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

The Hualapai Indian Tribe, through the Planning Department, has started work on a transit feasibility study to design a transit system to serve the Community. The study began in early April and will be completed in November, 2015. The study will result in a plan for tribal transit services for the Hualapai Community.

STUDY OBJECTIVES

- ldentify transit needs through data analysis, surveys, and Community discussions.
- Develop strategies to make it easier to travel within the Hualapai Reservation, and neighboring areas. Public transit strategies may include fixed route bus services, demand-responsive transit (dial-a-ride), vanpools, or a combination of services. Integration with existing transit services will also be considered.
- Provide a plan for developing transit service, including fare structure. ridership estimates, costs, organization, and funding sources.





Department of Cultural Resources Grand Canyon Monitoring River Trip May 28-June 9, 2015

The Hualapai Dept. of Cultural Resources will be conducting their annual Cultural Resources Monitoring River Trip from May 28-June 9, 2015. We have a limited number of spaces for Tribal members to participate on the trip. Our goal is to include those who have not participated in past monitoring trips and who are interested in learning about the Colorado River through the Grand Canyon, experiencing this aspect of your ancestral homeland, and contributing to the goals of the monitoring program. Additional Information for Dept. of Cultural Resources Monitoring River Trip; May 28 - June 9, 2015

The Hualapai Department of Cultural Resources will be conducting their annual Cultural Resources Monitoring River Trip from May 28-June 9,

2015 (May 28 is actually a travel day to Lees Ferry; we will launch on May 29). We have a limited number of spaces for tribal members to participate on the trip. Our goal is to include those who may not have participated in past trips and who are interested in learning about the Colorado River through Grand Canyon, experiencing this aspect of your ancestral homeland, and contributing to the goals of the monitoring program. These include:

- Monitoring archaeological sites and other Traditional Cultural Places.
- Conducting plant studies at designated study plots to identify changes in the number & types
 of native and non-native plants.
- Learning and sharing information about Hualapai Traditional Ecological Knowledge regarding plants, wildlife, and other aspects of Colorado River ecology.
- Reinforcing the Hualapai people's connection to the Canyon and River, and gaining insight
 and input on how we may help direct the management of Glen Canyon Dam and the Colorado River ecosystem, including the cultural and natural resources (which go hand in hand).

Participants will be expected to help out in one way or another. For example, younger people will help with monitoring and other aspects of field work (we'll provide training), which will involve some hiking. Elders may share knowledge about the Canyon and the River and about how the Hualapai people made their living there and in the surrounding landscape. Much of what we do will be documented through photographs and audio & video recordings.

Please be aware that this will be a 12-day river trip on a large motorized raft, which will be operated by professional staff from the Grand Canyon Monitoring and Research Center of the U.S. Geological Survey in Flagstaff. Every precaution will be taken to conduct a safe and healthy trip, but there are risks and potential hardships involved. For example, a number of large rapids will be encountered, so expect to get wet on occasion! In addition, camping each night will be required. Younger participants will be expected to sleep on pads on the ground, but we will provide cots for our elder participants. Tents will be available, but since our trip will be during the normal dry and warm season of late May & early June, they may be optional. Camping gear will be provided to those that request it.

Adequate food will be provided, including breakfast, lunch, dinner, and between meal snacks, as well as water, juices, and soft drinks, Generally, we eat quite well, so don't worry about going hungry. (We can even arrange to make some tortillas & fry bread at camp!)

If you have certain medical or dietary needs, we can accommodate these up to a point, but it is very important to know what they are beforehand, so that we can determine if we can take care of them on a trip like this, and let the boat staff know, as well.

Tinhorn's Corner

I have been thinking what is going on with our community and education? Why are some of the kids not succeeding?

Here are some hints for working with your kids:

Elementary

- Before they go to school tell them that you love them and to have a good day.
- Listen to the teachers and behave in school. When they come home ask, "What did you learn at school today?" Don't settle for I don't know. What is your favorite subject, tell me what did you learn in that subject? Ask do you have homework?
- Can I help you or can I see what your homework is? BE CON-SISTENT!

Head Start

• Spend time reading or talking with them. Go over numbers (1-10), counting, and recognizing the numbers that are written

around them. Use pinto beans with an empty egg carton to have them count pinto beans into the egg cartoon. Use their fingers to show random numbers that you say or hold up different amount of fingers and have them tell you the number. The book that your child loves to hear is called "Love You Forever" by Robert Munsch. BE CONSISTENT!

Younger Kids

- Playing games, fun and easy activities to do at home with your baby and young child.
- Play stimulates your child's curiosity, creativity, and intellect, which helps him or her
 make sense of their world. Pretend with puppets: stimulate your child's creativity by
 entertaining their fingers and hand puppets. They will exercise both their hands and
 their imagination.

What you can do at home: For infants, draw faces on your fingers and wiggle them as you make the puppets talk and sing. For toddlers, make and decorate puppets out of paper bags or old socks. For preschoolers, perform a puppet show.

Things you may need: Pens or markers, Finger puppets or hand puppets, old socks, gloves, or paper bags.

In my travels throughout Indian Country and the United States, and in my trips to Canada and Australia, I talk and teach about this phrase: "The People, Gather, Ground, and Grow." Though this phrase has minimal words, these words represent a vast array, or body, of thinking, belief, and strategies for Community & Nation Building. The phrase is a short and simple way to describe how human beings gathered themselves together to form communities then nations; developed government and organizational structures by rule of law; took roots in various places, built villages and cities; and considered community infrastructure needs as well as the needs of the environment and all the life it sustains; how all of this together must support an economy that provides individuals and institutions the opportunity to thrive. You see how simple the phrase makes it. Everywhere, all over the planet, the different Peoples continue to gather, ground, and grow. One major aspect is law and that is what I tend to speak most about to the people. So that is what this letter will briefly focus on, and in its relation to the Hualapai Judiciary.

Law can be described by the following words: Constitution, Code, Common Law; Culture, Custom, and Common Practices. We'll look at the first three. The highest law of the land is the Constitution. If you are a tribal member or resident of Hualapai Nation you should have some general idea about our Constitution. One of the roles of the Judiciary, similarly in the Courts of the United States, is to interpret the Constitution and codes when they are being read differently by people. The Court will declare what the contested words of legal texts will finally mean, at least for very specific situations, in opinions and orders for the cases that come before them. Courts communicate though these cases. These writings of judges make up what is called the Common Law. You might have heard it described as judge-made law and perhaps in the negative form, "legislating from the bench". These cases tell important stories about how, at Hualapai, the People Gather, Ground and Grow.


Codes of law, or statutes, are passed by the legislatures, or our Council. The Code has grown over the past 20 years, Just like it does for any nation or state. Our most recent revision was in 2004. The initial code was developed in the 70s. What is interesting is that even the best code writing cannot take into account every situation so general words are used to try to capture certain things. But when there is something that just isn't clear in a code of law or ordinance, then that is where a matter may ignite and become a case for the court to decide what the words mean in this instant and/or situation. The opinion joins the body of common law, and remains law until 'fixed' in the Code.

Well, I wanted to share this little bit about those three types of law and will return to the other three in the future. They are equally important and actually come from our past and history. I will hopefully be sharing more about how Hualapai's use to solve dispute between people, which is described in the Ethnography. I remember one time asking Lucy and Annie, "did they really do that", I was reading a part of it. And after a few loud rounds of Annie talking to Lucy in Hualapai, they said it is what they heard as well. So I am looking forward to that discussion. Until next letter, Hankyu and Ha:nk Wayo:hiyu.


