



KWLP Political Advertising Disclosure

KWLP Political Advertising Disclosure

As a radio station broadcasting under a commercial license issued January 5, 2016 by the Federal Communications Commission (F.C.C.), KWLP, 100.9 FM, Peach Springs, Arizona must comply with certain rules and regulations regarding political advertising during designated "political windows." These rules vary regarding federal, state and local election campaigns and issues-focused political advertising. Political windows are 45 days prior to primary elections and 60 days prior to general elections. KWLP will be applying the F.C.C. rules regarding local elections to the upcoming Hualapai Tribal Council elections. These rules include "equal opportunity" to "reasonable access" for "legally qualified" candidates for the same office.

If you are a "legally qualified" candidate interested in advertising on the radio, you are entitled to review the station's public file, including the political advertising request and run contents, and to information from the station regarding:

- Classes of spots and day parts generally sold
- General rotations sold by the station
- Sales practices such as "make goods," discounts for packages, etc.,
- Lowest available spot rate

If you request to purchase political advertising time, you will need to complete a requisite disclosure statement (N.A.B. #17, 18) that must be kept in the station's public file for two years.

With all that in mind, we hope you are looking forward to the Spring cleaning of the community during this time as we are getting to the long days and short nights of the spring and summer coming.

Also, we are looking forward to the candidates that are making their way into the council arena. Good luck in your campaign and see you in the next month as you take your oath of office. For the four members going out in the next couple of weeks, it has been a fulfilling two years serving with you. As you know, there has been many discussions, agreements and disagreements. We will still keep your actions that needed to be addressed in mind as we move forward. Thank you for your time and efforts for the Hualapai Tribe. (Hanikyu).

This time, of the season, high school seniors, College graduates, and even some of you that have completed your G.E. D. you will be embarking on one of the most challenging phases of your life. The challenges involve the formation of your character, sense of responsibility and purpose of life. You will have to discover that you are to leave your childish ways and find what you really want to become. For many people this transition is a difficult one and represents a long journey.

You might think that me or others will help you in your search for answers to the challenge ahead. But as you will hear from most is that it is stressed time and time again, the importance of achieving individual success in life is up to you. "The Choice is Yours" and "Taking It To the Next Level" is my emphasis to you.

Success is a topic that seems to automatically complement graduation. I want to offer another concept for each of you to consider besides success, and that is of your development of personal aspirations. What sort of thought went through our ancestors minds as they encountered this situation? They were facing the ultimate fear: the fear of dying, getting hurt, and ever the fear of extermination. But, they put their fear aside and fought. Our La Paz March is significant of that, without our people to overcome this fear, we would not be here today.

Young men and young ladies, call back the courage of our ancestors. You have the courage and spirit of them within you! Imagine what would Chief Schrum, Chief Walapai Charlie, or Chief Levi Levi would say to you and me today. They would be very proud of you and your accomplishments. Be proud of what you have completed and Find Yourself- You have a purpose.

Council Members to Washington and Updates

Council members to Washington and updates

Inter Tribal Association of Arizona (ITAA) coordinates a week in Washington, D. C. for leaders of the 21 tribes and their designees to advocate for issues and matters that affect tribes as a whole or individuals of the tribe. The week provides an opportunity to learn about current legislative and administrative issues and to speak with senators, congressmen, and administrative staff about issues of Indian country and issues at home and within Arizona.

We, as a member of ITAA meet with a plan to identify issues and develop solutions to make our voices heard. We have a list of talking points with a plan of presentations. When we speak with the representatives, we only have a brief period of time and thus, have to make our points clear and concise. The staff of ITAA have developed a document that discusses all our issues. There is a lot of walking involved, and time is really an issue. This year the teams formed established a method to make our messages clear, and we felt that an impact was made, but that is going to be revisited in the next couple of months as we look at the results.

This year our Tribal Leaders Talking Points were:

- Continued and sustained funding for U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Programs
 (EPA) that provides support of Tribal EPA. We have opposed any and all policies or funding decisions that have the effect or reduced federal funding for tribal EPA through the U.S. EPA.
- 2. Restore Appropriations for the Rural Community Development Funding Program of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. We are concerned that the President's 2019 FY budget zeroed-out the HHS-ACF-OCS Community Services Block Grant-Rural Community Development program. The need for safe and reliable drinking water and effective wastewater management is fundamental to the health, safety, welfare, economic development and self-determination of tribes. Effective wastewater management is made possible by public health professionals that are properly trained and certified to operate and maintain water and wastewater systems.
- 3. Restore Appropriations for the Water Environmental Programs (WEP) of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. We are concerned the President's FY 2019 budget has zeroed-out the USDA- Rural Utilities Services (RUS) drinking water and waste facility (DW & WF) grant programs. The need for safe and reliable drinking water and effective wastewater management is fundamental to the health, safety, welfare, economic development and self-determination of tribes. ITCA Tribal Water Systems Program provides free training, technical assistance, and operator certification services for tribal communities nationwide.
- **4. FY 2019 Indian Health Service President's Budget Request.** We are deeply concerned of the elimination of funding for the Community Health Representatives (HR) program, Health Education, the Grants Management Program and a \$38 million cut below fiscal year 2018 to Health Care Facility Construction.
- **5. Bureau of Indian Affairs Appropriations.** We oppose the Administration's proposed budget cuts to the BIA for FY 2019 and request increases in line items. Road Maintenance is needed for safe and reliable roads. Criminal Investigations and Police Services are necessary and many tribes do not have 24 hour 7 day a week policing in their communities. Tribal courts are necessary to demonstrate tribal courts are just as sophisticated and have the ability to protect the rights of citizens under tribal law. Funding for Detention/ Corrections facilities and Social Services need to be appropriated.
- 6. Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC). There needs to be adequate funding which allows WIC staff to deliver quality nutritional services which are key to influencing and transforming eating habits and affecting the nations epidemic of obesity. We recommend that \$6.36 billion be provided for WIC services in FY 2019.
- 7. State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP). This was also eliminated and thus we were dismayed by the President's 2019 budget. We, ITAA and Arizona Indian Council on Aging (AICOA) strongly request SHIP FY 2019 appropriation be restored to the levels of FY 2018 of the amount of \$52.1 million.
- 8. Legislation to Develop Dedicated and Sustained Funding Streams for Tribal Public Health Emergency Preparedness Programs Including Prevention and Control of Vector-Borne Diseases. We strongly request that public health preparedness emergency funding and other resources that support vector-borne disease surveillance, prevention, and control, be made explicitly and directly availa-

ble to Tribes in order to protect the publics' health in Indian country as well as stated, counties, and municipalities.

9. Legislation to Develop Dedicated and Increased Funding for Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness for Tribal Communities. Across the Department of Homeland Security and Federal Emergency Management Agency, Tribal Nations receive very limited emergency management training within their communities, and we have been informed there is no funding available. We are asking to strategically increase the funding and programs to offer Tribal Nations to mitigate, prepare and respond and recover from disasters.

We understood that although the President's budget was presented to both the House and Senate, it was not considered a done deal. The Congressional leaders and Senators have a bigger say in the overall budget and understand better how to appropriate monies to the Indian tribes and Nations.

30th Anniversary Celebration for Grand Canyon West Draws Thousands

30th Anniversary Celebration For Grand Canyon West Draws Thousands

A huge crowd of thousands came out on Saturday, April 28, 2018, to help the Grand Canyon Resort Corporation (GCRC) commemorate the 30th anniversary of Grand Canyon West, which first opened for business in May 1988. Hualapai Tribe members, the Hualapai Tribal Council, members of the GCRC Board of Directors, elected officials from Kingman and Mohave County and residents of the County spent the day touring Grand Canyon West free of charge and enjoying free food and prize giveaways for tribe members.

Among the speakers at the annual celebration: Tribe Chairman Dr. Damon Clarke and GCRC Board Chairperson Elisa Bradley. Dozens of employees were honored for their longtime service, including two of GCW's original employees (Millie Grover and Perry Powskey) who have been with the company for its entire 30-year run.

Said Bradley in her remarks: "Every day, 365 days a year, our team does more than come to work. They put their soul and sweat into making more than 1.1 million guests a year feel as welcome as possible.

"Some of you drive hours to get here. You have challenges with child care and family health, or your own health. Still, you show up and give us a hard day's work for a good day's pay. Because of you, this business continues to perform at a high level – and we continue to make Grand Canyon West even better."

The gathered crowd heard talk of 2017's business successes – including the opening of the new Zipline at Grand Canyon West, recently featured on the NBC's *The Today Show* – and highlights intended for the year ahead, like the construction of the new GCW Visitors Center, the opening of more than a dozen new cabins at Hualapai Ranch, and the new Separation Canyon tour offered for Hualapai River Runners' 2018 rafting season.



Housing Corner • Spring Cleaning

Housing's Corner

Hello, Spring is here and it is time for Spring Cleaning inside and out.



Housing would like all Low Rental tenants to know we have rakes, shovels, hoes and other yard tools available for you to sign out and use for your Spring yard cleaning. We will also pick up your weed piles if they are outside your fenced area by the road. They must be free of all other debris. Please contact the Housing office for more information.

Spring Cleaning Tips include but are not limited to:

- 1. Clean windows inside and out, wipe down window sills.
- 2. Clean and dust ceiling fans, doorways, walls and baseboards.
- 3. Move and clean under furniture and under furniture cushions.
- 4. Vacuum your bed mattresses and flip them over twice a year.
- 5. Clean closets and remove clutter.
- 6. Sort and discard all old magazines and papers.
- 7. Organize fridge and cabinets, rotating can food and discard all expired food.
- 8. Clean range top, oven and stove knobs.
- 9. Clean and sanitize bathroom, toilet, shower/tub stall to remove built up soap scum.
- 10. Use white vinegar to remove lime build up on faucets.
- 11. Wash out all trash receptacles including your outside bin.

If you do not have funding to purchase cleaning supplies for the inside of your unit.. Housing may provide one small cleaning box per unit if needed.

Dr. Joseph Gone

A national expert in American Indian psychology and behavioral health. A professor at the University of Michigan, Dr. Gone has collaborated with tribal communities for over 20 years to harness traditional culture and spirituality for advancing indigenous well-being. He has published over 70 scientific articles and chapters, and received recognition in his fields through several fellowships and career awards, including a year-long residency at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences at Stanford University. A graduate of Harvard College and the University of Illinois, Dr. Gone also trained at Dartmouth College and McLean Hospital/Harvard Medical School.

Honorable Judge, Linda Davis

Appointed by Governor Engler to the 41B District Court in Mount Clemens, and then was elected in November of 2000. She was Chief Judge from January 2002 until 2010. She implemented a Drug/Sobriety Court at 41b in 2011, and currently serves on the board of Michigan Association of Treatment Court Professionals (MADCP). Judge Davis remains active in her community and is involved with educating young people, doctors, lawyers and the public regarding prescription drug use. She speaks throughout the state as President of EA.N (Families Against Narcotics). She has received several prestigious awards from the FBI, Care House, Girl Scouts of the USA, Macomb Community College Outstanding Alumna Award, Henry Ford Hospital, Center Line H.S. Most Distinguished Graduate and Humanitarian of the Year, Leadership Macomb, and has been inducted into the Macomb Hall of Fame.

Petoskey has 40 years' experience as an administrator and evaluator in tribal communities. She has over 20 years of successful experience with SAMHSA grants. Tribal grantees across the country look to her spirit and heartfelt guidance to discover a path for Native American treatment and recovery support programs to provide services in a way that is congruent with Anishnaabek life ways. She is an enrolled member of the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians and previously served as the Vice-Chaitperson of her local tribal council for several years. She has been on the healing path of recovery since 1979.

Dr. Donald R. Vereen, Jr.

Directs Community Academic Engagement in the Prevention Research Center at the University of Michigan School of Public Health (UMSPH) and serves on the faculty of the Michigan Institute for Clinical and Health Research (MICHR) at the University of Michigan Medical School. Dr. Vercen oversees the development of equal partnerships between community-based organizations, academic institutions, and health agencies to address challenging health issues in communities. Don devoted his career to public service at the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and the White House serving two Presidents. While at NIH, Dr. Vereen developed new research strategies to address public health issues such as drug abuse, addiction, mental illness, and violence by establishing interdepartmental research programs that included active community involvement.





Red Road to Wellbriety • Respect, Love & Strength

To honor my Jiđa Connie, my sisters and all women: Respect, Love & Strength;

Gamyu!

It's me again, Mario Zephier, I hope to be able to share some of what I am learning and what our Creator is putting in my heart, mind and spirit, as well as my body that is now walking upon the Red Road to Wellbriety and strengthening my recovery.

This is not just about alcohol and drug addiction. It is about where have we come from and where are we going. Our Native peoples, families and those who are different suffered immeasurable loss of life, land, resources and culture as the European influence started to eradicate our tribal lives. Included in their treatment of indigenous groups was genocide, residential schools, reservations, forced assimilation and the outlawing of cultural practice, such as language, spiritual expression and customs. We were left with helplessness, hopelessness, sadness, despair, shame and anger. As taught by our elders, the time would come for us to awaken from our long sleep and search again for the teachings of the Creator through which we would find healing, wisdom and power. Not power over others, but power over our greatest enemy, ourselves.

Many native people are seeking healing at this time, some because they want to stop inflicting pain on themselves and their loves ones, some to quiet the tears of their children and some because they want to fill the spiritual emptiness. True healing calls us to ask for the Creators help. We must learn to cry our tears of sorrow to comfort our shames, to forgive the unforgivable, and to return to the values of our ancestors — Love, Courage, Justice, Generosity, Respect, Humility, Gratitude and Acceptance of those who are different.

It is the good mind that we seek, the power to see truth, to consult with the elders again, to seek the counsel of the Creator, to make decisions with the welfare of our children, our families and our communities to be our first priority. We are each being called to journey the Red Road, to do the healing work that will provide freedom for generations of children to come. We will be free to live life fully with a good mind and a loving heart, to sing and gourd or drum our traditional songs, dream and see visions, perform our sacred ceremonies, seek the wisdom of the Creator, to live in peace and harmony with all our relations and to live our lives once again alcohol and drug free. These are the lessons I am learning along the Red Road to Wellbriety and Sobriety in a spiritual, emotional, mental and phys-

ical way. I am sharing this with any and all that these teachings may awaken something within you, as they have and still are in me. There are 7 aspects or philosophies that govern us as Native People and keep us in harmony. I am truly honored and grateful to be able to share they 1st of our natural values. #1 concerns our Winyan (women). Violence against our women is not traditional. Sovereign women strengthen our sovereign nations. The woman has been given by natural laws the ability to reproduce life. The most sacred of all things is life. Therefore, we should treat women with dignity and respect. Never was it our way to harm women mentally, emotionally, physically or spiritually.

Native men were never abusers. We always treated our women with respect and understanding. A woman's cycle of life is the baby, girl, woman and grandmother. Both men and women must respect this natural cycle because it is the basis of all life. We must also recognize and respect the female principle whenever we find it. The Creator gave women the responsibility for bringing new life into the world. Life is sacred and new life is the basis for the survival of our nations and our people. In our traditional ways, the woman is the foundation of the family. As a man, I will work with her to create a home atmosphere of respect, security and harmony. If I have feelings that might lead to abuse of women, I will talk to the Creator and to counselors for guidance. Each woman is my own female relative, in a time of great diversity, the brilliance of a Winyan's mind and her many capabilities must be honored and encouraged to contribute to our communities in a good way. Once again, there are 7 philosophies that will keep us as a people in harmony with our natural priorities.

Thank you for allowing me to share these teachings with you all, they are a part of my everyday life and I choose to live by them; as our ancestors and our Creator meant us to. I have chosen the Red Road to save my life and to be a part of our great healing circle and to one day give back what my Creator is putting in my mind, heart and spirit, so that my body may walk healthy upon the Red Road of this life.
