The Election Board must receive all Candidate Filing Forms by the deadline of April 5, 2016 at 5:00 PM.

Primary Election:

The Primary Election will be held for Chairman and Vice-Chairman positions only. Current Council Members whose seats are **NOT** expiring in June 2016 and who wish to run for the position of Chairman or Vice-Chairman must complete a Candidate Filing Form by the deadline; however, current Council Members must also be eligible to serve a second consecutive term.

Candidates eliminated in the Primary Election for Chairman or Vice-Chairman may still seek the position of Council Member in the General Election, provided that the Candidates completed a Candidate Nomination and Filing Form by the deadline. A candidate who is successful in the Primary Election (received the first or second highest number of votes) may **NOT** run a Council Member position in the General Election.

List of Candidates

A list of candidates will be posted at the Multi-Purpose building, Tribal Office and Walapai Market on April 5, 2016.

List of Voters:

The Preliminary List of Eligible Voters will also be posted at the above locations on March 4, 2016. Written challenges to the Preliminary List of Eligible Voters for the Primary Election will be accepted by the Election Board clerk up until 5:00 p.m. on April 25, 2016.

The Election Board will make decision on all written challenges to the Preliminary List of Eligible Voters for the Primary Election by April 30, 2016. The Election Board will post the Final List of Eligible Voters on April 30, 2016.

Absentee Voting:

Absentee Voting is required in both Primary and General Elections. Voters may request an Absentee Ballot by completing an Absentee Ballot Request Form, which are available from the Election Board.

The official deadlines for the Election Board to receive your Absentee Ballot are:

Primary Election: **April 30, 2016 @ 5:00 p.m.**

General Election: **June 4, 2016 @ 5:00 p.m.**

Voters are responsible for returning their Absentee Ballots to the Election Board by the Official deadlines.

KWLP Political Advertising Disclosure

As a radio station broadcasting under a commercial license issued January 5, 2016 by the Federal Communications Commission (F.C.C.), KWLP, 100.9 FM, Peach Springs, Arizona *must* comply with certain rules and regulations regarding political advertising during designated “political windows.” These rules vary regarding federal, state and local election campaigns and issues-focused political advertising. Political windows are 45 days prior to primary elections and 60 days prior to general elections. KWLP will be applying the F.C.C. rules regarding *local* elections to the upcoming Hualapai Tribal Council elections. These rules include “equal opportunity” to “reasonable access” for “legally qualified” candidates for the same office.

If you are a “legally qualified” candidate interested in advertising on the radio, you are entitled to review the station’s public file, including the political advertising request and run contents, and to information from the station regarding:

- Classes of spots and day parts generally sold
- General rotations sold by the station
- Sales practices such as “make goods,” discounts for packages, etc.,.
- Lowest available spot rate

If you request to purchase political advertising time, you will need to complete a requisite disclosure statement (N.A.B. #17, 18) that must be kept in the station’s public file for two years.

First of all I want to give thanks to the Creator for allowing us to be here today and wish all the runners “thank-you” for your time, patience, and your sacrifice to the ones before us, who also gave us their lives and endurances.

The purpose of this letter is to apply to the position of Tribal Council Chairman. After 25 years plus working in the educational field, Dr. Clarke is ready for new challenges. The following narrative describes his experiences, qualifications, and characteristics to fulfill the position as Chairman:

Professional Experience

At the present time, Dr. Clarke is a Professional Transporter (Driver) for the Hualapai Health Department, working part-time transporting clients to their appointments and treatments for the past year. Not many understand the daily task it is for the Dialysis patients to undergo the treatments, and life as it is for them. It is hard to hear, see, and think about what they have to do in order to continue and still have a sense of humor to one another.

Dr. Clarke worked as a Substitute teacher at Flagstaff Unified School District from Feb. 2014 to May 2015. He has been the Superintendent of Cedar Unified School District for six years (2005-2011) in Northern AZ. The district served the Navajo

and Hopi students K-12 and other tribes that enrolled in the district. Dr. Clarke was also the Superintendent for Peach Springs Unified School District for two years 2003-2005. Prior to that, he was a Principal K-12 for three years and Principal for the K-6 for three years. He worked as a self-contained teacher in the 7th and 8th grades for eight years. Finally, he was a teacher's aide for eight years 1979-1986, again with 7th and 8th grades.

Education

Dr. Clarke obtained a Doctorate's degree in the field of Educational Leadership at Northern Arizona University in 1998. He has a Master's degree in Elementary Education from N.A.U. in 1991 and a Bachelor's degree in Elementary Education in 1986. He attended Haskell Indian Junior College obtaining an A.A. at Lawrence, Kansas in 1976. Dr. Clarke has attended Mohave Community College, the University of Arizona in Tucson, AZ and also Morgan State University in Baltimore, Maryland. He attended Kingman high school for one year and then transferred to Stewart Indian School and graduated in 1974.

Other

Dr. Damon R. Clarke is a member of the Hualapai Nation lived and worked in Peach Springs since age of 12 at the Gre macho Café. He is married to Ms. Drusilla A. Clarke (Havatone) for 35 years and has three children: Thomas, Misty, and Summer. He has nine grand-children: Destiny, Marilyn, Tiberone, Caden, Vernon, Jacob, Ann Marie, Tristan, and Greyson. His mother was Janice Marie (Clark) Begay and is father was a Mexican named Harry Garcia (both deceased). He was raised by his grandparents Taft and Eunice Clark until their passing and then by his great-uncle and aunt Vernon and Gloria Kaiser. He has three sisters: Sonja (aka Theresa Frank-deceased); Angie and Freda; and three brothers Adolph; Sammy (AKA Daniel Taylor); and Fred, Jr. As a young boy, he lived in Peach Springs during the school year and then during the summers at Frazier Wells. This was quite an experience as a young man in his early years.

Dr. Clarke has served on the Hualapai Education Committee, the Recreation Committee, and the Hualapai Enterprise Board/ Hwa:l Bay Ba:j Enterprise, Inc. as Vice- President for several years.

He has served as a Hualapai Councilman for seven years from 1984 to 1991 with many of the "seasoned" Councils.

As a member of the Council, he learned that listening to the discussions, reviewing of documents, listening to the community members, and having a clear vision for the tribe was essential for making sound decisions. During this time, the beginnings of outside venues were coming into play. When Dr. Clarke completed his last term with the council, he became involved with the Enterprises and was one of the first members of this board along with four other tribal members.

In 2011 Dr. Clarke retired from the educational field and has spent the last few years at Frazier Wells (Thorton Tower), Peach Springs, and Flagstaff.

He is well aware of the issues the council and tribe are confronted with and has attended many meetings during the past few years.. Working with other tribes and other entities has been an experience with which Dr. Clarke is versed on dealing with confronting obstacles and barriers that were part of the job as a Superintendent. These experiences have been very helpful in preparation of the necessities of being the Chairman. Working together with other Superintendents, other school boards, and other educators, the State Government, the Federal Government, other tribes, and people, in general makes Dr. Clarke an individual who is very versed. He is Trustworthy, Respected, Responsible, Fair, Caring, and is a person of character. He will work and speak at your level to make sure he understands the situations that is in front of him and others.

As part of his commitment and goals to the position, he would like to propose that:

There will be regularly provided specific performance feedback.

There will be the assurance of knowledge of the tribe's progress.

There will be accountability for peoples' behavior and performance.

He will set the example by being a positive role model for the tribe and improve relations with our community and beyond. In closing, he will work towards the understanding of what it means to serve our community, our history, heritage, our future, and especially for our Elders, Veterans, our Youth, and Protection from the unknown.

Mission Statement: Our goal is to serve the public by managing county elections as efficiently as possible, and to reach out to every qualified voter in our county, enabling them to cast their ballot in a friendly and informative environment.

The Elections Department is the operating arm of the Board of Supervisors fulfilling the responsibilities of election administration.

Duties of the Elections Department include:

1. Issues & accepts all candidate, recall, initiative, & referendum petitions
2. Issues & accepts all campaign finance forms
3. Establishes election precinct boundaries
4. Provides for the printing of all election related material
5. Secures use of facilities for election day polling places
6. Recruits, hires, trains & compensates poll workers
7. Prepares, allocates & transports election materials to & from polling places
8. Prepares & tests ballot tabulation equipment
9. Tabulates ballots
10. Provides election results
11. Coordinates & administers Primary & General elections

Mohave County also enters into intergovernmental agreements with the City of Bullhead City, the City of Kingman, the City of Lake Havasu City, the school districts and other special districts to conduct elections for local office holders and bond issues.

Four (4) consolidated election dates in Arizona:

All jurisdictions are required to hold elections on consolidated election dates

1. Second Tuesday in March
2. Third Tuesday in May
3. Tenth Tuesday before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November
4. First Tuesday after the first Monday in November

During Presidential Election years, the Presidential Preference Election (a political party only election) is held on the 1st Tuesday after March 15.

Methods of Voting in Mohave County:

1. **Permanent Early Voting List (PEVL)** — at Voter's request to be placed on the PEVL list, Voter will have ballot automatically mailed to them 26 days before all elections Voter is qualified to vote in. No more missed elections!
2. **One-time Early Ballot Request** — ballot for an election will be mailed to Voter when request is made by Voter to Voter Registration Department.
3. **Early Voting Site** — Voter may go to a designated area Early Voting Location & vote an early ballot.
4. **Poll Site Voting on Election Day** — Voter goes in person to their precinct polling location to cast ballot on Election Day.

Over 58% of votes cast in last election were cast by Early Voters!

Some important facts on Voting:

1. Sample ballots are mailed to each household containing a registered voter about 10 days before an election. Your polling place is on the mailing label.
2. Sample ballots are not mailed to Voters on the Permanent Early Voter List (PEVL) as they receive their actual ballot before the 10 days.
3. Voted Early Ballots may be returned by mail (allow plenty of time to reach Voter Registration Department by 7 p.m., evening of Election Day), or dropped off at any Early Voting site, or dropped off at any polling location on Election Day.
4. ID is required for Voters at the Poll Site — check out acceptable types of ID at: <http://www.mohavecounty.us/ContentPage.aspx?id=118&cid=143>
5. On county-wide elections, close to 400 people are hired to work the day and night — Poll Worker Information can be found at: <http://www.mohavecounty.us/ContentPage.aspx?id=118&cid=142>
6. To notify Voter Registration of the death of a registered Voter, go to: <http://www.mohavecounty.us/ContentPage.aspx?id=129&cid=782>



Bus Driver / Program Aide

Duties may include setting up spaces for meetings, Family Nights, socializations, etc.

This position also works as a part of a team to assist in activities in the areas of the classroom, kitchen and bus and/or to serve as a disabilities aide as needed.

Pay D.O.E. is \$9.00 per hour.

Cook On Call

This position is one role in a large system of services provided to children and families. A strong food service program is important to supporting the goals of the program. This position is responsible the ordering, preparing, serving and documenting of meals and snacks. It includes following menus and all phases of kitchen operations including inventory control. The position may prepare foods for and/or pre-school children following the USDA/CACFP standards. Position may involve reassignment to various kitchens/centers as deemed necessary for program operations. Pay D.O.E. is \$10.00 per hour. This is an On Call position.




The 2016 Wildland Fire Season is on its way and we are looking for highly motivated individuals willing to work strenuous shifts, maintain a positive attitude, and to be a team player. Keep in mind fire is unpredictable so shifts include weeks away from home and working holidays.

What is Wildland Fire?

A wildland fire is an unwanted ignition which consumes available fuels (grass, trees, and shrubs) by crawling, creeping, jumping, and running before smoldering to rest. Unwanted fires are the results of Yellow Stone Fires (1988), Rodeo-Chediski Fire (2002), Wallow Fire (2010) and most recently on the Hualapai Reservation the Black Canyon Fire (2012).

What causes a Wildland Fire?

There are two types of ignitions 1) "anthropogenic" the results of human activity such as playing with matches, dropping cigarettes, embers from chimneys, unattended camp fires, and sparks from machines 2) natural ignitions are from volcanic activity and lightning.

How do I apply?

Contact staff at Branch of Forestry or stop by the office for application and nomination form for trainings. The process for employment is to complete; 1) Drug test 2) Physical Exam if your 45 years or older (Optional Form 178) 3) Southwest Firefighter Application 4) Health Screen Questionnaire 5) Work Capacity Test (WCT): Informed

The position which you are applying for will determine the WCT as Pack test, Field test, or Walk test.

What will I Do?

You will be a part of a 20 man hand crew made up of a Crew Boss, Squad Bosses, and Sawyers. On the other hand, you may be working on a wildland fire engine. Depending on experience and qualifications your position may vary.

Required

- DOI Drug Testing is required; test must include the five drugs: marijuana, cocaine, opiates, amphetamines and phencyclidine. Drug testing is provided by the applicant with a copy of verification to the Branch of Forestry.

Photo Identification Card will soon be required to pick up prescriptions at CRSU Pharmacies



The Pharmacy will soon launch efforts to help patients safeguard their pharmacy prescriptions and meet required national IHS guidelines.

Starting January 1, 2016, it will be required that any person coming to the pharmacy to pick up prescriptions must present a government-issued photo identification card. There can be no pick-up without proper identification.

Acceptable forms of government-issued photo identification include:

- Driver's License
- State Issued Photo ID Card
- Passport
- Military ID
- IHS PIV Card
- Tribal ID (Must Have a Photo)


In addition to the new identification card requirement, the pick-up person must provide two identifiers that are unique to the patient, i.e. the patient's chart number, date of birth, or name. The individual picking up medications will be asked his or her relationship to the patient.

Until the new requirement takes place, the CRSU will launch several efforts to create awareness and provide education to help patients make a smooth transition.

ADDED SUGARS

Add fruits and vegetable to each meal!

Quick Added Sugar Facts:

- One 12-ounce soda can have about 40 grams of sugar. That's almost a full day's supply of added sugar. Kid-sized sodas at most fast food places are 12 ounces — the same amount as that can of soda!
- Sweetened iced tea contains a surprising amount of sugar, roughly 22 grams per cup. Most bottles contain a couple cups or more, which in turn makes it easy to consume a day's supply of sugar in one bottle of iced tea.
- Sweet treats are not only high in sugar but they are also high in calories. The average large cookie contains over 400 calories and a day's supply of added sugars.

Daily Sugar Allowance:

The Dietary Guidelines for Americans advise people to keep added sugars to no more than 10% of their daily calories. To find how much sugar that is for you, first you need to find your daily calorie intake. A 2,000-calorie-per-day eating pattern is pretty typical, so let's use that as a base number. 10% of 2,000 is 200 calories each day.

Some people prefer to calculate their sugar needs in grams. To do that, divide the daily total calories from sugar by 4 (calories/gram). For a 2,000-calorie diet, the max is 50 grams.

Just for kicks, let's set that out in teaspoons too. There are 4 grams of sugar in a teaspoon. This means that the daily cap is set at roughly 12 teaspoons of added sugars per day.





COMMUNITY MESSAGES

Way Station to Captivity

I am sharing information about the forced march to La Paz and back, from the book "The Kinship Structure and Territorial Range of Hualapai Congery".

Way-Station to Captivity. When the Hualapais were marched from Camp Beale Springs to La Paz on the Colorado River Indian Reservation, Cokwata Giyo lay along their Trail of Tears. "My father said that they gathered all of these people and they drove them down through the country. Some of the Indians died on the way, and the trail is along this route, one of the places was Ukwata Giyo", one Ko'audva kopai testified matter-of-factly.

"The Hualapais were gathered at Beale Springs, and then the soldiers drove them south. They came by Yucca and straight on to Cokwata Giyo. There is where they crossed (the Bill Williams Fork). When they drove them, they just whipped them and made them come. A lot of them got sick from the water and food and died on the way. My father had a horse and was riding. Some of them had shoes, and some not. The children had no shoes, and they didn't have much food to bring with them. So they suffered a lot on the way and many lives were lost.

From Cokwata Giyo they crossed and went up the canyon...and over a low place toward Parker. They drove them to Parker. They kept them a while at Parker.

An eye-witness participant in this forced march of the defeated Hualapais was probably in his teens at the time. "When the Indians all skipped off from the reservation at Beale Springs... who's left there... Captain Byrne told these men, "Go on over and bring them Indians back".

We went from there to Kingman down the wash where the railroad is now, named Yo Kwa'a. moved up to a place the name of I forget, made another camp, then... Hualapai mountain, on the west side, make another camp. Then further up make another camp... place the name Teki'aulva. Then turn from there toward Cokwata Giyo, and we get there...bring flour from Fort Mojave. Mohaves carrying the sacks of flour to bring over to Cokwata Giyo. And we got that little bit to eat, and crossed over that mountain toward Parker...

From where we start at Beale Springs, soldiers pushing pretty hard...till they got to Teki 'aulva, then go to Cokwata Giyo, and we'll take our time to make it there to Parker.

Exodus. This forced march was made in the spring of 1871, and the following spring the Hualapais fled from the Colorado River Indian Reservation to return to their pre-conquest territory. "When we start to come back up to the mountain where we belong, we starting from there at La Paz, to make a camp before they make Parker. Take two days to make Parker...and we keep going, before we make Cokwata Giyo, camp there. Next morning make Cokwata Giyo. Then after, passed Cokwata Giyo all them Indians rushing to come home... they just run..." for they were then once again traveling within Hualapai country.

Last night, he finally killed me. He beat me to death. If only I had gathered enough courage and strength to leave him. I would not have gotten flowers today.
