Kingman Gives Sergeant a Warm Homecoming

KINGMAN - Christmas is a great time for homecomings. The scars on Sgt. Tyrell Manakaja's face failed to dim his bright smile as he deplaned from a Gulfstream jet at the Air'Zona Aircraft Services building at Kingman Airport and Industrial Park on Monday.

There to greet the injured former Peach Springs resident were members of the Patriot Guard Riders, who ran a flag line for Manakaja. Representatives from various Kingman-area veterans' organizations were on hand as were a contingent of flag-bearing employees of Home Depot.

Emotions ran high two days before Christmas as Manakaja shook hands or hugged a couple dozen well-wishers. They were there to welcome Manakaja home. They were there to thank him for his sacrifice. They were there to show respect to a wounded warrior. Also on hand were his parents, Edison and Deborah Manakaja - and they were the happiest of all.

Manakaja was on his second tour in Iraq when shrapnel from an improvised explosive device tore through the walls of the Humvee he was in on a Baghdad street on June 25, 2009. An infantryman assigned to the 1st Battalion, 5th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division, Manakaja, 28, remembers the day he was injured along with his driver and gunner, who lost a leg, while they were on patrol. "It was an ambush," he said. "That's what it was. The IED went off on the side of us and it shot projectiles of molten copper right through (the vehicle)," he said.

His injuries were severe. "My nose was blown off," he said matter-of-factly. "My neck was opened up because shrapnel severed my carotid artery. I almost lost my eye." Doctors were able to salvage his leg. Burn scars on his face and a slight limp are the only outward signs that Manakaja was ever injured.

Like the overwhelming majority of troops who have survived horrible wounds in the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, Manakaja considers himself lucky. If he has any regrets, it might be that his injuries forced him to retire from the Army, where he planned to spend his working life.

After being treated in Germany, Manakaja was flown to Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio, where he and his fiancé, Keria Harlan, and their two sons, Maximus and Maddox, live. At Brooke, Manakaja said the physical therapists show little mercy to wounded warriors like him, saying it felt more like "training for Special Forces" than convalescence. "I'm taking it easy right now," he said. Manakaja said he intends to restart his college career in the coming months, with a plan to major in civil engineering. "We're glad he's home," said Edison Manakaja. Manakaja and his family were flown to Kingman from San Antonio thanks to the Veterans Airlift Command, a group that provides transportation to wounded warriors for both medical care and happier occasions, like Christmas homecomings. ■

Bid Notice for Historic Building Signs in Peach Springs and Valentine

The Hualapai Planning and Economic Development Department, in association with the Hualapai Cultural Resources Department, is soliciting bids from sign companies to fabricate and install several interpretive signs for historic buildings in Peach Springs and Valentine, Arizona. Bids will be received at the Planning and Economic Development Office, 887 West Highway 66, Peach Springs, Arizona 86434, phone (928) 769-1310, until 2:00 P.M. Arizona Time, February 28, 2014. At that time bids will be publicly opened and read aloud.

The work to be performed under this contract is subject to procurement practices as outlined OMB Circular A-102 and the contractor's eligibility as set forth in Executive Order 12549. Bids will be accepted from both Indian-owned and other firms for this project. A 5% bid preference in the award of contracts and subcontracts shall be given to Indian organizations and Indian-owned economic enterprises. In accordance with 43 CFR 12.76, the Hualapai Tribe will take affirmative steps to assure that Minority and Women Owned Businesses are utilized where possible as sources of supplies, equipment, construction, and services.

Prospective bidders are invited to attend a pre-bid conference at the Hualapai Council Chambers, Peach Springs, AZ at 10:00 AM on Thursday, February 13, 2014, at the Hualapai Cultural Center, 880 Route 66, Peach Springs. At the conference, questions may be asked and clarifications made relative to the type, style and size of the signage. Signs should meet or exceed the minimum standards set by the two existing interpretative signs placed at the Osterman Gas Station, the Hualapai Trading Post and the Route 66 Park. The project sites may be visited after the meeting. 

PHOENIX (Jan. 23, 2014) – Arizona Department of Environmental Quality officials announced today that the fifth annual Lake Havasu City free electronics waste recycling event will be held Saturday, Feb. 8 from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. in the Police Station parking lot, 2360 McCulloch Blvd. North, across the street from City Hall.

ADEQ and its partners -- City of Lake Havasu City, Keep Havasu Beautiful Committee and E-Waste Harvesters of Phoenix -- anticipate collecting tons of unwanted televisions, computer equipment, monitors, batteries, chargers, cell phones, VCRs, CD and DVD players, printers, small appliances, fax machines, stereos, cables and cords during the event.

During the past four years, ADEQ, city workers and other volunteers have collected more than 58 tons – 117,249 pounds - of electronics waste from 1,045 vehicles, one of the most successful collection efforts that ADEQ has had in its statewide program.

“Lake Havasu City residents have embraced these annual events and made them very successful. We’re looking forward to our fifth year of this partnership,” ADEQ Director Henry Darwin said. “These events ensure that this potentially toxic stream of waste is disposed of responsibly and does not take up valuable landfill space.”

Doyle Wilson, Lake Havasu City’s Water Resources Coordinator, said he was excited about the electronics recycling event and the impact it will have on keeping electronic products out of the landfill.

“These events make a huge difference in the responsible disposal of electronics waste and take a bite out of the problem of illegal dumping in our area,” Wilson said. “We’re very happy once again to co-sponsor this event and offer the opportunity for our residents to get rid of their e-waste for free.”

Companies and individuals donating e-waste will receive a certificate of disposal for their records from E-Waste Harvesters if they want the document. E-Waste Harvesters recycles all material in accordance with state and federal regulations and will erase all hard drives received with state of the art software.





Peach Springs Elementary School is enjoying their new 19 kilowatt photovoltaic solar array which was installed in June of 2013. Thanks to donations from Mohave Electric Cooperative in the amount of \$50,000 and Grand Canyon Trust Renewable Energy Investment Fund in the amount of \$30,000, and technical assistance from the Hualapai Planning and Economic Development Department, we are now able to contribute to creating clean energy across the world and save on our future utility bills.



The new array employs 76 solar modules with each being controlled by a micro-inverter which allows the array to function optimally if shade obscures any one solar module. Since operation began at the summer solstice, the array has produced nearly 18,000 KWhrs

of electricity, valued at over \$1,800, about 85 KWhrs per day, or enough power for several homes. The array should reduce the school's electric costs by 10% annually. The school district and the Planning Department would like to thank DeVault Electric for their time and effort to design and construct the system.

We look forward to educating our students on the positive effects of solar technology and demonstrate how clean energy is the wave of the future.

Minority Children Use Appropriate Car Seats Less Often

NEW YORK (Reuters Health) Jan 13 - Many kids are not put in car seats and booster seats as recommended, studies have shown, and new data suggests that might be particularly true among non-white children. "We expected that differences in family income, parental education, and sources of information would explain the racial disparities in age-appropriate restraint use and they did not," lead author Dr. Michelle L. Macy told Reuters Health by email. Certain parents may face barriers to car seat and booster seat use that researchers haven't discovered yet, said Macy, a pediatrician at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. Or social norms could explain the differences between racial groups.

The new study took place in Michigan, where state law requires that children under four use a car seat and kids four to seven use a car seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet, 9 inches. Experts generally recommend older kids under that height keep using a booster seat as well. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says *all kids under 13 should ride only in the back seat*.


The new study was based on surveys of 600 parents of kids ages one to 12. Close to 3% of kids under age four ever sat in the front seat, compared to 10% of kids ages four to seven and 34% of kids ages eight to 12, according to findings published online January 13 in *Pediatrics*. Among four- to seven-year-olds, twice as many non-white kids sat in the front seat as white kids. For the other age groups, there was no difference based on race.

Across the board, white parents were between three and four times more likely to report using age-appropriate seats for their children than non-white parents. Parents' education and income didn't explain the racial differences in seat use, and all parents got their child safety information from similar sources. Parents most often learned to use car seats by reading the instruction manual or 'Just figuring it out.' They sought child car safety information from friends, family, doctors or nurses. The most common source of information was the Internet, which was used more often by white parents.

The researchers also found that less than 30% of kids ages eight to 12 who should have been using a booster seat, based on height, were actually using the seat. "Booster seats are extremely important," said Dr. Mark R. Zonfrillo of the Center for Injury Research and Prevention at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. "Our previous research has shown that booster seats reduce the risk of injury in a crash by 45% to 59% compared to seat belts alone," he told Reuters Health. "Motor vehicle crashes are a leading cause of death and injury for children," said Dr. Suzanne Brixey, a pediatrician at Children's Hospital of Wisconsin in Milwaukee who also didn't participate in the research. "Unfortunately, these results are not surprising and indicate that there is more work to be done to keep children safe on every trip." Macy said she gets a lot of questions about when a child should transition from one safety seat to the next, stop using a booster seat or sit in the front seat. But there are conflicting messages.

"When I care for children injured in car crashes in the Emergency Department, parents generally thought they were doing everything they could to keep their child safe," she said. "Many parents prematurely move their child into a booster seat or seat belt based on outdated recommendations that are supported by state laws for child passenger safety." For parents, Macy stressed the importance of putting kids in the back seat when possible and not rushing to "graduate" kids to the next level of restraint before they are ready.




