#### Back to School 2016

Gam-i-yu-jel! It's That Time...

I ask for everyone to be prepared to enter school, return to school, start a new school, enter college or even enter a trade school. Parents, I know you are getting ready to see your student(s) off to the new 2016-2017 school year. Prepare your student(s) to be responsible for their grades, attendance, homework, sports, getting to the bus on time, getting enough sleep, having a good breakfast, etc. Remember to always expect the best from your student(s) and to ask questions of their teacher(s) when they are not understanding the lessons.

As a former teacher, Principal, Superintendent of schools it always was a time to enter a new year with familiar faces eager to learn and to see former students from the year before and their changes during the summer months. Every new year is a new challenge with new teachers (and sometimes the same teacher(s) ) and new lessons to be learned. The challenge that I always had for students was to realize that they are much smarter than what people really see. It is just that they need to prove it, because as American Indians (Hualapai) we are looked at differently. We have to work harder to prove to others we are capable and intelligent as the next person in the classroom. We have to just do it. In college, the professors would say, "Justify it"; in other words "Give me proof."

So parents, grand-parents, care-takers, and guardians make that effort to sit with your student, their teacher(s), and others to help make your student a successful year and course of education. I always had support from the parents, aunts/uncles, grand-parents, guardians, and older siblings. **You are the backbone in your student(s) education and future. There were times when students understood this; "now is the time to back them before it is too late. You know it is never too late."**

For you students, your education is "FREE"...All you have to pay for is time, effort, and using all you learn in what you want to become. Make the effort to yourself, do not short-change yourself from what someone cannot take away from you - YOUR education... make the best of what is FREE.

The next item I wanted to share with you is the "School Clothing" funds that the Tribe issues to parents and students. From what is in the policy and what is allowed from the Gaming monies we obtain, we have to follow the guidelines. We are not being mindful of what is happening especially when our students are not working hard for their future.

We are going to effectively enforce the guidelines as it is stated;

"Assistance will be provided if previous nine weeks passing or satisfactory grades were obtained." This is according to the gaming guidelines in bullet 8.

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We will issue a letter to parents about the guidelines and include that:

“After this year this student will no longer receive school clothing assistance unless proof of passing grades is submitted.” The only exception will be made are to the students with an Individual Education Plan (I.E.P.) from the school.

Lastly, let's be safe during the school year, STOP when buses pick up and drop off students, also during the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. especially in the school zones —SLOW DOWN— 15 Miles-Per-Hour. Han i kyu.

### **Permit Requirement • Hualapai Reservation**

**RE: Permits Required**

As stated in the Hualapai Tribe Natural Resources Conservation Ordinance 24-70

#### **Section 3.9 Trespassing**

It shall be unlawful for any non-member to enter an area of the Hualapai Reservation for which a permit is required under any Tribal Law, without first obtaining the requisite permit. Violation of this Ordinance by non-members triggers Spontaneous Revocation of permission to enter the Reservations and renders the violator a trespasser. It shall be unlawful for any non-member to trespass on the Hualapai Reservation.

#### **Chapter 6. PERMITS**

##### **Section 6.1 - Permit Required**

**B.** Non-Tribal members who are married to tribal members shall have hunting and fishing privileges by reason of such marriage, except as otherwise may be provided by the Tribal Council. The non-member spouse shall obtain a free use permit from the Hualapai Game & Fish Department.

**G.** Permits for visitation, site-seeing, camping, hiking. Climbing, picnicking and any other non-consump-

tive outdoor activity are required on the Reservation except for tribal members, their spouses, and their immediate families or non-member tribal employees. A tribal employment ID card will be supplied by the Human Resources Office for that purpose. In addition refer to Section 2.4B.

**Section 6.3 Permit Agreements Required**

All persons to whom permits are issued by Game & Fish Department shall be required to sign a Permit Agreement before any such permit shall be valid. The Permit Agreement shall be in the form provided by Section 6.4. The Permit Agreement shall be signed by the applicant in the presence of the individual who issued the permit, or his agent.

**Section 6.5 Particular Permits**

**M. VISITATION PERMIT ( Day Use )**

**Non- members** must obtain a permit for camping, hiking, climbing, picnicking, birding, sightseeing and any other non-consumptive outdoor activity.

**Non-member tribal employees:** A free use permit will be provided to non-member tribal employees, public school employees, and local government employees and their immediate families. A tribal employment I.D. is required to receive a free use permit.

The Permittee waives all claims against the Government of the Hualapai Tribe of the Hualapai Indian Reservation, Arizona, for any loss or damage which may result from any cause during the period covered by this permit or his presence on the Reservation in pursuance thereof. Permittee consents to the absolute and exclusive jurisdiction of the Hualapai Tribal Court as the forum for the resolution of any disputes arising from Permittee's presence on the Reservation and/or use of Tribal resources and/or services.




## Seats open on First Things First Regional Partnership Council

You can vote in the comfort & convenience of your own home--no traveling to your polling location or waiting in line! **On Election Day**, all voters who wish to vote, and did not vote early, must vote at their *home precinct* (precinct in which you currently reside) polling location between the hours of 6:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

**Mission Statement:** Our goal is to serve the public by managing county elections as efficiently as possible, and to reach out to every qualified voter in our county, enabling them to cast their ballot in a friendly and informative environment.

The Elections Department is the operating arm of the Board of Supervisors fulfilling the responsibilities of election administration.

### **Duties of the Elections Department include:**

1. Issues & accepts all candidate, recall, initiative, & referendum petitions
2. Issues & accepts all campaign finance forms
3. Establishes election precinct boundaries
4. Provides for the printing of all election related material
5. Secures use of facilities for election day polling places
6. Recruits, hires, trains & compensates poll workers
7. Prepares, allocates & transports election materials to & from polling places
8. Prepares & tests ballot tabulation equipment
9. Tabulates ballots
10. Provides election results &
11. Coordinates & administers Primary & General elections

Mohave County also enters into intergovernmental agreements with the City of Bullhead City, the City of Kingman, the City of Lake Havasu City, the school districts and other special districts to conduct elections for local office holders and bond issues.

**Four (4) consolidated election dates in Arizona:**

All jurisdictions are required to hold elections on consolidated election dates:

1. Second Tuesday in March
2. Third Tuesday in May
3. Tenth Tuesday before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November
4. First Tuesday after the first Monday in November

During Presidential Election years, the Presidential Preference Election (a political party only election) is held on the 1st Tuesday after March 15.

**Methods of Voting in Mohave County:**

1. **Permanent Early Voting List (PEVL)** — at Voter's request to be placed on the PEVL list, Voter will have ballot automatically mailed to them 26 days before all elections Voter is qualified to vote in. No more missed elections!
2. **One-time Early Ballot Request** — ballot for an election will be mailed to Voter when request is made by Voter to Voter Registration Department.
3. **Early Voting Site** — Voter may go to a designated area Early Voting Location & vote an early ballot.
4. **Poll Site Voting on Election Day** — Voter goes in person to their precinct polling location to cast ballot on Election Day.

**Over 58% of votes cast in last election were cast by Early Voters!**

**Some important facts on Voting:**

1. Sample ballots are mailed to each household containing a registered voter about 10 days before an election. Your polling place is on the mailing label.
2. Sample ballots are not mailed to Voters on the Permanent Early Voter List (PEVL) as they receive their actual ballot before the 10 days.
3. Voted Early Ballots may be returned by mail (allow plenty of time to reach Voter Registration Department by 7 p.m., evening of Election Day), or dropped off at any Early Voting site, or dropped off at any polling location on Election Day.
4. ID is required for Voters at the Poll Site — check out acceptable types of ID at: <http://www.mohavecounty.us/ContentPage.aspx?id=118&cid=143>
5. On county-wide elections, close to 400 people are hired to work the day and night — Poll Worker Information can be found at: <http://www.mohavecounty.us/ContentPage.aspx?id=118&cid=142>

Please note that starting this year all Minor Per Capita Applications turned in for 2016 will be in effect permanently. This will eliminate you having to turn in an application every year. However, if you wish to change it then you must fill out a new application for that year.

The Accounting Department would like to inform the community and all Tribal members that we must have a social security number on file in order for you to receive your check in December. The social security number is for sending out the IRS 1099 forms in which a social security number is required. A list of those we are missing is attached.

The Per Capita deadline for this year is November 15, 2016. We must have your social security number by that date or your check will be held until we receive it. We will not mail out a check until a social security number is received and a current address is on file.

Also, we received many of the IRS 1099 forms back in the mail due to bad addresses so if you did not receive a 1099 for 2015, please call April at the Tribal Office (928) 769-2216.

Minor Per Capita statements were also recently mailed out and many were returned. If you did not receive a statement for your child(ren) this year, please call April at the Tribal Office to verify your address. If you need to update your address, then the address change form must be filled out.



Dear Chairman Clarke:

The Hualapai Indian Tribe (Tribe) submitted a Secretarial election request enacted under Resolution No. 79-2015, which was adopted October 1, 2015, to amend the Constitution of the Hualapai Indian Tribe of the Hualapai Indian Reservation (Constitution) to add a Section 3 to Article XVI-Sovereign Immunity. Resolution No. 12-2016 was also submitted to correct a typographical error in the proposed amendment language.

On March 21, 2016, the Superintendent, Truxton Canon Agency, received authorization to call and conducted a Secretarial election pursuant to the updated Title 25 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 81 (25 C.F.R. § 81), which went into effect November 18, 2015. The Secretarial election was conducted by mail out ballot and concluded on May 23, 2016.

As evidenced by the Certificate of Results of Election, signed by the Election Board Members on May 23, 2016, the proposed amendment A to the Constitution was adopted by a vote of 24 "for" and 23 "against", and 4 cast ballots found to be spoiled or mutilated in an election in which at least thirty percent (30%) of the 84 members registered and entitled to vote cast their ballots.

There were no challenges to the result of the Secretarial election, therefore, by my signature on the enclosed Certificate of Approval, the proposed amendment A is hereby approved pursuant to the authority delegated to me by the Secretary of the Interior by 3 IAM 4. Proposed amendment A is now designated as Amendment No. 1 to the Constitution of the Hualapai Indian Tribe of the Hualapai Indian Reservation.

Enclosed with this letter are the amendment document, the original Certificate of Approval and the Certificate of Results of Election for your files. As a last note, my decision to approve this amendment is a final agency action 25 C.F.R. §§ 81.45; 81.45(f). Pursuant to the revised Secretarial election regulations, this decision is a final agency action that is not "subject to appeal to a superior authority in the Department." 25 C.F.R. § 2.6.

**AMENDMENT I**

**Article XVI – Sovereign Immunity**

*The following Section 3 will be added as follows:*

**Section 3. Limited Waivers of Sovereign Immunity by Certain Tribal Entities**

Notwithstanding Section 2 of this Article, a limited waiver of sovereign immunity otherwise within the scope of that Section shall require only the approval of the Tribal Council if the Tribal Council determines that such waiver would facilitate the advancement of the economic or commercial interests of the Tribe and its members. Only those tribal entities formed and governed pursuant to ordinances of the Tribal Council may, with Tribal Council approval, grant limited waivers of sovereign immunity as prescribed in this Section 3.

**CERTIFICATE OF APPROVAL**

Amendment A, to the Constitution of the Hualapai Indian Tribe of the Hualapai Indian Reservation which was adopted by the qualified voters of the Tribe on May 23, 2016, is hereby approved and designated as Amendment I pursuant to the authority delegated to the Secretary of the Interior by the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984), as amended and re-delegated to me under 3 IAM 4. This approval is effective as of this date; provided that nothing in this approval shall be construed as authorizing any action under this document that would be contrary to Federal Law.



#### **COMPLEXITY**

- ❖ The work includes varied duties which require the incumbent to apply the principles and concepts of criminal law to a broad range of activities which include a substantial depth of analysis. The assignments are characterized by the breadth and intensity of effort and involve several phases being pursued concurrently on sequentially with the support of others within or outside of the organization. Decisions regarding what needs to be done include largely undefined issues and elements, requiring extensive probing and analysis to determine the appropriate method involved in processing cases.






**P**each Springs Elementary is a small K-8 school with an enrollment of 221 students, that serves as the LEA of a community that has a population total of over 1000.





### **KidsCare Accepting Applications July 26 Coverage Effective September 1, 2016**

PHOENIX – Governor Doug Ducey signed SB 1457\*, restoring KidsCare coverage to children in households between 133% and 200% of the Federal Poverty Limit (FPL). KidsCare is Arizona's version of the federally created Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). KidsCare enrollment was frozen in January 2010, one of several measures taken to address the budget crisis during the Great Recession.

Applications for KidsCare will be accepted beginning July 26, 2016 for coverage that will begin September 1, 2016. Applications received before July 26 will be denied until the recently signed legislation becomes effective, which also allows time for needed changes within the State's eligibility system, Health-e-Arizona Plus (HEAplus), in order to accept the KidsCare applications.

"We applaud the Legislature and Governor Ducey's commitment to health care coverage for working families," said AHCCCS Director Tom Betlach. "We are grateful to our partners at the Department of Economic Security (DES) who are ready to take applications and the AHCCCS contracted health plans that stand at the ready to meet the health care needs of children in the KidsCare program."

"On behalf of the Arizona Department of Economic Security, I'd like to thank Governor Ducey and members of the Legislature for the restoration of KidsCare," said DES Director Tim Jeffries. "This program will further the DES mission of helping Arizona's most vulnerable. We look forward to working with our state agency colleagues at AHCCCS on the successful reimplementation of this program."

Parents insuring their children in KidsCare pay a monthly premium depending on their household income. Monthly premiums can range from \$10 for one child in a household at the lower income range up to \$70 for multiple children in households at the upper income range. The annual family income for a household of four at 133% FPL is \$32,319 and at 200% FPL is \$48,600.

AHCCCS estimates approximately 30,000 Arizona children may enroll in KidsCare coverage. KidsCare offers the full array of AHCCCS benefits. Families will have their eligibility conducted by the Department of Economic Security as part of a holistic eligibility determination. Eligible children will receive their coverage through health plans contracted with the AHCCCS Administration.
