

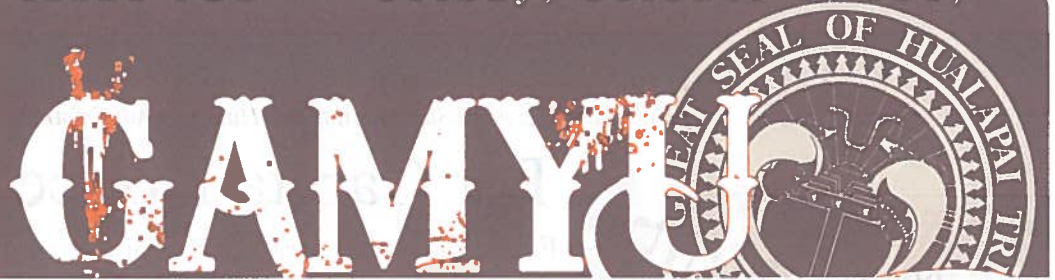

**\*Please note that the deadline to turn in the change of address form and the Minor Per Capita applications has changed.**

Any address changes must be updated with the Finance Department **before October 15, 2017** or we will mail to the last address on file. If you are unsure if you need to fill out a form then please give us a call.

**Minor Per Capita applications are now available!** You must also turn these in before the October 15, 2017 deadline. The form must be **completely** filled out with no missing Tribal ID numbers, birth dates, or social security numbers. Forms must be complete and include any legal custody documentation if needed. Incomplete applications will result in monies being sent to trust, no exceptions will be made.

**Please note, for those that do not re-file a new application your designation will stay the same as it was last year. So, if you selected trust or check last year it will be the same this year. You only need to fill out a new application if you missed the deadline last year or you wish to change your designation of where your minor(s) funds will go.**

Both of these forms must be notarized or they will not be accepted. The forms are located online, at the Tribal Office or in the Gamyu.

### Non-Emergency Medical Transportation Rider Rules

Riders have a responsibility to conduct themselves in a manner, which shows consideration for the comfort of other passengers. Toward that end, the NEMT has adopted the following Passenger Rules:

- Conduct - Obscene language, loud noises, or boisterous conduct is prohibited.
- Smoking - Smoking or carrying any lighted substance on board an agency vehicle is prohibited.
- Noise - Playing of radios, tape recorders or similar devices (other than by means of an earphone) is prohibited.
- Food - Consumption of food or beverages is prohibited.
- Graffiti - Any writing, spraying, scratching or otherwise affixing of graffiti on, or in, facilities or vehicles is prohibited.
- Seatbelts - Passengers must remain in their seats and wear seat belts at all times.
- Seating - Elderly and Disabled passengers in wheelchairs, shall have priority over other persons seated in the wheelchair tie-down locations. Other seats are designated as courtesy seating for elderly and disabled.
- Please be ready for your ride early. Watches and clocks seldom agree, and an error of time may result in a missed transport.

Each Staff member is trained in vehicle and passenger safety, which includes use of seat belts, biohazard clean up. Drivers also receive CPR, First Aid, and defensive driving training.

Transportation is provided to individuals who have a medical appointment, locally or out of area. These transports include the local IHS clinic, Kingman, Phoenix, Prescott, Flagstaff, Tucson, and Las Vegas. Funding is provided by the Hualapai Tribe and AHCCCS (if client is eligible).

Other transportation includes travel to Kingman to shop and other personal activities. These individuals are charged \$10 per person for each 100 miles traveled. Medical transports take precedence over other types of trips.





### **Hualapai Transportation Services Offered for:**

- Medical appointments
- Discharge from health facility
- Dialysis Treatment
- Dental appointments
- Optometry appointments
- Community activities

Public Transportation offered by a state or local government is covered by Title II of the ADA.

We have vehicles that are accessible to those with disabilities, via ramps and securement devices

Our drivers are courteous and well-trained.

Compliments, Complaints, Suggestions, and all feedback are welcome.

Complaints may be made by phone (928-769-4188), or in writing, to the Transportation Manager. The complaint will be documented and investigated in a timely manner

The ADA and Title VI complaint procedure is posted in each Transportation vehicle.

### **Steps to requesting Hualapai Non-Emergency Medical Transportation**

#### **Medical Transports:**

- Client notifies IHS Purchase Referred Care Clerk, explains need of medical transportation.
- IHS Clerk will complete transportation forms and fax to the Health Department's Transportation Office
- Transportation Manager schedules the transport and assigns driver.

#### **Non-Medical Transport**

- **The request for non-medical transport is completed and faxed or brought to the Health Department with the receipt obtained from the tribal office after paying the fee of \$10.00/100 miles.**
- Transportation Manager schedules the transport and assigns driver.

\* Things to consider: \*

- **Request transportation 2 days in advance. Requests "on day" of transport may not be honored, due to scheduling.**
- If you are unable to make the scheduled transport, please notify the Transportation Program as soon as possible.
- Dialysis clients and requests for medical transport take top priority.
- Medical Facilities need to notify us directly, when clients are discharged.

### **Hualapai Tribe Hualapai Health Department Medical Transport Description**

The Hualapai Tribe, through the Hualapai Health Department's Non-Emergency Medical Transport (NEMT) Program, provides transport services for medical and Non-Emergency Medical purposes.

Medical Transport Trips are requested through the Indian Health Service's Purchase Referred Care office, because they receive the appointment or admission information from the medical providers. The Purchase Referred Care Office personnel schedule the appointment and give the information to the NEMT Program.

**The trips are provided between 8 AM and 5 PM, Monday through Friday. Saturdays are reserved for dialysis clients.**

Other types of transports are provided for individuals who do not have a vehicle and whose income is limited. **Medical transports take precedence over other types of trips.** Those trips include; food, bank, shopping, pick-up or drop off at various places, trips to medical facilities where an immediate relative has been flown or taken by ambulance.

There are also trips requested and scheduled for individuals, not financially in need, who will to pick up their vehicle, shop for a program, and other social or program issues that may arise. The trips are available between 8 AM to 5 PM, Monday through Friday.

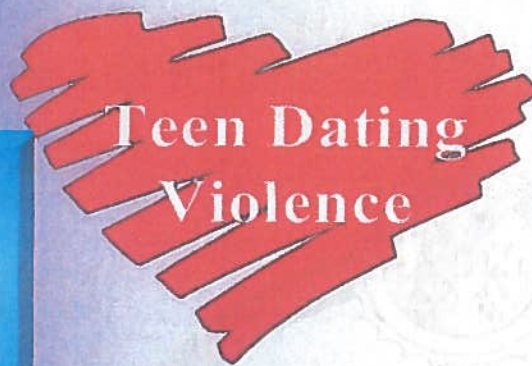

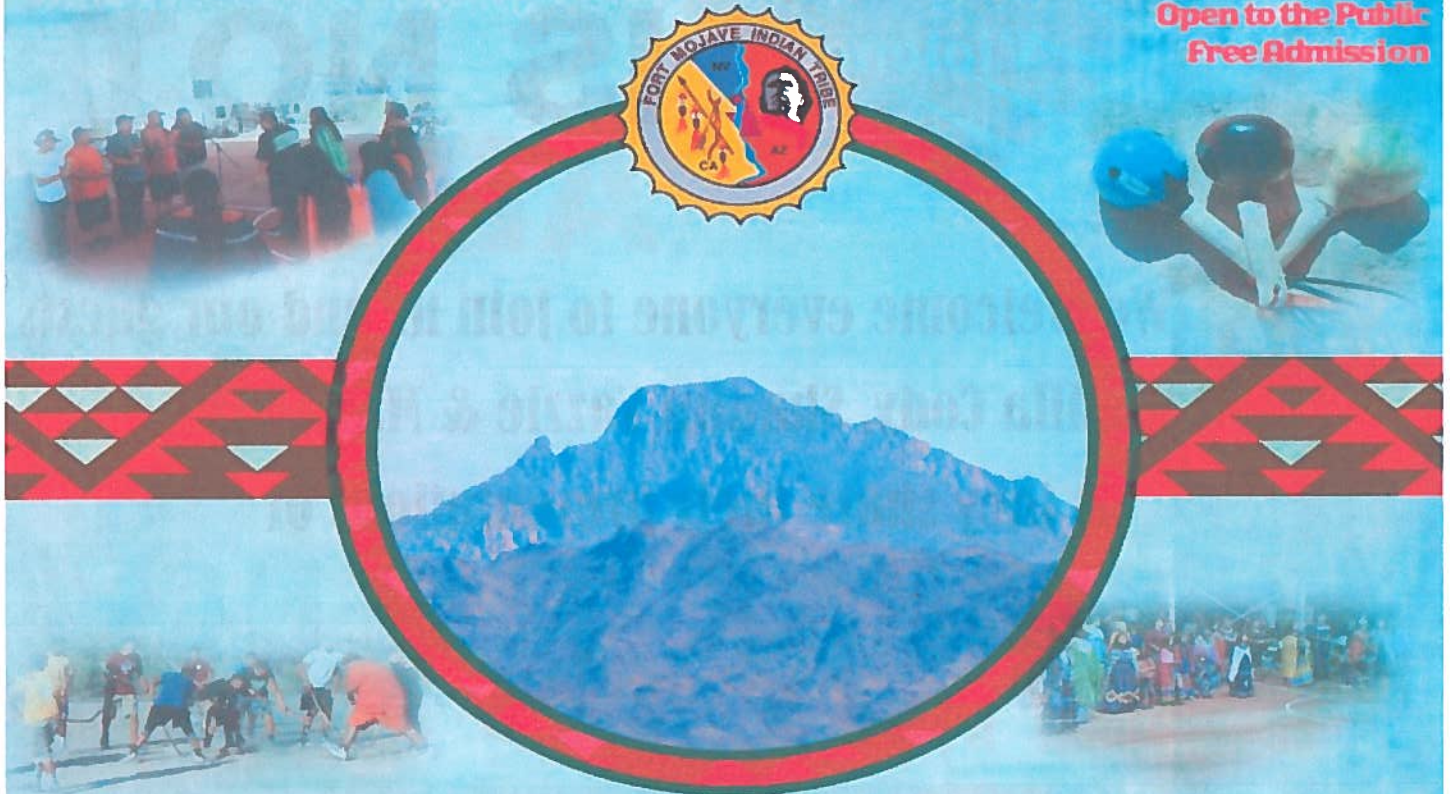

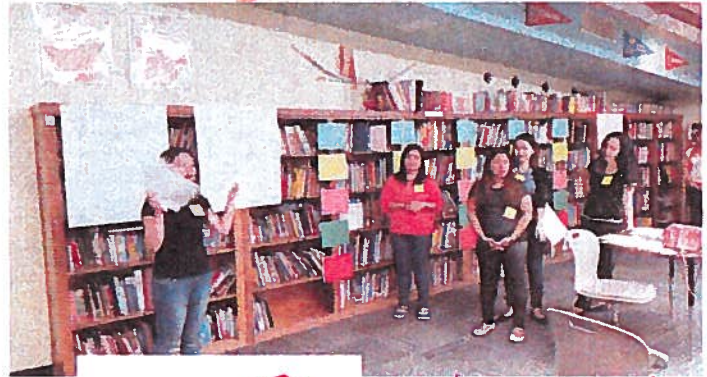

## HOW CAN I HELP MY STUDENT?

- Talk to your students about drugs – Children of parents who talk to their students regularly about drugs are 42% less likely to use drugs than those who don't.
- Keep up with their grades on ParentVUE – When students know that someone is paying attention to their progress, they are more likely to have an interest in keeping up with their schoolwork and keeping their grades up.
- Set goals with your student – Start simple, maybe with something like, "Be on time to school every day." By setting smaller goals early and having success, students will be more willing to set and work toward achieving larger goals down the road.
- Show them you value reading – Let them see you read for enjoyment as well as for information as part of your everyday lives (recipes, directions, manuals, newspapers, computer screens)
- Limit screen time – Especially the hour before bedtime. Research has shown that people (including adults) have better quality sleep when they are not on their phones, tablets, or computers right before they go to bed.

With Halloween on a school day this year, the question always comes up – "Can my student wear a costume to school for Halloween? Since we did not have issues last year, students will again be able to wear costumes on Halloween this year, but with certain conditions:



### Hualapai Tribal Wellness Court



#### Information Message:

The Hualapai Tribal Adult Wellness Court is designed to provide alternatives to individuals abusing drugs and alcohol throughout the Hualapai community. Off the reservation, American adversarial justice systems use the harshest penalties for drug and/or alcohol offenders. Wellness Court takes a holistic approach that promotes the wellbeing of individuals. Instead of focusing on tough penalties the focus of Wellness Court is on identifying services and programs individuals can use to cultivate the skills to create a sober life. The overall effect will create a betterment of themselves and the Hualapai community.

#### Our Mission:

To provide healthy alternatives to develop and establish sober living through Wellness Court by utilizing cultural, therapeutic, and educational services provided by the Hualapai Tribe.

#### Our Vision:

Through Wellness Court eligible

individuals of the community will have the knowledge and skills on how to live healthy and sober lives without relying on addiction.

#### Our Goal:

To reduce recidivism and increase the value of sobriety through the four (4) Phases of the Treatment Plan.

#### Wellness Court Eligibility

The changes are indirectly and/or directly related to alcohol and/or drug use.

Defendant is willing to pay fines and accept sanctions if imposed. The defendant is eligible and available for treatment for substance use disorder.

The defendant has no other warrants and/or detainers from other jurisdictions.

The defendant is not a violent offender. A violent offender is defined as;

Is currently charged with or convicted of an offense during the course of which:

The person carried possessed or used a firearm or other dangerous weapon or:

There occurred the use of force against the person of another; or There occurred the death of, or serious bodily injury, to any person; without regard to whether proof of any elements described herein is required

to convict; or

Has previously been convicted of a felony crime of violence involving the use or attempted use of force against a person with the intent to cause death or serious bodily harm.

The defendant has not been con-

victed of a sex offense within the past five years.

Any individuals not eligible for Wellness Court will have to continue through the established process of adjudication through the Hualapai Tribal Court.

Our offices are located next to the Hualapai Tribal Court.

If you have questions regarding the referral process, please contact your Defense Counsel or Prosecution. They can also contact us for information.

#### Entrance into Wellness Court

Participants are referred into Wellness Court. This can happen through a motion entered in by the Tribal Prosecutor, Tribal Public Defender, Pro se (own behalf), Advocate, pre-trial agreements, and/or as a post-trial sentence. Legal determination is made through a combination of factors with input from Tribal Prosecution, the presiding Judge, and available defense.

If Wellness Court is referred and accepted by all involved parties, individuals will be required to abide by all required Phases of Wellness Court. A total of four (4) Phases make-up the Wellness Court Program and require a 12 to 18-month commitment from the individual.

Length of stay within Wellness Court is dependent on the success of the individual.

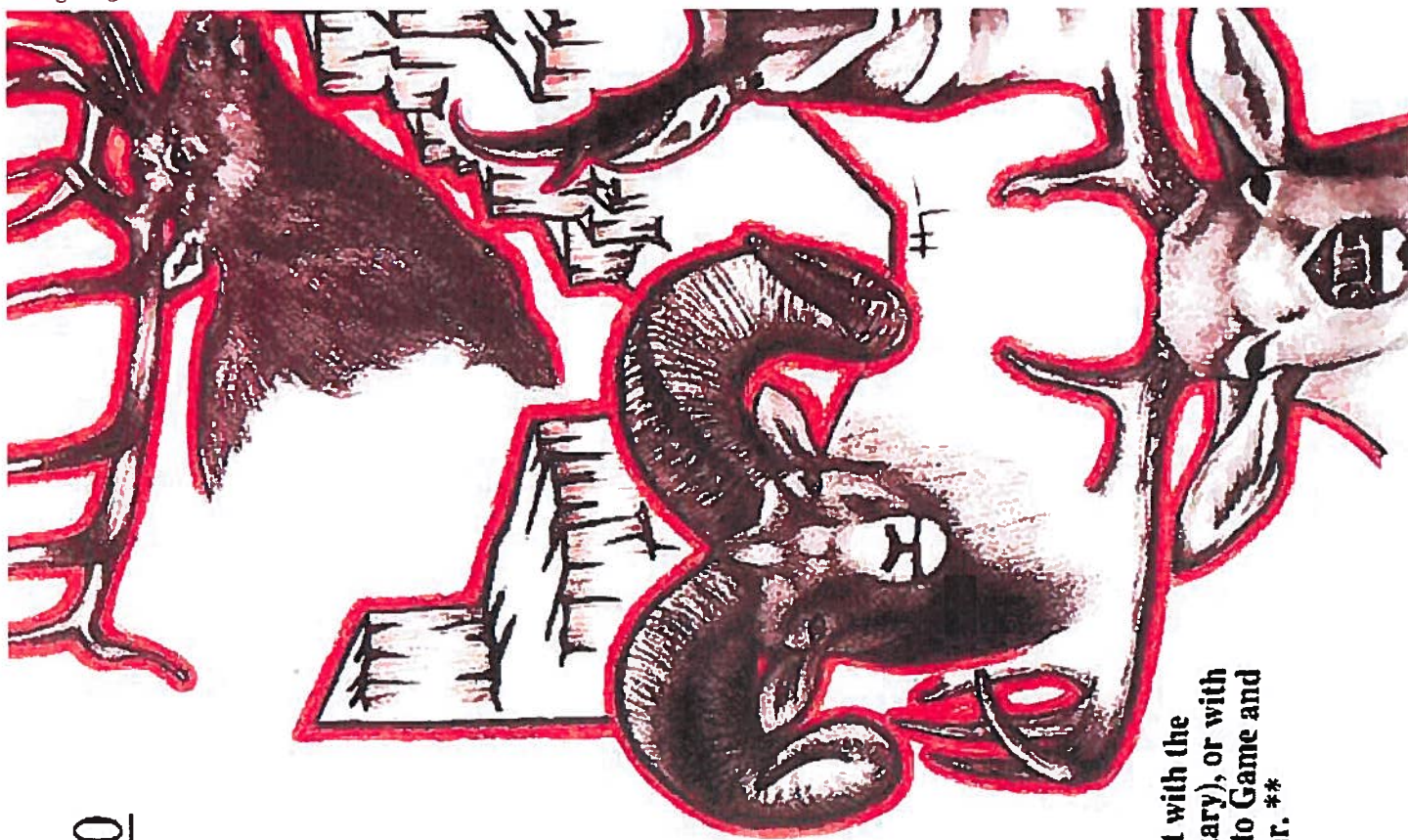

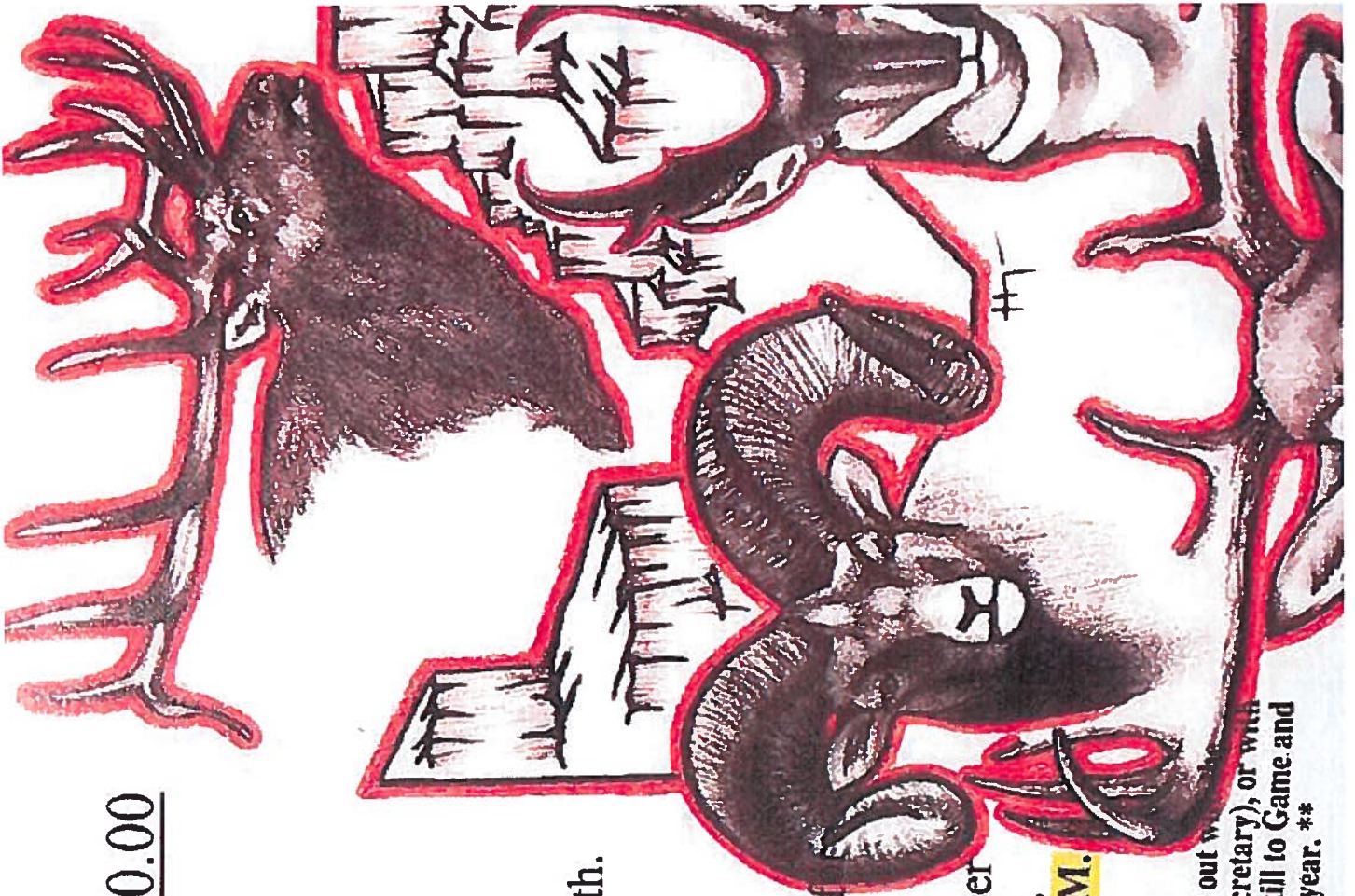
