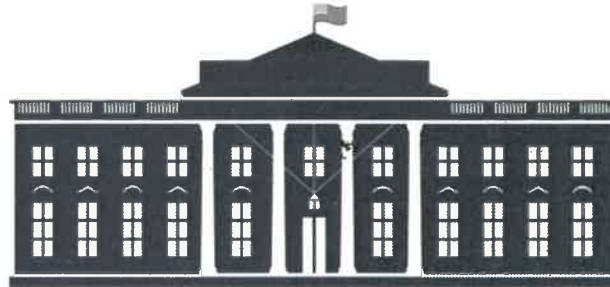

Brackeen**

I stand alongside Tribal Nations as they celebrate today's Supreme Court decision. This lawsuit sought to undermine the Indian Child Welfare Act – a vital law I was proud to support. The Indian Child Welfare Act was passed to protect the future of Tribal Nations and promote the best interests of Native children, and it does just that. The touchstone law respects tribal sovereignty and protects Native children by helping Native families stay together and, whenever possible, keeping children with their extended families or community who already know them, love them, and can help them understand who they are as Native people and citizens of their Tribal Nations. The Indian Child Welfare Act safeguards that which is most precious to us all—our children. Today's decision from the Supreme Court keeps in place a vital protection for tribal sovereignty and Native children.

Our Nation's painful history looms large over today's decision. In the not-so-distant past, Native children were stolen from the arms of the people who loved them. They were sent to boarding schools or to be raised by non-Indian families—all with the aim of erasing who they are as Native people and tribal citizens. These were acts of unspeakable cruelty that affected generations of Native children and threatened the very survival of Tribal Nations. The Indian Child Welfare Act was our Nation's promise: never again.

Tribal Nations fought hard to pass the Indian Child Welfare Act, and I am proud to have joined them in the ongoing efforts to defend it. Vice President Harris and I will continue to stand with Tribes to protect Native children, honor tribal sovereignty, and safeguard the essential principals of the Indian Child Welfare Act.

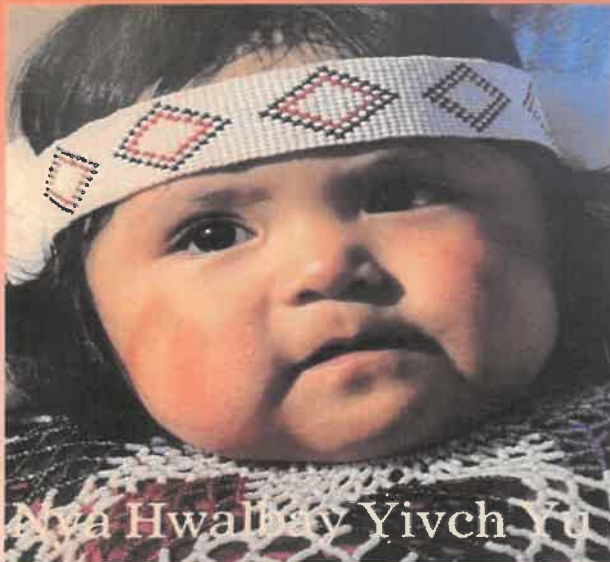

Cultural Class 2: Stories

Cultural Class 3: Cultural Geography

Cultural Class 4: Ethnobotany

Each quiz coincides with the email address that it comes from, thus each student/individual must request for the test to receive their own quiz. This helps keep track through an Excel spreadsheet automatically generated on Google Forms.

After passing each quiz, you will receive a certificate of completion by email. It is your responsibility to turn in your certificate to the Tribal Office to begin the process of your per capita trust payout. Hualapai Cultural Resource Center is not responsible for filling out any forms or turning in certificates of completions to the Tribal Office.

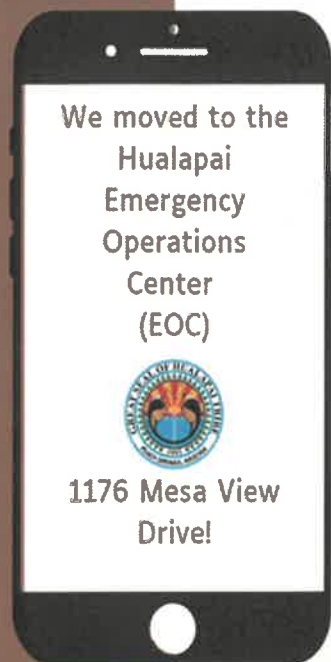

What is typical for other children may not be the same as yours.***

While every child develops at their own pace, there are certain milestones they should reach from birth to 5 years old in how they play, learn, speak, behave and move. Skills such as taking first steps, speaking words or phrases and self-control are considered developmental milestones. The early years are important for parents to keep an eye on how their child is developing. Intervention works best when potential delays and disabilities are screened early.



If you are a parent or caregiver of a child 5 years old and younger, you can make a difference by monitoring your child's physical, mental, social and emotional development and talking about what you see with your child's health care provider. This is not a way to find something "wrong", instead, it should be viewed as an opportunity for parents and health care provider to work together to keep your child developing in the best way possible.

- Keep notes about and document issues that you are concerned about.
- Take pictures of your child doing a specific task.
- Record audios or videos on your phone of behaviors that concern you.

- Write down your questions and take them with you so you remember what to ask and tell your child's primary care provider during your appointment.

First Things First reminds parents that all children develop at different rates. What is typical for other children may not be the same as yours. If a doctor tells you there is nothing to be concerned about, ask what you can do at home to support your child's development. If a doctor or other professional tells you that there are concerns about your child, follow up and act right away.

Resources

There are several resources available to help parents and caregivers identify concerns about a child's development:

- For one-on-one parenting support, reach out to Hualapai Early Childhood Home Visitation (HECHV) at 928-769-2588 Ext. 242, in the Health Education and Wellness building. Parent Educators provide information about children's development covering their cognitive (brain), language, social-emotional, fine and gross (small and large muscles).
- Call the toll-free, statewide Birth to 5 Helpline (1-877-705-5437). Nurses and child development experts are available to talk with you about your child, give you tips on which milestones they should have achieved for their age, and help you decide if a follow up with your health provider is needed.
- Contact Raising Special Kids if you have a developmental concern you want addressed (info@raisingspecialkids.org), or if you think your child needs screening or further assessment.

What is WIC?

WIC is a nutrition program that helps families feed their children healthy foods. WIC provides nutrition information, healthy foods, and help accessing health care to moderate to low-income families. The program is available to families with pregnant women, new mothers, and children under the age of five.

What Can WIC Offer My Family?

Benefits that can be used at the grocery store to buy healthy foods like milk, yogurt, whole grains, beans, juice, eggs, cheese, cereal, peanut butter and fruit and vegetables. Information about nutrition and health to help you and your family eat well and be healthy. Help with breastfeeding your baby, Help in finding health care and other community services, and Breast pumps to help you breastfeed even when you return to work

Can My Family Enroll In WIC?

WIC is for all kinds of families – families with married or single parents and those who are working or not working. WIC has different requirements than SNAP (Food Stamps) so even if you don't qualify for SNAP, you may still qualify for WIC. If you are a father, mother, grandparent, foster parent or other legal guardian of a child under 5 years of age, you can apply for your child.

If you are a woman who is pregnant, breastfeeding, or has a baby up to six months old, you can apply for yourself.

REQUIRED Documents:

- 1. Identification for all clients**
- 2. Proof of residency**
- 3. Proof of income**

Examples of proof of identification are:

Driver's License or state issued identification card
 Birth certificate
 Immunization record
 Tribal enrollment card
 Social security card
 AHCCCS card
 Hospital card for newborn baby

Examples of proof of residency are:

Driver's License or State issued ID Card

Bank statement

Utility bill

Payroll stub

Rent/lease agreement

Tribal enrollment card (if address is on card)

If you are pregnant, you may count your unborn child as a family member.

Examples of proof of income are:

Current pay stub including the pay time frame

Most recent year's income tax return

Letter from employer stating your current pay

Tribal per capita check stub.

TANF benefit letter

Social security/DES benefit letter or check stub

* You are automatically income eligible for WIC services if you currently receive TANF, SNAP (Food Stamps) or Medicaid (AHCCCS).

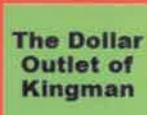

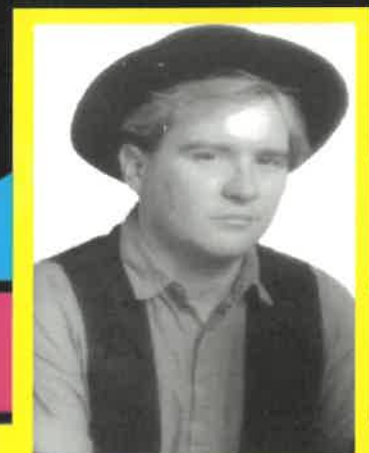
