





I would like to thank you for your votes for my re-election for the Chairwoman of the Hualapai tribe. My commitment to be a strong out spoken leader for the tribe is my mission and goal. Through this administration we have solved many issues especially those big legal battles that I was presented with when I was elected in 2012. These battles were not easy for any of us but we stood our ground and had significant victories. I believe these were the big issues that the people wanted me to address when you put me in this office.

During my term I have worked hard and diligently to accomplish goals for the Hualapai people. I am a strong woman of faith I believe in the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and will never deny that. Through that faith I believe that I was elected as leader for the purposes that God wanted to accomplish some things for Hualapai. I have been willing to pray and lift up our issues to God and He has resolved big major issues for us. At the end of each day I love my job! It is not an easy job it is exciting to see our accomplishments and goals met.

We have resolved a major lawsuit; completed our Diamond Bar Road; completed our Water Rights Phase 1 settlement signed for by the President of United States in 2015; opened a new store and gas station; provided a disbursement of funds from our business annually to all enrolled tribal members; opened a new Skywalk building. We opened a new Daycare, a new Youth Camp soon to open, a new Elder Living Facility ready to open. These bring more jobs and are necessary to promote our future.


I have attended the Inter-Tribal Council meetings, Arizona Indian Gaming Meetings, I have been asked to speak to the Senate of Natural Resources on Water Rights in Washington, DC. Representative Gosar has asked me to speak at a Women's Conference in Scottsdale 2015. I was invited to speak at a Water Symposium in January of 2016; with other tribes I have gone to DC numerous times to speak to Senators and Congressmen about our Gaming concerns for rural tribes.

It is the Hualapai Tribal Council that makes decisions for the best interest of the tribe. The council has worked together to make decisions we have not fought with each other as has been reported. As the leader I have worked to ensure that we respect each other to be professional and the community members that come before us to address their issues and concerns are to remain respectful.

In my last campaign I had two concerns 1) that all people should be treated fairly, 2) that we should follow the Hualapai Constitution, Code of Ethics, Policies and Procedures and those guidelines put in place by past councils to address issues. I said I am a problem-solver and that is what I have done is solve problems. I have worked hard to ensure that people are treated fairly and according to all policy. It has been challenging work not perfect work but I believe that our government has been stable and our work has benefitted the Hualapai people as a whole.

I believe that as Hualapai we deserve a lot more from our federal government for our people and our land. I have worked on our health care needs and worked to help people get some medical bills paid and promote and support better care at our clinic. The L.H.S. has worked to provide quality service it is not where it could be but it is coming along. We have to stand up for what we are entitled to and I speak up for us. They meet with me to address issues and report changes and progress.

I have been very outspoken to the Federal, State, and County level leaders for the things we need. Many leaders have become great supporters of Hualapai issues. I would like to continue to **MAKE A DIFFERENCE** and to do what is right for the benefit of the tribe. I know you hear many things that others may say some negative some positive you can call and I will tell you the administration/council side. Please don't believe everything you hear it is only one side of the story. We must maintain our team work and move forward. May God bless the Hualapai Nation and the United States of America. KWLP Political Advertising Disclosure • Hualapai Tribal Council Elections

KWLP Political Advertising Disclosure

As a radio station broadcasting under a commercial license issued January 5, 2016 by the Federal Communications Commission (F.C.C.), KWLP, 100.9 FM, Peach Springs, Arizona *must* comply with certain rules and regulations regarding political advertising during designated “political windows.” These rules vary regarding federal, state and local election campaigns and issues-focused political advertising. Political windows are 45 days prior to primary elections and 60 days prior to general elections. KWLP will be applying the F.C.C. rules regarding *local* elections to the upcoming Hualapai Tribal Council elections. These rules include “equal opportunity” to “reasonable access” for “legally qualified” candidates for the same office.

If you are a “legally qualified” candidate interested in advertising on the radio, you are entitled to review the station’s public file, including the political advertising request and run contents, and to information from the station regarding:

- Classes of spots and day parts generally sold
- General rotations sold by the station
- Sales practices such as “make goods,” discounts for packages, etc.,.
- Lowest available spot rate

If you request to purchase political advertising time, you will need to complete a requisite disclosure statement (N.A.B. #17, 18) that must be kept in the station’s public file for two years.



Natural Resources News

January – April, 2016

Zika virus is spread to people primarily through the bite of an infected Aedes species mosquito. The most common symptoms of Zika are fever, rash, joint pain, and conjunctivitis (red eyes). The illness is usually mild with symptoms lasting for several days to a week after being bitten by an infected mosquito. People usually don't get sick enough to go to the hospital, and they very rarely die of Zika. For this reason, many people might not realize they have been infected. However, Zika virus infection during pregnancy can cause a serious birth defect called microcephaly(<http://www.cdc.gov/ncbddd/birthdefects/microcephaly.html>), as well as other severe fetal brain defects. Once a person has been infected, he or she is likely to be protected from future infections.

PURPOSE AND MISSION

The purpose of this newsletter is to highlight Program Activities within the Hualapai Department of Natural Resources. Our Mission is to preserve, protect, and improve the tribes natural and recreation resources so that tribal members and future generations shall be afforded the greatest possible freedom to use and enjoy their Reservation's resources.

AGRICULTURE PROGRAM

- Grazing Fees were due March 1. We have 50 Tribal Grazing Permits encompassing 2,599 AUM's.
- The Range Water Program continues to repair broken water lines and keep Water Storage Tanks full. **Livestock Owners:** Please repair floats in water troughs when you notice them broken. The Range Water Program has been directed to shut the water off to the troughs if floats are broken to prevent the water storage tanks from draining.
- In March, we assisted Coyote Springs with the gathering and counting of their cattle.
- We gathered 22 head of wild cattle from District 1.
- We are working to gather and remove wild horses from National and Mohawk Canyons.
- 4H Facility: Completed shading for small livestock pens, prepared large livestock pens and scale for shading, worked with Mohave Electric to install power pole, completed cattle pens and partially completed installation of water lines to cattle pens.
- April Junior Rodeo had 80 participants. Next Junior Rodeo will be May 14.
- Monthly meetings with Livestock Associations. Next meeting will be in May.

FORESTRY PROGRAM

- The Forestry Crew marked 100 acres for thinning in Compartment 22. The Crew will begin work again beginning May 2, 2016.
- The Program worked with the BIA to create burn piles of mesquite in Valentine.
- Preparing for Mexican Spotted Owl Surveys.
- Attended Intertribal Timber Council National Symposium

WATER RESOURCES AND AIR PROGRAMS

- Continue to monitor the aquifer levels at Westwater Well, Frazier Wells, and Truxton Well.
- Continue to monitor Air Quality at Grand Canyon West and Peach Springs Community using PM 2.5 and PM 10 monitors. PM stands for organic air particulate matter on the order of 2.5 microns to 10 microns. PM is also often referred to as aerosols. When it comes to human health considerations chemical composition and size of particulate matters are important.
- Preparing to construct gabion structures for erosion control in the Mud Tank area.
- Conduct water quality sampling on remote springs for nonpoint source pollution.
- Issued 401 Certification for Construction Projects on Tribal Lands.
- Alex Cabillo was re-elected as the Vice Chairman for the National Tribal Operations Committee and he represents Hualapai on the National Tribal Water Council.

WILDLIFE, FISHERIES, AND PARKS PROGRAM


- Submitted Hunting Harvest Recommendations to Tribal Council for approval on April 4, 2016

A Program of Conservation Legacy

Responsibilities:

Interns will serve in pairs and will work on projects on NPS units, doing meaningful work for the Park, building off of the intern's knowledge and experience. A key component of the project work will be to engage the local Native American community and build stronger ties between the community and the NPS. 

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. **What is the amount of the scholarship award?** If you are enrolled at a 4-year college, the award is \$5,000.00 per academic year. If you are attending a 2-year college, the amount is \$2,500.00 per academic year.
Half of the award will be disbursed (\$2500.00 for 4-yr college or \$1250.00 for 2-yr college) at the beginning of Fall semester. Upon completion of semester, student is required to submit official transcripts to determine continued eligibility for the second part of the year funding - based on the 2.5 cumulative GPA. If you are attending a college based on the quarter system, the disbursement will be made in three equal amounts (not two as in a semester system).
2. **What if I am unable to complete a class, will I still be eligible?** If there are circumstances beyond your control, such as a class being cancelled, you may still be eligible for the Spring Semester. Eligibility for continuation regarding other types of withdrawals will be determined on a case by case basis.
3. **When is the application deadline?** The complete application packet must be postmarked **on or before June 30, 2015**. Scanned and mailed or faxed application packets will be accepted. Complete application packets can also be delivered to the Phoenix Indian Center before the deadline.
4. **Do applicants have to live on the reservation?** No, they can reside anywhere as long as they are an enrolled member of one of the four tribes listed, White Mountain Apache, San Carlos Apache, Hualapai or Tohono O'odham Nation.
5. **Is the scholarship only for students who are new high school graduates?** Applications will be accepted for any new college student or any continuing college student who meets the Eligibility and Academic criteria. Currently enrolled college students are encouraged to apply. Note: GED recipients are welcome to apply - must have a cumulative score of 450/

equivalent or higher.

6. **Can the college/university be outside the State of Arizona?** Yes, if an eligible student has been accepted to an accredited college/university anywhere within the United States they are eligible to apply.
7. **Do all classes have to be on campus?** Can be On-Line and/or On-Site. This does not exclude students who may be required to travel abroad or do field work/practicum as part of their degree requirements.
8. **Is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid a requirement?** Yes, and this process needs to be completed ASAP. The best time is immediately after you have prepared your (or parents) Income Taxes. Once you have submitted the appropriate forms, the Student Aid Report (SAR) can take 10- 15 days and it must be part of your application packet.
9. **Who can write my letter(s) of reference?** This letter must be written by a professional person who knows your academic skills and abilities to be successful in higher education as well as your leadership and community service activities. The letter(s) should be written by a school advisor, counselor, teacher, other Higher Education staff person, employer, clergy, etc. Letters from family or friends will not be accepted.
10. **Is Section 2 different from the essay?** Yes, this is where you would provide any information on your personal activities. Please do not limit to those listed. Those are suggestions – add any pertinent information, use additional paper if necessary. For the essay it is important to focus your writing on answering the essay question!
11. **Can I apply if I am going to graduate school?** No, this scholarship is for undergraduate students only at an accredited 2-yr or 4yr college.
12. **Can I change schools after Fall Semester?** Yes, if you plan to transfer to a different school when the Fall Semester is over you need to submit a Letter of Acceptance from the new school, a new Release of Information for the new school and if applicable new contact information.
