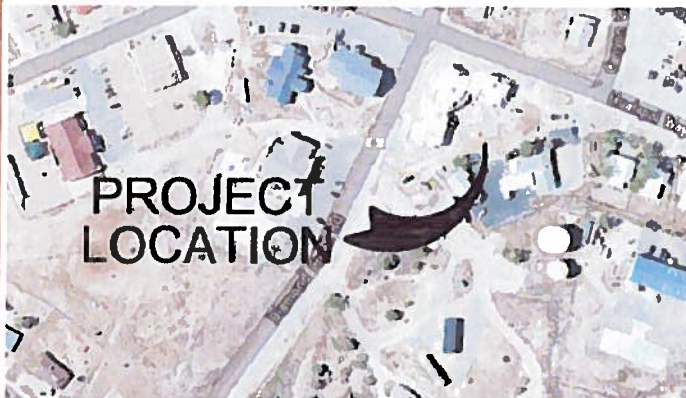

A mandatory Pre-Bid Conference will be held at 10:00 AM on April 24, 2014, in the conference room of the Health & Wellness Center located at 488 Hualapai Way; Peach Springs, AZ 86434.

The work to be performed under this contract is subject to Section 7(b) of the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act (25 U.S.C. 450b). A 5% bid preference in the award of contracts and subcontracts shall be given to Indian organizations and Indian-owned economic enterprises.

Hualapai Nation Implementing SORNA Compliance • Submitted by Hualapai Police Department

Compliance



On July 27, 2006, the United States passed the Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act (SORNA), also known as the Adam Walsh Child Protection and Safety Act of 2006. Under SORNA, every State, Tribe and Territory is required to register all sex offenders who live, work or go to school within their jurisdiction.

To comply with the key provisions of SORNA, on June 22, 2012, the Hualapai Tribal Council amended the 2004 Criminal Offenses of the Law and Order Code for the Hualapai Tribe, Section 6.126 to 6.139 Sex Offender Registration. The new provisions of the code require sex offenders who live, work or go to school on the Reservation to register with the Hualapai Nation Police Department, subject to the requirements of the code.

In addition, the Tribe is also required to set up a public website related to sex offender registration. The Hualapai Tribe is currently in the process of enacting key provision of SORNA.

Rep. Gosar to Hold Downwinders Field Hearing

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Congressman Paul A. Gosar, D.D.S. (AZ-04) will hold a field hearing in Kingman, Arizona on April 14, 2014. The hearing will focus on expanding eligibility for benefits under the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act to all residents of Mohave County affected by downwind radioactive contamination, also known as "downwinders."

BACKGROUND:

In 1990, Congress passed the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act (RECA) to compensate people (or their surviving beneficiaries) who were diagnosed with specified cancers and chronic diseases that are assumed to have resulted from exposure to radiation from U.S. nuclear weapons tests between 1952 and 1962. The "downwinder" category currently includes all of Coconino, Yavapai, Gila, Navajo and Apache counties, but only parts of Mohave County.

In January 2013, Rep. Gosar introduced H.R.424, the Mohave County Radiation Compensation Act of 2013, which would make all affected residents of Mohave County eligible for radiation exposure compensation. Currently, only the parts of Mohave County north of the Grand Canyon and west of the Colorado River, commonly referred to as "the Arizona Strip," are eligible for compensation under the law.

Mohave County is closer in proximity to the Nevada Test Site than the other Arizona counties eligible for radiation exposure compensation. A survey conducted to compare radiation-induced cancer incidences in the RECA-covered counties also showed that Mohave County had the second-highest overall incidence rate. The National Research Council and the National Academy of Sciences both concluded in separate studies that all of Mohave County should be covered by RECA. ■

GCRC Leadership Development Program

Deadline: Wednesday, April 16, 2014

The GCRC Leadership Development Program Interns will participate in a two-year program of on-the-job training, in-house learning and external academic learning. This will lead to a certification of leadership from GCRC and an academic degree from an approved institution. During the program, Interns will be considered full time employees of GCRC and will abide by and receive the benefits of the Employee Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual. After successfully completing all the requirements of the Leadership Development Program, Interns will be eligible to apply for leadership positions within GCRC.

The GCRC Leadership Program is guided by Native American professional trainers who will provide a culturally specific training model rooted in the traditional teaching of storytelling, laughter, family, spiritual outlook, and honoring the community. The GCRC Leadership Development Program recognizes and honors the Hualapai tradition of personal empowerment through living a healthy life and the connection to community by giving back through service. Each intern will expand on their skill sets to become inspiring leaders who effect change in their personal lives, family life, and professional life.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR PARTICIPATION

Leadership Intern Candidates applying to the Tribal Leadership Development Program must meet all of the following criteria:

Must be an enrolled Hualapai Tribal Member;

Must have satisfactorily completed high school or GED Certificate;
(Having already acquired college or trade school credit hours with a 2.5 grade point average for College or passing grade for Trade Schools is a plus; Must submit an official transcript during application process.)

Must be in good standing, meaning must not have received a disciplinary suspension, disciplinary transfer or disciplinary demotion in the previous six months. Must not have been terminated or resigned without a two week notice from GCRC or the Tribe in the previous 90 days.

Must have clean background check and drug test;

Must submit a written essay in application for the Leadership Development Program that demonstrates his/her written communication skills, strategic thinking skills, and visionary and leadership ability.

Must submit two written nomination forms completed by an employer, colleague, teacher, spiritual leader, community leader, etc.;

Must be able to commit two (2) years to fully participate in and complete the Leadership Development Program. Must be able to work a minimum of 40 hours a week if selected as a Leadership Intern. (example: an intern cannot work for the Tribe and be concurrently enrolled in the Leadership Program).

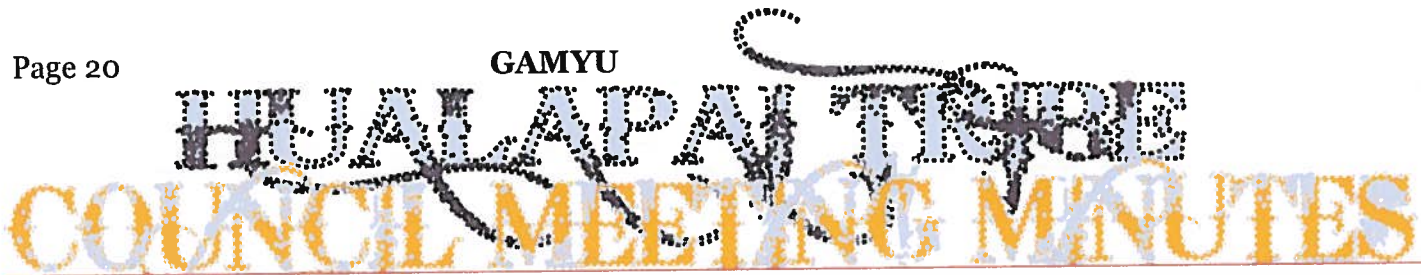
Mohave County Museum Exhibit to Recognize & Honor Hualapai Veterans

All members are appointed by their state board therefore she will get their recommendations on how to handle this situation.

3. **PUBLIC WORKS - Philip Wisely**

Mr. Wisely is requesting for a special meeting for a presentation of the Water Supply Study Conceptual Design Review during the week of January 21st. The field work for the Water Supply Study was performed by Dowl-HKM.

Council set January 21st at 9 am for a special meeting.

In regards to Truckee, Vice Chair requested the files on Truckee from Mr. Wisely; therefore before any date is set for a meeting the committee sits down and goes through all the documents to see what had transpired from previous meetings.

Sewer ponds in Peach Springs

Mr. Wisely reported that the structural integrity of a couple of sewer ponds was starting to fail, such as leaking from one pond to the other.

IHS has funding and recommends a wastewater study be completed to present the most feasible alternatives to address the lagoon capacity issue in Peach Springs. To accomplish preliminary work in evaluating wastewater treatment and disposal options the letter will constitute an agreement between the IHS and the Hualapai Tribe. The estimated cost to of study is \$38,000 of IHS funds.

An analysis of water flow was done and showed that a minimum flow of 40 gallons of water per day was occurring in the middle of the night when there should be less activity in homes. The flow is into the lagoon, so there may be leaks in homes that are not being reported. 40 gallons adds up per minute. The leaks do include outside faucets as that water does not flow into the lagoons.

Ronnie suggested that someone either from Housing or Public Works go house to house and check for leakages.

Mr. Wisely will set up a program to do that.

Rudy motioned to allow the Chairwoman to sign off on the planning of the Sanitation facilities and that the funding is contingent on availability of funds, for overall project feasibility, and other factors. Seconded by Ronnie. Vote: 9 for. Motion carried.

FEMA - Letter- Mobile Homes

Maintenance Report

The report noted the status on homes currently being worked on, number of days to complete and number of men working on units. There are two temporary placements with applicants already assigned to move in once the temporaries move out. Two units are currently vacant, families given a deadline to remove all belongings.

Housing maintenance takes care of rental units and Public Works under the tribe maintenance the ownership homes.

Issues addressed: Homes not being completed in a timely manner. Water leaks are an issue when not reported and causes more damage to homes. Better communication between staff on call for emergencies. Housing staff can only stabilized ownership homes in emergencies.

Issues addressed: Concerns with the Waiting List on the dates when first applied and last updated. Applications are suppose to be updated yearly but by looking at the list some never did. Staff needs to work with the applicants on getting applications updated if still interested and if not take them off the list. Some applicants already had a HUD home but gave it up and applying for another home.

Elaina stated the waiting list is based on preference points that were established by previous administrators and that is what each applicant's eligibility is based on.

Hilda present at 1:40pm, making 8 members present.

Issue with the tenant and animals came before Council and Housing was directed to work with tenant and work out issues.

Vice-Chair feels that Housing has procedures/guidelines to follow and if not complying go with what is written and suggested a letter be written regarding non compliance and start the eviction process as we have tribal members requesting for homes.

Mike voiced his concerns with codes, policies, regulations that we adopt.

This issue was clarified at the NAHASDA training that there is no conflict with Council being the Board. But due to Council being the Board all issues go to the Court for a final decision.

Carrie has concerns with Council being the board and feels it's not right and also discussed with Vice Chair the essentials for families.

Council discussed repurchasing several ownership homes that are boarded up.

Issues: land lease, rental homes vandalized by own tenants, inspection of rental units not being done, spending funds having to fix same homes over and over, tenants to be held liable for damages they cause. Elder's homes are being damaged by their own grandkids. Tenants changing locks on rental units when not allowed. Why non tribal members are allowed to reside in homes when tribal member no longer lives there.

The recommendation is to go with previous motion to move family into the 4 bedroom.

Homeownership Report

Working on annual recertifications and current ones for the year.

Finishing rescheduled annual inspections

Follow up on ownership home in which tenant is not eligible.

Follow up on homes eligible for conveyance

Issue: Deeds are in BIA's hands, there were efforts on numbers not matching. Housing requested to follow up with a list of names that are in need of their deed.

Higher Education Rental Assistance Program

12 applicants submitted for the spring semester. Of the 12, 5 are new, 3 pending, 1 ineligible. 8 were complete and being assisted.

There is no appeal process for the Higher Education Housing Policies.

Emma would like to see the staff person that works with the education housing policies be a part of the Education Committee as it used to be. There is now an issue before Council requesting for housing assistance and feels the Tribe should assist this individual.

Council briefly discussed the issue and felt the Housing policies need to be looked into.

Rudy motioned to approve request from Applicant to pay for his housing for the spring semester from the Housing Higher Education Assistance. Seconded by Emma. Question. Vote: 6 for, 2 not voting, 1 excused. Motion carried.

Update- Box Canyon Project

Finishing up bid cost for infrastructure for Phase 2 Box Canyon Project by Dahlgren Consulting.

Mohave Electric's estimated cost to mark out for public utilities easement is \$67,000 in which \$3,000 has been paid leaving a balance of \$64,000, includes the 42 lots.

Under the IHP requested to build 2-3 homes as well as the retaining walls for some of the new homes. In regards to employee housing, no word received from IHS or GCW. Request to have a representative come and share information on Section 104 at next month's board meeting.

Emma excused at 3:41pm due traveling.

It was confirmed that MEPA be can part of the NAHASDA homes.

The invitation states that we have a similar tourist attraction, resources and background and international exchanges, in promoting both designations. We will only pay for our roundtrip flight and they will take care of everything else.

Council supports as this would be a great opportunity to advertise our business.

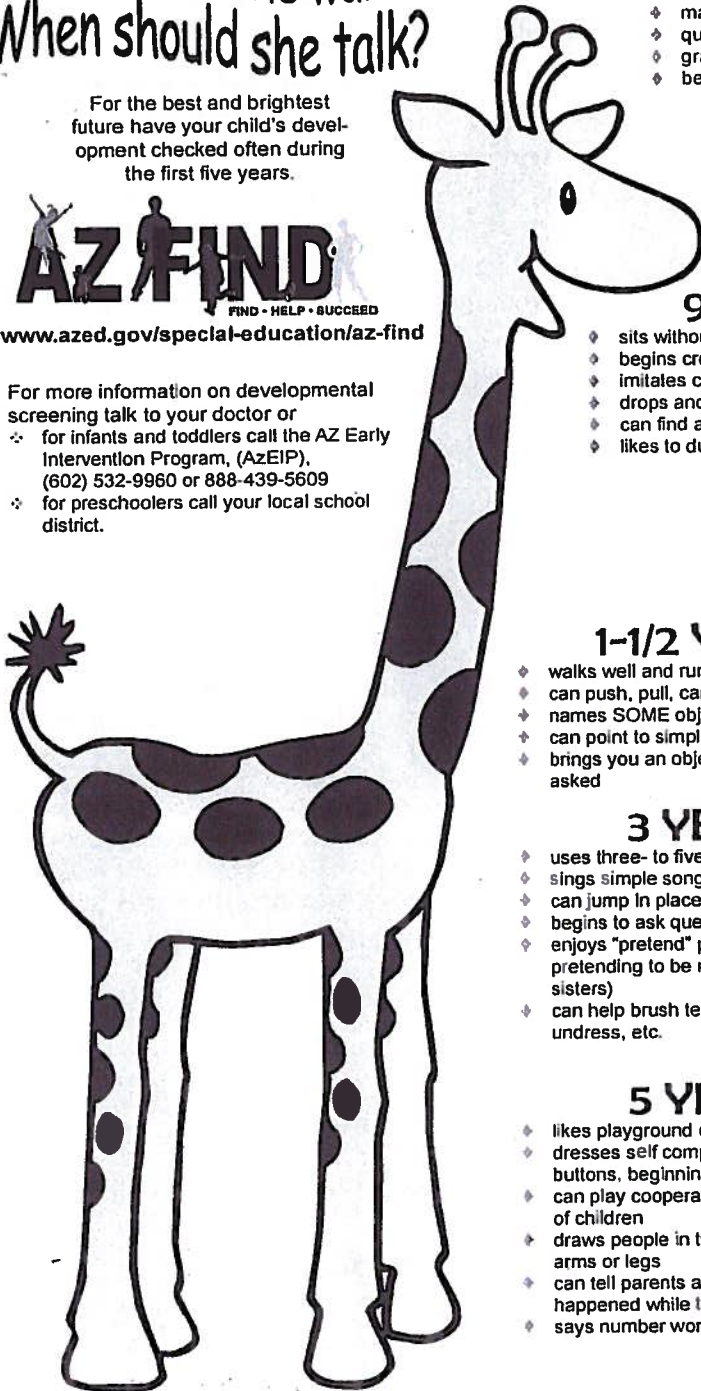

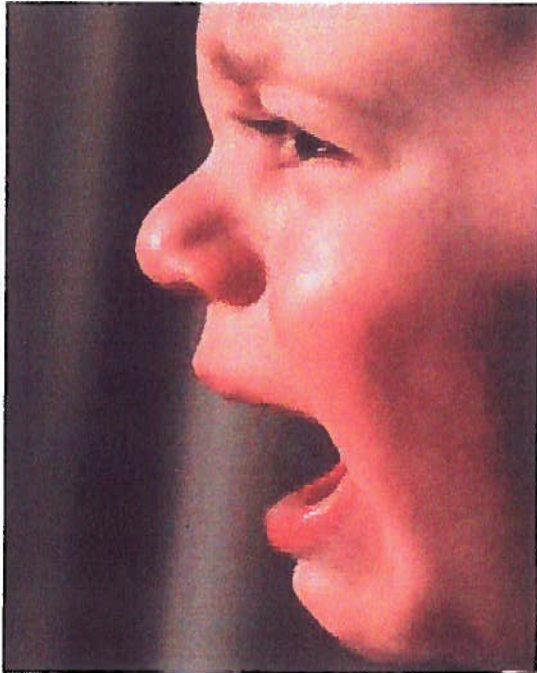

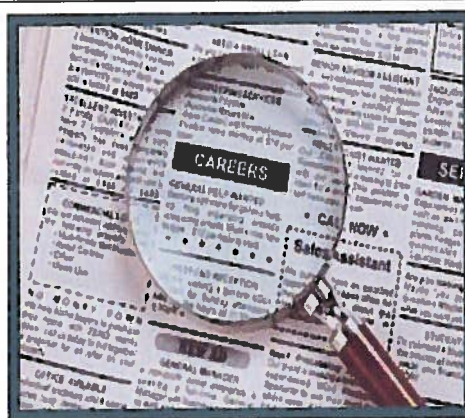

HDNR has partnered with the AZGFD Hunter Education program to offer a Hunter Safety class during the Week of Camp. The Natural Resources Youth Training Camp, including Hunters Education, is open to tribal and nontribal members ages 8-18. Youth Big Game hunters (Ages 10-13) need a Hunters Education card to hunt. Participants take the hunter education test at the end of the course to receive certification. In order to pass the course, students must pass a 50 question multiple choice test with a grade of 80%, demonstrate to the instructor that he or she can safely handle a firearm through practical exercises and participate in live firing.

The camp is more than just a hunter certification course. Kids are exposed to all facets of environmental sciences, wildlife management, safety training, plant and wildlife identification, trapping methods and ethics, bow and muzzleloader shooting, sporting arms instruction and field work in the utilization of the skills they learn, and finally horsemanship.

All camp participants are encouraged to bring their horses to camp if they have one. If not, one can be leased for use during the camp. Please let us know.

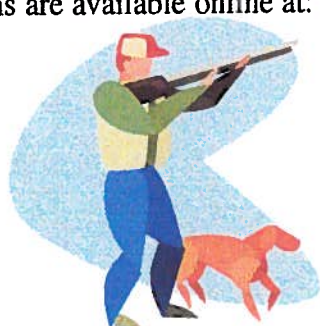

5.
