



Greetings Community Members:

The Planning Department is looking for one new applicant for the Tribal Environmental Review Commission (TERC) or Board of Commissioners. Below is a summary of what TERC is and what duties it performs.

Under the Hualapai Environmental Review Code (HERC), the Board of Commissioners has the primary authority, under the direction of the Hualapai Tribal Council, for regulating land use and development of Hualapai Tribal Lands. The Board of Commissioners is composed of seven (7) members who are appointed by the Tribal Council.

Their function is to review and regulate, including issuing permits, for all development activities that are proposed for any land site within Hualapai Tribal lands in order to ensure that:

- (1) no development activity will be carried out without a permit; and
- (2) all development activities will be carried out in accordance with all applicable tribal and federal environmental protection laws and regulations.

If you are interested, you can pick up an application at the Hualapai Planning Department located at 887 Hwy 66 (next to 76 fuel station). You can also request an application be mailed or e-mailed to you. The due date for applications is Friday, June 2, 2023 and may be turned in to the tribal office or the Planning Department. Seeking One New Board Member for the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority (HTUA)

On September 24, 2014, the Hualapai Tribal Council adopted the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority Governing Ordinance. This is a significant step toward self-determination in the realm of public utilities for the Hualapai Tribe.

Established as an institution of Tribal government, the five members of the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority board are chosen by Council. As noted in Section 107.b.3, of the Ordinance, the HTUA Board is authorized to acquire, construct, operate, maintain, promote, and expand electric power service, and eventually water service, and sewage service at Grand Canyon West and on such other locations within the Hualapai Reservation and on other Tribal lands under the jurisdiction of the Hualapai Tribe as the Tribal Council may deem appropriate. The HTUA board is delegated full authority and responsibility for the management and operation of HTUA consistent with the Ordinance.

At this time, the Tribe is seeking one new candidate to apply for Board membership to maintain this important function of Tribal government.

- The position may be filled by a member of the Community who has sufficient education, experience, and sound judgment to learn basic utility business practices and procedures.
- The new board member will be appointed for a three-year term.
- No employee of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, employee of the HTUA or member of the Tribal Council shall be a member of the Board.

Hualapai Master Plan Update Committee to hold second meeting on Tuesday, June 6th The Hualapai Master Plan Update Committee is scheduled to hold its second meeting on Tuesday, June 6, 2023, beginning 5:15 PM at the Multi-Purpose Building, located at 470 Hualapai Drive in Peach Springs.

The 18-member Committee was formed by Hualapai Tribal Council on March 6, 2023, with the task of updating the tribe's existing draft Master Plan. The Master Plan is a statement of community values and aspirations, written as goals and policies, and shown on maps and diagrams. This will be the primary tool for managing community change to achieve the desired quality of life for tribal members living on the reservation, trust lands and private property owned by the tribe.

What is WIC?

WIC is a nutrition program that helps families feed their children healthy foods. WIC provides nutrition information, healthy foods, and help accessing health care to moderate to low-income families. The program is available to families with pregnant women, new mothers, and children under the age of five.

What Can WIC Offer My Family?

Benefits that can be used at the grocery store to buy healthy foods like milk, yogurt, whole grains, beans, juice, eggs, cheese, cereal, peanut butter and fruit and vegetables. Information about nutrition and health to help you and your family eat well and be healthy. Help with breastfeeding your baby, Help in finding health care and other community services, and Breast pumps to help you breastfeed even when you return to work

Can My Family Enroll In WIC?

WIC is for all kinds of families - families with married or single parents and those who are working or not working. WIC has different requirements than SNAP (Food Stamps) so even if you don't qualify for SNAP, you may still qualify for WIC. If you are a father, mother, grandparent, foster parent or other legal guardian of a child under 5 years of age, you can apply for your child.

If you are a woman who is pregnant, breastfeeding, or has a baby up to six months old, you can apply for yourself.

REQUIRED Documents:

- 1. Identification for all clients
- 2. Proof of residency
- 3. Proof of income

Examples of proof of identification are:

Driver's License or state issued identification card

Birth certificate

Immunization record

Tribal enrollment card

Social security card

AHCCCS card

Hospital card for newborn baby

Examples of proof of residency are:

AHCCCS Suspends Payments to Behavioral Health Providers Based on Credible Allegations of Fraud

Ensuring member safety and access to needed health care services is top priority

PHOENIX -- Today, Governor Katie Hobbs and Attorney General Kris Mayes joined the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System (AHCCCS) Office of Inspector General (OIG) to announce payment suspensions against more than 100 unique, registered behavioral health providers of Medicaid services based on credible allegations of fraudulent billing activities, in conjunction with the Arizona Attorney General's Healthcare Fraud and Abuse Section, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the US Department of Health and Human Services, the US Attorney's Office, and the Internal Revenue Service.

Provider payment suspensions, known as Credible Allegations of Fraud (CAF) suspensions, are the first step of required action when Medicaid payment fraud is identified, and the beginning of multi-agency investigations.

"The State of Arizona is taking swift action to stop a humanitarian crisis, root out waste, fraud and abuse, and crack down on bad actors exploiting Tribal communities," said Governor Katie Hobbs. "I'm proud of our law enforcement officials and AHCCCS for taking action to hold fraudulent billers accountable and protect some of our state's most vulnerable communities."

"I am proud of the work done by the law enforcement officials, and in particular those at Arizona Attorney General's Office in investigating fraud and abuse of taxpayer dollars," said Attorney General Kris Mayes. "Fraudulent Medicaid billing harms taxpayers and puts vulnerable individuals at risk of not receiving needed health care services. Together, the Attorney General's Healthcare Fraud and Abuse Section and AHCCCS will continue to disrupt organized fraudsters, apprehend them, and prosecute them to the full extent allowed by law."

Under federal regulations (and unless good cause exists to not suspend payment per federal regulation), AHCCCS is required to suspend all payments to a provider when it determines that a credible allegation of fraud exists. The agency makes a fraud referral to the Arizona Attorney General's Office Healthcare Fraud and Abuse Section, or a federal law enforcement agency. This is a preliminary finding of fraud indicating that evidence of fraud has been identified as reliable. Suspended providers may continue to bill AHCCCS for services provided; the reimbursement they claim is withheld pending the outcome of further investigation.

"AHCCCS Office of Inspector General and the Arizona Attorney General's Office became aware of potential fraudulent billing practices including significant increases in outpatient behavioral health services. AHCCCS was able to connect the irregular billing with alleged criminal activity targeting tribal communities and other Arizonans," said Carmen Heredia, AHCCCS director. "As with any provider payment suspension, our immediate top priority is ensuring members are safe, sheltered, and receiving the health care services they need."

"Health care fraud is often billed as a victimless crime, but that couldn't be further from the truth in this case," said Akil Davis, special agent in charge of the FBI's Phoenix field office. "This scheme we are investigating negatively affects some of the most vulnerable in our society who rely on these services. The FBI and our law enforcement partners will continue to aggressively pursue all those who seek to unlawfully enrich themselves by manipulating the system with nothing but greed as their motivation."

The FBI is seeking victims who may have been recruited to live in and receive services in group homes, and asking them to complete a form at https://forms.fbi.gov/phoenixgrouphomes/.

Ensuring AHCCCS members have continued access to health care services is the top priority any time a CAF payment suspension is issued. AHCCCS is working with its network of health plans, tribes, behavioral health partners, and other state agencies to contact all members for whom these providers have billed services and connect them with the resources they may need, such as:

 A dedicated member hotline at 2-1-1 (press 7) for members who have been impacted by the closure of a sober living home or residential facility (see www.211Arizona.org/MMIP),

- Mobile crisis teams ready to deploy when members need hands-on, immediate behavioral health services, transportation, or care coordination, and
- Coordination of immediate housing, transportation, and health services related to a provider closure.

"When Arizonans work together, with active collaboration among state, tribal and federal partners, we best protect the most vulnerable among us," said United States Attorney Gary Restaino. "Our health care fraud investigations continue. Safety is paramount here, and we'll be looking at the efforts of facilities to help ensure the orderly transfer of residential patients."

"The Arizona Department of Health Services licenses sober living homes, behavioral health residential facilities, and outpatient clinics, among other facilities and we are utilizing our licensure oversight to support our partners in


this effort," said Jennie Cunico, interim director of ADHS. "We are working to implement measures to more easily find and eliminate bad actors from the behavioral health system. We encourage Arizonans to use AZCareCheck.com to review the status of all the facilities we license or our complaint portal, to submit a complaint."

AHCCCS has enacted holistic, system-wide strategies to find and eliminate fraudulent billing, including recommendations from the Arizona Attorney General's Office:

- Moving three behavioral health provider types to the high-risk category for new applicants and revalidating providers, which requires on-site visits, fingerprinting, background checks, a registration fee, and additional disclosures,
- Reviewing all existing claims edits which differ from national standards and setting specific rates for current "by report" billing that pay a percentage of the total billed amount instead of a standard rate,
- Creating a trend report of all providers registering for the at-risk provider types and closely monitoring any billing anomalies,
- Creating system reporting to flag concerning claims (volume, services per day, services for minors) for review prior to payment, and
- Setting billing thresholds to deny claims for multiple services that should not be billed on the same day, and more.

Winds blow softly as if whispering, those that left the moment they gave, they have left an imprint, that they cared completely.

Story of old, says our Ancestors don't go away they walk beside us everyday unseen, unheard, but always near. They are missed very dearly. After the late Rosabelle Powsey's passing in her honor, the Valentine Memorial was respectfully stopped for a year, since she was a descendant of Chief Schrum.

Rosabelle's mother, the late Eva Schrum, in honor of Chief Schrum started a yearly commemoration at her home in Valentine, Arizona for all deceased Hualapai's and deceased Hualapai Veterans.

Eva Schrum whom is a Salt singer sang alongside the late Sherman Whatoname under the arbor on Memorial Day in Valentine, other Hualapai Salt Singers were Jacob and Jane Honga, Beth Wauneka, Nanny Lee Nish (whom are sisters), Gladys Whatoname and Elnora Mapatis.

As they sang in solemn respect with meaning and understanding for their tribe, the late Oleda Benson from the Paiute Tribe, sang along side them. Their singing was in harmony as their voices blended, it had the pleasing effect which was comforting and soothing to the soul.

One Memorial Day, Eva covered the arbor with a cover that resembled a parachute which represented her late son, Franklin Schrum who belonged with the 82nd Airborne. 




