NATIONAL NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH, 2015

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

A PROCLAMATION

American Indians and Alaska Natives enrich every aspect of our country. As the first to live on this land, Native Americans and their traditions and values inspired -- and continue to inspire -- the ideals of self-governance and determination that are the framework of our Nation. This month, we recognize the contributions made by Native Americans since long before our founding, and we resolve to continue the work of strengthening government-to-government ties with tribal nations and expanding possibility for all.

Native Americans have helped make America what it is today. As we reflect on our history, we must acknowledge the unfortunate chapters of violence, discrimination, and deprivation that went on for far too long, as well as the effects of injustices that continue to be felt. While we cannot undo the pain and tragedy of the past, we can set out together to forge a brighter future of progress and hope across Indian Country and the entire American landscape.

Since I took office, I have worked with tribal leaders to write a new chapter in our nation-to-nation relationship. Ensuring young people have every opportunity to succeed is a critical aspect of our work together, and this year my Administration hosted the inaugural White House Tribal Youth Gathering following the launch of Generation Indigenous -- an initiative aimed at improving the lives of Native youth and empowering the next generation of Native leaders. We will also host the seventh White House Tribal Nations Conference later this year, bringing together leaders of 567 tribes to explore opportunities for progress, with a particular focus on young people. As part of our agenda for providing Native youth the chance to realize their fullest potential, I have engaged tribal communities in a range of critical areas, and we have worked together to boost high school graduation rates and afford young people more chances to pursue higher education, employment, and professional development opportunities. We're also working to expand access to health and counseling services essential to ensuring youth feel safe and heard.

My Administration has continued to partner with tribes to address vital gaps in resources for Indian Country, including equipping communities with broadband, rebuilding infrastructure, spurring economic growth, and increasing renewable energy. To confront the peril of a changing climate, we are also working

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with tribal leaders across America to develop effective approaches to protecting our communities from this grave threat. And because we know that fostering pride in the languages, traditions, and practices that make up the extraordinary richness of Native American culture is central to our shared progress, my Administration remains committed to ensuring every community feels connected to the extraordinary legacies they are a part of.

This month, let us reaffirm our responsibility to ensure each generation is defined by a greater sense of opportunity than the last, and let us pledge to maintain our strong relationship with tribal nations across America. By keeping this commitment, and by endeavoring to shape a future in which every citizen has the chance to build a life worthy of their hopes and dreams, we can ensure that ours is a country that is true to our spirit and to our enduring promise as a land where all things are possible for all people.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BARACK OBAMA, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim November 2015 as National Native American Heritage Month. I call upon all Americans to commemorate this month with appropriate programs and activities, and to celebrate November 27, 2015, as Native American Heritage Day.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this thirtieth day of October, in the year of our Lord two thousand fifteen, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and fortieth.






Figure 2. Aerial photo of proposed Sharon Wilder family site lease

Grandmother's Gathering • Event Held on October 22<sup>nd</sup>

### **Grandmother's Gathering October 22nd, 2015**



In March of this year, I was moved to approach a Hualapai Senior/Elder to hold a sacred space to begin a Circle of Grandmothers here in Peach Springs, AZ. I was moved to do this due to the loss of two young ladies in our community who committed suicide. The most recent suicide was one of my patients, a young Hualapai/Supai woman who took her own life at the end of January this year.

The Hualapai Senior/Elder woman, Ms. Jorigine Paya who I will refer to as my Hualapai Elder, accepted this challenge and on April 2, 2015 we had our first Circle of Grandmother's meeting. We had over 30 women from our community join us. Our second meeting of Grandmothers occurred on May 18, 2015, we had about 20 ladies in our gathering. We had our 3rd meeting October 1st, 2015 and even though our meeting time conflicted with the domestic violence walk we still had 12 grandmother's attend our gathering.

Our purpose in these meetings is to discuss what we can do as Native American women to empower the People, heal the land and heal our Hualapai community in a good way.

On September 28th, 2015, I was contacted by Mrs. Perci Ami, a Hopi Grandmother who saw our Grandmother's Circle flyer in the lodge. Mrs. Ami and I had a meeting and she informed me of a Circle of Grandmothers with which she is affiliated. After discussing this idea with my Hualapai Elder, Ms. Paya, and other Hualapai Grandmothers, we decided to gather together and have a cultural exchange with Mrs. Ami's group of Grandmothers.

On October 22nd, 2015, our Hualapai Grandmothers had a big gathering at the Multipurpose building. We served elk stew and fry bread to our Hualapai Grandmothers and our guests for lunch. Earldine Achee shared precious information about the Hualapai cradleboard and Delores Honga shared information with our guests about Hualapai traditions and culture. That evening we had a talking circle of approximately 50 people and then we shared a wonderful dinner together. We had gifts for all of our guests as well as for our Hualapai Grandmothers. It was a day of sharing and healing for everyone. The photo above was taken that evening.

Just a reminder that any new address change updates must be made by filling out the new Address Change Form.

The form can be found in the Gamyu, on the Tribal website, and at the Tribal Office.

Please note that this applies to all vendor checks including per capita and gaming assistance requests. **If your address has changed recently you must fill out the Address Change Form to change it.**

Phone calls, faxes, texts, emails, gaming asst applications, or other documentation will not be accepted in place of the Address Change Form.

Addresses that are not updated properly may cause a delay in the check making process including vendor checks, school clothes and other gaming assistance requests.

If you are unsure whether your address is updated please call the Tribal Office and double check.

**Important Notice**

Please note that the Minor Per Capita Applications are now available. You may find a copy in the Gamyu, on the Tribal website, or at Tribal Administration. Please make sure if you are requesting a check(s) for your child (ren) this year that you are aware of the deadline of **NOVEMBER 15, 2015.**

**Those who need to provide custody documentation must attach proper documents to application. If applications are not complete and deadline has passed monies will automatically be deposited into minor's trust account.**

**All applications must be notarized or they will not be accepted.**

**Only original applications will be accepted, so they must be mailed or turned in by hand to Tribal Office. No faxes or emails will be accepted.**

**After the deadline all monies will be deposited into the minor's trust account. No exceptions will be made.**




