Grand Opening for the Hualapai Youth Camp

On Tuesday, May 30, 2017, the Hualapai Tribe held the grand opening for the new Youth Camp. After some 11 years of planning, securing funding, working with architects and engineers and then construction contractors, the Youth Camp is officially open. Nearly 400 people were estimated to be in attendance as members of Tribal Council, Peach Unified School District, Boys and Girls Club, Youth Council and Hualapai Royalty made presentations on their use and care of the facility. Councilman Scott Crozier began the event with an opening prayer and Mr. Ivan Bender was so kind to give the blessing.

The theme Sma:m jo (Everlasting Vision) seeks to re-

kindle this life and spirit for the new Youth Camp while seeking to improve attitudes and build cooperation among youth of all ages.



Many years ago, when people listened to music on vinyl records and then danced to a disco beat, the Hualapai Youth Camp hosted summer events for youth and members of the broader community. Camp counselors at the time remember helping youth with arts and crafts after lunch as a way to relax in the heat of the day following mornings filled with ball games, archery and relay races. Stories of glorious deeds and earthly wisdom were shared at the nightly camp fires.

New Features at the Youth Camp

The Youth Camp has a 5,000 square foot bunk house with 16 bunkrooms (32 beds), a dining hall, meeting room and bathrooms. The Pavilion can seat 200-plus people and the laundry/restroom building has four washers and dryers to support the 5-space RV park and over a dozen camp sites.

The Youth Camp is located approximately 38 miles from Peach Springs on Indian Route 17. Turn left (west) at the sign on Route 18 and proceed 4 miles to the site.



Hualapai Tribal Council Updates

Resolutions adopted May and June 2017

The following Resolutions have been reviewed, discussed, and adopted by the Hualapai Tribal Council for the months of May and Partial of June 2017:

Resolution 36-2017 was adopted in reference to the "Grant Application to Federal Transit Authority". This was adopted April 27, 2017.

Resolution 37-2017 was passed "Tribal Membership Enrollment of 4" and adopted May 6, 2017.

Resolution 38-2017 was defeated and not passed.

Resolution 39-2017 The Council adopted this Resolution that Renews the Contract of Montgomery and Associates for a period of three years.

Resolution 40-2017 The Council passed a Residential Lease of Toni Cesspooch on May 15, 2017.

Resolution 41-2017 A Tribal Transportation Program Priority List was adopted on May 15, 2017.

Resolution 42-2017 was adopted For the Tribal Transportation Improvement Program on May 15, 2017. A "Resolution opposing Canyon Mine and the hauling of uranium ore and other radioactive materials from Canyon Mine to the White Mesa Mill near Blanding, Utah" was passed on May 15,207. Resolution 43-2017.

Resolution 44-2017 was successfully adopted entitled: "Resolution approving Agreement between Hualapai Tribe and Arizona Public Service Company to Renew APS Right-of-Way" on May 31, 2017.

Resolution 45-2017 "Housing Board By-Laws" was presented and passed on May 31, 2017.

The Council adopted **Resolution 46-2017** titled "Terrestrial Radio Station License Class Upgrade" on June 3, 2017.

Resolution 47-2017 was adopted on June 3, 2017 of a Residential Lease for Truman Talieje.

The Hualapai Tribal Council adopted **Resolution 48-2017** A Grant Application to Native Language Preservation on June 3, 2017.

Resolution 49-2017 A Grant Application to Native American Social & Economic Development was passed on June 3, 2017.

HTUA Seeking New Board Member • Respond by Friday, June 30th

Seeking New Board Member for the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority (HTUA)

On September 24, 2014, the Hualapai Tribal Council adopted the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority Governing Ordinance. This is a significant step toward self-determination in the realm of public utilities for the Hualapai Tribe.

Established as an institution of Tribal government, the five members of the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority board are chosen by Council. As noted in Section 107.b.3, of the Ordinance,

the HTUA Board is authorized to acquire, construct, operate, maintain, promote, and expand electric power service, and eventually water service, and sewage service at Grand Canyon West and on such other locations within the Hualapai Reservation and on other Tribal lands under the jurisdiction of the Hualapai Tribe as the Tribal Council may deem appropriate. The HTUA board is delegated full authority and responsibility for the management and operation of HTUA consistent with the Ordinance.

At this time, the Tribe is seeking a new candidate to apply for Board membership to maintain this important function of Tribal government. This Board position may be may filled by members or non-members of who have not less than ten years' experience in business management of substantial character and have had some experi-

ence in the management and operation of an electric utility (Section 202.a.3).

• No employee of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, employee of the HTUA or member of the Tribal Council shall be a member of the Board (Section 202.a.4).

The new board member will be appointed for a three-year term (Section 202.b.2).

The Board functions in much the same capacity as an elected Board of Directors of a chartered municipal electric utility, and shall be responsible for making investment decisions, subject to certain limitations; for the establishment and maintenance of effective operating policies; the selection of management personnel; and for continuous supervision of performance (Section 203.a.2).

Members of the Board shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred in attending its meetings, and the Board in its discretion may propose a fee to be paid to its members (subject to approval by the Tribal Council) on a per-meeting or annual basis (Section 203.a.6).

The Board shall make annual and quarterly reports to the Tribal Council (Section 203.a.7) and hold meetings at least every quarter and annually (Section 204).





The Court upon review of the case finds defendant is charged with Disorderly Conduct, a violation of Section 6.64 of the Hualapai Law and Order Code. Defendant plead "Guilty" to the charge on December 15, 2008. The defendant was ordered to pay \$250 for the conviction of Disorderly Conduct due a payable on or before March 16, 2009. Defendant did not pay his fine as ordered and the Court ordered defendant to show cause for failure to pay his fine. The defendant could not be served with process for reason he is no longer residing in Peach Springs, Arizona. The Court shall issue an Order to Show Cause on defendant to bring him before the Court for defendant to show why he should not be held in contempt and why he should not pay his \$250 fine.

Now Therefore:

It is hereby ordered:

The shall issue an Order to Show Cause and have said action published in the next edition of the local newspaper, namely: GAMYU.

The Court shall require one (1) publication of a Notice of Hearing to the defendant.

DO NOT tamper with gate valves on the livestock water lines out on the reservation!

Last week 4/17/17 through 4/21/17, HDNR was forced to haul water to districts to ensure that cattle had access to sufficient water while range water located the disruption in the main water line. The disruption was later found to have been a gate valve that had been tampered with which shut down service on the main water line. This caused significant delays in water deliveries, other scheduled projects, and the daily operations of the Hualapai Department of Natural Resources, Agriculture program.

If there is a need for water delivery or there are problems with leaking pipes or valves, please contact the Department of Natural Resources immediately. With your help, we can ensure that there are no service interruptions with water delivery to the livestock districts, tribal agencies, wildlife and community functions out on the reservation.

Should you have any questions or concerns please do not hesitate to contact the Hualapai Department of Natural Resources.

Our mission is to conserve, protect and enhance the natural resources of the Hualapai Reservation while providing for multiple consumptive and non-consumptive uses, and ensuring the overall goal of long-term sustainable and balanced multiple uses of natural resources under the direction of the Hualapai Tribal Council. Beginning April 24, 2017, the Hualapai Department of Natural Resources will be conducting a feral horse round-up within the external boundaries of the Hualapai Indian Reservation. This project is being conducted in accordance with Hualapai Tribal Council Resolution No. 50-2003, Ordinance 2B, section 1(b) The grazing of livestock upon reservation lands within an area closed to grazing of that class of livestock, and Ordinance No. 24-70, Section 5.11(f) An abatement Plan formulated pursuant to this section may authorize the trapping, tagging, moving, or killing of hazardous or nuisance animals if necessary for the safety of the public or the protection of property from related damage. This project will continue for an indefinite amount of time until the feral horse population can be brought into more manageable numbers to conserve the natural resources and minimize property damage within the reservation boundaries.







10 Traits That Separate a Good Dad From a Great One

10 Traits That Separate a Good Dad From a Great One "Anyone can be a father, but it takes a real man to be a daddy." - Anonymous

A good father makes all the difference in a child's life. He's a pillar of strength, support and discipline. His work is endless and, oftentimes, thankless. But in the end, it shows in the sound, well-adjusted children he raises. On Father's Day, much of the world will take the time to appreciate the work of good fathers. While you show your admiration for your own dad, take the time to see if you yourself have what it takes to be a great father, whether you have children or plan to.

A good father loves his children, but he doesn't let them get away with murder. He strongly disapproves of his children's misdeeds, using tough love to prove a point. He does this through the power of his words, not his fists. Likewise, a father doesn't reward his children for actions that are expected of them, such as helping with house chores or performing well in school. If his child drops out of school, the father demands that he provide for himself, considering the child no longer wants to invest in his own future.

A good father realizes that his children are human, and that making mistakes is part of growing up. Spending money recklessly, getting into minor car accidents, getting drunk and sick for the first time, even dating questionable persons are rites of passage, and a good father recognizes this. However, he makes it clear that repeated irresponsibility won't be tolerated.

He Teaches His Children To Appreciate Things

A good father never lets his children take what they have for granted. From the food on the table to the good education he's paying for, a good father will make his children see the value in everything they have. He'll ask his child to get a job to help pay for a part of his first car, and take the time to illustrate how important a good education is. He doesn't let his kids treat him like an ATM. He teaches his kids to appreciate important purchases like the Promaster Navihawk GPS watch from Citizen which, with its Satellite GPS Timekeeping technology that adjusts time in 27 cities, they'll need when they responsible enough to travel the world on his own.

He's Open-Minded

A good father understands that times, people and tastes change over the years, and doesn't try to maintain some gold standard of his own time. For instance, he realizes that body piercings are more commonplace than before, that more couples have premarital sex, and that people

talk more candidly about personal issues. In other words, he allows his children to be citizens of their day and age.

He Accepts That His Kids Aren't Exactly Like Him

Everyone is different and a father knows this well. He won't expect his kids to live the same kind of life he does, and do the same kind of work. He also respects their values and opinions, as long as they don't harm the family or anyone else.

To use a pop culture example, he's like Martin Crane from *Frasier*, the everyman blue-collar dad who allowed his pompous sons to steer their lives in a different direction, even if he didn't quite agree with them.

He Spends Quality Time With His Children

A dad knows how to have fun with his kids too, taking them out to games, movies, and supporting their sports teams by attending their matches. He takes the time to listen to his kids and have a good, easy chat with them. He also makes time to help them with their homework, every night if necessary.

He Leads By Example

A good father is above the old "do as I say, not as I do" credo. He will not smoke if he doesn't want his kids to do it, and definitely won't drink heavily. He teaches them to deal with conflict with a family member and with others by being firm but reasonable at the same time. A good father also illustrates the importance of affection by professing his love for their mother in front of them. And he won't fight with her in their presence. In all, he adheres to the values he'd like his children to follow.

He's Supportive And Loval

Although he may be a football fanatic, if his son doesn't share his love for the game, he accepts it. He may be loyal to his alma mater and dream of having his kid follow his legacy, but if his son prefers to study abroad, he'll support his decision to take a different path.

A good father is also his children's public defender, standing up for them when needed. He waits for privacy to administer discipline. A safety net, a good father is also the person his kids turn to when things go wrong.

He Challenges His Kids

A father wants his children to be the best they can be, and gives them challenges that help them grow as human beings. This means giving them some liberty to face setbacks and resolve conflicts on their own. Or it could be a task, such as building something for the house. If a father wants his children to take over the family business, he teaches them how to keep it flour-

ishing — provided that's the path they want to take. He Teaches His Kids Lessons

A father figure is the prime source of knowledge in the ways of men, and teaches his kids accordingly. From shaving to being courageous, a father molds his kids into well-rounded members of society. He especially instructs them in proper etiquette, on being honest and keeping their word, and on being thankful. A great father knows he must sacrifice his own comfort for his fatherly duties. For instance, if he comes home from a hard day at work and catches his kids looking at porn on the Net, he'll take the time to address an awkward situation even though he's tired.

He Protects His Family, No Matter What

As the main provider of security and necessities, a father will do whatever he can for his family. He'll take a second job to provide for them, and he'll put his own safety on the line to keep them out of harm's way. This is how a father instills in his children the importance of personal sacrifice.

He Shows Unconditional Love

This is the greatest quality of a good father. Even though he gets upset at his children's faults and may lament that they did not attain what he hoped for them, a father loves his children no less for it.

Give Props To Dad

There are few things as valuable as a father who will do everything he can, and provide all the tools he has so that his children can become better than him. So this Father's Day, show your dad you appreciate what a great man he is. And take the time to make yourself just as grand.


