Hualapai Tribe's Osterman Gas Station on Route 66 named one of America's 11 Most Endangered Historic Places

PHOENIX – The Hualapai Tribe, the National Trust for Historic Preservation, and Arizona's State Historic Preservation Office, a division of Arizona State Parks and Trails, announced today that

the historic Osterman Gas Station has been named one of America's 11 Most Endangered Historic Places in 2023. The former filling station, owned by the Hualapai Tribe, is located in Peach Springs, Ariz., the tribal capital, along Route 66.

"Arizona's rich cultural heritage is a precious legacy we must steward. The Osterman Gas Station and its role in Peach Springs, contributing to the town's midcentury prosperity is an important piece of Americana," said



Governor Katie Hobbs. "With recognition of its significance and support, it can once again serve as a meaningful piece of the Peach Springs revitalization plans of the Hualapai Tribe."

The Osterman Gas Station was built in 1929, and is one of few remaining commercial buildings in Peach Springs from the early twentieth century. The station has been seen as a key community gathering place by the Hualapai people living in Peach Springs.

"The Osterman Gas Station is meaningful to the Hualapai people due to the significance of this being the last gas station out five that used to be here," said Sherry J. Parker, chairperson of the

Hualapai Tribe. "It provides history of our tourism days when traffic came through with buses stopping daily. It is a reminder of days gone by and stands as a representation of the significance of our contribution to Route 66."

By the mid-twentieth century, Peach Springs was one of the busiest communities along Route 66 between Kingman and Flagstaff. The Osterman Gas Station exemplifies the privately-owned businesses that thrived along the historic route, catering to travelers and tourists before Interstate 40 was completed in 1979 and traffic on the "Mother Road" drastically slowed.

Preservation efforts on the structure began over a decade ago, and in 2012, the station was added to the National Register of Historic Places. Time and extreme weather have taken its toll and the Tribe is currently in consultation with experts to develop and raise funds for a preservation and reuse plan. Grant funding, including an American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant from Arizona State Parks and Trails, has been secured for repairs.

The 11 Most Endangered Historic Places list brings greater awareness to places that are of historical significance that are at imminent risk of being lost forever if not preserved. Arizona's State Historic Preservation Officer, Kathryn Leonard, said, "It is our hope that being named to the 11 Most Endangered Historic Places list will be as impactful for the Osterman Gas Station as it has been for other historic places." Leonard continued, "The Osterman Gas Station holds an important place in the story of Route 66 and within the Hualapai tribal community, and support is needed to preserve this historic and cultural resource in Arizona."

Since 1988, the National Trust for Historic Preservation has listed more than 300 sites on its 11 Most Endangered Historic Places annual list. Only a handful of those historic places that have been named have been lost, but for most, the listing is a turning point for renewed support for preservation efforts.

"The Osterman Gas Station has been a focal point of the Hualapai Nation for generations, and its story illustrates the important but often untold history of diverse communities along the legendary Route 66," said Katherine Malone-France, chief preservation officer of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. "Thanks to the Tribe's commitment to steward this historic place, the Hualapai-owned gas station is poised to reach a new generation of tribal members and travelers through thoughtful reuse and planning, but it urgently needs stabilization and repair."

In 2022, another culturally significant location in Arizona was named to the 11 Most Endangered Historic list by the National Trust for Historic Preservation: Camp Naco in Bisbee, Ariz. This military camp was used from 1919-1923 and is a touchstone for the history of the Buffalo Soldiers. Camp Naco was named to the list in May of last year and in October received an \$4.6 million from the State of Arizona as part of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), and in January 2023 they received an additional \$3.5 million from the Mellon Foundation's Monument Project Initiative.

Greetings Community Members:

The Planning Department is looking for one new applicant for the Tribal Environmental Review Commission (TERC) or Board of Commissioners. Below is a summary of what TERC is and what duties it performs.

Under the Hualapai Environmental Review Code (HERC), the Board of Commissioners has the primary authority, under the direction of the Hualapai Tribal Council, for regulating land use and development of Hualapai Tribal Lands. The Board of Commissioners is composed of seven (7) members who are appointed by the Tribal Council.

Their function is to review and regulate, including issuing permits, for all development activities that are proposed for any land site within Hualapai Tribal lands in order to ensure that:

- (1) no development activity will be carried out without a permit; and
- (2) all development activities will be carried out in accordance with all applicable tribal and federal environmental protection laws and regulations.

If you are interested, you can pick up an application at the Hualapai Planning Department located at 887 Hwy 66 (next to 76 fuel station). You can also request an application be mailed or e-mailed to you. The due date for applications is Friday, June 2, 2023 and may be turned in to the tribal office or the Planning Department. Seeking One New Board Member for the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority (HTUA)

On September 24, 2014, the Hualapai Tribal Council adopted the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority Governing Ordinance. This is a significant step toward self-determination in the realm of public utilities for the Hualapai Tribe.

Established as an institution of Tribal government, the five members of the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority board are chosen by Council. As noted in Section 107.b.3, of the Ordinance, the HTUA Board is authorized to acquire, construct, operate, maintain, promote, and expand electric power service, and eventually water service, and sewage service at Grand Canyon West and on such other locations within the Hualapai Reservation and on other Tribal lands under the jurisdiction of the Hualapai Tribe as the Tribal Council may deem appropriate. The HTUA board is delegated full authority and responsibility for the management and operation of HTUA consistent with the Ordinance.

At this time, the Tribe is seeking one new candidate to apply for Board membership to maintain this important function of Tribal government.

- ♦ The position may be filled by a member of the Community who has sufficient education, experience, and sound judgment to learn basic utility business practices and procedures.
- The new board member will be appointed for a three-year term.
- No employee of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, employee of the HTUA or member of the Tribal Council shall be a member of the Board.

Please prepare a letter of interest offering your qualifications (resume) and general motivation to be a member of the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority Board and what you hope to achieve while on the Board. Tips to get your toddler to try (and eventually like) new foods

Be patient, stay positive, and think long-term.

1. Start small.

When introducing a new food to your child, give them just a little taste the first time. Studies have shown that offering even a tiny portion is an effective first step in – over time – getting kids to eat new foods.



2. Try, try again.

You may need to serve a new food – like peas or broccoli – many, many times before your toddler will eat it. It can take as many as 15 exposures for a child to get fully comfortable with a new food. Sometimes even more. Knowing that can help you be more realistic with your expectations.

3. Be creative.

To keep your child willing to try those peas or broccoli the first 14 times, you'll need to bring some fun to the table. Some ideas for presenting the same food in different ways: cut or arrange the food in different shapes; change up the plates, bowls and utensils you serve them with; or serve it in a different location, like a living room picnic. Try to keep the experience new and fun for your child

4. Let them explore.

You'll have more success introducing a new food if you let your child explore it with all of their senses. Encourage them to smell it and touch it. You might even need to roll it in their fingers. That may sound crazy, but kids learn through experience and discovery. They'll be more comfortable trying new things to eat if they can fully examine them first.

5. Get them involved.

One way to motivate your little one to try something new is to bring them to the grocery store with you and have them pick out a new fruit or vegetable to try. And they'll be even more excited to try their choice if you let them help you prepare it before mealtime.

6. Don't force it.

Studies show that kids react negatively when pressured to eat foods. And in the long run, it doesn't help them like new foods. Neither does negotiating or offering rewards. Be patient, stay positive, and think long term.



Dear Parents, Staff, and Community Members,

We are reaching out to you to share an update on your school district. We want to begin by expressing our gratitude and thanking Peach Springs and the surrounding communities for your support and involvement. We cannot have an effective school district without you.

Our vision is for schools to be hubs for our children, their families, and the community. We have spent the past three years working to rebuild relationships and school buildings, improve our educational services for students, and restore trust. That work is not complete, but we want to acknowledge the parents, volunteers, community partners, and the Hualapai Tribe for helping to reopen Music Mountain High School. We are excited to help bring our high school students home.

News from Peach Springs Schools

It has been an exciting year for both Peach Springs Elementary and Music Mountain High School. For the first time in the historical tracking of letter grades by the Arizona Department of Education in schools, Peach Springs Elementary has gone from a failing grade of "F" to a letter grade of "D." This is a very significant milestone for the district in our academic growth, representing a positive shift in momentum, and we certainly are celebrating this success. Specifically, our elementary students have been hard at work, 30% of our students demonstrated 100% growth in reading and math! In addition, Peach Springs Elementary School hosted three family and community nights that focused on STEAM, Literacy, and preparing for the state assessments.

Music Mountain Jr./Sr. High School is proud of our middle schoolers for their hard work with mandatory state testing this month. Just recently, they have persevered with confidence a three week testing schedule, have been compliant, giving their very best effort. Also, our 9th graders have had 100% attendance and completion of the ACT Aspire. We've graduated our first class of high schoolers from Music Mountain Online Academy and will be expanding on-campus class offerings. Next school year, for the first time in almost twenty years, Music Mountain High School will be offering an AIA athletics program. We hope that you will join our students and staff in cheering on the Warriors!

We will also continue to work to bring additional educational opportunities to our students and the community. The district is exploring opportunities to work with the Tribe, Mohave Community College, and universities to bring more educational and enrichment programs to the area. We hope to be sharing more on the potential for new programs in the near future.

Governing Board Opening

Opportunities for Public Comment

Superintendent Santiago and the Governing Board want to hear from you. The Board meets monthly, and each regular Board meeting includes a call to the public. While the Board may not be able to discuss or vote on the topic you share if it is not on the agenda due to Open Meeting laws, hearing from community members allows the Board to hear your ideas, set agendas for future Board meetings, and help set the direction for the District.

Board meetings also provide you with the opportunity to hear updates and reports on academic programs, student events, and developments in the District.

Notices for each Board meeting are posted online at the District website (www.psusd8.org), and on the front doors of Peach Springs Elementary. Board meetings are normally held at Peach Springs Elementary.

Budget and Staffing Updates

Before the start of each school year, the Governing Board considers a budget to fund items like teacher and staff salaries, books, curriculum, technology, and building maintenance. Since 2000, public schools have received additional federal funding. Unfortunately, that additional funding is now coming to an end. Like other school districts, Peach Springs Unified faces difficult decisions on how to allocate the resources entrusted to it. The District's Governing Board and leadership take that responsibility very seriously.

The District's first priority is the children who live in Peach Springs and the surrounding communities. Accordingly, the District has prioritized spending in classrooms as much as possible. We will not attempt to save money at the expense of student learning by combining grades, or by removing teachers from classrooms. Each grade will continue to have a teacher certified in the subject area he or she teaches.

Reduced federal funding will require some budget cuts. Those cuts will start at the top. The District will be eliminating two administrative positions. Superintendent Santiago, who is also a certified high school principal, will also take on the responsibility as Principal at Music Mountain High School. The District has also cut spending for consultants and other services.

Sadly, this will also mean that some support staff will not be brought back. We greatly regret having to make this decision and would not be doing so if it were not absolutely necessary. We recognize that this will be difficult for each of the staff members.

Please know that we are doing everything we can to grow enrollment and attendance, which in turn will allow the District to fund additional positions. In the meantime, we do not want to promise a position that we cannot fund, as that would only force us to make job cuts without any advance notice.

The solution to this problem is growth. Fortunately, our student population continues to grow. More students mean more funding available for our students. With that, we hope to restore some of the positions lost. The District has also worked hard to identify and apply for any additional sources of funding, including grants.

Many other school districts are facing similar, difficult choices. By careful budgeting, and prioritizing spending on students in the classroom, we hope to increase enrollment and bring in additional resources to help restore cuts.

District Policy on Indian Preference in Employment

The District has adopted policies on Equal Opportunity Employment, and on Indian Preference in Employment. The District's Indian Preference in Employment provides that, where the District has qualified Native American and non-native applicants with the same qualifications for a position, the District will give preference to the enrolled tribal member.

ENROLLMENT APPLICATIONS

Applications for 2023-2024 school year enrollment at Valentine Elementary are now available online and in the school office. We estimate that there will be approximately 75 open enrollment spots available for students who reside outside the VESD boundaries. Those spots are throughout all grades and are subject to classroom-specific size limitations.

Priority preference will be given to returning students who have met attendance and behavior expectations and siblings of those students.

Students maintain their eligibility for attendance exceptions by having regular attendance and appropriate behavior. Attendance exceptions are reviewed during the year and are revoked if those expectations are not met.



CROSSWALK

The Mohave County Public Works Department was out well ahead of schedule

just a couple of weeks ago to install our new crosswalk and paint the double yellow line for our school zone! They were so far ahead, we haven't even had time to get the signposts for our School Zone signs yet, but those are on order.

The school zone means a dramatic change for traffic in front of our school. The biggest change is that vehicles will no longer be able to stop along the fence line. The Mohave County Traffic Safety Committee has indicated to us that there is not enough of a shoulder to safely get off the street and still allow vehicles to pass without them crossing the center line.

What this means is that students will need to utilize the parking lot on the other side of the street to get out of their vehicles. The buses have already begun loading and unloading over there.

We will be ordering additional signage to direct traffic to turn right past the church and circle behind the staff vehicles and around to the drop off zone, until a more permanent solution can be found.



HOW CAN I HELP MY STUDENT?

- Talk about how words can be hurtful We have seen a recent spike in the number of instances where students are going out of their way to say things that are hurtful to other students. Below are some examples:
 - o "At least I have a mom."
 - o "Your mom and dad don't love you, that's why you live with your auntie."
 - o "You're fat."
 - o "You're so stupid."
 - o "Your glasses make you look funny."
 - o "You're retarded."

We have also heard of some students using words and phrases in the Hualapai language being used that are inappropriate. Some also think that simply making an apology "makes it all better," but the damage to the other students has already been done. Please take the time to speak to your student about being kind or being silent.

 Remind them to keep working until the end – With the temperature and calendar changing, it is common for many students to put forth less effort into their schoolwork. We have four weeks remaining, and students will be expected to keep learning until the end.

Permission forms are going home today with the itinerary and must be returned by this Wednesday, May 3, so we can have an accurate count.
