Public Apology Letter to the members of the Hualapai Tribal Council and the Hualapai People

My apologies to the members of the Hualapai Tribal Council and the Hualapai Tribal Members for violating the Code of Ethics (Article VII Prohibits Activity Subject to Tribal Council Discipline; Section B Official has acted in excess of the official's authority). As you know by now, I was suspended by the Hualapai Tribal Council for two weeks without pay from my position as the Hualapai Tribal Vice Chairman.

On April 15, 2016, I received a telephone call from a family member who requested release of two incarcerated family members to attend a traditional wake of a relative. I spoke to the Hualapai Tribal Judge about releasing the two individuals to attend the wake. I informed the judge that within our culture, families are closely related whether they are brothers, sisters, cousins, etc... One individual was released but failed to return the next day. He was arrested two days later. I was not aware of this until a police officer came to inform me of the situation.

As council members, we are elected into office to help our Hualapai people. I acted in that way in helping a family member who had lost a loved one. I did not do it for personal gain nor to benefit my family. I am aware that this type of practice has gone on in the past where individuals were released to attend wakes/funerals when requested by the Chairman or Vice Chairman. I believe that this was initiated by individuals because of my decision and the Hualapai Tribal Council to terminate two employees for violating tribal policies and procedures. In the future, I will be very careful not to violate the Code of Ethics.

**Re: Candidate Ineligibility Determination**

Dear Ms. Parker:

The Election Board received your Candidate Filing Form for the upcoming 2016 General Election. In review of your Candidate Filing Form, we note that you did not include a complete Social Security number and therefore did not complete the Candidate Filing Form by 5:00 pm on April 5, 2016. On April 6, 2016 we were notified by Advanced Surveillance Group Background Check Central that they were unable to process your background check due to an incomplete social security number provided.

The Constitution and Election Ordinance of the Tribe require the Election Board to conduct elections including the certification of candidate qualifications. Article IV – QUALIFICATIONS, Section 1(c) of the Election Ordinance states:


The Election Board shall certify that all candidates for Tribal Council positions meet the qualifications before establishing a final list of candidates.

The Election Ordinance also mandates a nomination deadline. Article III, Section 1(b) of the Election Ordinance states in pertinent part:

Nominations shall be closed thirty (30) days before the general election at 5:00 p.m.

In light of the foregoing, the Election Board is unable to include your name as candidate for a seat on the Tribal Council; therefore, your name will not appear on the ballot in the 2016 General Election on June 4, 2016.



Because of my past experience in what I was, an educator, I would like to share with you the following message:

Control Your Inputs

Your mind is your ultimate personal computer. Like your laptop at home, sometimes you might forget to turn on your mental virus protection program allowing negative thoughts to invade your mind - without even realizing it. So, the computer adage "Garbage in, garbage out" as it applies to your mind should really be "Garbage in, garbage stays."

Your mind never sleeps. You can't pull a "fast one" on it. Whatever your mind hears from others, and especially from you, it records and stores.

The mind doesn't discriminate between input that is good for you or harmful to you - it collects all input. If you hear something often enough, you will tend to believe it and act upon it. Your mind can be your greatest ally or worst enemy. Seek positive inputs and you will improve your chances of producing positive outputs.

We draw into our lives that which we constantly think about – good or bad. If you are obsessing about what your boss will do if you make a mistake, then guess what's likely to happen? If you are always thinking about why you can't seem to get a break, or when the next shoe will drop in your relationship, or what will happen if you can't afford to pay for your car repairs or why you don't get as much recognition as your colleague, then you are programming your mind (and those around you) to turn these thoughts into your reality. Negative thoughts are landmines along the pathway to being your best.

Consider three common influences that can program us daily. They have the potential for a positive or negative impact on our thoughts and, ultimately, our results.

Television - Studies show that the subconscious mind is most receptive five minutes before we doze off at night, a common time for watching the news. Unfortunately, much of the news today shows the worst side of people and the





world. When I was a kid my mom used to say, "Boy oh boy, we can watch the six o'clock news and not eat or watch the 11 o'clock news and not sleep." Mom's words still apply today. So, when you hear a news story, remind yourself that it's considered news because it is unusual. Doing so will help you balance potentially negative input with more uplifting thoughts.

So how can we remain well-informed and maintain a positive outlook? Monitor what you watch. More recently, my mom said, "I have 600 T.V. channels and nothing to watch!" An exaggeration of course, but if we choose programs that are more educational, artistic, spiritual or sports and comedy oriented, we will stimulate positive thoughts. Our thoughts today form our results tomorrow.

Newspapers – Many people, particularly in the business world, start their day with the newspaper. Whether it's a glimpse at the headlines or a front to back reading, there is plenty of positive and negative news to read. Before you dive into the daily newspaper or on-line news portal, take a quick inventory of all the things you have to be grateful for. Additionally, make it a habit to finish your reading with an inspiring story so your mind is primed for a positive day.

Other people – Make the choice to surround yourself with people who offer positive inputs. There will always be negative people and perspectives. Since we cannot hide from them, we must learn to filter out negative input to minimize "garbage" in our thoughts. The best strategy is to make a conscious effort to get to know and spend time with people who have a positive outlook.

These three sources of input have the potential for a positive or negative impact on your attitude, and ultimately, your results.

You are what you think, so control your inputs!

Dear Tribal Members,

I would like to thank you for your votes for my re-election for the Chairwoman of the Hualapai tribe. My commitment to be a strong out spoken leader for the tribe is my mission and goal. Through this administration we have solved many issues especially those big legal battles that I was presented with when I was elected in 2012. These battles were not easy for any of us but we stood our ground and had significant victories. I believe these were the big issues that the people wanted me to address when you put me in this office.

During my term I have worked hard and diligently to accomplish goals for the Hualapai people. I am a strong woman of faith I believe in the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and will never deny that. Through that faith I believe that I was elected as leader for the purposes that God wanted to accomplish some things for Hualapai. I have been willing to pray and lift up our issues to God and He has resolved big major issues for us. At the end of each day I love my job! It is not an easy job it is exciting to see our accomplishments and goals met.

We have resolved a major lawsuit; completed our Diamond Bar Road; completed our Water Rights Phase 1 settlement signed for by the President of United States in 2015; opened a new store and gas station; provided a disbursement of funds from our business annually to all enrolled tribal members; opened a new Skywalk building. We opened a new Daycare, a new Youth Camp soon to open, a new Elder Living Facility ready to open. These bring more jobs and are necessary to promote our future.

I have attended the Inter-Tribal Council meetings, Arizona Indian Gaming Meetings, I have been asked to speak to the Senate of Natural Resources on Water Rights in Washington, DC. Representative Gosar has asked me to speak at a Women's Conference in Scottsdale 2015. I was invited to speak at a Water Symposium in January of 2016; with other tribes I have gone to DC numerous times to speak to Senators and Congressmen about our Gaming concerns for rural tribes.

It is the Hualapai Tribal Council that makes decisions for the best interest of the tribe. The council has worked together to make decisions we have not fought with each other as has been reported. As the leader I have worked to ensure that we respect each other to be professional and the community members that come before us to address their issues and concerns are to remain respectful.

In my last campaign I had two concerns 1) that all people should be treated fairly, 2) that we should follow the Hualapai Constitution, Code of Ethics, Policies and Procedures and those guidelines put in place by past councils to address issues. I said I am a problem-solver and that is what I have done is solve problems. I have worked hard to ensure that people are treated fairly and according to all policy. It has been challenging work not perfect work but I believe that our government has been stable and our work has benefitted the Hualapai people as a whole.

I believe that as Hualapai we deserve a lot more from our federal government for our people and our land. I have worked on our health care needs and worked to help people get some medical bills paid and promote and support better care at our clinic. The I.H.S. has worked to provide quality service it is not where it could be but it is coming along. We have to stand up for what we are entitled to and I speak up for us. They meet with me to address issues and report changes and progress.

I have been very outspoken to the Federal, State, and County level leaders for the things we need. Many leaders have become great supporters of Hualapai issues. I would like to continue to **MAKE A DIFFERENCE** and to do what is right for the benefit of the tribe. I know you hear many things that others may say some negative some positive you can call and I will tell you the administration/council side. Please don't believe everything you hear it is only one side of the story. We must maintain our team work and move forward. May God bless the Hualapai Nation and the United States of America. **VOTE FOR RON QUASULA, SR.**

I am running for Hualapai Tribal Council Vice-Chairperson. I believe my 18 years experience as a tribal council member prepares me well to serve as Vice-Chairperson. I have lived on the Hualapai Reservation all of my adult life. My employment background has been in protecting the tribe's lands and providing public safety in fire and emergency response services.

Tribal Council members are required to adhere to our Constitution, Tribal Council Code of Ethics, Tribal Council Oath of Office and the Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual. Many times these guiding documents have been violated or ignored. For example, on April 4, 2016, the tribal council voted to sell the tribes 202 acres of land in Truckee, California. Another Council member including myself voted NO, on the vote to sell the land.

The biggest complaint I hear from the tribal members is that the people are not told what the tribal council is doing. Members have an absolute right to access and read tribal council meeting minutes and resolutions. The annual tribal government operating budget should be available to the members to see how much the council is spending and for what purpose. The way it works now is that every few months some outdated council meetings are printed in the Gamyu. Every member should have timely access to tribal council business either through the tribal government website or mail. Members have a right to ask questions and provide their input!

Another complaint is there are too many closed tribal council meetings! There is little more degrading than when tribal members are kicked out of tribal council meetings without some explanation. It gives the impression only the tribal council is smart enough or privileged to know what's going on even though it's the people who voted us into office. I understand that occasionally executive sessions are necessary like when dealing with employee personnel issues or issues that could negatively impact the tribe, especially business involving our corporations.

The third complaint I hear is from Hualapai members who do not live on the reservation. Nearly half of our members live off the reservation. Most cannot regularly attend council meetings or community meetings. They say the only time they hear from the council is when we want votes. I do not have all the answers. Tribal members, no matter where they live should tell the council what's important to them – education, health care, transportation, recreation, housing, criminal justice, public safety, electricity & water development, etc. Younger tribal members need to get involved. Young people are our future!

Tribal members must come together not just for today but the future. Our children, grand children and beyond deserve better.

Let us not focus on what we cannot do but let us focus on what we can do!

I AM THE SECOND ELDEST SON TO PHILIP AND LENA MCGEE-BRAVO. I AM PROUD TO SAY MY MOTHER SERVED ON THE TRIBAL COUNCIL INCLUDING BEING CHAIRPERSON. MY GRANDFATHER WAS CHARLES MCGEE ONE OF THE FIRST HUALAPAI TRIBAL CHAIRMAN.

I HAVE LIVED ON THE HUALAPAI RESERVATION ALL OF MY LIFE—AND YOU ALL KNOW ME. I GRADUATED FROM WOODLAKE UNION HIGH SCHOOL IN WOODLAKE, CA. I THEN ATTENDED JUNIOR COLLEGE AT COLLEGE OF THE SEQUOIAS IN VISALIA, CA AND YAVAPAI COLLEGE IN PRESCOTT, AZ. IN THE EARLY 1990s, I SERVED ON THE TRIBAL COUNCIL. I HAVE WORKED ALL MY ADULT LIFE INCLUDING FOR THE TRIBE'S NATURAL RESOURCES DEPARTMENT FOR THE LAST 20 YEARS. MY PRIORITIES & GOALS HAVE NOT CHANGED ALL THESE YEARS: I BELIEVE WE MUST WORK TOGETHER AND KEEP POSITIVE, I STRONGLY BELIEVE THAT EVERY TRIBAL MEMBER SHOULD BE TREATED EQUALLY, AND EVERY TRIBAL MEMBER SHOULD BE AFFORDED THE SAME OPPORTUNITIES TO SUCCEED. WE ARE EQUAL. MY PLATFORM IS SIMPLE:

- I WANT TO ENSURE THE HUALAPAI TRIBAL CONSTITUTION IS FOLLOWED, AND THE CIVIL RIGHTS OF TRIBAL MEMBERS MUST NEVER BE VIOLATED.
- I WANT TO IMPROVE THE EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES FOR OUR YOUTH BY ENSURING THAT THEY HAVE ACCESS TO THE RESOURCES THEY NEED TO BE SUCCESSFUL IN SCHOOL.
- I WANT TO DEVELOP A BETTER PLAN FOR ANNUAL PER CAPITA DISPERSMENT FOR ALL TRIBAL MEMBERS, ESPECIALLY FOR THE ELDERLY AND THE YOUNG PEOPLE.
- I WANT THE ENTIRE TRIBE TO VISIT THE ISSUE OF THE CURRENT BLOOD QUANTUM REQUIREMENT FOR ENROLLMENT. FOR MANY REASONS OUR OVERALL BLOOD IS THINNING OUT. WE CAN'T IGNORE IT OTHERWISE OUR TRIBE WILL BEGIN TO FADE AWAY.
- I WANT TO REVIEW EACH TRIBAL GOVERNMENT PROGRAM TO SEE IF THEY ARE WORKING FOR THE PEOPLE. THESE ARE PROGRAMS FOR THE PEOPLE—NOT SIMPLY TO KEEP PEOPLE EMPLOYED. IF WE CAN IMPROVE PERFORMANCE AND PRODUCTION, I'M ALL FOR IT.
- COUNCIL POSITIONS SHOULD BE PAID POSITIONS/NOT GETTING THE MEETING STIPENDS
- LASTLY, OUR TRIBAL COUNCIL MUST PUT THE PEOPLE FIRST-NOT THEMSELVES. COUNCIL MEMBERS MUST SERVE THE PEOPLE. I WILL DEFINTELY INVOLVE THE MEMBERSHIP. THE BEST WAY TO DO THAT IS TO KEEP THE PEOPLE INFORMED, INCLUDING DEVELOPING AND DISTRIBUTING AN ANNUAL HUALAPAI FINANCIAL REPORT AND POSTING ALL TRIBAL COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES ON OUR TRIBAL WEBSITE. FOR THOSE THAT DO NOT HAVE COMPUTER ACCESS I WILL MAIL YOU THE MINUTES.





The American Indians into Nursing program cooperative agreements or grant is used by the educational institution to provide IHS scholarships to students enrolled in nursing education programs.

**Purpose:** The purpose of this IHS cooperative agreement is to recruit, retain, graduate and increase the number of registered nurses, certified nurse midwives and nurse practitioners who deliver health care services to AI/AN communities. The primary objectives of this cooperative agreement grant award are to: (1) Recruit and train AI/AN individuals to be registered nurses; (2) facilitate associate degree registered nurses becoming baccalaureate prepared registered nurses; (3) provide a program that prepares practicing registered nurses for advance nursing education; (4) provide a program that encourages registered nurses and advance practice nurses to provide or continue to provide, health care services to AI/NA communities; and (5) provide scholarships to individuals that will cover tuition, books, fees, room and board, stipend for living expenses, or other expenses incurred in connection with nursing or advance practice nursing programs. Jo Gamyu:je, to keep busy I am sifting thru my 'papers' & personal items that I have accumulated for 45 years or so. I still have some items from when I was five years old. I am throwing away that which no longer has any past, present or future value, then organizing & storing the rest in a way for future identification by myself or others after I pass. I am not exactly sure how I was able to hold on to so much but I know why I have done so. For instance, I kept letters from as far back as the sixth grade when I spent part of the year in Peach Springs & part in Phoenix, & of course part of the Summer in Hodge (Barstow), CA., where my Goda was. Included in these containers are notes passed to me in class from friends in school, many now deceased. I also have ticket stubs for movies I have seen as far back as 1975 or so. While I guess most people probably do not keep ticket stubs like this, in my mind & probably more importantly my heart, I wanted to preserve the memory of the time spent with the people I was with. Perhaps it is unnecessary for other people to keep things as they remember everything. Or, what I consider something special another would not. I believe the time I had with all those people these things tie me to what was or is special & valuable. Something inside me makes me believe that the piece of paper, no matter the size, allows me to carry with me & keep the value, specialness, connection, or importance of that piece of time & relationship. And as it was for our ancestors all these items can either be laid to rest with me or burnt to confirm the end of life & beginning of a new consciousness.

In my stuff I also have more recent papers & items. For instance, I have kept every single text book for all my undergraduate, graduate & law school education. Most of my classmates were always selling things back to the school or to other students, but I kept them & have them all around me in my office or other parts of the house. I also kept much of the papers I received as a Hualapai Tribal Council Member, Tribal Planner, & Judge. I have, however, tossed or recycled papers that I know are available in other places, but kept agendas & readings, & most importantly planning documents I created that together tell the story of *Yada Yada's* contribution to the Hualapai Tribe. Going thru some of these documents though did cause a sadness in me & in fact brought me to tears, in that while there were many accomplishments, some of the goals of the projects I and others worked on were not achieved. I comfort myself though by acknowledging how much we as a People have done over time. And I have said many times here & in other forums, that Hwal'bay Ba:j have moved forward in ways many other tribes have not. So we should all be proud & remember if we just stop fighting each other, we could go so much further & Farther Along.

One of the regrets or sorrows I have regards Music Mountain High School. I remember when Mrs. Lucille Watahomigie & I went to an AZ. State School Board Meeting to argue for our own school district. Facing opposition from this one particular fellow could have prevented us from moving in this direction but in the end we were able to convince them to allow the mechanisms to move towards a High School. We were hoping that once we had our own school that all our talent could be nurtured & our young people empowered by learning, studying, and of course competing together as one, rather than being split to Kingman, Seligman, and the various residential schools our students went. In my heart I knew & still believe that if we had a unified student body that they would win the State Basketball tournaments, then other sports, each & every year; because our kids were or are that good. I do not understand what happened with that & why, but even after a beautiful new building was built, leaders, parents, the community I guess did not want to be unified. Maybe in my rambling & reminiscing I want to convey the importance of honoring our paths & passions we've had in life, at least that which empowers & promotes positivity, as well as those of others. Seek something strong for the years to come. If our Visions—personal & public—all the possibilities we can see together as a powerful people of the pines, are shared & our leaders take hold the reigns together to lead us there, then we will be unified & a much stronger Nation. What do you see in the future? "See far ahead." *Ev g'gwi:k, Ha:nk Wayo:hiyu!*

Most every council member says he or she supports education but what do they mean? What are council members going to do to increase the number of Hualapai kids going to college and getting a degree?

Are council members going to increase the amount of scholarship money? Are they going to visit Hualapai kids in high school and encourage them to go to college? If you think about it, we cannot wait until a kid is in high school. We need to talk to our kids when they are in the third grade.

What are new council members going to do for education? The Peach Springs school is OUR school. It is run by the state but it's OUR school. Only our kids go to this school. The last GCRC report said they made \$87million in 2014. The Hualapai Tribe should give money to OUR school. Our kids are OUR only hope.


Older people know time flies. Older people should make education our priority. We will be gone in a short time and new leaders will be in charge. We don't need council members to go to conferences. Every year, almost every week, a council member goes to a conference but what has changed? We never read reports from council members who go to conferences.

We need to teach our kids to take care of themselves. One way is to make education a priority. If you do not come from Hualapai Royalty (meaning your family is always on council), an education will give you a chance at a good job and/or to become a leader in our tribe. An education does not mean you know everything.

Those of you who feel you are on the bottom of the Hualapai totem pole, an education will help your kids go further in life. You know time flies, push your kids now. I was a single parent for most of my life. Two of my sons obtained degrees and I have three grandchildren who have five degrees between them. An education does not solve all of your problems but it will help make this life a little bit easier.

As a tribe we need to change the way we look at education. Right now it seems a lot of people don't value an education. And since the adults don't value education, the kids don't learn to value education. We need to motivate our kids to pursue college degrees. Those that do not go to college need to learn a trade; plumbing, electrician, carpenter, etc. Again, our kids need to learn to take care of themselves and their own kids (when they have kids).

We should have a parade for all the students who get straight A's. All students who have perfect attendance. The students who behave in school and try their best. This is how we show our kids that an education is important. We can do it. We have to try. Time flies.

As whole Nations from leadership to law enforcement to prosecution to healthcare to DV/SA programs, we must build our responses, strengthen our laws, hold offenders accountable, provide healing, and support the movement to end violence against our children, women, elders and our LGBT relatives as it is them that are our most vulnerable.

We pray for Ashlynnne's family and send our deepest condolences. No family should have to experience the tragic loss of a child so very young. For Ashlynnne we will work harder, swifter, and more purposefully to do our part in making tribal communities safer.






