Hualapai Tribal Council Updates

June-August 27, 2018 Resolutions adopted

The following Resolutions have been reviewed, discussed, and adopted by the Hualapai Tribal Council from June to the Present:

- Resolution 44-2018 A Tribal Membership was adopted on June 9, 2018; this resolution was to enroll six (6) more members into the Hualapai Tribe pursuant to the ordinance of the Tribe.
- Resolution 45-2018 was adopted regarding FY 2018 Grant Application for the MICA Group- Culture Resource Fund
 Phase 3 Language Revitalization. "The Hualapai Tribal Council supports cultural heritage initiatives that promote and preserve cultural heritage opportunities amongst its tribal members and community"... June 9, 2018.
- Resolution 46-2018 was passed "Amending Resolution 33-2018 Resolution Enacted by the Hualapai Tribal Council on May 7, 2018". The Hualapai Tribal Council nominated Stewart Crozier to serve on the Arizona Advisory Council on Indian Health Care, changing his term from a two year to a three year term. Approved June 9, 2018.
- Resolution 47-2018 was adopted by the Hualapai Tribal Council approving "Story Maps of the Hualapai Historic Places
 in Northern Arizona." This allows for the Department of Cultural Resources to capture much of the historic information on Geographic Information System (GIS). Sensitive information will not be available to the general public. Approved June 26, 2018.
- Resolution 48-2018 was adopted regarding Traumatic Brain Injury Prevention Project. The Hualapai Tribe supports
 the prevention of traumatic brain injury by participating in the ITCA TEC (Inter Tribal Council of Arizona, Inc.; Tribal Epidemiology Center) project. Adopted on July 7, 2018.
- Resolution 49- 2018. "A Resolution approving the amended Management Agreement with Hwal'Ba:j Enterprise, Inc." on July 10, 2018.
- Resolution 50-2018 This resolution was adopted on May 2, 2018 and entitled: "Attorney Contract Extension" regarding law firm of Robert J. Lyttle, PC, Attorneys at Law from August 1, 2018 to July 31, 2022.
- Resolution 51-2018 was passed and adopted the "Non- emergency Medical Transportation (NEMT) Policy and Procedures" on August 4, 2018.
- Resolution 52-2018. Methamphetamine and Suicide Prevention Initiative-Resolution Non 47-2015 and a MOA between Johns Hopkins University and Hualapai Health-Education and Wellness Department, this was passed on August 4, 2018.
- Resolution 53-2018. On August 4, 2018, the Council approved this in which the Hualapai Tribe approved Phase Two
 Paper (focus Group) Peer-reviewed Publication of the Hualapai Injury Prevention Initiative Program (HIPIP) Phase Two
 Paper.

Seeking New Board Member for the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority (HTUA)



On September 24, 2014, the Hualapai Tribal Council adopted the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority Governing Ordinance. This is a significant step toward self-determination in the realm of public utilities for the Hualapai Tribe.


Established as an institution of Tribal government, the five members of the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority board are chosen by Council. As noted in Section 107.b.3, of the Ordinance, the HTUA Board is authorized to acquire, construct, operate, maintain, promote, and expand electric power service, and eventually

water service, and sewage service at Grand Canyon West and on such other locations within the Hualapai Reservation and on other Tribal lands under the jurisdiction of the Hualapai Tribe as the Tribal Council may deem appropriate. The HTUA board is delegated full authority and responsibility for the management and operation of HTUA consistent with the Ordinance.

At this time, the Tribe is seeking a new candidate to apply for Board membership to maintain this important function of Tribal government. This Board position may be filled by members or non-members of who have not less than ten years' experience in business management of substantial character and have had experience in the management and operation of an electric utility. No employee of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, employee of the HTUA or member of the Tribal Council shall be a member of the Board. The new board member will be appointed for a three-year term.

Please prepare a typed narrative offering your qualifications (resume) and general motivation to be a member of the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority Board and what you hope to achieve while on the Board. Open House Review of Kingman Travel Management Plan • Tuesday, September 11th Submitted by: Peter Bungart | Hualapai Department of Cultural Resources

Public invited to open house for review of Kingman Travel Management Plan

KINGMAN, Ariz. – The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Kingman Field Office (KFO) invites the public's participation in the review of the KFO Travel Management Plan and Environmental Assessment. Travel management is an approach to establishing networks of roads for travel and transportation including areas for both motorized and non-motorized uses.

Travel management planning is necessary for designating and providing appropriate access to and across public lands for a variety of uses. This Travel Management Plan and Environmental Assessment includes Bagdad, Black Mountains, Cerbat Mountains, Crozier, Goodwin Mesa, Hualapai Mountains, Music Mountains and Poachies. It will also include the White Hills Travel Management Areas and encompasses Kingman, Bullhead City, Golden Valley, Chloride, Wikieup, Meadview, Dolan Springs, White Hills, and Wayside in Mohave, Yavapai and La Paz counties.

The Hualapai Department of Cultural Resources requested an open house public meeting be scheduled in Peach Springs. Staff from the BLM will display maps of the proposed travel network, as well as other alternatives that will be available for review. BLM staff will be available to answer questions and receive comments on the project.

The open house will be held Tuesday, September 11, 2018 at the Hualapai Cultural Center from 3:00 - 6:00 pm.

The Kingman Field Office travel network encompasses much of the historic Hualapai Homeland. This will be an opportunity to learn about the Travel Management Plan and how it may affect cultural and natural resources, and to provide comments. We encourage everyone to attend and participate.

The public comment period will be for a period of 30-calendar days from Aug. 20 to Sept. 18, 2018. More information can be found on-line at: https://go.usa.gov/xUsPq



*Please note that the deadline to turn in the change of address form and the Minor Per Capita applications has changed.

Minor Per Capita applications are now available! You must turn these in before the October 15, 2018 deadline. The form must be <u>completely</u> filled out with no missing Tribal ID numbers, birth dates, or social security numbers. Forms must be complete and include any legal custody documentation if needed. Incomplete applications will result in monies being sent to trust, no exceptions will be made.

Please note that those that do not re-file a new application your designation will stay the same as it was last year. So, if you selected trust or check last year it will be the same this year. You only need to fill out a new application if you missed the deadline last year or you wish to change your designation of where your minor(s) funds will go.

Any address changes must be updated with the Finance Department <u>before</u>

October 15, 2018 or we will mail to the last address on file. If you are unsure if you need to fill out a form then please give us a call.

Both of these forms must be notarized or they will not be accepted. The forms are located on the Tribal website, at the Tribal Office or in the Gamyu.

Pub 706 Revised: August 2017

This publication issued jointly by the Arizona Department of Revenue and the Arizona Department of Veterans' Services is intended to provide general information about the Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund. For complete details, refer to Arizona Laws 2016, Chapter 125, § 19-29. In the case of inconsistency or omission in this publication, the language of the Arizona law will prevail.

Background

On November 22, 2000 the United States Justice Department issued a memo declaring that the taxation and withholding of state income taxes from active duty military pay of Native Americans domiciled on their reservation was impermissible. The United States Department of Defense began mandatory Arizona income tax withholding on all active duty military pay on September 1, 1993 and continued withholding Arizona income tax through December 31, 2005. Beginning January 1, 2006 Arizona no longer taxed active duty military pay and therefore discontinued state income tax withholding on this type of income. The Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund was established on July 1, 2016 to refund Arizona income tax erroneously withheld from Native Americans who served in the military while claiming tribal land as their domicile from September 1, 1993 through December 31, 2005. During the 2017 Arizona legislative session House Bill 2158 was introduced to amend the original legislation when it was discovered the Department of Defense may have withheld Arizona income tax prior to September 1, 1993. Effective August 9, 2017 refunds may be claimed for years 1977 through 2005.

- Q1. Why was the Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund established?
- A1. Arizona income tax may have been withheld from Native American active duty military pay in years 1977 through 2005. Those tax years are currently closed by the statutes of limitations. Therefore, in an effort to refund Arizona income tax withholding from active duty military pay of Native Americans veterans domiciled on their reservation, the Arizona legislature established the Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund.
- Q2. What years did the Department of Defense withhold Arizona income tax from active duty military pay?

- The Department of Defense may have withheld Arizona income tax from 1977 through 2005. Arizona entered into an agreement with the United States Department of Defense to withhold Arizona income tax from active duty military pay beginning September 1, 1993. Arizona continued to withhold income tax on active duty military pay through 2005. Beginning January 1, 2006 Arizona no longer subjected active duty military pay to its income tax and accordingly stopped withholding state income tax. After the Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund was established it was discovered the Department of Defense may have withheld Arizona income tax prior to September 1, 1993. As a result, the Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund was amended to allow refunds for years 1977 through 2005.
- Q3. How much money is allocated to the Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement fund?
- A3. The Arizona Legislature allocated two million dollars to fund. Of the two million dollars 5 percent is allocated to the Department of Veterans' Services and 5 percent is allocated to Department of Revenue to cover administrative costs.
- Q4. What years are refunds available?
- A4. Refunds may be claimed for years 1977 through 2005. Mandatory withholding of Arizona income taxes by the Department of Defense on active duty military pay did not begin until September 1, 1993, however there may have been withholding prior to that date.
- Q5. May I amend my old Arizona state income tax returns to recover my Arizona income tax withholding for years 1977 through 2005?
- A5. No, 1977 through 2005 are closed tax years under Arizona's statute of limitations. The only way to recover withholding from tax years 1977 through 2005 is by making a claim under the Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund.
- Q6. How long is the Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund open?
- A6. The Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund was established July 1, 2016. The Department of Veterans' Service may not accept claims after December 31, 2019. The Department of Revenue will not grant refunds after June 30, 2021. Any money

left in the Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund on July 1, 2021 will be swept into the general fund.

Q7. What does the claimant have to demonstrate?

A7. Produce DD-214 or other proof of military service provided by the United States Department of Defense, B. Sign a statement declaring they were an enrolled member of their tribe while serving in the military, C. Produce evidence of domicile while serving in the military, D. Show Arizona income tax was withheld (W-2) and E. Sign a statement that the Arizona income tax was not refunded.

Q8. What must a claimant do in addition to the general requirements if the veteran is deceased?

A8. In addition to the requirements listed in Question and Answer #7 above, a claimant who is a surviving spouse or personal representative must produce the veteran's death certificate to make a claim. A personal representative must also sign a statement confirming they are the decedent's personal representative and produce a copy of the claimant's appointment. If the claimant is a not a surviving spouse or personal representative they must sign a statement that the estate is worth less than \$30,000, that 30 days have passed since the decedent's death and that they are the rightful successor.

Q9. How does the application process work?

A9. The claimant sends their completed forms along with any relevant paper work to the Department of Veterans' Services. Veterans' Services has 210 days to accept or reject the claim. Claims accepted by the Department of Veterans' Services are then sent to the Department of Revenue. The Department of Revenue has 210 days to approve or reject claims. The Department of Revenue will issue refunds to claimants with valid claims.

Q10. What forms are used to make a claim?

A10. Arizona Form NASF is used for general claims, Arizona Form NASF-D is an additional form for claimants if the veteran is deceased and Arizona Form NASF-RS is a form used to substantiate the veteran's residency.

Q11. Where do I find the application forms?

All. The application forms are available to download online at https://dvs.az.gov or https://www.azdor.gov

Q12. Where do I mail my completed forms?

Q13. Who may make a claim?

A13. Native American veterans who had Arizona income tax withheld from their active duty military pay while domiciled on their reservation. If the veteran is deceased the surviving spouse or personal representative may make a claim. If anyone other than the surviving spouse or personal representative (e.g., child of the veteran) makes a claim they must show the value of decedent's estate was less than \$30,000.

Q14. How are claims paid?

Q14. On a first-come, first-served basis until the fund is exhausted.

Q15. Is interest paid on the refunds?

A15. Yes, settlement payments shall include interest computed on a daily basis from the date of a timely filed return.

Q16. Are refunds subject to setoffs?

A16. Yes, the refunds are subject to setoffs consistent with A.R.S. § 42-1122. Examples of setoffs would include back taxes, overdue child support and unpaid court fees.

Q17. What if I do not have my DD-214 or other proof of military service?

A17. Arizona Form NASF includes a check box allowing the claimant to authorize the Arizona Department of Veterans' Services to obtain their DD-214 or other proof of military service on their behalf from the United States Department of Defense. Please attach and sign Form SF-180 and attach it to your application.

Q18. What if I do not have my old W-2's?

- A18. Arizona Form NASF includes a check box allowing the claimant to authorize the Arizona Department of Revenue to obtain prior year W-2's on their behalf from the United States Department of Defense.
- Q19. What if I had Arizona withholding from my active duty military pay while I was domiciled on my reservation, but did not file an Arizona income tax return for those years?
- A19. Even if you did not file an Arizona return during those years you are still eligible for a refund of your active duty military pay withholding including accrued interest, however any refunds paid are subject to setoffs consistent with A.R.S. § 42-1122.

Q20. What if my claim is denied?

A20. If the claim is denied by the Arizona Department of Veterans' Services the appealed case will go to the Office of Administrative Hearings. If the claim is denied by the Department of Revenue the appealed case will be considered a contested case heard by the Department of Revenue's Hearing Officer.



INSTRUCTION AND INFORMATION SHEET FOR SF 180, REQUEST PERTAINING TO MILITARY RECORDS

1. General Information. The Standard Form 180, Request Pertaining to Military Records (SF180) is used to request information from military records. Certain identifying information is necessary to determine the location of an individual's record of military service. Please try to answer each item on the SF 180. If you do not have and cannot obtain the information for an item, show "NA," meaning the information is "not available". Include as much of the requested information as you can. Incomplete information may delay response time. To determine where to mail this request see Page 2 of the SF180 for record locations and facility addresses.

Online requests may be submitted to the National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) by a veteran or deceased veteran's next-of-kin using eVetRecs at http://www.archives.gov/veterans/military-service-records/.

- 2. Personnel Records/Military Human Resource Records/Official Military Personnel File (OMFF) and Medical Records/Service Treatment Records (STR). Personnel records of military members who were discharged, retired, or died in service LESS THAN 62 YEARS AGO and medical records are in the legal custody of the military service department and are administered in accordance with rules issued by the Department of Defense and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS, Coast Guard). STRs of persons on active duty are generally kept at the local servicing clinic. After the last day of active duty, STRs should be requested from the appropriate address on page 2 of the SF 180. (See item 3, Archival Records, if the military member was discharged, retired or died in service more than 62 years ago.)
 - a. Release of information; Release of information is subject to restrictions imposed by the military services consistent with Department of Defense regulations, the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) and the Privacy Act of 1974. The service member (either past or present) or the member's legal guardian has access to almost any information contained in that member's own record. The authorization signature of the service member or the member's legal guardian is needed in Section III of the SF180. Others requesting information from military personnel records and/or STRs must have the release authorization in Section III of the SF180 signed by the member or legal guardian. If the appropriate signature cannot be obtained, only limited types of information can be provided. If the former member is deceased, the surviving next-of-kin may, under certain circumstances, be entitled to greater access to a deceased veteran's records than a member of the general public. The next-of-kin may be any of the following: unremarried surviving spouse, father, mother, son, daughter, sister, or brother. Requesters MUST provide proof of death, such as a copy of a death certificate, newspaper article (obitnary) or death notice, coroner's report of death, funeral director's signed statement of death, or verdict of coroner's jury.
 - b. <u>Fees for records</u>: There is no charge for most services provided to service members or next-of-kin of deceased veterans. A nominal fee is charged for certain types of service. In most instances, service fees cannot be determined in advance. If your request involves a service fee, you will receive an invoice with your records.
- Archival Records. Personnel records of military members who were discharged, retired, or died in service 62 OR MORE YEARS AGO have been transferred to the legal custody of NARA and are referred to as "archival records".
 - a. Release of Information: Archival records are open to the public. The Privacy Act of 1974 does not apply to archival records, therefore, written authorization from the veteran or next-of-kin is not required. In order to protect the privacy of the veteran, his/her family, and third parties named in the records, the personal privacy exemption of the Freedom of Information Act (5 U.S.C. 552 (b) (6)) may still apply and may preclude the release of some information.
 - b. Fees for Archival Records: Access to archival records are granted by offering copies of the records for a fee (44 U.S.C. 2116 (c)). If a fee applies to the photocopies of documents in the requested record, you will receive an invoice. Photocopies will be sent after payment is made. For more information see http://www.archives.gov/st-louis/archival-programs/military-personnel-archival-ompf-archival-requests.html.
- 4. Where reply may be sent. The reply may be sent to the service member or any other address designated by the service member or other authorized requester. If the designated address is NOT registered to the addressee by the U.S. Postal Service (USPS), provide BOTH the addressee's name AND "in care of" (c/o) the name of the person to whom the address is registered on the NAME line in Section III, item 3, on page 1 of the SF 180. The COMPLETE address must be provided, INCLUDING any apartment/suite/unit/lot/space/etc. mumber.

HOW CAN I HELP MY STUDENT?

- Check the communication binder daily Within the first three weeks, we have already had instances where students are not remembering to take home or bring back their communication binders. These white 3-ring binders are designed to keep you up-to-date with information about your student and your student's school. Make it part of the daily routine to go through the binder with your student, so important information and paperwork is not missed.
- Plan appointments for non-school days –
 Whenever possible, plan appointments and out-ofton trips for the 3 days a week that students are not scheduled for school. Every day of instruction missed puts a student potentially further and further behind academically.
- Talk to your students daily about what they did in school each day Ask specific questions—ones that cannot be answered with a simple yes/no or a shoulder shrug. Ask about what they did in their Singapore math lesson that day. The more students communicate about their learning, the more likely it is that they will remember what they have learned.

Picture Day

Our school picture day is scheduled for October 9, 2018. After that date, packets will go home with the proofs for families to place orders. Orders can be sent back to the school or placed online.

EMERGENCY DRILLS

We are required periodically to conduct emergency drills, such as fire drills, bus evacuations, etc. We ran our first fire drill yesterday. Ask your students about it.

Non-Emergency Medical Transportation Rider Rules

Riders have a responsibility to conduct themselves in a manner, which shows consideration for the comfort of other passengers. Toward that end, the NEMT has adopted the following Passenger Rules:

Steps to requesting Hualapai Non-Emergency Medical Transportation

Medical Transports:

Care Clerk, explains need of medical transportation.

- IHS Clerk will complete transportation forms and fax to the Health Department's Transportation Office
- Transportation Manager schedules the transport and assigns driver.

Non-Medical Transport

- The request for non-medical transport is completed and faxed or brought to the Health Department with the receipt obtained from the tribal office after paying the fee of \$10.00/100 miles.
- Transportation Manager schedules the transport and assigns driver.

* THINGS TO CONSIDER:

- Acquest transportation 2 days in advance. Requests "on day" of transport may not be honored, due to scheduling.
- If you are unable to make the scheduled transport, please notify the Transportation Program as soon as possible.
- Dialysis clients and requests for medical transport take top priority.
- Medical Facilities need to notify us directly, when clients are discharged.

Hualapai Tribe Hualapai Heaith Department Medical Transport Description

The Hualapai Tribe, through the Hualapai Health Department's Non-Emergency Medical Transport (NEMT) Program, provides transport services for medical and Non-Emergency Medical purposes.

Medical Transport Trips are requested through the Indian Health Service's Purchase Referred Care office, because they receive the appointment or admission information from the medical providers. The Purchase Referred Care Office personnel schedule the appointment and give the information to the NEMT Program.

The trips are provided between 8 AM and 5 PM, Monday through Friday. Saturdays are reserved for dialysis clients.

Other types of transports are provided for individuals who do not have a vehicle and whose income is limited. Medical transports take precedence over other types of trips. Those trips include; food, bank, shopping, pick-up or drop off at various places, trips to medical facilities where an immediate relative has been flown or taken by ambulance.

There are also trips requested and scheduled for individuals, not financially in need, who need to pick up a vehicle, shop for a program, and other social or program issues that may arise. The trips are available (if there is a driver/vehicle) between 8 AM to 5 PM, Monday through Friday.

KINGMAN – The Hualapai Department of Cultural Resources is partnering with the Kingman Center for the Arts in hosting a five-week long, "Bringing Us Together - A Cultural Art Event," Hualapai exhibit that Dawn Hubbs, program manager, described as "an adventure and experience in deep history of the Hualapai."

Marcelene Craynon, administrative assistant at the Hualapai Cultural Center, said one purpose of the exhibit is to bring together the Hualapai Tribe and the City of Kingman. She explained Kingman is considered a part of the Hualapai Tribe ancestral homeland, which at one point spanned 7 million acres from the Santa Maria River to the San Francisco Peaks, and down to the Colorado River. Hubbs and Craynon said the new faces turning up in Kingman can be largely unaware of the Hualapai Tribe and the influence it has had on the region, and its continued efforts to preserve culture, language and knowledge.

"I also feel that the overall non-native communities think of natives in the past, and so there's a lack of knowledge of what we still do to maintain the ongoing process and preservation of culture," Craynon said. "So in gathering together, it also tells the community that we still thrive as Native American Hualapai with our incentives to continue our preservation of language, our knowledge of plants, and our traditional ecological knowledge of the fundamentals of what makes Hualapai unique. These things are still very much a part of Hualapai knowledge that we continue with our community."

The exhibit kicks off when the gallery at 208 E. Beale St. opens at noon Friday. It will run for five weeks during the gallery's normal operating hours from 9 a.m. to

3 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday, noon to 8 p.m. Friday and 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturdays. "It comes down to a holistic viewpoint that everything is sacred, everything is important," Hubbs said. "That information gets passed through the generations of yesterday, today and tomorrow. So hopefully this show will impart that concept of continuity, preservation and partnership." Bringing Us Together is organized as a historic chronology of the Hualapai Tribe. Upon entering the building, attendees will learn about history

and archeology prior to the arrival of Europeans, with each subsequent station moving

through time, with the last focusing on the tribe today. There will be art, pottery, singers, dancers, drummers and an ongoing video highlighting the importance and sacredness of water featuring a tribal elder.

The exhibit opens at noon Friday, but at 6 p.m. traditionalist Ivan Bender will perform a Blessing Ceremony, which will likely include a sage blessing and three to four songs ensuring the event is properly blessed. There will be no photography permitted during the ceremony. Then from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, there will be a coil pottery demonstration where attendees will learn the process Issue #18 Page 39

of how those pots are made from beginning to end. Hubbs and Craynon noted that Hualapai pottery has in the last 10 years been revitalized with the help of the tribe's relatives, the PaiPai of Baja, California. Exhibit-goers have the opportunity to get hands-on experience with yucca twining, pottery and pine needle medallions.

"Everything has a story here, that's what gets me," said Center for the Arts board member Pat Evans. "It's more than what you see, there is so much depth behind what you see. We're going to see a pretty dress, but there's so much meaning behind that dress. We're going to see a pretty work of art, but there's so much meaning behind it. There's a story behind it all."

Tribe That Owns Grand Canyon Skywalk to Improve Airport

The northern Arizona tribe that owns the Grand Canyon Skywalk is getting nearly \$2 million in federal grant funding to improve its airport.

PEACH SPRINGS, Ariz. (AP) — The northern Arizona tribe that owns the Grand Canyon Skywalk is getting nearly \$2 million in federal grants to fix up its airport. The U.S. Department of Transportation announced the funding Thursday for the Hualapai (WAHL'-uh-peye) Tribe. It's part of more than \$3 billion in airport improvement funding from the Federal Aviation Administration.

The tribe's airport is at Grand Canyon West, a tourism venture outside the boundaries of the national park. It features a horseshoe-shaped glass bridge known as the Grand Canyon Skywalk, zip lines, rafting trips and aerial tours. The tribe received five separate grants. It will use the funding to rehabilitate the heliport, install perimeter fencing, and repair the apron, taxiway and runway.

Budget Change Threatens Future of Colorado River

Budget change threatens future of Colorado River

The Bureau of Reclamation's \$23 million budget will be transferred to the United States Treasury next fiscal year, impacting the continued health of the Colorado River and the many entities that depend on it.

The funds originally come from the power revenue created by the Glen Canyon Dam, which was then retooled by the bureau to ensure the safety of the water downstream. Without funding, the water, aquatic life and archaeological sites in the Colorado River area will be left unprotected and unmonitored. This change could affect Native American tribes including Havasupai, Hualapai, Hopi and Navajo, seven states of the Colorado River Basin and two states in Mexico -- all places that the river runs through. The Office of Management and Budget initiated the movement of funds from the bureau to the treasury.

In the meantime, the bureau is examining options to support their projects until a permanent solution is found. "Reclamation is not going to walk away from these pro-

grams," said Marlon Duke, spokesperson for the Bureau's Upper Basin Region. "We're working with our stakeholders and our partners to find ways to continue to do the work to find a more permanent solution."

According to the Bureau, the Grand Canyon Protection Act of 1992 originally diverted the \$23 million from the treasury to the Glen Canyon Dam. In diverting the money, the dam was intended to "protect, mitigate adverse impacts to and improve the values for which Grand Canyon National Park and Glen Canyon National Recreation Area were established."
