Bilingual books aim to preserve language for young children

(PEACH SPRINGS) - The Hualapai Department of Cultural Resources has published five children's books with a special audio component to promote early literacy and help preserve the culture of the Hualapai Tribe for the next generation.

The books will be showcased in Peach Springs during an open house from 10 a.m. to noon Friday, Feb. 28 at the Hualapai Cultural Resources Department, where elders and artists who worked on the project will talk about the books.


"This will be a great resource for young children to learn not only about their language, but about their heritage," said Carrie Cannon of the Cultural Resources Department.

The books were the result of a grant awarded to the department by the First Things First Hualapai Regional Partnership Council. First Things First is a statewide organization that partners with communities and tribes in Arizona to promote the health and education of children ages birth to five.

First Things First supports native language preservation projects through its partnerships with tribes.

Five bilingual books were developed around different themes, including common words and phrases; kinship terms; body parts; animals and geography; and lullabies. Weekly meetings were held over the last year with five fluent Elders and one facilitator to create the written and audio content. The books are designed so that a recording of the Elders will "read" the book as the child turns the page. Cultural Resources staff and an art teacher from Kingman contributed all of the original illustrations for the books.

One goal of the books is to promote pre-kindergarten language and literacy development for toddlers living in Peach Springs, many of whom attend the local Head Start where copies of the books will be made available.



First Things First Hualapai Regional Partnership Council member and Tribal Elder Lucille Watahomigie worked on the project. She said the bilingual books are a great way of incorporating the tribe's goal to preserve its culture and First Things First's goal to promote early literacy.

Watahomigie, along with several other Elders who worked on the project, was a teacher at Peach Springs Elementary School during the 1970s when linguists worked with fluent speakers at the school to create books that are no longer in print. Watahomigie has since founded a number of language development and cultural history programs and is considered a nationally recognized expert in native language preservation.

She said that in order for children to read and understand the language, they must first hear it spoken aloud, which makes the audio component of the books important.

"Written language is first how we talk, so the oral language has to be developed first," Watahomigie said.

Because the Elders also wanted to be purposeful about what they were passing down, they focused on adding terms and phrases that were in danger of fading out of the language. That's why the "Animal" book teaches words like "scorpion," rather than dog and cat, which are more commonly used in homes, Cannon said.

The "Geography" book also teaches children about places unique and sacred to the Hualapai Tribe, including Falling Rocks and a natural spring, both of which are sites in and around Peach Springs.

A total of about 300 books will be printed. They will be available to families with children ages 3 to 5, as well as other interested tribal members.

The Cultural Resources Department has worked on other projects to preserve the Hualapai language, but Cannon said the children's book project was a bonding experience for all who collaborated on it.

"It's wonderful to see it all culminate together," Cannon said. "I think that everybody that participated takes pride in it."

- 2 The permittee/licensee shall, upon completion of construction and during the equipment test period, make proper radiofrequency electromagnetic (RF) field strength measurements throughout the transmitter site area to determine if there are any areas that exceed the FCC guidelines for human exposure to RF fields. If necessary, a fence must be erected at such distances and in such a manner as to prevent the exposure of humans to RF fields in excess of the FCC Guidelines (OET Bulletin No. 65, Edition 97-01, August 1997). The fence must be a type which will preclude casual or inadvertent access, and must include warning signs at appropriate intervals which describe the nature of the hazard. Any areas within the fence found to exceed the recommended guidelines must be clearly marked with appropriate visual warning signs.

- 4 The permittee/licensee must reduce power or cease operation as necessary to protect persons having access to the site, tower or antenna from radiofrequency electromagnetic fields in excess of FCC guidelines.

- 5 The allotment underlying this construction permit was obtained through the Tribal Priority. Three Steps to Homework Success


You have probably noticed that your child has a little more homework each year. Help him/her get a handle on this year's workload with a daily plan.

- 1) **Discuss**-Begin each afternoon or evening by asking what homework they have. You can set a positive tone with comments like "I loved writing in my journal when I was your age" or "It's exciting that you're old enough for long division."
- 2) **Plan**-Ask your youngster what order they will do the work in. You might suggest that they finish her hardest subject or longest assignment as soon they get home and save easier ones for after dinner. Or perhaps they prefer to get simpler assignments out of the way to have fewer tasks ahead. They could try each method to see which works best.
- 3) **Review**-Look over your child's finished work together. You might compliment your child on something they did particularly well. Then, if you see careless mistakes, have them double-check their work but avoid telling them the answers as the teacher needs to know what your child is able to do.

What You Need to Know...

What is Staphylococcus Aureus?

Staph are bacteria that many healthy people carry on their skin or in their nose. About 25% of people in the US carry staph in their nose and it does not make them sick. Most staph infections are minor and can be treated without antibiotics. However, staph can sometimes cause serious infections like pneumonia, blood or joint infections and deep skin infections.

What is MRSA?

Methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA) is a type of staph that is not killed by penicillin and similar antibiotics.

About 1 in every 100 people carries MRSA without making them sick. MRSA infections do not look any different than ordinary staph infections.

What do staph and MRSA infections look like?

- Sores that look and feel like spider bites (but are not spider bites)
- Red painful bumps under the skin, called boils or abscesses
- Cuts that are swollen, hot and filled with pus
- Blisters filled with fluid or red skin with a honey-colored crust
- Red, warm, firm skin area that is painful and getting larger



How Do You Get MRSA?

- *Spread by direct skin to skin contact with an infected person
- *Touching surfaces that have staph on them from someone else's infection
- *It is NOT usually passed through the air!



- *If you think your child has MRSA, see the doctor. Do not ignore the sore or hope it will go away.*
- *Children can attend school with MRSA if the wound is not draining and can be covered with a dressing. Avoid activities with skin to skin contact.*

HAND WASHING IS THE EASIEST WAY TO PREVENT MRSA AND STAPH INFECTIONS!!

When should hands be washed?

- Whenever the skin comes into contact with other people or shared surfaces or equipment.
- Before and after athletic practice, games or working out.
- After sneezing, coughing, blowing or touching the nose.
- Before and after touching the eyes, nose or mouth or skin that has open sores, boils or rashes.
- After using the toilet or urinal.
- After touching any item soiled with wound fluids, such as bandages, dressings or bedding.
- After cleaning the bathroom, changing your bedding or doing laundry.
- Before preparing food, eating or drinking.

How are MRSA infections treated?

Some staph skin infections are treated by draining the sores and may not require antibiotics. Draining should ONLY be done by the doctor! If the doctor gives you antibiotics, make sure you take ALL the medicine, even if you are getting better. Do NOT share your medicine or

save it for another time. Call your doctor back if the infection does not get better after a few days. If someone you live with or know gets the same infection, tell them to go to the doctor!


