Grand Canyon Skywalk Celebrates After Welcoming 10 Millionth Visitor

Grand Canyon Skywalk celebrates after welcoming 10 millionth visitor

PHOENIX – The Grand Canyon Skywalk, the U-shaped glass bridge that extends over Arizona's breathtaking natural wonder, is celebrating this month after welcoming its 10 millionth visitor. The attraction, which opened in March 2007 after nearly three years of construction, announced that it reached the eight-digit milestone Thursday. To mark the accomplishment, Grand Canyon West is offering a 10% discount on general admission for the Skywalk and its zip line and Hualapai River tours until the end of January. Visitors must purchase tickets online and use the code MILLION to get the reduced price. Denise Hayes and Ryan Flanigan, a mother and daughter from St. Louis, were treated to a VIP experience Thursday, including a helicopter tour and pontoon boat ride, when their arrival pushed the Grand Canyon Skywalk over the 10 million mark.

"The 10 million guests who have walked on Skywalk have helped us create hundreds of jobs and an entire economy," Colin McBeath, CEO of Grand Canyon Resort Corporation, which operates Grand Canyon West, said in a press release. "It's a tourism experience that respects Hualapai culture and the spiritual and natural gifts of the Canyon while giving tourists from all over the globe an up-close look at one of the most awe-inspiring views known to man."

Visitors to Grand Canyon West, which is operated by the Hualapai Tribe, can experience the Skywalk, scenic vistas, ziplining, helicopter tours and boat rides on the Colorado River. The Skywalk is located on the West Rim about 90 minutes north of Kingman on the Hualapai reservation. The glass and steel structure extends more than 70 feet past the Grand Canyon walls to create a see-through platform suspended 4,000 feet above the floor.

Lecture: For the Love of Turquoise • Carrie Cannon

Turquoise has a long standing tradition among Native cultures of the Southwest, holding special significance and profound meanings to specific individual tribes. Even before the more contemporary tradition of combining silver with turquoise, cultures throughout the southwest used turquoise in necklaces, earrings, mosaics, fetishes, medicine pouches, and made bracelets of basketry stems lacquered with piñon resin and inlaid turquoise. Found on six continents across the world, turquoise forms in arid regions through the process of water seeping through rock and interacting with copper, aluminum, and iron deposits. In the southwest, used decoratively for millennia, this iconic art form has a

compelling story all its own. For the 11th lecture of our 2020 Thursday Lecture Series, Carrie Cannon explores a long tradition of distinctive cultural styles, history, and transition of this wondrous stone.

Carrie Cannon is a member of the Kiowa Tribe of Oklahoma and is also of Oglala Lakota descent. She has a B.S. in Wildlife Biology, and an M.S. in Resource Management. She began working for the Hualapai Tribe of Peach Springs, Arizona in 2005 where she began the creation of an intergenerational ethnobotany program for the Hualapai community. She is currently employed as an Ethnobotanist for the Hualapai Department of Cultural Resources. She administers a number of projects promoting the intergenerational teaching of Hualapai ethnobotanical knowledge working towards preservation and revitalization to ensure tribal ethnobotanical knowledge persists as a living practice and tradition.

It is very important that you come into the office, rather than staff trying to explain it over the Phone, so that you can see or have it explained to you from the Accounts Receivable Ledger/Pictures or through other documents, which give you a better idea of what you owe to Housing. Any questions you might have can be answered at that time.

Please note the voter registration deadlines for 2020. The Presidential Preference Election is scheduled for March 17, 2020 with a deadline to register to vote of February 18, 2020. As it states "Ballots are political party specific. Voters registered without a political party by the Voter Registration Deadline cannot participate in this election. The only candidates in this election are the Arizona qualified Presidential Primary candidates."

PLEASE IF YOU ARE 18 YEARS AND OLDER AND YOU ARE NOT REGISTERED TO VOTE, PLEASE COME TO THE TRIBAL OFFICE AND I WILL ASSIST YOU IN GETTING REGISTERED, OR IF YOU MOVED AND CHANGED YOUR ADDRESS.



VOTER REGISTRATION 101: DATES AND DEADLINES

Election Calendar 2019 to 2020

Be aware of upcoming elections and voter registration deadlines. Each deadline is calculated by counting backwards from Election Day. For example, the Voter Registration Deadline is E-29, meaning 29 days before Election Day.

Election Types Key:

Jurisdictional – Refers to off-season elections where Jurisdictions like Cities, Towns, School Districts, and Special Districts may choose to hold their elections. Stay informed about whether or not your local district is having an election by visiting our website Maricopa.Vote.

Presidential Preference – Ballots are political party specific. Voters registered without a political party by the Voter Registration Deadline cannot participate in this election. The only candidates in this election are the Arizona qualified Presidential Primary candidates.

Primary – In August of even years partisan candidates run on this ballot to represent their party for the General Election. Ballots are party specific and voters without a political party must tell MCRO which ballot they would like to receive. See page 5 for more details.

General – In November of even years the winners of the Primary election, judges, nonpartisan candidates, and propositions appear on this ballot. Ballots are precinct specific, not party specific.

On Saturday and Sunday, top American Indian and Canadian First Nations hoop dancers will compete at the Heard Museum for the prestigious World Champion title and cash prizes. At the two-day competition, men and women compete on an equal field.

The art of hoop dance honors the cultural traditions from multiple Indigenous communities that first employed hoop dance as a healing ceremony. Today, hoop dance is shared as an artistic expression to celebrate and honor Indigenous traditions throughout the U.S. and Canada.

Dancers are judged on a slate of five skills: precision, timing/rhythm, showmanship, creativity, and speed. Contestants compete in one of five divisions: Tiny Tots (age 5 and younger), Youth (6-12), Teen (13-17), Adult (18-39) and Senior (40 and older). See the contest rules below for further detail.

NOTE: This is an outdoor event, rain or shine. Lawn seating only. We recommend bringing folding chairs or blankets. Outside food and beverages (excluding water bottles) may not be brought into this event.

About Hoop Dancing

Hoop dancing is a long-standing tradition in many Native cultures. This unique dance can involve the use of more than 50 hoops. Passed down from one generation to the next, hoop dancing communicates individual and tribal stories using hoops to create symbols and depict animals of great meaning in Native communities. The continuous circle of the hoops symbolizes the circle of life and the continual changing of the seasons.

Traditional hoops were made from the wood of a willow tree. Modern-day hoops are often made from reed and plastic hose because of the durability of the material when traveling. The hoops are decorated with tape and paint to symbolize the changing colors of each season. The traditional wooden hoops are still used on rare occasions.

FIRST THINGS FIRST

TRIBAL LIAISON

First Things First (Arizona Early Childhood Development and Health Board) is one of the critical state partners in creating a child and family-centered, comprehensive, collaborative and high-quality early childhood system that supports the development, health and early education of all Arizona's children. Created by voter initiative in 2006, First Things First is governed by a state Board with 28 regional partnership councils. First Things First is a decentralized organization that engages diverse constituencies to accomplish its mission. Organizational values include a focus on accountability, transparency, coordination, collaboration and on the outcomes that will ensure young children start kindergarten healthy and ready to succeed in school and in life.

First Things First values its government-to-government relationships with Arizona's tribes and Tribal Affairs is an integral part of the agency's work. Arizona's tribes can participate in First Things First in one of two ways: by electing to have their tribal lands treated as separate regions by the statewide FTF Board, or by electing to have their tribal lands treated as part of the FTF regions in which their lands are geographically located. To date, 19 federally recognized tribes have elected to participate in First Things First (10 as separate regions, and nine as part of the region in their geographic area). More information on FTF Tribal Affairs is available at <http://azff.gov/tribal-affairs>.

Job Summary:

In its mission to serve all Arizona children, FTF recognizes that Arizona's tribes are sovereign nations with complete authority over all activities occurring on their tribal lands, including services provided, work performed by the tribe's departments and employees, and research and data collection conducted on their lands. Under the supervision of FTF's Senior Director for Tribal Affairs, the Tribal Liaison will support First Things First's ongoing commitment to continuous consultation and open dialogue with tribal governments regarding all proposed or actual FTF-funded activities on tribal lands, including potential studies on which to collaborate as well as on specific tribal approval processes necessary for programmatic implementation and evaluation (including the corresponding data collection). This position assists the Senior Director of Tribal Affairs in carrying out a variety of activities to enhance Arizona's relationships with tribes; build awareness of the importance of early childhood among stakeholders working in and with tribal communities; and enhance the cultural responsiveness of early childhood programs. In addition, the Tribal Liaison is responsible for coordinating with regional, program and evaluation staff to request appropriate tribal approvals for data collection, analysis and publication (e.g. regional needs and assets, programmatic data and research and evaluation).

Distinguishing Characteristics:

The ideal candidate will enthusiastically support the vision and mission of First Things First and possess the personal qualities of integrity and credibility. The Tribal Liaison will have the proven ability to work within teams to accomplish multiple tasks and keep multiple projects organized and progressing. The Tribal Liaison will also have demonstrated capacity to work in a fast-paced environment, and the proven ability to deal with sensitive situations with efficiency, diplomacy and tact. The Tribal Liaison must have strong knowledge of and experience in working with tribes in the areas of planning, program implementation, program evaluation and/or data collection protocols and processes on tribal lands. In addition, the Tribal Liaison must have strong research, analysis and critical thinking skills and the ability to analyze and apply those skills to the development and implementation of the First Things First Evaluation Plan and funded programs.

Typical Duties and Responsibilities:

The Tribal Liaison is part of the Public Affairs unit and reports to the Senior Director of Tribal Affairs. The Tribal Liaison will have the capacity and desire to work within teams to accomplish multiple tasks and keep multiple projects organized and progressing towards successful completion. The Tribal Liaison will work as a collaborative partner with FTF cross-divisional teams and community partners to promote the effective implementation of funded programs and data/evaluation activities with Arizona tribes. The position requires the ability to communicate effectively, work as a contributing team member, and share expertise and findings with colleagues and partners.

- The Tribal Liaison supports the Senior Director of Tribal Affairs in the successful implementation of the following Tribal Affairs priorities:
 - Developing and fostering effective communication between FTF staff and staff members from tribes and nations.
 - Training FTF staff and others in the area of tribal relations through ongoing education.
 - Working with tribal partners, such as the Inter-Tribal Council of Arizona and the Indian Health Service, to provide information and resources related to the work of First Things First.
 - Facilitating partnerships and educating both the public and private sectors on FTF programming in tribal communities.

First Things First is a Top 25 program in the 2017 Innovations in American Government Awards from Harvard University, Ash Center for Democratic Governance and Innovation.



- Providing training to FTF grantees who provide services in tribal communities.
- Formulating and recommending policies, programs and initiatives impacting tribes.
- Planning and implementing events to build awareness of early childhood development and health in tribal communities (e.g. FTF Early Childhood Summit and Tribal Connections).
- Planning and implementing Statewide and Regional Tribal Consultations.
- The Tribal Liaison will assist FTF senior staff and regional directors in coordination with tribal authorities and external partners to request and obtain data permissions (including obtaining tribal resolutions, Memoranda of Agreement/ Understanding, tribal IRB approval, etc.) for data collection and usage in tribal communities.
- The Tribal Liaison will assist regional directors in locating and obtaining existing data for tribal communities related to regional needs and assets reports.
- Ensuring ongoing communication with tribal governments and tribal partners by responding to requests for information and providing technical assistance as it relates to projects assigned.
- This position will also be responsible for adhering to all FTF policies and protocols related to data collection and security, and will provide oversight of the proper completion of all security, reporting, and communication requirements as agreed to in data permissions, tribal IRB approvals or other authorizing processes for data usage and collaboration with tribal governments.
- This staff member will also provide technical assistance, as necessary, to establish partnerships and promote coordination with external agencies, governments and tribal communities regarding data, especially data related to regional needs and assets reports in tribal communities.
- In collaboration with the Senior Director of Tribal Affairs and the Research and Evaluation Division, this position serves as a resource for FTF staff and other stakeholders on the use and interpretation of tribal data; and works with regional FTF staff to update regional councils and tribal authorities regularly on the status of data.
- This position participates in regular conference calls and other meetings with the FTF Tribal Technical Advisory Group (TTAG) or any other meetings as required.
- This position manages the Tribal Affairs contacts database, develops correspondence and prepares reports.
- The position assists with other administrative support and other office duties, as needed.
- Other duties as assigned.

Qualifications:

- Minimum of a bachelor's degree in research methodology, evaluation, child development or related field combined with practical experience is required.

Violence Prevention**Preventing Adverse Childhood Experiences****What are adverse childhood experiences?**

Adverse childhood experiences, or ACEs, are potentially traumatic events that occur in childhood (0-17 years). For example:

- experiencing violence or abuse
- witnessing violence in the home or community
- having a family member attempt or die by suicide

Also included are aspects of the child's environment that can undermine their sense of safety, stability, and bonding such as growing up in a household with:

- substance misuse
- mental health problems
- instability due to parental separation or household members being in jail or prison

If you think your children are not affected by the chaos in your home, you are sadly mistaken.

ACEs are linked to chronic health problems, mental illness, and substance misuse in adulthood. ACEs can also negatively impact education and job opportunities. However, ACEs can be prevented.

How big is the problem?

ACEs are common. About 61% of adults surveyed across 25 states reported that they had experienced at least one type of ACE, and nearly 1 in 6 reported they had experienced four or more types of ACEs.

Preventing ACEs could potentially reduce a large number of health conditions. For example, up to 1.9 million cases of heart disease and 21 million cases of depression could have been potentially avoided by preventing ACEs.

Some children are at greater risk than others. Women and several racial/ethnic minority groups were at greater risk for having experienced 4 or more types of ACEs.

ACEs are costly. The economic and social costs to families, communities, and society totals hundreds of

What are the consequences?

billions of dollars each year.

ACEs can have lasting, negative effects on health, well-being, and opportunity. These experiences can increase the risks of injury, sexually transmitted infections, maternal and child health problems, teen pregnancy, involvement in sex trafficking, and a wide range of chronic diseases and leading causes of death such as cancer, diabetes, heart disease, and suicide.

ACEs and associated conditions, such as living in under-resourced or racially segregated neighborhoods, frequently moving, and experiencing food insecurity, can cause toxic stress (extended or prolonged stress). Toxic stress from ACEs can change brain development and affect such things as attention, decision-making, learning, and response to stress.

Children growing up with toxic stress may have difficulty forming healthy and stable relationships. They may also have unstable work histories as adults and struggle with finances, jobs, and depression throughout life. These effects can also be passed on to their own children. Some children may face further expo-

How can we prevent adverse childhood consequences?

sure to toxic stress from historical and ongoing traumas due to systemic racism or the impacts of poverty resulting from limited educational and economic opportunities.

ACEs are preventable. Creating and sustaining safe, stable, nurturing relationships and environments for all children and families can prevent ACEs and help all children reach their full potential. CDC has produced a resource, Preventing Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs): Leveraging the Best Available Evidence (<https://www.cdc.gov/violenceprevention/pdf/>

Raising awareness of ACEs can help:

- Change how people think about the causes of ACEs and who could help prevent them.
- Shift the focus from individual responsibility to community solutions.
- Reduce stigma around seeking help with parenting challenges or for substance misuse, depression, or suicidal thoughts.
- Promote safe, stable, nurturing relationships and environments where children live, learn, and play.

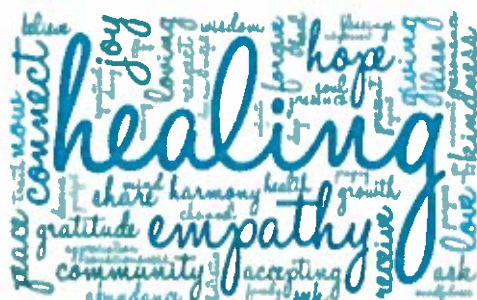

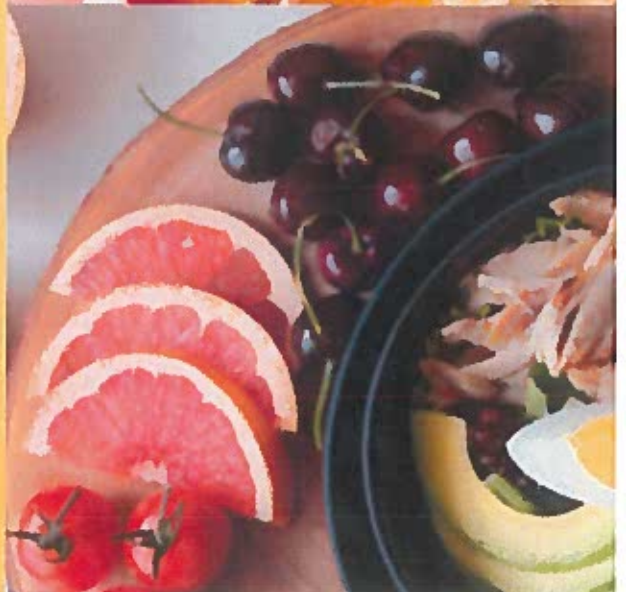

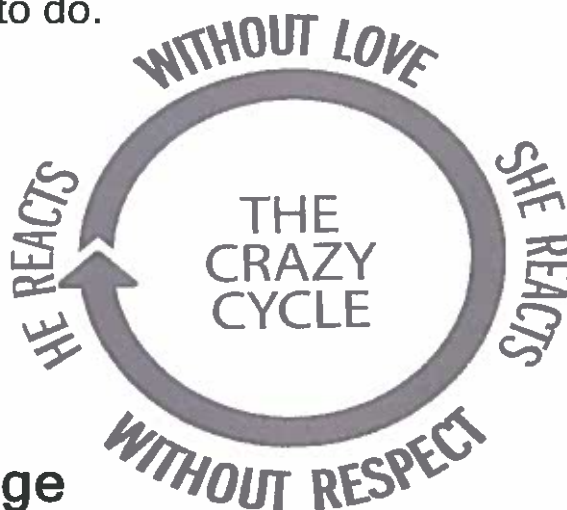
