**PIERCE FERRY ROAD FROM STATE ROUTE 93 TO DOLAN SPRINGS MILE POST 7.3
STRUCTURAL RESURFACING WORK TO COMMENCE ON MONDAY, JUNE 23RD**

Mohave County, in conjunction with Cactus Asphalt, will be performing structural pavement resurfacing on approximately 7.3 miles of Pierce Ferry Road in connection with the County's internationally recognized Capital Pavement Preservation Program. The Work provides a durable pavement structural resurfacing, through a proven and innovative Polymer Modified Asphalt Rubber (PMAR) binder surface treatment known as Fractured Aggregate Surface Treatment (FAST) configured for high volume roads. A FAST bituminous surface composed of a single application of PMAR binder material and pre-coated aggregate form the pavement surface preservation treatment. Such treatments act as a stress absorbing membrane to limit proliferation of reflective cracking from the underlying pavement surface layer, resist water infiltration into the pavement structure base and/or subgrade and maintain a longer surface life than conventional chip seal applications. As an interesting side note, approximately 6100 used tires collected in Mohave County will be used for the crumb rubber ingredient in the binder on this Mohave County road.

Cactus Asphalt will begin work on June 23, 2015 and anticipates completion on or about June 30, 2015. Work hours will be 6:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., weekdays only.

Project extents:

- Pierce Ferry Road – Intersection of State Route 93 to the edge of north and south turning aprons of Thirteenth Street (MP 7.3)

Motorists traveling through the Project area should expect delays of less than 10 minutes. A pilot car and flagmen will be utilized to provide maintenance and protection of traffic through the work zone and maintain single-lane roadway operations on Pierce Ferry Road.

A cook is needed for the Hualapai Scholarship Hunt. This hunt is a 16 day hunt beginning on August 16 - August 31, 2015. The hunt may or may not last the entire 16 days.

We are seeking bids from cooks to prepare and cook all meals, and provide snacks necessary during the length of camp, including conducting all things necessary to keep a clean presentable kitchen. The cook must be friendly and willing to interact with hunt guide and the hunter. Expect to cook for up to 5 people daily.

Title: Construct livestock holding pens and shade covers at the 4H, Youth and Agriculture Facility on the Hualapai Indian Reservation.

Requested By: Hualapai Tribe, Department of Natural Resources

Project Location: Rt. 66 mile post 102.5 (Old Stockyards)

Scope of Work:

Successful bidder will construct 2 sets of livestock holding areas, each housing 10 livestock pens. Construction will include using railroad ties as ground barriers and retaining wall; using 2x12x16 wood planks for internal pen walls; and constructing a roof over both livestock holding pens. Shade cover shall also be constructed over the pens located in the southeast end of the facility. Pens are 9x12' in dimension.

Specifications

Railroad Ties shall be measured and placed in the ground for corner and gate post, also as ground barriers. Ties will also be measured and cut to fit for exterior walls for pens.

2x12x16' Wood planks shall be cut to fit the interior wall to divide up individual pens.

4 foot gates will be installed on railroad post at each livestock pen.

Misc. lumber and tin will be utilized to construct shade cover on each 9x12' pen and each of the 24x24 pens located at the Facility.

First Things First (FTF), also known as the Arizona Early Childhood Development and Health Board, is a public agency that exists to increase the quality of, and access to, the early childhood development and health system that ensures a child entering school comes healthy and ready to succeed. Passed by voter initiative in 2006, First Things First operates through a tax on tobacco products. Governed by a State Board and Regional Partnership Councils, First Things First is a decentralized organization that engages diverse constituencies to accomplish its mission. Organizational values include a focus on accountability, transparency, coordination, collaboration and on the outcomes that will ensure young children start kindergarten ready for school and life. First Things First acts in accordance with our Beliefs, Actions and Performance statements, which are attached.

The Indian tribes and nations of Arizona can participate in First Things First in one of two ways: by electing to have their tribal lands treated as separate regions by the statewide FTF Board, or by electing to have their tribal lands treated as part of the FTF regions in which their lands are geographically located. To date, 19 of Arizona's 22 federally recognized Indian tribes and nations have elected to participate in First Things First (10 as separate regions, and nine as part of the region in their geographic area). Both the Hualapai Tribe and Colorado River Indian Tribes have determined to have their tribal lands as separate regions and therefore the Board established the Hualapai Tribe Regional Partnership Council and the Colorado River Indian Tribes Regional Partnership Council.

Job Summary:

The Regional Director is responsible for the overall management of two First Things First Regional Partnership Councils: the Hualapai Tribe Regional Partnership Council which serves the communities of the Hualapai Indian Reservation located in northern Mohave County, and the Colorado River Indian Tribes Regional Partnership Council which serves the Arizona portion of the Colorado River Indian Reservation and the Town of Parker. The Regional Director is also responsible for coordinating efforts with the La Paz/Mohave Regional Partnership Council.

Distinguishing Characteristics:

The ideal candidate will enthusiastically support the vision and mission of First Things First and possess the personal qualities of integrity and credibility. In addition, he/she will have an understanding of issues that have historically impacted tribal relations and demonstrated experience applying that knowledge in positions that impact program delivery in tribal areas. She/he will have the proven ability to work within teams to accomplish multiple tasks and keep multiple pro-

jects organized and progressing. The position requires substantial effort to coordinate and work with parents; community leaders; local, state, and federal government officials; private entities and faith-based groups to improve quality and access to early childhood development programs which effectively prepare children to start school ready to learn.

Typical Duties and Responsibilities:

Under the general guidance of the Senior Director for the West Regional Area, the Regional Director is responsible for supporting the Regional Partnership Councils in fulfilling their roles and responsibilities which include:

- Serving as the First Things First representative and effectively working with the Hualapai Tribe and Colorado River Indian Tribes;
- Partnering and effectively working with the Senior Director of Tribal Affairs to support and strengthen the positive relationships with the tribes;
- Completion of a biannual regional needs and assets reports;
- Completion of annual funding plans which serve as the strategic direction of the Regional Partnership Councils;
- Management and oversight of the implementation of the funding plan;
- Understanding the importance of expanding access to high-quality early childhood development and health resources in the regions and assuming a leadership role in addressing the regions' needs;
- Coordination and collaboration with various early childhood development and health organizations, agencies and community partners;
- Leading/facilitating collaboration efforts, both within the region and cross-regionally, including the identification of service gaps, development of strategies to address the gaps, and fostering relationships with community partners that contribute to the development of an early childhood system;
- Increasing awareness of the importance of early childhood development and health;
- Building and maintaining strong working relationships with the Regional Partnership Council Members, tribal government leaders, tribal departments and programs, community organizations and agencies;
- Acting as the chief spokesperson for the Regional Partnership Councils;
- Staffing all Regional Partnership Council meetings and committees as determined by the Regional Partnership Councils; and,
- Ability to travel throughout the regions located 150 miles apart, the regional area consisting of Mohave, La Paz, and Yuma counties, as well as to Maricopa County for statewide meetings.

Qualifications:

- Direct experience working with tribal communities in Arizona, with a preference for experience working with the Colorado River Indian Tribes and Hualapai Tribe with extensive knowledge of American Indian sovereignty and related issues;
- Demonstrate high level knowledge of policies and conditions impacting the young children and families of Indian tribes;
- Master's degree in early education, social work, education, health or other related field preferred;
- Have a background of progressively responsible managerial or leadership positions in public, private or non-profit organizations, preferably with such experience in the area of providing early childhood development and/or health services to children and families;
- Possess a thorough knowledge of early childhood development and health issues, with knowledge of the particular issues facing Native American children and the Indian tribes and nations of Arizona. Demonstrate the ability to develop successful strategies to address those issues;
- Demonstrate a strong record of leadership in early childhood development, literacy and/or health programs;
- Possess a demonstrated ability to develop and implement strategic long-range plans that promote program goals such as increasing early childhood development opportunities, increasing access to preventive health programs and health screenings and providing training and education to support early childhood development providers;
- Possess a collegial leadership style and an ability to work effectively and cooperatively in working relationships with staff, parents, community leaders, tribal leaders, local governments, public and private entities and faith-based groups to improve the quality of and access to early childhood development and health programs in the regions;
- Exhibit highly-developed interpersonal and communication skills, and the ability to effectively articulate the goals, strategic direction and programs of two unique Regional Partnership Councils;
- Show a commitment to uphold high ethical standards and promote sound business practices;
- Demonstrate the ability to ensure public accountability as well as measure and improve outcomes appropriate for program goals;
- Demonstrate knowledge, skill and success in generating financial support and developing cross-sector partnerships with private, public and tribal governments;

- Have competence in working effectively with a citizen governing board and volunteers to advance the interests of programs;
- Cultural sensitivity and strong familiarity with the Hualapai Tribe and/or Colorado River Indian Tribes Regions;
- Demonstrate strong communication skills including the ability to write and speak clearly, succinctly, and in a manner that appeals to a wide audience;
- Creative, solution driven, and detail oriented with the ability to self-motivate and meet competing deadlines;
- Reliable and comfortable working with minimal supervision and maintaining multiple responsibilities with regular and punctual attendance at work during core business hours.



Gamyu:je! This week I would like to explain a few things related to the Hualapai Constitution, the Law and Order Code, Rules of Court, and how they affect what the Court does in its work. First of all, the Constitution is the supreme law of the Hualapai Nation. It is the guiding document that empowers the Hualapai Government to act. It also describes the basic layout of Hualapai Government. As I have mentioned in the past, Hualapai Nation is divided into two Departments. They are the Legislative Department and the Judicial Department. The Legislative Department is the Tribal Council. The Tribal Administration is under or beneath the Tribal Council. The Tribal Council is the Chairman's and Vice Chairperson's bosses - as a group - not individually. The other branch of Government is the Judicial Department, where the Tribal Trial (first level) Court and the Court of Appeals are located. This structure of government is different from other nations, such as the United States, where it has three branches of government: The Judicial (Courts), Legislature (Congress), and the Executive (Office of the President). Other Tribal governments are set up similar to the United States. Hualapai is different and of course unique in its plan of government.

The Constitution not only tells us how the Government is structured, it also prescribes the powers of government, what the Departments (Council and Court) can do. The Constitution also places limits on the both branches particularly when it comes to rights of 'persons' - not necessarily Tribal Members, but all persons. Every person under the jurisdiction of Hualapai Nation has rights. This is particularly important given that this week the World is coming to Hualapai and all our guests have certain rights that must be guaranteed.

The Hualapai Law and Order Code explains more specifically what conduct is inappropriate or illegal, and how the Tribe will operate to enforce proper behavior. The Code prescribes all sorts of specific actions and how issues or controversies shall be addressed, by the Court, law enforcement, Tribal Prosecutor, the Council, Tribal Departments, and others. There are other Ordinances that the Tribe has put in place over the years, which many of us do not even know about. One thing you should know, however, is that ignorance of the law is generally not an excuse to not follow and obey the law. Remember, there was a Revised Code passed by the Council in 2004, which went into effect in July of that year. There are sections of the Revised Law and Order Code that we all must pay particular attention to. Over the past few months the Court has responded to various requests which make it clear that the Code is not well known by defendants, inmates, and family of both. For instance, the Revised Code does not allow for 2 for 1 status in detention. Each defendant/inmate must serve at least $\frac{3}{4}$ of their ordered detention before they can ask for early release or parole. In the past, the Court was able to release people at half of the defendant's time. Also, there is a Mandatory Sentencing section for some clauses in the Criminal Code that demand that the defendant/inmate serve all the ordered time before he/she is allowed to be released. Another section to pay attention to is the sentencing schemes in the Domestic Violence Chapter. There are rules for release in that section that must be adhered to by the Court. And remember, the Court cannot deviate from what the law states. The Court can only interpret the law if there is ambiguity or lack of clarity.

Finally, there are Court Rules which describe the Judiciary's procedure and process. These rules are not made by Council. While the Council can alter these rules, until they do so, Rules of Court are made by the Judiciary in order to make the judicial process work more easily and more understandable. Court Rules, however, cannot be contrary to the law the legislature passes. As I mentioned in a previous article, there were some General Administrative Orders that were in opposition to tribal law, which I readily vacated. The Court is always willing to work on making the Court process better and for ways to incorporate non-adversarial means to adjudication (hearing cases). I hope over time to help make the Hualapai Judicial Process more unique, and not a mere copy of Anglo American courts. Well, keep working hard on being at peace with one another and striving for the good things that life has to bring. Until next time, Hankyu and Ha:nk Wayo:hiyu.
