Motor Coach Inspection and Traffic Enforcement

On July 03, 2014 from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm the Hualapai Nation Police Department in partnership with Arizona Department of Public Safety, Arizona Department of Transportation and the Mohave County Sheriff's Office, will be conducting Motor Coach Inspections and Traffic Enforcement along with speed enforcement in a collaborative effort to deter aggressive/reckless driving, and to promote passenger safety, on Pierce Ferry Road and East Diamond Bar Road, which lead up to the Hualapai Nation Tribe's Grand Canyon West Skywalk.

The goal is to deter drivers who choose to drive aggressively and/or recklessly, while educating Motor Coach Drivers on the importance of passenger safety. In 2012 there were over 34,000 deaths related to motor coach collisions. East Diamond Bar Road is traveled by more than 45,000 vehicles a month. Mohave County last observed a fatal motor coach collision in 2010. In an effort to prevent further tragedies from occurring, zero tolerance enforcement will take place during this event.

Food Boxes Help Families Stretch \$ • Friday, July 18th

Food Boxes Help Families Stretch \$\$\$

Food boxes from St. Mary's Food Bank Alliance can help families stretch their grocery budget.

The Kooyaquaptewa family said their food box, which included melons, grapefruits, carrots, potatoes, pastries and canned goods, lasted their family of five more than two weeks. That included sharing some of the items with neighbors and other family members.


"We get our meat in town, but this really helps with side and snacks," said Lomavuyouma Kooyaquaptewa.

The food boxes are provided through a partnership with St. Mary's Food Bank Alliance, the Hualapai Tribe and the Hualapai Tribe First Things First Regional Partnership Council. First Things First is an early childhood organization that supports the education and health of children ages birth to five.

"This program is to make sure people are able to get food to carry them over until they are able to get assistance, especially in homes where there are little ones," said Joann Whatoname with the domestic violence program.

The food is delivered by semi-truck on the third Friday of the month. Michael Cox with St. Mary's said demand for the boxes increases during the summer.

"When school is out, parents have to provide what the kids had been getting at school," Cox said.



The fresh fruit provided with the boxes are perfect for 4-year-old Lex Kooyaquaptewa, who pulled a fresh apple out of the box his parents were picking up.

"He likes noodles, bananas, grapes and watermelon," his dad said. "It's easy to get him to eat healthy."



UPDATE on the Tribal Vision Project for Protecting the Colorado River

The Hualapai Department of Cultural Resources sponsored a Hualapai Community Meeting on Monday June 16th at the Cultural Center. This second community meeting was a continuation of the "Tribal Vision for Protecting the Colorado River," which began last year in November. The Goals for the Tribal Vision Project (sponsored by the National Wildlife Federation and the Cocopah Tribe) are:

1. To lay the groundwork for developing and formalizing a vision of the Colorado River with habitat being actively restored and conserved by the Tribes (Cocopah, CRIT, Chemuevi, FMIT, Hualapai, and Havasupai) that have an innate bond and ownership for the land, water, wildlife and other resources.
2. Establish key working group members from each tribe to develop the vision as well as identify a broader community involvement.
3. Gather input from the tribes on the goals and objectives of the vision and begin to establish a framework of the vision.

Since November, working groups were established for each tribe: Two tribal community meetings have been held within each of the interested tribes; and two inter-tribal workshops were completed before this with each of the respective tribes participating; one at Yuma and the other in Parker.

Previous workshops discussed River issues of concern and problems, and began the sharing of knowledge about the River. It was agreed that several common themes, shared by all of the interested tribes, became apparent:

- Need for water for cultural uses
- Continuation of oral traditions – loss of culture
- Mining – Dams – Commercial use of river
- Water rights – excess water issues – water banking
- Contamination of water – drinking water quality
- Effects to the environment (plants – animals – loss of clay sources – natural resources)
- Invasive species (plant/animal) – Restoration of native species
- Creation and Natural order (prior to sovereignty). Linear thinking versus cyclic thinking.
- Respect for the Colorado River – The River is the bloodline–backbone—it is us as tribal people. Tribes view things holistically.

As a result of the June 16th meeting in Peach Springs, the following recommendations have been suggested. **We would like to have community feed-back, added suggestions, and/or other recommendations.**

A). Need for water. Each tribe put together previous information on activities that involve the River. This will help to see if there are areas that have reoccurring impacts to Culture and the Environment.

1. Hualapai have been participating on river trips for the last 25 years, if not longer, collecting information regarding plants, animals, cultural sites, environmental conditions, etc. How can this information be shared (where needed and with Tribal consent) to achieve the goals of the Tribal Vision Project?

2. Naming Places (Hualapai language) and cultural associations can be imparted to youth and Hualapai community so cultural information is not lost.

B). Each tribe convene workshops for their community covering current issues regarding:

1. Drought: how does the Hualapai tribe deal with drought? How is drought dealt with along the Colorado River Corridor and the Southwest in general?

DESCRIPTION OF TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

The Hualapai Tribe through the Hualapai Health Department's Non-Emergency Medical Transport provides transport services which include services to the elderly and disabled. The Hualapai Tribe is a Tribal Government which provides governmental services for individuals who live on the Hualapai Indian Reservation. One of those services is Non-Emergency Medical Transportation.

Hualapai Health Department's Transport Services

1. The priority is medical transports. These trips are for medical appointments or for medical admissions. The trips are requested by completing the Non-Emergency transport form located at the Health, Education and Wellness Reception desk. Please attach a copy of your appointment slip. The completed transport request and appointment slip. Submit transport request as soon as you know you need the transport. The completed transport form should be given to the HEW Reception staff. If you do not receive a call informing you that you have been scheduled, you may call 928-769-4188. The trips are provided between 3 AM to 10 PM, Monday through Friday. The trips are normally made to Kingman, Arizona but also include, Flagstaff, Phoenix, Parker, Tucson Arizona and occasionally to Las Vegas, Nevada. Seat belts and car seats are required for all transports. You must bring your own car seat.
2. AHCCCS is billed for medical transportation for those Individuals who are on AHCCCS or who may qualify. Non-AHCCCS ,who qualify, patients are covered through the Hualapai Tribe's general funding.
3. Non-Medical Transports. There is a charge for other types of transports of \$10.00 per 100 miles per person. Those trips include: food bank, shopping, pick-up or drop off at various places, trips to medical facilities where their immediate relative has been flown or taken by ambulance, individuals who need to pick up their vehicle, shop for a program, and other social or program issues that may arise. The trips are available between 8 AM to 5 PM, Monday through Friday. The trips are made to Kingman, Flagstaff, Parker, Phoenix, Las Vegas, Supai Hilltop.

Local transports may be provided if a driver and vehicle are available.

If an escort is needed, please complete that portion of the transport form.

Summary Statement

The driver may encounter a situation not covered in this or the Hualapai Tribe's Policy and Procedure and may not be able to discuss alternatives with the Supervisor or Director and will need to make the best decision they can. In these instances, they must notify the Supervisor/Director as soon as possible and follow-up with a letter explaining what happened - follow-up and outcome. The Hualapai Tribe does not discriminate against any individual on the basis of race, color, sex, religion, national origin, age, pregnancy, disability and/or sexual orientation.

Community Messages

Sobriety Gathering

Recently, I attended the 25th Annual Sobriety Gathering at 20 Pines and I found it to be a most exhilarating and fulfilling experience. So, from here I want to thank the committee members for their vision to make this experience a most memorable uplifting gathering. I'm not sure how many attended the campout, they were young and old alike there, and many campers brought their children and grandchildren: showing the children that there is a good life without the use of alcohol or other drugs. The children, with open minds and hearts, assured the campers that this community is standing in the doorway of recovery. Clearly, there is a new tree of life growing in this community and the roots are taking hold through the children.

However, as we know, children are nurtured by the parents and grandparents and there were plenty of these older types in attendance, which was a good thing to see. Many of the older types willingly participated in the activities of the weekend; attending the sweat lodge, helping out at the children's activities, helping with the cooking, or just hanging out listening to the stories of recovery and observing the activities.

However, the most vivid memory I hold of this campout is the quiet time sitting around the sweat in the cool morning hours: Just appreciating the spiritual nourishment of the early morning meditation and feeling the connection and "Oneness" with the creative force in the environment. Then, participating in the sobriety countdown; the person with the longest sobriety of 40 years to the person with just hours of sobriety. The countdown is an exercise in claiming, cherishing, and valuing sobriety. I've heard some old man in AA say that "sobriety by the yard is hard but by the inch it's a cinch." Those standing up and claiming sobriety reported different pathways to the same objective; many reported getting sobriety through the doorway of AA, others claimed church, while other claimed cultural traditions. But, no matter how differently they may have achieved sobriety, the primary ingredient is in a power greater than ourselves, namely Good Orderly Direction.


I also want to thank the Hualapai Tribal Council and GCRC for sponsoring Jewel's Ms. Indian NAU.
