In my humbleness, it is thanks to the Creator for this time and efforts that we will put forth. It was very heartfelt to see all the PEOPLE who cast their ballot and voted for the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and the three candidates for the Hualapai Tribal Council. I wanted to give my personal thanks to Ms. Amanda Santistevan, Carmella, and Ms. Cleo S., for their support in making a poster that was posted at their residence. Also, my sincere gratitude to Ms. Catalina Steele and her family for their awesome banner that was in front of their house. Wowsers!!!

It will be an honor to serve you as the "Newly Elected Chairman". Thank you one and all for your support and trust in what you have shown in your nomination. We have a lot of issues to work on as well as the day-to-day operations. In the past couple of years there have been many readings that I have come across and I will share them with you in the next few years we have together. This is one that is about "Seven Philosophies For a Native American Man" from a reading of a Native Magazine, the focus will be on two items the Fourth Philosophy and the Seventh Philosophy.

"Fourth Philosophy" - TO THE COMMUNITY

The Indian community provides many things for the family. The most important is the sense of belonging; that is, to belong to "the people", and to have a place to go. Our Indian communities need to be restored to health so the future generation will be guaranteed a place to go for culture, language and Indian socializing. In the community, the honor of one is the honor of all and the pain of one is the pain of all. I will work to strengthen recovery in all parts of my community.

As an Indian man, I will give back to my community by donating my time and talents when I am able. I will cultivate friendships with other Indian men for mutual support and strength. I will consider the effects of our decisions on behalf of the next seven generations; in this way, our children and grandchildren will inherit healthy communities. I will care about those in my community so that the mind changes, alcohol and drugs, will vanish, and our communities will forever be free of violence. If each of us can do all these things, then others, will follow; ours will be a proud community.

"Seventh Philosophy" - TO MYSELF

I will think about what kind of person I want to be when I am an Elder. I will start developing myself now to be this person. I will walk with the Great Spirit and the grandfathers at my side. I will develop myself to remain positive. I will develop a good mind. I will examine myself daily to see what I did good and what I need to improve. I will examine my strengths and weaknesses; then I will ask the Creator to guide me. I will develop a good mind. Each day, I will listen for the Creator's voice in the wind. I will watch nature and ask to be shown a lesson which will occur on my path.

I will seek our the guiding principles which guided my ancestors. I will walk in dignity, honor and humility, conducting myself as a warrior. I will seek the guidance of the Elders so that I may maintain the knowledge of culture, ceremonies and songs, and so that I may pass these on to future generations. I choose to do all these things myself, because no one else can do them for me. I know I CANNOT GIVE AWAY WHAT I DON'T HAVE, so I will need to learn to walk the talk.

Native American Prayer

Oh, Great Spirit, whose voice I hear in the winds, and whose breath gives life to all the world, hear me, I am small and weak, I need your strength and wisdom. Let me walk in beauty and make my eyes ever behold the red and purple sunset. Make my hands respect the things you have made and my ears sharp to hear your voice. Make me wise so that I may understand the things you have taught my people. Let me learn the lessons you have hidden in every leaf and rock. I seek strength, not to be greater than my brother, but to fight my greatest enemy - myself. Make me always ready to come to you with clean hands and straight eyes. So when life fades, as the fading sunset, my Spirit may come to you without shame.


I'm proud to see higher education graduates because it helps us move forward as a tribe, if one succeeds we all succeed.

A new program in the community of Peach Springs is emerging from the Cultural Department, and we are seeking participants to be involved in the Hualapai Empowerment Program, co-sponsored by the Health Department. These are the age groups we are looking for:

- Youth 10 yrs 18 yrs
- Young Adults 19 yrs 29 yrs
- Adults 30 yrs -54 yrs
- Elders 55 and Above

The **Hualapai Empowerment Program** is a mentorship program designed to motivate Elders, Adults, Young Adults and Youth, who would like to create mentorship relationships but are in need of structure. In the early stages of the project, all of the participants will ask each other general questions about their lives, their reasons for living, and their connections to Hualapai Culture. The object of the questions is not to get through as many questions as possible, but rather to get elders talking and to create a connection between the other participants.

Together we'll focus on how to become more involved with community activities to better understand Hualapai self-care traditions that can help reduce forms of negative social behavior through learning about Hualapai cultural core values, and creating partnerships. Working with Hualapai community members who participate in the program (that will include cultural site visits, Hualapai Language learning and other hands-on-activities) participants may find new ways of healing by finding hope and learning about positive cultural core values through caring for the land, themselves, and their families. The goal is to build a relationship so that the youth and elders feel comfortable with each other using Hualapai Language skills. Some of the activities are:

- Hualapai traditional cultural landscape site visit at Indian Point, Keepers of the Wild, and other areas (ancestral lands)- Speaking Hualapai, discuss landscapes and compare how one can learn from the land and use that knowledge for living daily lives.
- Cooking Class- Native Foods- Hualapai did seasonal gathering and hunting. Discuss plants and how one can learn from the plants. Gathering plants at Keepers of the Wild (starts July 1, 2016).
- Genealogy Family Tree- Mentor and student will collect family pictures and family documents beforehand in order to display immediate and past family members. Learn about Hualapai Leaders
- Cultural Mapping- Maps transmit information for the understanding of geography, history, and people.
- Facebook Page- Use as an outreach to the Hualapai Community and other tribes interested in the program, to share and show the activities being done.

If you are interested in becoming a participant in the Hualapai Empowerment Program, please come fill out an application at the Cultural Center by June 27th as the program will begin on July 1, 2016.



Program Director

This position manages the day-to-day program operations of a program with Head Start and/or Early Head Start including personnel administration and supervision and oversees the over-all program to ensure smooth functioning of the program in all areas to provide quality services to children and families, and to support the goals of the program. Responsible for development, training and on-going work with the program Policy Council. Provides general and day-to-day oversight of operations of Head Start/Early Head Start centers, assuring regulatory and legal compliance with federal, state and local regulations, communicating with parents and the community and monitoring of all staff working at the assigned center(s). Minimum requirement is a bachelor's degree in child development, early childhood education, human services, business or related field with supervisory experience. Pay is DOE, 40 hours per week. 48 weeks per year.

Program Aide

This position works as a part of a team to assist in activities in the areas of the classroom, kitchen and bus and/or to serve as a disabilities aide as needed. The position contains elements of job descriptions of positions with titles similar classroom aide, bus monitor, janitor and kitchen aide and as a disabilities aide providing support for children with disabilities. Works with typically developing children and/or children with special needs/disabilities. The minimum requirement is that the individual be 18 years of age. This is an entry-level position requiring no previous education or experience, a high school diploma or G.E.D. is preferred. Pay D.O.E. \$9.00 per hour, 35 hours per week, 39 weeks per year.

Teacher Preschool

This position serves as the lead worker in a classroom of Head Start children by planning, implementing, and supervising all classroom activities. This position works with typically developing children and children with disabilities. This position supports and assists families as they identify and meet their own goals through a family-centered case management model for developing and carrying out the program Family Partnership Agreements including responsibility for child files, enrollment/applications, etc. Entry-level requires an A.A. in ECE Pay is \$1,050.00/biweekly at an A.A. level, and \$1,120.00 biweekly at a B.A. level 35 hours per week, 39 weeks per year. Education Coordinator

This position serves as the lead worker in a classroom of Head Start children by planning, implementing, and supervising all classroom activities. This position works with typically developing children and children with disabilities. This position supports and assists families as they identify and meet their own goals through a family-centered case management model for developing and carrying out the program Family Partnership Agreements including responsibility for child files, enrollment/applications, etc. Minimum requirement is a Bachelor degree in Early Childhood Education, Child Development or other related human service degree with at least 30 credits in Early Childhood Education credits and two years of experience working with young children and families. One year supervisory experience preferred. Position requires a B.A. in ECE \$1,520.00/biweekly, 40 hours per week. 48 weeks per year. This is a grant funded position

Program Aide On-Call

This is an entry-level position requiring no previous education or experience, a high school diploma or G.E.D. is preferred Pay D.O.E. \$9.00 per hour, this is an On Call position.

Teacher Preschool On Call

Franke College of Business and Center for Indian Economic Development (CAIED) to provide a 4-day engaging and interactive summer college experience program. The program is designed to encourage incoming 9th-12th grade students to consider and prepare for college-level business degrees/programs. The 7GPS program is funded by the Johnson Scholarship Foundation.

The program will:

- Help you understand what is important for success at the college-level
- Connect you with a college student mentor
- Provide pre-college and College of Business preparation and guidance
- Give you a chance to learn about campus resources,
- Give you the chance to see what it is like to live on a college campus



HUALAPAI ANIMAL CONTROL

- ENFORCEMENT: As pet owners of the Hualapai Nation, the Tribal Council passed strict ordinances regarding Animal Care, all dogs must be confined to your yard at all times, pet owners should never allow their dog to roam free. Pet owners who allow their pet to run at large will be cited for violations according to Chapter 15 of the Hualapai Law and Order Code. A maximum penalty of FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS for every violation cited maybe imposed upon pet owners who violate the ordinance. Animals picked up in serious incidents i.e.; dog bite incidences will be held for a mandatory 10 days observation in accordance to the ordinance with fees applied for observation, transportation, and vaccinations.
- SPAY or NEUTER: You are asked to help control the pet population on the Hualapai Nation by having your pet spayed or neutered, this will help with the over population of unwanted pets and decrease the Public Nuisance complaints of pack of male dogs chasing after a female dog that is in heat. The Animal Control Program recommends the following animal clinics:
 - 1. Low Cost Spay/Neuter Clinic, 1520 E. Andy Devine, Kingman AZ. 86401 (928)692-5226
 - 2. Manzanita Animal Hospital, 2323 Detroit Ave. Kingman, AZ 86401 (928) 753-6138
- Housing and Tribal Ordinance: It is also a reminder according to the Hualapai Housing Policy, you are only allowed two (2) dogs a residence, this is being enforced by the Housing Department, the Law and Order Code also has an ordinance Sec. 15.2(H) that prohibits the owning of no more then two dogs per residence, owners who violate the code with multiple dogs are being referred to the Hualapai Tribal Courts.
- ANIMAL ABUSE: If you witness or have any information of an animal owner who is teaching their animal to fight or provoke any such action against another person or animal or conduct such illegal business of animal gaming. Contact Hualapai Animal Control Dispatch 769-2810
- REGISTRATION LICENSING: According to the Animal Care and Control Ordinance, all pets must be registered through the HUALAPAI ANIMAL CONTROL program, the registration is easy, Registration is \$10.00 per animal with complimentary (FREE) Rabies vaccination. Animals Running at Large will be picked up and transported to the Hualapai Tribe Kennel. All animals that are transported are held at the kennel for a mandatory 72 hours for owner reclaim. For any time past 72 Hours the animals will be considered abandoned and a stray animal. They will then be considered for the adoption process.

MISSING ANIMALS: To report your animal missing, you may contact the Emergency Service Dispatch and give a brief description, tag Number, Owner name and Phone Number.

**DISEASE CONTROL: A high number of canine deaths have been reported to animal control, most have been young dogs contacting the Parvovirus. Parvovirus is a viral disease of dogs, it affects puppies more frequently than it affects adult dogs, and in young puppies it can infect the heart muscle and lead to "sudden" death. Parvovirus is probably the most common viral illness of dogs. Veterinarians recommend vaccinating puppies every three to four weeks for this virus, starting at 6 weeks of age, until they are at least 20 weeks of age. The parvovirus attacks the lining of the digestive system. It causes dogs and puppies to not be able to absorb nutrients or liquids. Puppies are especially prone to it because they have an immature immune system. When dogs and puppies contract parvo, they usually stop eating and develop a bloody, foul-smelling, liquid stool, symptoms include high fever, depression, loss of appetite, vomiting and bloody diarrhea, in many case dehydration, shock, followed by death. More information contact your veterinarian and vaccination information for your pet.

SCHOOL and WORK: Animal Control reminds pet owners, please keep your pet at home, Also remind your children not to walk their dog to school, keep all pets at home, properly confined with food and water. Any Violations will be submitted through Tribal Courts.

DOG BITE REPORTS: It is our goal to be **dog bite free**, but this is not always the case, about half of all children are bitten by a dog, before their 18th birthday, here are some tried-and-true tips that all children should keep in mind when man best friend is near. **MOTHER**, may I? <u>Rule number one</u>: ALWAYS ask permission before petting someone's dog, approach slowly and quietly, and allow the dog to sniff the back of your hand. Pet the dog's sides or back gently.

THEY THINK THEY OWN EVERYTHING Stay away from any dog who may be protecting something. That means not petting a dog that's eating, playing with a toy, tied up, behind a fence or in a car. PREPARE FOR THE WORST: If a dog growls at you or chases you, be still and quiet. Avoid eye contact with dogs; dogs often see this as a threat. Protect yourself with a backpack or bikes as a shield.

REPORT ANY DOG BITE INCIDENT TO ANIMAL CONTROL OR HUALAPAI NATION POLICE.

If you're Hot, your dog is Hotter. Dogs will naturally do less in the heat-Leave them to relax in a cool, shady spot with lots of water to drink.

- 1. Dogs need shade in the hot weather. They also benefit from a breeze.
- 2. Dogs need lots of clean water ALL THE TIME.
- 3. If you tie your dog, always do it in the shade with at least 8 feet of Leash.
- 4. <u>NEVER</u> leave your dog in your car or truck. Dogs don't have sweat glands and can die quickly. Metal truck beds get very hot in the sun. If it feels hot to you, it feels even hotter to your dog.
- 5. Remember that bugs are just as annoying to your dog as they are to you. Don't leave your animal in a bug infested area.

Signs of heat stroke include excessive panting, drooling, lethargic and even unconsciousness. Call your veterinarian right away if your dog exhibits any of these signs of heat stroke.

Things you could do to help your animal:

- 1. Put your dog in a cool well-ventilated area;
- Wet his fur with a cool towel with cool water (NOT COLD WATER—you have to lower their body temperature slowly.)
- 3. Stay with the animal, and give it fresh, cool water to drink when he has recovered.
