I am running for Council. I have had the opportunity to serve on the Council at the age of 25 under the Old Constitution, at a time you had to be nominated from the floor. In addition, I was elected as the first woman to serve as the Chairwoman for the Hualapai Tribe, under the Old Constitution in 1988 and served a second term. In between, I've served as Council throughout the years. I ran for the seat of the Vice Chair in 2000, won and served out my term in 2004. From 1996 to 2000, I served as a Council Member and from 2000 to 2004, served as the Vice; having served eight years straight for the Hualapai Tribe.

I have been out of the political arena for the past 10 years, looking in from the outside; having done this, my perspective has been different. I look around and wonder what happened to our tribal members, our own way of life, our own tribal laws and being able to employ our tribal members.

I will not make promises, but what I will do is to stand ground to enforce all the policies and procedures, our Ordinances' and our Tribal Constitution. When these documents were made, it was understood as to the intent and purpose for the best interest of the Hualapai Tribe. Documents need to be reviewed from time to time, but it must be done in the right way, where everyone understands the goal and if need be, bring the matter to a vote of the enrolled tribal members.

I have gained the experience in tribal government by serving as a Tribal Council Member, as the Chairwoman and Vice-Chairwoman for the Hualapai Tribe. I also had the opportunity to serve as an Associate Judge under Jolene Marshall, when she was the Chief Judge. Therefore, I have the experience and will think through issues before casting my vote for decisions that will impact our Tribal Members.

I humbly seek your vote to serve as a Tribal Council member for the next four years.

I am very concerned about the tribe and where we are going in the future. Although I am not familiar with politics and the legislative body of our government I am willing to work effortlessly to learn the political and social issues that surround and affect our community.

Although I do not always see eye to eye with how the council does things... I am willing to work as a team player so that we can get things accomplished. In addition, I believe in better management at the West End and in holding those responsible and accountable for their actions. I would like to see more Hualapai members in management position and see them as shadow employees and moving up the employment ladder. I want better pay for our tribal member and profit sharing when possible.

Finally, it is beneficial to the Hualapai and tribal members that we employ and promote our own people and although we must be willing to hire outside peoples we still must look at our members first.

If elected, I promise to work towards the betterment of the community and to uphold the laws and policies of the Hualapai Nation.

A cook is needed for the Natural Resources Youth Training Camp. The camp will be June 23-27, 2014.




**** Earn your AZ Hunters Safety Certificate at the Natural Resources Youth Training Camp. ****

HDNR has partnered with the AZGFD Hunter Education program to offer a Hunter Safety class during the Week of Camp. The Natural Resources Youth Training Camp, including Hunters Education, is open to tribal and nontribal members ages 8-18. Youth Big Game hunters (Ages 10-13) need a Hunters Education card to hunt. Participants take the hunter education test at the end of the course to receive certification. In order to pass the course, students must pass a 50 question multiple choice test with a grade of 80%, demonstrate to the instructor that he or she can safely handle a firearm through practical exercises and participate in live firing.

The camp is more than just a hunter certification course. Kids are exposed to all facets of environmental sciences, wildlife management, safety training, plant and wildlife identification, trapping methods and ethics, bow and muzzleloader shooting, sporting arms instruction and field work in the utilization of the skills they learn, and finally horsemanship.

All camp participants are encouraged to bring their horses to camp if they have one. If not, one can be leased for use during the camp. Please let us know.



Medical Transport – Update 5-28-2014****DESCRIPTION OF TRANSPORTATION SERVICES**

The Hualapai Tribe through the Hualapai Health Department's Non-Emergency Medical Transport provides transport services which include services to the elderly and disabled. The Hualapai Tribe is a Tribal Government which provides governmental services for individuals who live on the Hualapai Indian Reservation. One of those services is Non-Emergency Medical Transportation.

Hualapai Health Department's Transport Services

1. The priority is medical transports. These trips are for medical appointments or for medical admissions. The trips are requested by completing the Non-Emergency transport form located at the Health, Education and Wellness Reception desk. Please attach a copy of your appointment slip. The completed transport request and appointment slip. Submit transport request as soon as you know you need the transport. The completed transport form should be given to the HEW Reception staff. If you do not receive a call informing you that you have been scheduled, you may call 928-769-4188. The trips are provided between 3 AM to 10 PM, Monday through Friday. The trips are normally made to Kingman, Arizona but also include, Flagstaff, Phoenix, Parker, Tucson Arizona and occasionally to Las Vegas, Nevada. Seat belts and car seats are required for all transports. You must bring your own car seat.
2. AHCCCS is billed for medical transportation for those Individuals who are on AHCCCS or who may qualify. Non-AHCCCS ,who qualify, patients are covered through the Hualapai Tribe's general funding.
3. Non-Medical Transports. There is a charge for other types of transports of \$10.00 per 100 miles per person. Those trips include: food bank, shopping, pick-up or drop off at various places, trips to medical facilities where their immediate relative has been flown or taken by ambulance, individuals who need to pick up their vehicle, shop for a program, and other social or program issues that may arise. The trips are available between 8 AM to 5 PM, Monday through Friday. The trips are made to Kingman, Flagstaff, Parker, Phoenix, Las Vegas, Supai Hilltop.
Local transports may be provided if a driver and vehicle are available.
If an escort is needed, please complete that portion of the transport form.

Summary Statement

The driver may encounter a situation not covered in this or the Hualapai Tribe's Policy and Procedure and may not be able to discuss alternatives with the Supervisor or Director and will need to make the best decision they can. In these instances, they must notify the Supervisor/Director as soon as possible and follow-up with a letter explaining what happened - follow-up and outcome. The Hualapai Tribe does not discriminate against any individual on the basis of race, color, sex, religion, national origin, age, pregnancy, disability and/or sexual orientation.



The Sun is the symbol of life, without it nothing is possible - plants don't grow - there will be no life - nothing. The Sun also represents the dawn of the Hualapai people. Through hard work, determination and education, everything is possible and we are assured bigger and brighter days ahead.

The Tracks in the middle represent the coyote and other animals which were here before us.

The Green around the symbol are pine trees, representing our name Hualapai - PEOPLE OF THE TALL PINES -

Gamyu' The Hualapai Nation is pleased to announce that it has recently received a modified permit from the Federal Communication Commission (F.C.C.) to construct a commercial FM radio station in the Peach Springs community. As Tribal Council liaison to the Radio Station program, I would like to take this opportunity to share some information about the radio station with you.

The radio station mission is to:

- Be a mechanism in the community that will encourage and assist in preserving the Hualapai community and its' traditions, culture and language;
- Provide a variety of educational, entertaining, informative and cultural programming, both local and national, that will serve all age groups, interests and related needs on the reservation;
- Promote and enhance timely and accurate communication about local news, events, and emergencies on the reservation.

While the radio station programming will accordingly strive to be primarily community-oriented, KWLP/EPCH will also operate as a commercial radio station. This means the radio station will shortly begin to sell and run advertising and to charge for radio station services, as do other commercial radio stations. Because it is a community radio station, however, it will charge reduced rates and provide the opportunity to trade services for Tribal Departments and Hualapai Community members. It is the desire of the Tribal Council that by doing





Call to Order/Welcome

The regular meeting of the First Things First Hualapai Tribe Regional Partnership Council was held on March 12, 2014 at 9:00 a.m. at the Hualapai Health Education and Wellness Department in Peach Springs, Arizona, 86434.

Members Present

Reverend Pete Imus, Chair; Candida Hunter, Vice Chair; Omaovensí Coochwytewa; Darren Hudak; Charlene Imus; Sandra Irwin; Dr. Anthony Perkins and Barbara Tinhorn

Members Absent

Joyce Holgate and Lucille Watahomigle

Chair Imus called the meeting to order at 9:18 a.m.

Possible Approval of February 12, 2014 Meeting Minutes

Vice Chair Hunter made a motion to approve the February 12, 2014 meeting minutes. Member Irwin seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Call to the Public

There were no responses to the call to the public.

Regional Partnership Council Member Announcements

Chair Imus introduced Loveena Watahomigle, Youth Council Treasurer, who was present at the meeting.

Member Irwin announced submission of the Circles of Care grant application to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMSHA) for Maternal Child Health to coordinate those who work with young children in the community.

Chair Imus announced the Youth Council's Family Fun Night, the Spring Break Carnival, and the Color Run.

Fiscal Year 2014 Implementation Update

Regional Director Ashley Pascual reviewed the second quarter grantee report, and noted that in following up from the last regional council meeting, she connected the TEACH scholarship program with Sheila Halbert, Head Start Director. Director Pascual reviewed the grantee narrative data summary. Senior Director Gary Arnold inquired whether the expansion grantee (Hualapai Day Care Center) was provided ongoing training information, and Director Pascual advised they were. Director Pascual also reviewed the financial expenditures to date.

Hualapai Early Childhood System - Progress and Next Steps

Chair Imus and Director Pascual reviewed the current status of the community vision and partnership, and noted the five focus areas prioritized last year for the building up of the early childhood system. Dr. Perkins provided an update on developmental screening and services, another one of the focus areas. Dr. Perkins noted that Beth Ferry, Special Education Director for the Peach Springs Unified School District, provided training and communicated to parents and Tribal entities how and where to obtain assistance; however, a need still exists and she will continue visits as necessary. Members discussed ideas for additional outreach, and Dr. Perkins will ensure information is provided in the Gamyu. Dr. Perkins also noted some

system building efforts in the community to facilitate a smoother transition for children advancing from Head Start to elementary school, and encouraged members to help get the word out about the Kindergarten Roundup.

Chair Imus also highlighted the community vision and partnership efforts of the Youth Partners.

Members discussed the effects of domestic violence on children, and trainings that could benefit the community. There was discussion about grantee accountability through data reporting. Other ideas for partnerships were attending Hualapai Health Education and Wellness Department meetings and Head Start Policy Council meetings, possibly using the medicine wheel as a starting point for discussion on what it means to have a system in place. Members commented on the need for better tracking of data, and that a community effort with community involvement is necessary.

National Advisory Panel for Research and Evaluation

Candida Hunter, Vice Chair and National Evaluation Advisory Panel Member, discussed the role of the panel which includes data collection and evaluation, and ensuring First Things First is using the best approaches for data collection, maintenance and analysis for measuring the school readiness indicators.

Discussion on the Fiscal Year 2015 Meeting Schedule

Chair Imus led a discussion about filling vacant regional partnership council seats, and accommodating members' work schedules in order to continue meeting quorum requirements. Members agreed to consider moving the meeting time to 3:00pm in the next fiscal year, and maintaining the second Wednesday of the month. Director Pascual will provide the fiscal year 2015 meeting schedule for possible adoption at the next meeting.

Regional Director's Report

Director Pascual provided an update on the search for a new Chief Executive Officer and several other items. She will bring more information about the BUILD Arizona Initiative to the regional partnership council at a future meeting.

Director Pascual reviewed a timeline for strategic planning for fiscal years 2016-2018.







Taking your child to the doctor when he or she is feeling under the weather is simply not enough. Asking what you can do to help your child's development and learning is probably the best question.

The ultimate goal is to promote and improve the health, education, and well-being of infants, children, adolescents, families, and communities.



- enjoys doing things for self
- gets easily frustrated
- uses objects as they should be used

3 YEARS

- uses three- to five-word sentences
- sings simple songs
- can jump in place
- begins to ask questions
- enjoys "pretend" play (for instance, pretending to be mom, dad, brothers and sisters)
- can help brush teeth, wash hands, undress, etc.

4 YEARS

- can use the toilet (with few accidents)
- can balance on one foot, then the other
- can name up to three colors
- can recall parts of a familiar story
- begins to play with other children rather than alongside them

5 YEARS

- likes playground challenges
- dresses self completely, including buttons, beginning to do tie
- can play cooperatively with a small group of children
- draws people in two parts—head and arms or legs
- can tell parents about something that happened while they were gone
- says number words to ten

Dear Community, Tribal Leaders, Schools, and Day Care:

As we complete the 2013-14 school year with well-deserved Promotions and Graduations, now is the time to start planning for the next year. Plan early for school immunizations and physicals to ensure your child's health and beat the back-to-school rush. Also as advocates for public health, we are writing to express the importance of immunizations and concern about those who disregard vaccinating their children.

Keeping up to date with vaccines is very important; failing to keep immunizations current could prevent your child from attending school, pre-school, and/or day care. Today, young children receive vaccines to protect them against 14 different diseases. Getting your child vaccinated helps protect others in your community—like your neighbor who has cancer and cannot get certain vaccines, or your best friend's newborn baby who is too young to be fully vaccinated. When everyone in a community who can get vaccinated does get vaccinated, it helps to prevent the spread of disease and can slow or stop an outbreak; such as, the recent confirmed cases of Measles and Pertussis in our state. Choosing to protect your child with vaccines is also a choice to help protect your family, friends, and neighbors, too.

To be fully immunized, children need all doses of the vaccines according to the recommended schedule. Not receiving the full number of doses leaves a child vulnerable to catching serious diseases. It is important to your child's health to be up-to-date on immunizations. It is always better to prevent a disease than to treat it after it occurs. Vaccine-preventable diseases have a costly impact, resulting in doctors visits, hospitalizations, and premature deaths. Sick children can also cause parents to lose time from work.

Vaccination has protected generations of children from horrible diseases. It works because of the choices parents make to protect their children and the children of others. It also works because the community comes together to ensure our children are immunized. Together, we can protect ourselves and each other from potentially deadly diseases. Please be sure you and your loved ones are immunized on time, every time.

KIDS IN HOT CARS HEATSTROKE SAFETY TIPS FOR PARENTS AND CAREGIVERS

Kids in hot cars are a deadly combination. Whether intentional or accidental, these deaths are preventable, which makes it all the more tragic. Here are some helpful tips to make sure it doesn't happen to you.

Remember:

- Never leave a child alone in a parked car, even with the windows rolled down, or air conditioning on. Children's body temperature can heat up 3 to 5 times faster than adults. A core temperature of 107 is lethal.
- Always look in both the front and back of the vehicle before locking the door and walking away.
- Heatstroke can occur in temperatures as low as 57 degrees. On an 80-degree day, temperatures inside a vehicle can reach deadly levels in just 10 minutes.
- Never let children play in an unattended vehicle. Teach them a vehicle is not a play area.
- Always lock your vehicle doors and trunk and keep the keys out of a child's reach. If a child is missing, quickly check all vehicles, including the trunk.

Is dropping a child off not part of your normal routine? Come up with some ways to remind yourself that the child is in the car.

- Place an item that you keep on you, like a briefcase or purse, in the back seat next to the car seat, so that you'll always check the back seat before you leave the car.

- Call your spouse after you drop the child off to make sure you didn't forget.
- Have daycare call you if your child doesn't show up.
- Write a note and place it on the dashboard of the car. Or set a reminder on your cell phone or calendar. You can also download the Baby Reminder App for iPhones.

If you see a child alone in a hot vehicle:

- Call 911 or your local emergency number immediately.
- If they are in distress due to heat, get them out as quickly as possible. Cool the child rapidly, by spraying them with cool water or a garden hose. NEVER use an ice bath.

Remember: kids in hot cars are a deadly combination. Don't take the chance. Look before you lock.



Make Walking Your First Step to Preventing or Managing Diabetes

Being physically active will help you prevent or manage diabetes.

You can start by walking. It's easy to start walking. All you need is 10 minutes and a good pair of walking shoes.

How much walking should I do?

Walking for at least 150 minutes a week is best. Start out walking 3 or more times a week. Work up to 30 minutes of walking at least 5 days a week. You can break the 30 minutes into three 10-minute sessions spread throughout the day.

What kind of shoes should I wear?

Make sure that your shoes fit well. They should cushion and support your feet. Wear a clean pair of socks to protect your feet. If you have any foot problems or need help getting the right shoes, see your health care provider.

How fast should I walk?

Start slowly and go faster as you become more fit. If you cannot talk while you walk, you are walking too quickly. If you can sing while you walk, you are walking too slowly!

How can I make walking a habit?

With a little time, walking can become a habit. Try to develop a habit of walking for at least 30 minutes every day:

- Have fun! Walk with family or friends. Enjoy talking.
- Take scenic routes.
- Park a little farther from the store or your work place.
- Walk on your lunch hour or break.
- Use the stairs.
- Walk at the same time each day.
- Have a weekly schedule. Walk on most days of the week.

How can I become more fit?

First check with your health care provider to find out what activities are best for you. Try bike riding, hiking, dancing, or working out at a gym. Find out what kinds of fitness activities you can join at your tribal health center. Ask a friend, your children, grandchildren, or other family members to join you. You will be a healthy role model to your loved ones.

The Gathering brings five of the Yuman Speaking Tribes together to celebrate their history, language, narratives and culture. This years Gathering of the Pai will share the Pai People's relationship among its Arizona members and their relatives relocated to Mexico. The main purpose is to remind Pai people of their past as Native Americans and to share with the public the rich and beautiful culture. The event is open to the public.

Over the past 15 years the three Yavapai tribes, along with the Hualapai and Havasupai, have gathered together as one to recognize their relationship to each other as indigenous people. The gathering event has traveled throughout Arizona, being hosted by each of these five different Pai Tribes.

The gathering will exhibit cultural performances, food, entertainment and traditional cultural dwellings. Demonstrations of authentic arts & crafts from Pai people will be on display for the public to experience. A special naming ceremony for Ms. Pai will be conducted. The event encourages and promotes Pai People to

continue the culture and traditional ways of being Native peoples.

This agreement is entered into by and between the Yavapai-Prescott Indian Tribe (Sponsor) and _____ (Entertainer).

Description of Services: _____

- I. **COMPENSATION:** In consideration of the Entertainers, the Sponsor agrees to pay the group \$500.00 payable to the Lead Entertainer on the final day of the event. There will also be hotel room(s) given to each group. The Sponsor will determine the number of rooms.
- II. **PRESENTATION:** Sponsor agrees to furnish adequate spaces for all contracted performances and the reasonably necessary sound, lighting, and other equipment if requested in writing by the Lead Entertainer. Breaks will be determined on an individual basis by the Entertainer and shall be discussed with the Sponsor's representative. All Entertainers are required to arrive at the performance site at least thirty (30) minutes prior to their scheduled performances. Guests and visitors accompanying the Entertainers are not allowed to use a tripod, disturb the performance, or enter the performance area until after the Entertainers is finished, unless Sponsor expressly approves the additional person(s) in writing.
- III. **PHOTOGRAPHS/FILMS/VIDEOS/ AND AUDIO RECORDINGS:** Only the Sponsor's representatives are permitted to photograph, record, film, or video the Entertainers for the purpose of publicizing the event. Visitors to the event are permitted to photograph, record, film, or video the performances, with permission from the Sponsor.
- IV: **IMPOSSIBILITY OF PERFORMANCE:** In the event that the performance in this Agreement is prevented by war, illness, acts of God, physical disability, acts or regulations of applicable public authorities, labor intervention or delay of transportation services, or any other unforeseen cause beyond the parties' control, the parties shall be relieved of their obligations hereunder.

- V. **INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR:** The parties further agree that the Entertainers relationship to the Sponsor during the term of this Agreement shall be deemed to be that of any independent contractor and Entertainer is not an employee or agent of the Sponsor.
