Helpful Winter Safety Tips for your pets

The Hualapai Code Enforcement Animal Control would like to share some tips on protecting your Pet when the temperatures drop.

Follow these simple tips to keep your pet comfy and safe!

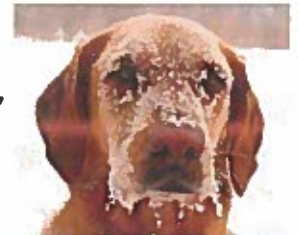
- **KEEP YOUR PETS INDOORS, WHERE IT IS WARM**
If possible don't leave dogs or cats outdoors when the temps drop. Your pet will be safer indoors where it is warm. No matter what the temp is, wind chill can be a factor.
- **TAKE PRECAUTIONS IF YOUR PET SPENDS A LOT OF TIME OUTSIDE**
To help your pet be comfy outside, make sure your



has a DRY, DRAFT FREE house, large enough for your pet to sit and lay down comfy, but small enough to hold in the body heat, and making sure the door of their shelter is away from the wind.

- **KEEP YOUR PET HYDRATED**
Keep a keen eye on your pet's water bowl, make sure it is not FROZEN and we recommend using a plastic bowl for your pet's water, this will help prevent your pet's tongue from getting stuck to the bowl!
- **BE CAUTIOUS WHEN YOU START YOUR VEHICLE**
Pets, wildlife and other animals may often find a place to stay warm when the temps drop, which often leads them to your car, the engine block. To avoid any injury to your pet, or other animal, or injury to your car, we suggest you bang on your hood before starting your engine!
- **ANTIFREEZE POISONING**
Although sweet and odorless, Antifreeze is a very deadly poison. It attracts animals as well as children. Remember to wipe up spills, and store antifreeze as well as other household chemicals out of reach of children and pets.

THE LIFE STORY OF AN EAGLE: REBIRTH OF EAGLE **Eagle has to make painful decision to survive.**

This is a story of the Eagle's Life. Eagle has a long life up to 70 years. It has patience to survive. He lives up till 70 years, and has to pass through a hard decision.
