Fallen soldier receives recognition: Effort to put faces to Vietnam memorial names leads to Mohave County tribal member

A soldier killed in action almost 50 years ago was remembered during a military reunion in Scottsdale earlier this month, an event that allowed many of his loved ones - members of the Hualapai and Havasupai tribes — the chance to witness him be honored for his service.

U.S. Army PFC Michael Bruce Jones's name is on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington D.C. Jones, a member of B Company, 4th Battalion, 9th Infantry Regiment, 25th Infantry Division who had been in Vietnam for only a month, was 20 years old when he was struck and killed by enemy fire in 1968, the year of the Tet Offensive. He was on patrol in the part of South Vietnam A table display memorializing Michael Bruce known then as the Gia Dihn Province, which included Saigon, now Ho Chi Minh City, at the time of his death.



Jones, who died while serving in Vietnam in 1968, was part of a military reunion event held in Scottsdale on June 17. A Hualapai and Havasupai tribal member, Jones lived with both people during his youth. Contributed

Jones is buried in Mountain View Cemetery in Kingman. The gravestone says he died in March but he actually died in May 1968, Members of the Hualapai Tribe didn't know very much about the circumstances surrounding his death, said Michael Whatoname, a member who is involved with tribal veterans affairs.

"We were always curious about how he passed away," he said. Whatoname said that without having Jones' Social Security number, tribal members couldn't obtain information from the Army about his service. Jones will be more permanently memorialized in Hualapai tribal chambers: A plaque presented by reunion organizers during the ceremony will be paired with an enlarged photograph of Jones to form a display.

The Hualapai will also devote Veterans Day activities to Jones, Whatoname said. Sharon Johnston was able to find not only photographs of Jones but also some of his relatives, including his sister, Bernadine. The Phoenix elementary school teacher is participating in a project called The Wall of Faces that matches photographs to the more than 58,000 names on the memorial. It's part of a Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund plan to build an \$130 million facility called the Education Center at The Wall. Jones' mother was a Hualapai and his father was a Havasupai. He was born in Barstow, Calif., but lived with both tribes over the course of his young life because his parents lived separately. He graduated from Stewart Indian School in Carson City, Nev., and when he was enlisted he had been attending what is now known as Haskell Indian Nations University in Lawrence, Kan. Johnston has focused on finding photographs of men and women born in Arizona, as well as in Maryland and Washington D.C. Her Arizona efforts were chronicled in *The Arizona Republic* on Memorial Day. That story included a list of names of people for whom she was still trying to find photographs and information. She had been trying to track down photographs of about 20 Arizonans but is down to just three.

"And I have leads for those," she said. After seeing the Memorial Day article, a member of the 25th Infantry Division 1st of the 5th Mechanized Regiment, known as the "Bobcats," reached out to Johnston to tell her that he remembered Jones. He also invited her to the division's reunion. Johnston was able to find out about Jones' tribal connections and ended up learning quite a bit about him as a result of that conversation and subsequent research. She asked the reunion organizer if tribal members related or close to Jones could also attend and they all were invited. A table at the reunion was devoted to Jones and his short life — including his military service. "This becomes a little bit more for me than just a photograph," Johnston said of this and other experiences related to her work on the Wall of Faces. "You get to know about the people, their families, these kids ... and many of them were just kids."

KINGMAN – While most people can appreciate the beauty of the grasslands and rocky canyons of Northern Arizona, the land holds a special meaning for Ka-Voka Jackson. These are the lands where her Hualapai Tribe ancestors lived and farmed and raised their families. Many of them are buried on the land.

Jackson, 24, who grew up on the Hualapai reservation in Peach Springs, has a special connection to her master's degree project at University of Nevada, Las Vegas. She and a group of other UNLV ecology students spent their spring break restoring native plants at Glen Canyon National Recreation Area on the border of Arizona and Utah. Jackson is collaborating with the National Park Service on research to remove invasive Ravenna grass weeds from several canyons along the Colorado River and replace them with native plants used in traditional Hualapai ceremonies and everyday life. Not only do the invasive plants

pose a wildfire risk, they're displacing other plants central to Native American culture, religion and history, Jackson said. "Just like other invasive plants can cause issues, it presents a problem because it squeezes out vegetation and it's a fire hazard," she said. "It's a big grass that gets really tall and grows in close quarters. It provides all this dry vegetation that can pose a fire risk." Ravenna grass is not a "very friendly" plant, Jackson said. Wildlife won't eat it because of its sharp, serrated leaves. It'll leave humans with stinging paper-like cuts, she said.

Jackson recruited three UNLV undergraduates to drive nearly five hours to Page, then take a four-hour boat ride to camp in a remote desert area for five days of planting.

They transplanted white sagebrush, a medicinal plant whose leaves and stems are boiled into teas; willow baccharis and arrowweed, whose branches were woven into baskets and thatched roofs; and food sources such as prickly pear cactus, Indian rice grass and four-wing saltbush. They also put in big bluestem grass, which is a native grass smaller than Ra-

venna that grows in seeps and springs.

It's an ongoing project for Jackson, who juggles three classes at UNLV while raising her 8-yearold daughter. working on a separate study examining Ravenna grass seeds in the laboratory for ways to eradicate the plant. She'll make regular visits to the planting site to monitor progress. .The project's success is dependent upon analysis of modern-day scientific factors such as climate change, drought and water quality.

Along with preserving the natural beauty and history of Glen Canyon and Grand Canyon national parks, Jackson is striving to maintain a delicately balanced ecosystem with her project. The survival of plants, insects, animals and humans is dependent upon each of their preservation, she explained.

UNLV ecologist Scott Abella was looking for students to work in his laboratory researching culturally important plants. He said he was delighted to get someone from a local Native American tribe.

"It is a special opportunity for her to work on her tribe's ancestral lands," he said. "The Glen Canyon and Grand Canyon area is a special place and as a protected national park unit, we want the area to be in a reasonably natural state."

DO NOT tamper with gate valves on the livestock water lines out on the reservation!

Last week 4/17/17 through 4/21/17, HDNR was forced to haul water to districts to ensure that cattle had access to sufficient water while range water located the disruption in the main water line. The disruption was later found to have been a gate valve that had been tampered with which shut down service on the main water line. This caused significant delays in water deliveries, other scheduled projects, and the daily operations of the Hualapai Department of Natural Resources, Agriculture program.

If there is a need for water delivery or there are problems with leaking pipes or valves, please contact the Department of Natural Resources immediately. With your help, we can ensure that there are no service interruptions with water delivery to the livestock districts, tribal agencies, wildlife and community functions out on the reservation.

- My helmet fits and stays on when I shake my head.
 I use the Eyes-Ears-Mouth test:



Eyes: Can you see the edge of your helmet? Is your helmet level?



Ears: The straps should make a V-shape around your ears.




Mouth: Can you fit 1 finger between your chin and the strap? Open your mouth; can you feel it pull down your helmet?

- I wear bright, snug clothes and reflective items. I do not wear or carry backpacks with straps. I don't wear items with drawstrings that can get caught in my bike.
