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

It will be the 1 year anniversary for the Cholla Ranch Protest better known as Ha'kamwe Protest, it was once an area where many tribes gathered including our Hualapai Ancestors. It's also the homeland to the Big Sandy band including the Santa Maria River, today Ha'kamwe and the small town of Wikieup are facing future Mining Exploration for Lithium Copper and Gold. This means destruction to recorded and unrecorded sacred sites. Roughly 500,000 gallons of water goes into extracting 1 ton of lithium.

Always Give Thanks to Ha'nah gach "Water is Sacred, Water is Life" there was a time when the significance of Ha'Kamwe was its Sacred Springs not destructive mining. Prayers we Stand Together to Protect Our Ancestral Lands to Protect the Sacred.

On September 24th, 2022 the Ha' Kamwe Spiritual Walk and Journey will start at 5:30 am at the Route 66 Park, we will walk from Peach Springs to Valentine on the first day. Shuttle transportation will be provided throughout the day and back home.

We will meet each day at Route 66 Park at 5:30 am on September 24th, 25th, 26th, and the 27th. A shuttle will be provided to transport everyone to and from the run locations.

#### Route 66 Pavement Work • September 19th

#### Pavement work on State Route 66 in Peach Springs scheduled Sept. 19-21

Drivers should plan for delays and allow extra travel time

The Arizona Department of Transportation advises drivers to plan for brief traffic delays for pavement work on State Route 66 north of Kingman, from Hackberry Road to Wahanda Way (mileposts 81-104) in Peach Springs.

The following restrictions will occur from 5 a.m. to 5 p.m. beginning Monday, Sept. 19, to Wednesday, Sept. 21:

- SR 66 will be reduced to one lane only of alternating east- and westbound travel.
- On-site flaggers will direct drivers through the work zone.
- A 12-feet vehicle width restriction will be in place.
- The speed limit will be reduced.

ADOT advises drivers to be prepared to stop in the work zone and use caution around personnel and equipment. The restrictions are necessary while crews apply a fog seal, which protects and extends the life of the pavement.

The Planning Department is looking for one new applicant for the Tribal Environmental Review Commission (TERC) or Board of Commissioners. Below is a summary of what TERC is and what duties it performs.

Under the Hualapai Environmental Review Code (HERC), the Board of Commissioners has the primary authority, under the direction of the Hualapai Tribal Council, for regulating land use and development of Hualapai Tribal Lands. The Board of Commissioners is composed of seven (7) members who are appointed by the Tribal Council.

Their function is to review and regulate, including issuing permits, for all development activities that are proposed for any land site within Hualapai Tribal lands in order to ensure that:

- (1) no development activity will be carried out without a permit; and
- (2) all development activities will be carried out in accordance with all applicable tribal and federal environmental protection laws and regulations.

If you are interested, you can pick up an application at the Hualapai Planning Department located at 887 Hwy 66 (next to 76 fuel station). You can also request an application be mailed or e-mailed to you. <u>The due date for applications is Friday, September 23, 2022</u> and may be turned in to the tribal office or the Planning Department. Many of you have questioned my candidacy for the June 4, 2022 Election. Here is the Appeal Courts ruling, they found the Election Board violated my Due Access Right when they rejected my application to run for Tribal Council.

**Opinion and Order** 

Before Chief Justice Carole Goldberg (lead) and Justices Joe Keene and April Olson

Appellant Hualapai Election Board ("Election Board") is challenging a decision of the Hualapai Tribal Court, dated May 25, 2022, enjoining Election Board from sending out ballots for the June 4 General Election without including the name of Appellee Jolene Marshall ("Marshall"). Election Board asks this Court to reverse the decision below and order a new election for Marshall's seat on the Tribal Council. After receiving briefs from both parties, this Court held an oral argument hearing on August 11, 2022. We hold that the Tribal Court reached the correct result, but not for the right reasons. As explained below, this Court finds that Election Board failed to provide Marshall with sufficient notice of its requirements for qualifying to be on the ballot. Accordingly, we affirm the decision below.

#### Background

At issue is whether Marshall met the qualifications for office—specifically the residency requirement—set forth in the Hualapai Constitution and Election Ordinance, as administered by

Election Board. Article VIII, section 5(a)(2) of the Hualapai Constitution states that every candidate for tribal office must be "a resident of the reservation for at least one (1) year...." Article IV, section 1(c)(1) of the Election Ordinance states that "For residency, candidates shall sign a statement that they have maintained and lived in their primary residence on the reservation for at least one year immediately prior to the general or special election," and section 1(c)(2) provides that Election Board "may verify residency through visual verification, Post Office box receipts, utility bills, housing records, voting records, tax records, or other means as determined by the Board."

Election Board received an application from Marshall with supporting documentation on May 4, 2022. It is undisputed that the documentation included a letter from the Hualapai Elderly Program showing that Marshall resided at the Tribe's Elderly Center between May, 2021 and April, 1, 2022, and a handwritten letter from Mrs. Gregory Russell, dated May 3, 2022, stating that since April 1, 2022 Marshall has been residing at 1426 Milkwood Springs Road on the reservation, and providing a phone number that Election Board could call if it needed confirmation. Other documents, including Marshall's Arizona Driver's License, showed an address for Marshall on Diamond Creek Road on the reservation. On May 4, 2022, Election Board informed Marshall by letter that the documentation was insufficient because "it does not verify consistent residency as multiple addresses ... have been submitted," and that her application would remain "pending until you can prove that you have maintained a single residency for the period of May 2021-May 2022...." Marshall was given until 5:00 PM on May 5, 2022 to submit further documentation, and Marshall did in fact submit a letter and further documentation that day, including a document of uncertain origins, that may have been a Dish Network bill, with Marshall's email address and the 1426 Milkwood Springs Road address listed as the billing address. After reviewing all the material, Election Board notified Marshall on May 5, 2022 that she did not qualify for the June 4, 2022 ballot because her documentation did not "meet the qualifications under the Hualapai Constitution and Election Ordinance."

On May 25, 2022, the Tribal Court issued its injunction against Election Board, holding that Marshall was "a qualified candidate for Council and her name should be placed on the [June 4, 2022] General Election ballot." In its opinion, the Tribal Court found that Election Board had imposed an improper "single residency" requirement for the one-year period preceding the election, which the Tribal Court understood as requiring consistent residence in one house (or other unit) on the Hualapai reservation for the entire period. The Tribal Court could find no such requirement of consistent residence in a single location either in the Hualapai Constitution or Election Code. The Tribal Court also reviewed the documentation Marshall had submitted to Election Board, and found that it satisfied the residency requirement by showing she "could be physically found" on the Hualapai reservation for one year prior to the election. Citing Article IV, section 1(c)(2) of the Election Ordinance, the Tribal Court determined that once Marshall had submitted such documentation, it was "up to the Election Board to confirm and verify or to disprove her contention." According to the Tribal Court, Election Board had not "fulfill[ed] their duty by confirming and verifying her residency." Furthermore, even if they had verified her residency within the reservation, "they would have denied her anyway due to their erroneous requirement of a single residency."

In its brief and during oral argument, Election Board has contended that the Tribal Court misinterpreted the residency requirement as applied to Marshall, and that the Tribal Court erroneously placed the burden of verifying residency on Election Board. Election Board's position is that under the Hualapai Constitution and Election Ordinance, the burden of demonstrating residency is on the applicant for candidacy, and Election Board's only obligation is to review the submitted evidence to determine whether it is sufficient to satisfy that burden.

#### Discussion

This Court has been able to narrow the issue in this case considerably based on Election

Board's representations at the oral argument hearing. Specifically, Election Board disavows imposing

any requirement that the one-year residency means living in a "single residence" for the entire one-

year period. This Court understands that the May 4, 2022 guidance letter that Election Board sent to Marshall could have been interpreted to impose such a requirement. But there is nothing in Election Board's official letter of rejection reiterating such a "single residence" requirement, and Marshall continued to provide support for multiple residences on the reservation after receiving the May 4, 2022 letter from Election Board. Thus, the Tribal Court's reliance on Election Board's imposition of such a requirement was misplaced.

Election Board nonetheless contends that rejection of Marshall's application was justified by her failure to meet her burden of demonstrating primary residency on the reservation at some location for the entire one-year period from May, 2021 to May, 2022. At the oral argument hearing, Election Board agreed that Marshall had supplied sufficient documentation for the period from May, 2021 to the beginning of April, 2022, the time when she was residing at the Tribe's Elderly Center. Thus, the reason for its rejection comes down to the sufficiency of Marshall's documentation for the period April 1, 2022 to May, 2022. To support her claimed residence at 1426 Milkwood Springs Road for that period of time, Marshall provided the handwritten letter from Mrs. Russell affirming her residence there and the document purporting to be a satellite television bill that included Marshall's email address and the Milkweed Springs Road address, though its origin was unclear (see discussion above).

As stated in its brief before this Court, Election Board found this documentation insufficient because the handwritten letter was not notarized or provided under oath, nor did it include any kind of formal or informal occupancy agreement, and the purported satellite/cell phone bill did not indicate the name of any service-providing utility. Whereas the Tribal Court concluded that it is "up to the Election Board to confirm and verify or to disprove her contention," the Election Board's position is

that the candidate must first supply sufficient documentation that adequately supports residency. At that point, Election Board argues, it may seek to verify any questionable material; but verification is not an obligation when the documentation originally submitted is inadequate. To support its position, Election Board notes the tight time frames and very limited staffing available if it were required to seek out verifying evidence whenever it received an inadequate submission.<sup>2</sup> It also points to language in Article IV, section I(c) of the Hualapai Election Ordinance, stating that Election Board "shall certify" that candidates meet the qualifications for office, but only that it "may verify" residency through various means listed and "other means as determined by the Board" (emphasis added). A burden of verifying each questionable submission by each applicant, Election Board argues, would impose an untenable obligation and would contradict Hualapai law, which allows for verification but does not require it. According to Election Board, we should find that it was under no obligation to verify that Marshall was actually residing at the Milkwood Springs address beginning April 1, 2022 once it determined that the letter was inadequate to support Marshall's application.

Under Article VI, section 12 of the Hualapai Constitution, this Court has jurisdiction to determine all "matters of law and procedure." Whether the burden of demonstrating and supporting satisfaction of the residency requirement for candidates is on the applicant or Election Board is indeed a matter of law. But this Court does not need to resolve where the burden lies in this case. During the oral argument hearing, Election Board conceded that if Marshall's May 3, 2022 letter from Mr. Russell had been notarized or provided under oath, it could very well have enabled Marshall to be certified as a candidate. Yet, the guidance letter that Election Board sent to Marshall on May 4, 2022 did not inform Marshall of this easy cure. Furthermore, nothing in Election Board's Candidate

Residency Verification Checklist for candidates<sup>3</sup> explains that letters affirming residency at a particular location must be notarized in order to be accepted. This Court takes notice that informal living arrangements, which may occur in family or other situations, may leave an applicant for candidacy with no lease or other written agreement and with no utility bills in his/her name. Under those circumstances, a letter from the homeowner may be all the applicant can produce. If that letter must be notarized or under oath in order for Election Board to certify the applicant, applicants should be apprised of that requirement. Election Board had every opportunity, in its letter of May 4, 2022, to inform Marshall that she needed to have Mr. Russell's letter notarized, but did not do so. This notice is distinct from the type of burden that Election Board claims it should not have (and upon which this Court does not opine).

Under Article IX, section (d) of the Hualapai Constitution, the Tribe may not "deprive any person of liberty or property without due process of law." Running for tribal office is unquestionably an important aspect of "liberty" that cannot be denied without due process. Vaughan & Hunter v. Hualapai Election Board, 2013-AP-003 and 2013-AP-004 at 5 (2013) (citing Havatone v. Hualapai Election Board, SWITCA No. 99-002-HTC at 6 (1999)). "At minimum, due process requires notice of any proposed action that could affect the right, and a meaningful opportunity to be heard in relation to the proposed action." Id. In other cases, this Court has also identified "notice" as a key feature of the process that is "due" when liberty is at stake. See, e.g., Wescogame v. Alvirez et al., 2018-AP-001 (2018), at 6; In the Matter of the Estate of Wayne Whatanome, Sr., 2008-AP-008 (2009), at 8. In the present case, Election Board failed to supply notice to Marshall that she needed more than a handwritten letter from the homeowner, Mr. Russell, even though Russell's letter included the writer's

phone number an indicator of genuineness.<sup>4</sup> It would have been no additional burden for Election Board to have included this information in the May 4, 2022 letter it was already sending to Marshall.

This Court finds that the rejection of Marshall's application occurred without sufficient notice to her, denying her the process that was due. Accordingly, this Court affirms the Tribal Court's decision, but not for the reasons set forth in the Tribal Court's opinion.

IT IS SO ORDERED.

However, consideration for Indian preference in employment under 25 CFR Part 5 requires proof that (a) you are a member of any recognized Indian tribe currently under Federal jurisdiction; (b) you are a descendant of a member residing within the present boundaries of any Indian reservation on June 1, 1934; (c) you are an Eskimo or another aboriginal person of Alaska as defined by the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (43 U.S.C. 1601 et seq.); or (d) you possess one-half or more Indian blood of tribes that are indigenous to the United States. Indian Reorganization Act of June 18, 1934, 25 U.S.C. 472.

#### **Keys to Co-Parenting Young Children**

Sharing responsibility for child-rearing, though no longer partners in a relationship, has unique challenges.

Parenting is hard. Even with the support of a loving partner or spouse, all parents have days when they feel overwhelmed and stressed. Co-parenting is hard, too, with its own unique challenges. The term describes two parents sharing the responsibility of raising their child, though they are no longer partners in a relationship. By keeping the child's needs at the forefront, parents can support their little one to create a new normal that nurtures the whole child. Child-centered Co-parenting: The Three C's Cooperation, consistency and communication are three keys to healthy coparenting, according to early childhood expert Liz Santiago of the United Way of Pinal County. "Especially in situations where two people once were together, adults have a lot of big feelings," Santiago said. "It's important to remember that the child comes first."

Cooperation: As a parent, you will always be connected in some way to your child's other parent. That's why it's best to make the decision to cooperate with one another sooner rather than later. Cooperation looks like keeping your promises, doing what you say you're going to do when you're going to do it and committing to working with your child's other parent and not against them. Drop offs and transitions can be a great way to put this into practice. Instead of picking your child up from their co-parent's house have that parent drop them off. This is a subtle adjustment that can make a huge difference in your child's perspective.

Consistency: One challenge for children in co-parenting situations is having to figure out how to live in two separate homes, situations and conditions. Santiago recommends making sure

that children always have these questions answered: Where am I going next? Who am I going with next? When will I see my other parent again? Creating regular routines helps children know what to expect and that helps them feel stable and gives them a sense of control.

**Communication**: Regularly communicating with your co-parent, child and child's caregivers helps ensure everyone is on the same page and has the information they need to support the child.

- Talk to your co-parent to understand what they're seeing when your child is at their house. Share information with them about things you're concerned about, things your child loves and anything else relevant to your child.
- Talk to your child about their feelings, and be sure to tell them about any changes to their routine.
- Don't say negative things about your little one's other parent or family in front of them. Children see their parents in themselves, so doing this can hurt your child's feelings and self-image.

You Have What It Takes: Young children need to be nurtured and loved, have strong relationships and secure attachments with the adults in their lives, and have consistency to grow and develop into healthy, happy little ones. Responding to them, playing with them, talking to them, and spending time with them are all ways to support their development and show them that you'll always be there.





#### **Healthy Social Media Habits**

How You Use It Matters

Technology has changed the way we interact with each other. Social media puts other people just keystrokes away. This helps some feel like they have more social support. But for others, it can increase isolation and depression.

Researchers are investigating how social media affects mental health. They're learning that who you meet and what you find online can mean the difference between helpful and harmful effects.

Use Your Time Wisely • Logging into social media can lead you in many directions. Actively engaging and connecting with others online can help build your social supports-both online and offline. But spending many hours passively scrolling through upsetting content can send you spiraling into negative thoughts and feelings.

Increased social media use has been linked to symptoms of depression, anxiety, and stress. But it's not always clear which comes first: Is more time online causing the symptoms or a result of the symptoms?

Depression or anxiety can cause you to isolate yourself. Spending more time online may be a sign that you're withdrawing from others.

Studies have also found that some online activities can worsen your mental health. Passively watching what others are doing online can make you feel more isolated. You



might feel you're missing out or being left out. Or it can make you think that other people have better lives than you.

What you click on then affects what you see next. If you click on things that bother you, you're likely to be shown more of those things. Repeated scrolling through disturbing content can increase your stress and anxiety.

Teens are especially at risk from the effects of social media. Studies have found links between patterns in teens' social media use and mental health problems.

"There has been a growth in social media use, smartphone use, and teens' lives being online over the last 10 years," says Dr. Katherine Keyes at Columbia University. Rates of teen depression and suicide also rose

over the past 10 years. Researchers have been looking at social media's role in that increase.

Keyes's studies have shown that digital media use alone doesn't account for these recent rises in depression and suicide. Other factors must also play a role. More research is needed to figure out what those are.

What seems most important is how teens are using social media and how their time online is affecting their offline social networks and activities, Keyes says.

In other words, time online takes away from time you could

be spending with others, being physically active, or doing a hobby. These are things that help protect your mental health.

Connect Carefully . You can find countless different people and communities online. "Many meaningful and beneficial connections can be made online," says Keyes. "This is especially true for teens who have more marginalized identities. Some-

times they can find community and connectivity online that they can't get in their day-to-day lives."

But the digital world can also expose you to harmful health behaviors. Excessive drinking, substance use, and eating disorders are sometimes misleadingly shown as what everyone's doing or wants to do.

People also see ads about tobacco use, cannabis use, and drinking online. Dr. Patricia Cavazos-Rehg at Washington University in St. Louis studies the effects of ads on teen substance use. Her research has shown that even passively viewing tobacco content online increased the likelihood of using tobacco products. Keyes found similar trends for alcohol and cannabis.

"My concern is that social media can make substance use behaviors seem normal," Cavazos-Rehg explains. That can affect both teens and adults.

"We've seen a lot of messages online about 'wine-mom' culture that link alcohol use with 'mommy needs a break at the end of the day," Keyes says. "These messages link alcohol with positive self-care." But using alcohol to manage stress is not

Cavazos-Rehg is researching ways to deliver information about the risks of substance use on social media. She's also looking at how to get quality treatment information to people talking about mental health issues and substance use online.

Seek Out Help • Social media can be a tool to improve your mental health. You can search for health information, hear about others' experiences, or find treatment options.

"We have found that social media can be very helpful for people who are feeling stigmatized about inperson recovery," Cavazos-Rehg says. "Plus, social media can help those who are curious or ready to engage in treatment but want advice from their online peers first."

Her team looked at what prevents people with symptoms of depression from seeking treatment. They found that many people worry about being stigmatized. Others have trouble accessing or paying for treatment.

Her team is looking for ways to reduce those barriers through social media. They've created tools to identify social media posts that may indicate someone needs treatment for an eating disorder. They also created a treatment app for teens with eating disorders. The team is working to reach teens in need of treatment through online ads as well.

"There is a lot of support for recovery and for mental health that individuals can get off of social media," says Cavazos-Rehg. "But there's often misinformation that can spread as well." Find tips for evaluating online health information at go.usa. gov/xSv9n and go.usa.gov/xSv9P.

Remember, you don't need to struggle with mental health problems alone. "There's a common misconception that we can handle our mental health problems on our own, and that they're not severe enough to warrant medical care," Cavazos-Rehg says. "But that's a misconception." Don't hesitate to reach out to a health care provider or mental health professional.



# Wise Choices Protect Your Mental Health

- Take care of your body and mind. Stick to a schedule, eat well, stay physically active, get quality sleep, stay hydrated, and spend time outside.
- Invest in healthy relationships.
   Socializing is a powerful buffer to stress and a source of well-being.
   Spend time with others regularly, in-person and virtually.
- Be intentional about your use of social media, video games, and other technologies. Ask yourself: How much time am I spending online? Is it taking away from healthy offline activities, like exercising, seeing friends, reading, or sleeping? What content do I see, and how does it make me feel?
- Learn to manage stress and other difficult emotions. Try to recognize situations that may be emotionally challenging and come up with strategies to manage those emotions.
- Ask for help. Find someone you trust to talk to about stressful situations. If you are struggling to manage negative emotions, reach out to a health care provider, counselor, or person you trust.
- Call or text the Suicide & Crisis Lifeline at 988 if you or someone you know is in crisis.
- Get help finding substance use and mental health treatment in your area. Call the free National Helpline 1-800-662-HELP (4357) or visit www.FindTreatment.gov.

# Cloudy Vision? It Could Be Cataracts

Your eyes are your windows to the world. If something clouds them, you may have trouble seeing well enough to read, drive, or do other daily activities.

One common cause of cloudy vision is cataracts. These form in the lens of your eye. Cataracts are a normal part of aging. They occur when proteins in the lens break down over time and clump together.

The risk of getting cataracts rises as you get older. More than half of people in the U.S. over the age of 80 either have cataracts or have had surgery to remove them.

"Everybody who lives long enough gets cataracts," says Dr. Chantal Cousineau-Krieger, an eye surgeon at NIH.

Some people may develop cataracts at an earlier age than others. Smoking or exposure to lots of sunlight can increase the risk of cataracts. Certain types of eye surgeries and injuries can trigger a cataract. Some medications can also raise your risk.

Cataracts may not cause symptoms when they first form. But over time, your vision can become cloudy or blurry. Colors may look faded. You might not be able to see as well at night as you used to. Lamps, sunlight, or headlights can seem too bright. You may notice a halo around light sources. Or you may start to see two images instead of one.

These symptoms can also be a sign of other common eye problems. If you have problems with your vision, talk with an eye doctor. They can perform a dilated eye exam. These

exams use eye drops to widen part of your eye called the pupil. The doctor can then look into your eye for cataracts and other problems.

If you have mild cataracts, using a magnifying lens and brighter lights can help you see better inside. Sunglasses that reduce glare can help with vision outside.

Cataracts that are bad enough to interfere with daily activities can be treated with surgery. An eye surgeon first uses ultrasound or a laser to break up the cloudy lens. Then, they put a new plastic lens in its place.

A bonus from cataract surgery is that the new lens can often improve how well you see objects at a distance, explains Cousineau-Krieger. "We're always aiming to get you the best vision that we can and reduce your dependence on glasses," she says.

People are awake during cataract surgery. "But we give you medicine to make you comfortable and relaxed. It's not a painful procedure or a painful recovery," says Cousineau-Krieger. "Overall, it's a very low-risk surgery. And the benefits are tremendous. By the next day, most patients have better vision than they came in with."

NIH-funded researchers are working to better understand what makes proteins in the eye clump and cause cataracts. Eventually, their goal is to develop drugs that can prevent cataracts or even reverse them.

"Right now, you can't reverse a cataract once it's started. But you might be able to slow the rate of progression," Cousineau-Krieger says.

- Wear sunglasses and a hat with a brim when outside. These help keep the sun's harmful UV rays from reaching your eyes.

- Eat healthy. Eat plenty of fruits and vegetables. Include lots of dark, leafy greens in your diet.

#### **Tracking COVID-19 in Wastewater**

If you're infected with SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, you shed virus down the drain each time you wash your hands or use the toilet. This happens even if you don't have symptoms. Scientists have been tracking levels of SARS-CoV-2 in wastewater for early clues about infections in cities and towns.

Wastewater tracking has some advantages over clinical tests. It's much less expensive. And it doesn't require people to seek out testing. But this method hadn't been able to  $track\ specific\ variants\ of\ the\ virus.$ 

A team of researchers designed a new system to get more detailed information about SARS-CoV-2 variants from wastewater. They adapted a magnetic nanobead that can capture more of the virus's genetic material from water. They also built a computer program that quickly recognizes small pieces of the genetic material.

Researchers tested the system for a year in San Diego, California. It picked out new variants, like Delta and Omicron, weeks before they showed up in clinical tests. The system also found variants rarely seen in the clinic.

"Tracking new variants of concern in the clinic is slow and expensive," explains Dr. Kristian Andersen from Scripps Research Institute, who co-led the study. "But with this new tool, you can take one wastewater sample and basically profile the whole city."

The team is now expanding the program to track other viruses.

#### Monkeypox: What You Should Know

You may have heard that an outbreak of monkeypox is spreading across the country.

The virus got its name because it was first discovered in monkeys in 1958. But it likely came from other animals. Since then, the virus has also infected people. Until recently, most monkeypox infections were in Africa. But due to international travel, the illness has reached several parts of the world.

Monkeypox symptoms can be severe and painful. They can include fever, headache, chills, and a rash of sores that look like pimples or blisters. The rash may be located on or near the genitals or in other areas like the hands, feet, or face.

Anyone who has been in close contact with someone who has monkeypox is at risk for infection. The virus usually spreads by three main routes: by touching a rash or body fluid of an infected person; by touching clothes or bedding used by someone with monkeypox; or by breathing in the virus during close face-to-face contact. The virus can spread from the time symptoms start

until the rash has fully healed and healthy skin has formed. This can take several weeks.

NIH played a key role in developing and testing vaccines that are now being used to prevent monkeypox infections. Medicines approved to fight similar viruses are now being tested or used to treat monkeypox. NIH continues to support research to better understand, diagnose, treat, and prevent this disease.


