intensive introductory course, titled "Early Child Care Professional Training." The class will meet at Kingman Academy of Learning, 3419 Harrison St., Room 14, in Kingman, AZ beginning Friday, November 7th, 2011 at 8:00am.

The 60-hour course is designed for those interested in pursuing careers working in child-care centers, pre-schools, Head Start programs or in-home child care. The 10 modules cover pertinent topics, such as child development, appropriate learning environments, nutrition/menu planning and early reading and math activities to encourage skill development.

Philosophy of Hospice Care

Despite all the advances in diagnosis and treatment, a cure is not always possible. Continued treatment, even if available may compromise a patient's quality of life. 
