Greetings Community Members:

The Planning Department is looking for one new applicant for the Tribal Environmental Review Commission (TERC) or Board of Commissioners. Below is a summary of what TERC is and what duties it performs.

Under the Hualapai Environmental Review Code (HERC), the Board of Commissioners has the primary authority, under the direction of the Hualapai Tribal Council, for regulating land use and development of Hualapai Tribal Lands. The Board of Commissioners is composed of seven (7) members who are appointed by the Tribal Council.

Their function is to review and regulate, including issuing permits, for all development activities that are proposed for any land site within Hualapai Tribal lands in order to ensure that:

- a) no development activity will be carried out without a permit; and
- b) all development activities will be carried out in accordance with all applicable tribal and federal environmental protection laws and regulations.

If you are interested, you can pick up an application at the Hualapai Planning Department located at 887 Hwy 66 (next to 76 fuel station). You can also request an application be mailed or e-mailed to you. **The due date for applications is Friday, March 3, 2023** and may be turned in to the tribal office or the Planning Department. On September 24, 2014, the Hualapai Tribal Council adopted the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority Governing Ordinance. This is a significant step toward self-determination in the realm of public utilities for the Hualapai Tribe.

Established as an institution of Tribal government, the five members of the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority board are chosen by Council. As noted in Section 107.b.3, of the Ordinance, the HTUA

Board is authorized to acquire, construct, operate, maintain, promote, and expand electric power service, and eventually water service, and sewage service at Grand Canyon West and on such other locations within the Hualapai Reservation and on other Tribal lands under the jurisdiction of the Hualapai Tribe as the Tribal Council may deem appropriate. The HTUA board is delegated full authority and responsibility for the management and operation of HTUA consistent with the Ordinance.

At this time, the Tribe is seeking one new candidate to apply for Board membership to maintain this important function of Tribal government.

- ◆ The position may be filled by a member of the Community who has sufficient education, experience, and sound judgment to learn basic utility business practices and procedures.
- ◆ The new board member will be appointed for a three-year term.
- ◆ No employee of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, employee of the HTUA or member of the Tribal Council shall be a member of the Board.

**NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING AND ARIZONA WATER PROTECTION FUND
GRANT APPLICATION GUIDELINES REQUEST FOR COMMENTS**

The Arizona Water Protection Fund (AWPF) is a competitive state grant program that provides funding to interested parties for maintaining, enhancing, and restoring river and riparian resources throughout Arizona, including projects that benefit fish and wildlife that are dependent on these important resources. The distribution of grant funds from the AWPF is authorized pursuant to A.R.S. § 45-2101 *et seq.* and is overseen by the Arizona Water Protection Fund Commission (Commission). The program is administered through the Arizona Department of Water Resources.

Pursuant to A.R.S. § 45-2105 *et seq.* the Commission is required to develop guidelines for applicants for funding, and is seeking input from interested landowners, state and federal agencies, local government entities, non-profit organizations, and the public.

Specifically, the Commission is requesting comments related to:

- Current grant application structure and processes, and suggestions on streamlining and/or simplifying the grant application;
- Geographic areas in the state where protection and restoration should be prioritized (e.g., particular watersheds or streams; feature categories such as stream headwaters; etc.);
- Issues of concern that the AWPF should focus on across the state or in specific areas;
- Types of measures to address the issues of concerns identified;
- Relevant science related to designing and implementing effective riparian and watershed protection and restoration projects; and
- Published technical articles and experience with applied conservation/restoration practices with upper watershed and forest treatment projects that provide water quality and quantity benefits.

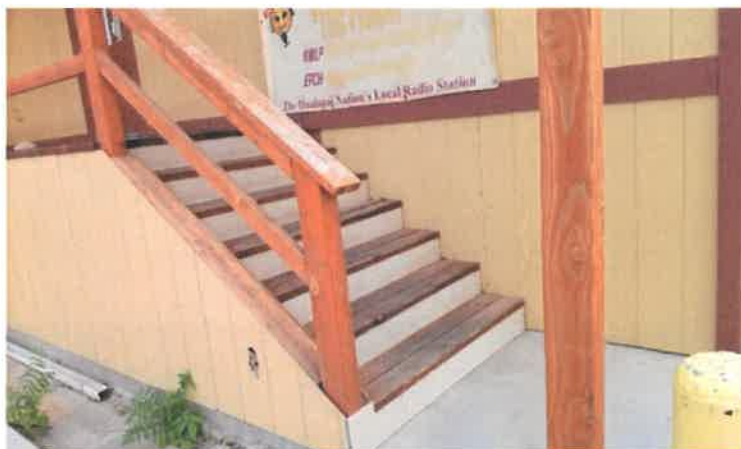

4 ways to help your child be ready for kindergarten

It's not too early to begin preparing for that first day.

While the big day may still be months away, it's not too early to start preparing for that first day of kindergarten. Today's schools expect 5-year-olds to arrive with basic academic and social skills so they are ready on day one to start learning to read, write and do basic math. You can help your child develop the skills they'll need with some fun, easy, everyday activities



- **Make reading part of your daily routine.** Read with your child at least 20 minutes per day. Look for books about things your child likes, and ask questions about the story like, "What do you think happens next?"

- **Get them talking.** Back-and-forth conversations help kids develop language skills and vocabulary. The more the better, so talk and sing with your child everywhere – at home, in the car, at the store.
- **Writing begins with scribbling.** Give your child safe writing tools to play with – like crayons, chalk or markers and blank paper – and let them create. They're developing the muscles and skills they'll need to be able to write.
- **"Clean up, clean up, everybody do your share."** Help your child get used to putting their toys and things back where they found them. And work on sharing with others, too. Social skills are a big part of being ready to learn and succeed in school.

Children who have positive experiences from birth to age 5 are more likely to be prepared when they start kindergarten and to do well in school. By turning everyday moments into learning moments, you can help children develop the skills and a love of learning that will help them succeed in school and in life.

COMMUNICATION

We have seen quite a bit of success with our Valentine Families Facebook group and our school smart phone app, but we know not everyone takes advantage of those technologies.

If there have been changes to your phone number or email address, please let the school know right away. There is plenty of information that the school can provide, but all that information is only useful if we can get it to you.



HOW CAN I HELP MY STUDENT?

- Have them teach you – With everything going on, sometimes it is easy to let students answer the, “How was school today?” with a simple, “Fine.” One way to have a more meaningful conversation is to ask your students to show (or even better teach) you something that they learned that day. In addition to you having a better understanding of what your students are learning, this provides the students an opportunity to deepen their understanding of the concepts, because they will learn things better when they have to teach someone else.
- Download the Valentine Elementary School app – Our school smartphone app has been released and is available in the Google Play Store and the Apple Store. You can scan the QR code at the top with your phone’s camera, and it will take you directly to the download.
- Read. Every. Day. – New year = same message. Reading every day can strengthen your student’s fluency, vocabulary, comprehension . . . everything. There simply is no substitute for making the time for daily reading.
- Remember that every minute matters – It may not seem like a big deal if a student gets to school at 8:30, but what they miss in those first 30 minutes can set the tone for the rest of the day. The very beginning of the day is prime learning time, whether that be new procedures, new vocabulary, or new math concepts. When students are late, it places additional burdens on the staff to try and get them up to speed, while still maintaining the structure already planned for the day for the rest of the class. A student being late, leaving early, or absent altogether affects not only the student, but everyone else as well.

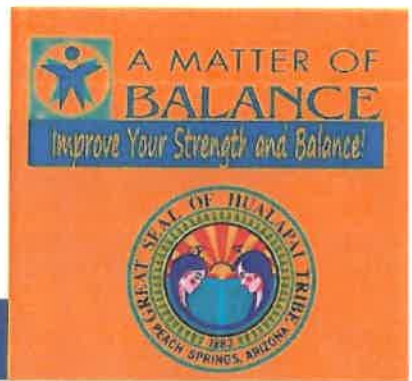

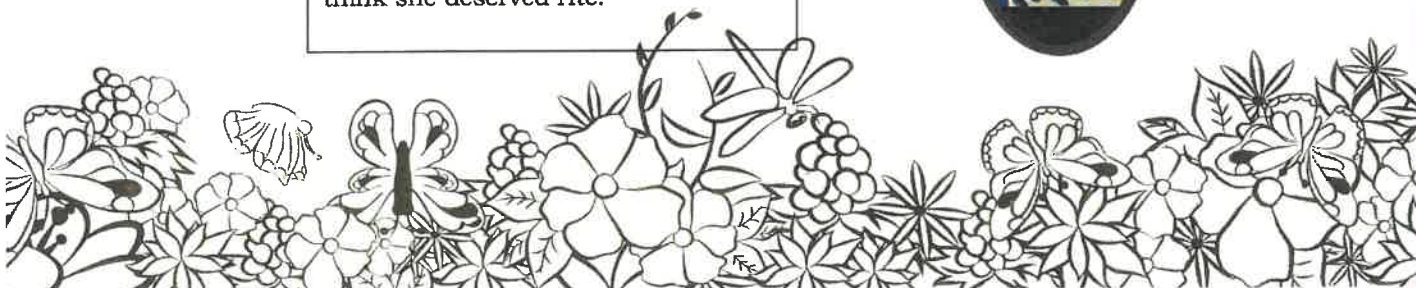

Feather Study... I love finding feathers! WHEN A FEATHER FALLS ON YOUR PATH

Have you wondered about what it might mean when you find a feather? Feathers are ways that Spirit (of different forms) sends us signs.

For a start, feathers (and other items such as coins, and creatures such as birds, butterflies and dragonflies), can be signs from the angels, guides, or loved ones in that they are near - that they hear you, guide you and are supporting you. It can be an acknowledgment of you or your thoughts or it is their way of saying hello.

Finding a feather is often a magical moment. I have had many beautiful feather experiences and have watched one fall down from the sky onto my daughter's lap while we had a picnic in our backyard! In my children are often sign bearers, delivering me feathers from their play-time travels.

Feathers represent flight and freedom, soaring above, looking from a higher perspective, and moving beyond boundaries and limitations. Different colors and color combinations can also add extra meaning. (See further below about various color meanings).

Interpreting the Meaning of the Feather Sign

Whenever you observe a sign, take note of what you were thinking just before it happened, or what is going on in your life at that moment. What could the sign be telling you? Don't stress yourself finding a meaning. Even if you do not understand the meaning of the sign at the time, it could become clearer later, or you may be absorbing it in at a sub-conscious level. Just trust that it is a sign and let go of any doubts. Enjoy the way that Spirit works, and embrace the fact you are intermingling with it and paying attention.

Asking for Feather (and other) Signs

You can ask for feather (or other) signs to come to you. And you can be specific. I once asked for confirmation that I had a male guide watch-

ing over me (which is what I was feeling and just wanted the magical validation). I asked that if it were true I be shown in the form of a blue feather. I picked blue because it was more rare and unusual, and I saw it as an obviously male color. Exactly one week later I went to work and as I approached some steps outside there were bright blue feathers everywhere! They were fakes ones but it didn't matter. It was another of those magical moments.

It is just a matter of believing, letting go, and staying aware. Signs often remind us to be at peace and relax into the nature and flow of life. The meanings can at times be profound, and at other times quite simple. The best advice when signs happen is to not put any pressure on yourself to understand it. Take it as an opportunity to connect, take notice of and thank the ever-present Spirit. If your sign is an item such as a feather, you can keep it in a special place whether that be by your bedside, on your dresser, or added to your sacred space / spiritual altar. Or you can gently release it back to nature or where you found it.

How do you know for sure your feather is a sign?

It is especially a sign if it comes in a magical way or you find it in an odd place. Feather signs often appear on your path in front of you, or at your doorstep. Once a feather appeared in my bag, and on my bedroom floor. This article by Natalia Kuna was published in the magazine, "Alive, So Make it Count!"

What Different Feather Colors Mean

The Native American people had a great spiritual understanding about feathers, their colors and their meaning. They would take the utmost care of any feathers that came their way as they saw it as a sacred gift, or a powerful talisman in battle.

When considering feather colors, firstly I always recommend seeking the answer within yourself first. Do you have any particular personal association with the color? What does the color make

you think or feel? What are the universal meanings of that color to your knowledge? Does the feather you found act as an answer to a question or some kind of acknowledgment. Always go with your gut and the first impressions you get, and trust. I recommend noting it down and keeping a journal of signs and synchronicities. You might see more in connection to this sign, so stay alert and enjoy the mystery of the process.

Below is a brief rundown of the possible color meaning of feathers (though trust your own heart and use this as a general guide - you can experiment with this!):

WHITE - White feathers symbolize purification, spirituality, hope, trust, faith, protection, peace, Heaven, angels, and also act as blessings and wisdom connected with moon.

RED - Red feathers symbolize the root chakra (money, possessions, security, career), physical vitality/energy/life force/action, good fortune, passion, emotions, courage.

BLUE - Blue feathers symbolize the throat chakra (communication, acceptance, speaking your truth) peace, inspiration, mental abilities/knowledge, connection with spirits, spiritual protection and psychic awareness.

YELLOW - Yellow feathers symbolize solar plexus chakra (gut intuition, happiness), blessings and wisdom connected with powerful sun energy, intelligence, playfulness, joy, cheerfulness, mental alertness, vision.

GREEN - Green feathers symbolize heart chakra - love, emotions, relationships, forgiveness), health, healing, nature, environment, nature spirits, plant spirits, animal spirits, growth, fertility, harmony, unity, money, prosperity, success.

ORANGE - Orange feathers symbolize sacral chakra - sex/physical relationships, love, appetite, attraction), energy, change, optimism, and ambition, success, new ideas, will power, creativity, physical love, new ideas, will power, independence.

PINK - Pink feathers symbolize unconditional love, romance, feelings, friendship, caring, compassion, harmony, service, empathy, kindness, gentleness, faithfulness, honor, inspiration.

GRAY - Gray feathers symbolize peace and neutrality (as it is in the middle of black and white), authenticity, flexibility.

PURPLE - Purple feathers symbolize crown chakra - (universal consciousness, spiritual connection), heightened spiritual growth and experiences, higher thought.

BROWN - Brown feathers symbolize Earth, stability, grounding, endurance, home, friendship, respect.

BLACK - Black feathers symbolize protection, warning, repelling or warning of negative energy, death (as in a closed chapter), mystical wisdom - a sign that you are undergoing a spiritual initiation, growth or increased wisdom. When the feathers are iridescent, or represents high mystical insight (especially if there is a shiny iridescence).

COLOR COMBINATIONS:

- Black and white mixed feathers can represent protection, or the sense of union.
- Black mixed with purple represents a very deep spirituality, a deep mystical sign.
- Black, white, and blue mixed feathers denote change on the horizon.
- Brown and black striped pattern (like a pheasant's feather) - balance between the physical and the spiritual.
- Brown and white - happiness, and you will go under the radar from psychic or other harm.
- Feathers with red and green in them or together would denote that you are being assisted financially, a very lucky sign.
- Grey and white symbolize hope.

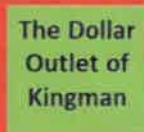
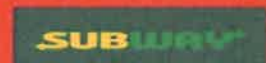
John Hopkins, aka Huckleberry Hopkins

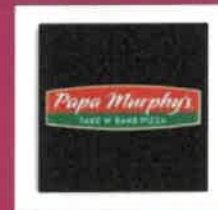
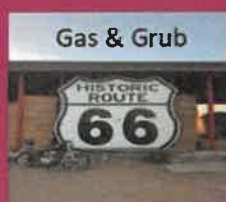
