Article V. (N) of the Hualapai Tribe Constitution says that leases involving more than \$50,000 shall need the approval of the eligible voters of the tribe voting in a Special Election.

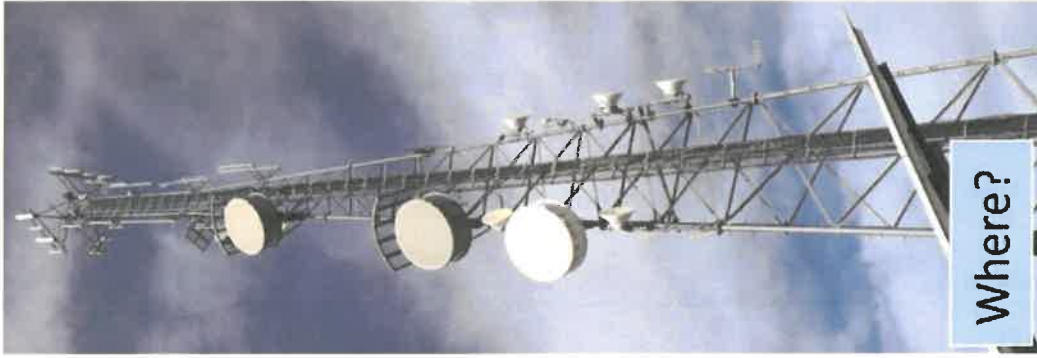
Verizon is upgrading their network connection to the internet (backhaul) and should be complete in the first part of 2024.

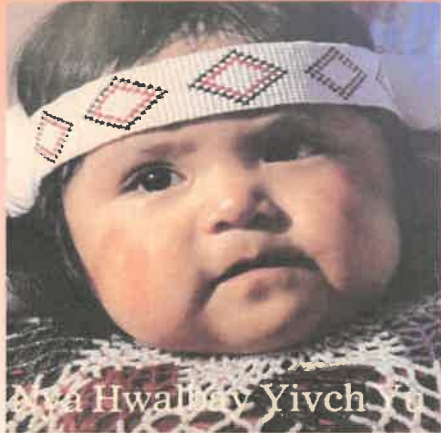

The Hualapai Master Plan Update Committee is scheduled to hold its Seventh meeting on Tuesday, November 28, 2023, beginning 5:00 PM at the Multi-Purpose Building, located at 470 Hualapai Drive in Peach Springs.

The 18-member Committee was formed by Hualapai Tribal Council on March 6, 2023, with the task of updating the tribe's existing draft Master Plan. The Master Plan is a statement of community values and aspirations, written as goals and policies, and shown on maps and diagrams. This will be the primary tool for managing community change to achieve the desired quality of life for tribal members living on the

reservation, trust lands and private property owned by the tribe.

HUALAPAI MASTER PLAN MEETING #5

Meeting Notes

Meeting Date: September 12, 2023, 5:55 PM

Multi-Purpose Building, 470 Hualapai Way, Peach Springs, AZ

1. DINNER at 5:25 PM

2. CALL TO ORDER – Chairman Robert Bravo called the meeting to order at 5:55 PM.

3. ROLL CALL:

Present:

Andrea Nieto, Camille Nighthorse, Gensean Havatone-Putesoy, Heather Nieto, Joyce Powskey, Longfeather Fox, Manny Siyuja, Marilyn Vaughn, Martina Dawley, and Robert Bravo

Absent:

Cheryle Beecher, Clay Bravo (excused), Deborah Saganitso (excused), Loretta Jackson-Kelly (excused), Nick Hunter (excused), Raelene Havatone, Shana Talieje (excused) & Sharon Wilder.

Also in attendance were Kevin Davidson of Hualapai Planning & Economic Development Department and Nona Baheshone, Facilitator, Bahozhoni Development LLC.

Chairman Robert Bravo requested approval of the meeting agenda. Committee adopted agenda by consensus.

4. MINUTES:

Chairman Bravo requested a motion to approve the August 9, 2023, meeting minutes. Motion to approve by Andrea Nieto and second by Manny Siyuja. Meeting minutes were approved by unanimous vote.

Chairman Bravo opened the discussion on HMPUC member attendance by saying that he had spoken to Ms. Wilder who informed him that she would like to resign. Mr. Davidson said he also talked to Ms. Saganitso earlier that day and she is also looking to resign given her job commitment to community support meetings which are also held on Tuesday nights. Should we appoint new members to fill these vacancies? Tribal council appointed 18 members to the HMPUC in anticipation of some attrition over the 14-month development process. The HMPUC agreed that if new people want to join the Committee, they should attend a meeting to get a feel for what we are all about.

Mr. Davidson noted that the tribe has recently hired Southwest Business Development Consultants out of Albuquerque, New Mexico, to create a tribal tourism plan for the reservation and trust properties. SWBDC will be holding a kick-off meeting shortly with the tribe and Mr. Davidson would like representation from the HMPUC to be on the tourism plan steering committee. The goal is to have the tribal tourism plan ready for tribal council review by May of 2024. The tourism plan will influence the goals of the Master Plan's Economic Development, Land Use, and Infrastructure Elements.

To continue the discussion on public outreach and getting more people to show-up to the community meetings, Chairman Bravo recommended a raffle with prizes of some value. Martina Dawley said to keep people interested in the planning process, they need to feel that their input is taken seriously by the Committee. Heather Nieto recommended the Committee prepare a survey to gather more input and Mr. Siyuja advised we add a QR code to the survey. Andrea Nieto also recommended we prepare a paper survey for the elderly since not all seniors have smart phones. Mr. Davidson said he also had a request from the Ms. Imus of Peach Springs Unified School District to have members of the HMPUC come to the

elementary school to explain what the Master Plan is and how it will affect them. Mr. Davidson said he was able to obtain a template to create a youth-friendly presentation and will share it at the next HMUPC meeting.

5. PROJECT SCHEDULE:

Mr. Davidson noted that this is the Committee's fifth meeting where we will review the Vision Statement from the 2012 Master Plan as well as assess the existing goals and objectives to see if they are still relevant.

6. VISION STATEMENT UPDATE:

To begin, the Vision Statement reads as follows:

WE ARE HUALAPAI! WE ARE A NATIVE PEOPLE WHO FOR MILLENNIA HAVE LIVED ON THE LAND OF OUR ANCESTORS.

WE ARE THE CANYON KEEPERS.

WE ARE A COMMUNITY THAT WORKS TO CREATE A PROMISING FUTURE FOR OUR CHILDREN.

WE ARE AMERICANS WHO LOVE AND FIGHT FOR OUR COUNTRY.

WE ARE CHILDREN OF ANCESTORS WHO TAUGHT US TO HONOR THE CREATOR, RESPECT MOTHER EARTH, TO VALUE ALL LIVING THINGS.

WE ARE ANCESTORS TO FUTURE GENERATIONS WITH A RESPONSIBILITY TO CARRY ON OUR LANGUAGE, CULTURE, AND TRADITIONS.

WE ARE THE PEOPLE OF THE TALL PINES – WE ARE HUALAPAI!

Chairman Bravo and Ms. Dawley recommended we remove "canyon keepers" from the statement given that other tribe's also claim this role. In the interest of brevity, the Committee agreed that the last two lines provide the essence of the Hualapai vision: *WE ARE ANCESTORS TO FUTURE GENERATIONS WITH A RESPONSIBILITY TO CARRY ON OUR LANGUAGE, CULTURE, AND TRADITIONS. WE ARE THE PEOPLE OF THE TALL PINES – WE ARE HUALAPAI!*

7. PLAN ELEMENTS UPDATE:

Mr. Davidson next turned to the homework assignment given at the August 9, 2023, Committee meeting, and thanked the five committee members who provided their recommendations to "keep," "remove" or "modify" the wording before tonight's meeting,

Land Use Element:

Land Use Goal 1: To recognize the distinct character of individual planning areas and encourage land use patterns that are consistent with the goals of the Master Plan and each area's own objectives.

The Committee decided to modify the goal by removing "individual" from the statement.

Objective 1.1 Locate future urban development, where practical, within or adjacent to existing urban areas to eliminate sprawl and strip development, to assure the provision of adequate urban services, to preserve agriculture, forestry, and open space land uses, and to maximize the use of funds invested in public facilities and services.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as written.

Objective 1.2 Establish diverse, compatible, and functional land use patterns and, when necessary, amend the existing land use pattern to prevent urban and rural decay.

The Committee decided to remove "rural and urban" from the statement and replace with "built environment."

Objective 1.3 Establish and maintain a functional balance between employment opportunities and available housing to meet the needs of the community.

The Committee decided to re-word the objective as follows:

Objective 1.3: Identify and implement a functional balance between employment opportunities and available housing.

Objective 1.4 Create quality residential areas which function as integral neighborhood units with schools, parks, and other community service facilities as their centers.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 1.5 Create adequate regional, community and neighborhood commercial facilities that are compatible with adjoining land uses.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 1.6 Design commercial and industrial development to provide an attractive safe and healthy environment which does not have an adverse impact upon the surrounding areas.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Housing Element:

Housing Goal 1: Maintain current housing stock in a safe, sanitary, comfortable, and affordable manner.

The Committee decided to keep Goal 1 as written.

Objective 1.1 Modernize and rehabilitate existing, eligible units including those which have been previously conveyed.

The Committee requested "rehabilitate" be replaced with "renovate."

Objective 1.2 Provide a crime prevention program and security program with previous year's program funding.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 1.3 Provide fencing to homes and HUD funded parks to reduce gang, trespassing, and intrusion related crimes.

The Committee decided to remove this objective.

Objective 1.4 Reduce drug related crimes through the coordination with the local Tribal Police Department.

The Committee requested this objective be modified based on Housing's policies. Planning will research further.

Housing Goal 2: Maintain a viable housing department for all eligible tenants within all programs available for home occupancy offered by the Hualapai Housing Department.

The Committee requested the language of the goal be reworded for clarity by stating "Hualapai Housing Department" in the first part of the goal statement.

Objective 2.1 Complete, review, and revise as necessary program budgets for all existing funds to ensure compliance and congruence with the approved Indian Housing Plans.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 2.2 Review and update Hualapai Housing Department Policies and Procedures. Seek community input on policy development and implementation.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 2.3 Develop a "sweat equity" program and policies to assist tenants with paying arrears and/or damages to help families maintain current housing assistance.

The Committee decided to remove this objective.

Objective 2.4 Provide budgeting and home maintenance education to tenants within the housing programs.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 2.5 Provide continual information to tenants on lease compliance through public flyers and inserts with billing statements.

The Committee decided to remove this objective.

Objective 2.6 Provide eligible youth activities and opportunities.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 2.7 Complete an annual self-monitoring assessment.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 2.8 Adopt policies and ordinances to support housing finance programs and projects.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Housing Goal 3: Create new housing opportunities for eligible applicants.

The Committee decided to keep the goal as stated.

Objective 3.1 Utilize current needs assessment to plan for new housing units.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 3.2 Coordinate with the local Bureau of Indian Affairs, Indian Health Service, and Tribal Departments to ensure adequate population counts.

Mr. Davidson advised the Committee add US Census Bureau to the list of coordinating agencies to ensure accurate population counts. The Committee agreed to this modification.

Objective 3.3 Appraise and acquire Part 137 homes to rehabilitate and place back into the Housing Department stock.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 3.4 Provide information to the community on new housing development and encourage input.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 3.5 Provide a rental assistance program for low-income students through an education assistance program.

The Committee agreed the "low-income" should be removed from the statement.

Objective 3.6 Commission a study on home financing mechanisms, including the requirements for qualifying for guaranteed loan programs and policy requirements for tax credit financing.

The Committee requested this objective be modified to assign the Housing Department the task of commissioning the study.

Objective 3.7 Create and implement a Comprehensive Housing Plan to establish a housing construction program.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 3.8 Ensure decent housing for all persons by encouraging a diversity of housing types and housing densities.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Housing Goal 4: Maintain 1937 Act units in a safe and sanitary manner.

The Committee asked Planning to research how many tribal homes constructed under the 1937 Housing Act were still in Housing's rental program to see if this goal is still relevant.¹

Objective 4.1 Prioritize a maintenance and modernization schedule.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 4.2 Appraise and acquire units to be rehabilitated and placed back into the housing stock.

The Committee asked that this objective be modified to allow Housing to set aside funding for the real estate appraisals and home purchases.

Housing Goal 5: Utilize the housing programs to co-locate housing with Tribal employment opportunities.

The Committee decided to keep the goal as stated.

Objective 5.1 Assist in completing infrastructure at Grand Canyon West to support new housing.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 5.2 Obtain funding for new houses and rental opportunities at Grand Canyon West.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 5.3 Renovate dilapidated unoccupied houses in Peach Springs and add to housing stock to increase housing commensurate with new jobs.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 5.4 Plan and develop housing at Frazier Wells simultaneously with economic project development.

The Committee decided to remove this objective.

Objective 5.5 Coordinate with Frazier Wells economic development to establish identified subdivisions and infrastructure.

The Committee decided to remove this objective.

Objective 5.6 Construct in-fill housing.

The Committee requested this objective be modified as follows:

Objective 5.6 Construct in-fill housing as identified on the Land Use diagram.

Housing Goal 6: Continue and enhance development that promotes smart growth, public health, energy conservation, operational savings, and sustainable building practices in affordable design.

The Committee decided to keep the goal as stated.

¹ The concrete block homes constructed in AZ17-1 and AZ17-2 were built under the 1937 Housing Act. Planning has asked Housing how many units have been conveyed to private ownership and how many are still in Housing's rental program.

Objective 6.1 Create a high-quality, healthy living environment.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 6.2 Conserve energy to minimize Tribal utility costs.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 6.3 Construct new homes and rehabilitate existing housing to be energy efficient and reduce water use.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 6.4 Advance the health of local and regional ecosystems.

The Committee requested "advance" be replaced with "enhance."

Objective 6.5 The Tribe shall adopt the 2008 (or latter edition) Green Communities Criteria as developed by Enterprise Community Partners, Inc.

The Committee decided to remove this objective.

The Committee requested a new objective addressing "tiny homes" to serve the housing needs of the community. Planning will research language for this new objective.

Public Buildings & Facilities Element:

Public Buildings & Facilities Goal 1: Increase needed Public Facility operations in the core area of Peach Springs.

The Committee decided to keep the goal as stated.

Objective 1.1 Obtain more efficient use of existing public facilities, particularly those that have potential for multiple usage.

Mr. Davidson advised the language to be modified in light of the community's request for a dedicated cry house.

Objective 1.1 Obtain more efficient use of existing public facilities, particularly those that have potential for multiple usage where appropriate and in accordance with Hualapai tradition and custom.

The Committee agreed to this modification.

Objective 1.2 Expand existing facilities that are pre-planned for expansion to relieve overcrowding at minimal expense.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 1.3 Enhance the ability to take advantage of project funding as it is available.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 1.4 Construct new facilities in accordance with this Plan's prioritizations.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Public Buildings & Facilities Goal 2: Eliminate gaps in Public Facility funding for Tribal services and facilities.

The Committee requested the goal be modified to distinguish between funding spent on capital improvements and funding operations and maintenance as follows:

Goal 2: Project submittals will include estimates of all project development costs, including off-site costs of extending infrastructure, with the facility operations and maintenance expenses being listed separately.

Objective 2.1 Project submittals will include estimates of all project costs, including the facility, operations, maintenance, and off-site expenses.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 2.2 Project funding activities will clearly illustrate gaps in funding that will directly impact the Hualapai General Fund.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 2.3 Stakeholders in Public Facility projects will be involved in formulating all aspects of service operations.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Public Buildings & Facilities Goal 3: Establish 'service cores' in association with Tribal expansion to new development areas.

The Committee decided to keep the goal as stated.

Objective 3.1 The final detailed Master Plan for each development area will include reserved spaces for local satellite services that will be needed in the future.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 3.2 The overall development plan for each area will include consideration of the project demands, infrastructure, intra-service communications and coordination needed to extend the identified services to each service core.

The Committee decided to remove the objective.

Objective 3.3 Public Facility development will be commensurate with actual identified needs, as given in this Master Plan, unless time-specific alterations are deemed necessary.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 3.4 Establish necessary ordinances to support community facilities financing and on-going programs.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Public Buildings & Facilities Goal 4: Augment public information regarding Public Facility needs and implementations.

The Committee decided to keep the goal as stated.

Objective 4.1 Resolve Tribal Member misunderstandings regarding services that are provided and the facility conditions under which those services are provided.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Objective 4.2 Maintain Tribal Member consensus regarding Council-approved Public Facility priorities.

The Committee decided to add "building" after "facility" to the objective.

Objective 4.3 Obtain additional support for achieving project funding.

The Committee decided to keep the objective as stated.

Economic Development Element:

Economic Development Goal 1: Support commercial development that is determined by the residents and Tribal government to serve the needs of the residents and tourists while honoring traditional Hualapai values and enhancing the quality of life on the Reservation.

The Committee requested the goal be modified as follows:

Goal 1: Support commercial development that is determined by the tribe to serve the needs of the tribal members while honoring traditional Hualapai values and enhancing the quality of life on the Reservation.

Economic Development Goal 2: Encourage diversified and balanced economic development activity that focuses on local employment opportunities at existing population centers.

The Committee requested the goal be modified as follows:

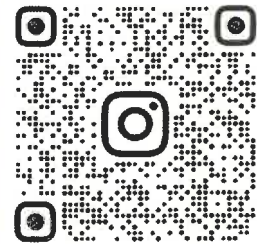

- A 20 inch rubber ball will be used during game.
- Coin toss will determine which team will serve the ball to start the game.
- Points are based on rally point system, meaning a team can score points without serving the ball. Games will be played to 15.
- The losing team will serve to began next set.
- Players must wait until the referee blows the whistle before serving.
- Rotation is clockwise.
- All players must be seated in a chair or their wheelchair and remain seated during the entire game. You must remain seated while playing if you get out of your seat the other team will get a point and awarded the ball.
- One Cheek Rule - players are allowed to lean out of chair if one cheek remains in contact with chair.
- There is a max of 3 hits to return the ball.
- NO SPIKING from the front row. The second row is allowed to spike.

First Things First • Expert Advice on Shopping with a Toddler: “They’re Not Trying to Be Naughty”

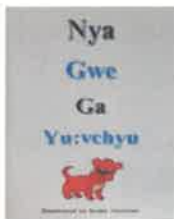

Expert advice on shopping with a toddler: “They’re not trying to be naughty.”

A shopping trip is full of new sights, sounds, people and activities that can be quite intense for your little one.

Grocery shopping with a toddler can be pretty challenging. As a parent, you want to do the best you can to help your child learn and grow, but you also have a bunch of stuff to get done, and your little one doesn’t always seem to want to cooperate. DeAnn Davies — the director for early childhood and pediatric psychology at Summit Healthcare in Show Low — has some advice on how you can make these outings less stressful and more positive for you and your child.



Timing is everything.

“First and foremost, you want to make sure it’s a good time for your toddler to go to the store,” says DeAnn. Avoiding those times when they’re over-tired, hungry or cranky to begin with is pretty solid, common-sense advice. But as any parent knows, a young kid’s mood can change quickly and without warning.

See things from their point of view.

Keep in mind that a shopping trip is full of new sights, sounds, people and activities that can be quite intense for your little one. “A store is a very overwhelming place for a young child to be. They just don’t ignore sounds and stimulation like adults do, or even older children do. They’re taking it all in,” says DeAnn.

Understand child development, and be realistic.

Young children learn by exploring and experiencing new things. So what might seem like bad behavior is usually the result of their drive to learn. “We put them in a cart and toddlers don’t like to do that. They need to be up and running around and learning about everything. So if they’re challenging you in a store, they’re not trying to be naughty. The opposite is true. When we restrict toddlers for too long, we are asking too much of them at that age.”

When things go wrong, just do the best you can.

Even with your best planning, you may at some point find yourself with an upset child in public. Everyone has the occasional bad day, and your child may have theirs in the middle of the checkout line. But take heart. Says DeAnn, “If you do have an incident, and other people are looking at you, and you just need to get out of the store, keep this in mind: I’m going to tell you parenting is hard, and that’s all there is to it. Get through it the best you can, and try not to let the judgments of other people bother you. That’s really their issue, not yours.” Life can be busy for parents of young children. And challenging and frustrating and exhausting. And also fulfilling and wonderful and pretty amazing. Sometimes all at the same time.

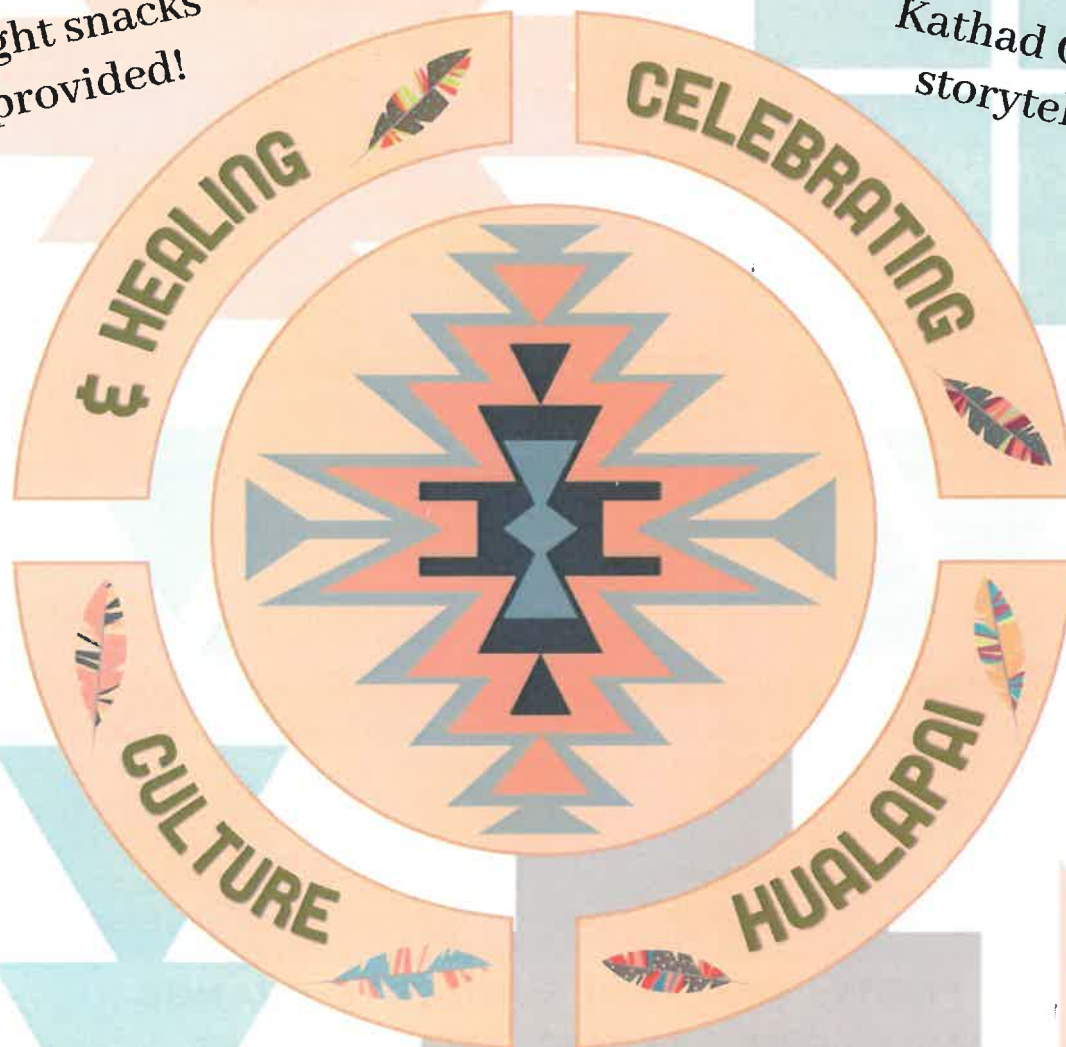

Facts for Parents and Caregivers: Alcohol

Alcohol

Facts for Parents and Caregivers

Parents are the leading influence on their kids' decision to drink or not to drink. Start talking to your kids early and often.

Alcohol is a drug.

Alcohol is a depressant, which means it slows down the function of the brain. Alcohol affects people differently at different stages of life—for children and adolescents, alcohol can interfere with normal brain development. Your child's brain is not fully developed until around the age of 25. As a result, the harms from drinking alcohol can alter the development of the areas of the brain related to learning, memory, and judgment. In general, underage drinking can lead your child to make poor decisions and engage in risky/harmful behavior that can result in a variety of serious consequences such as injuries, sexual assaults, legal trouble, and even death.

Why is underage drinking a problem?

Addiction

A teen's brain is much more susceptible to alcohol dependence than an adult's. Alcohol tricks the brain's pleasure-reward system into generating pleasure-reward feelings from a harmful chemical instead of a real experience. Because the teen brain produces an abundance of dopamine, it can rapidly go from liking, to wanting, to craving alcohol.

Youth who start drinking before age 15 are 3.5 times more likely to develop an alcohol use disorder in their lifetime than people who start drinking at or after age 21.

What can you do?

- Talk to your child about the real cost of drinking alcohol.
- Protect, Don't Provide.
- Get tips on how to talk to your kids about alcohol at TalkNowAZ.com

Brain Development

The use of alcohol during adolescence can alter brain development, potentially resulting in long-lasting changes in brain structure and function. Underage alcohol use can cause damage to the areas of the brain that control memory, emotional regulation, learning, and decision making.

Binge Drinking

When young people drink, they drink a lot at one time. On average, young people have about 5 drinks on a single occasion. This is called binge drinking, a very dangerous way of drinking that can lead to serious problems and even death.

Protect, Don't Provide

Underage drinking is not a rite of passage, it's against the law. In Arizona, providing alcohol to a minor is a class 1 misdemeanor. It is not "cool" to host parties or gatherings where underage drinking occurs. As a host, you can be held legally responsible for any injuries caused by an underage person who consumes alcohol in your home. Protect your kids, don't provide them with alcohol.

December is National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Month*Submitted by: Jessica Powskey | Hualapai Health, Education & Wellness***December is National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Month**

December is National 3D Month or National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Month, which stemmed from MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving), and the mission statement expanded to include drug-impaired driving. This particular month was selected due to the spike in traffic-related deaths between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day.

At the beginning of this year's holiday shopping, there was a decrease in online purchases and an increase in face-to-face purchases, which reflects that many people are interested in being around others versus than being online. It can also be an educated guess that there is probably an increase in social gatherings with the options of drinking or using drugs since social groups or anything face-to-face was not encouraged last year.

North Carolina is one of the eighteen states that adopted the standard; if any detectable amount of controlled substance is found in a driver's system, other than legally prescribed medicine, the driver will be charged with drugged driving. Compared to drunk driving, drivers are allowed a small amount of alcohol in their system and can still drive.

Anxiety, depression, PTSD, conduct disorder, anti-social personality disorder, and stress are some factors that may contribute to drunk and drugged driving.

Cognitive Behavioral Therapy is a short-term, solution-oriented approach to help identify negative thoughts/behaviors and replace them with positive thoughts/behaviors. Motivational Interviewing is also a brief-client-centered approach concentrating on improving and strengthening a client's motivation for change. This specific technique is selected when someone is less motivated or ready for a change in parallel with other therapy modalities.

The engagement of these two common modalities can help someone make better choices to avoid drunk and drugged driving.

Now Accepting Housing Improvement Program (HIP) Applications

The Housing Improvement Program is a home repair, renovation and replacement grant program administered by the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) and federally-recognized Indian Tribes for American Indians and Alaska Native individuals and families who have no immediate resource for standard housing. To be eligible for HIP assistance, you must be a member of a federally recognized American Indian tribe or be an Alaska Native; live in an approved tribal service area; have an income that does not exceed 125% of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Poverty Guidelines; have present housing that is substandard, as defined in the regulations 25 CFR, Part 256; have no other resource for housing assistance; have not received HIP assistance after October 1, 1986 for repairs, renovation, replacement or housing, or down payment assistance; and have not acquired your present housing through a federally sponsored housing program that includes such housing assistance. Interested applicants should contact Michelle Zephier for an Application Package containing the application, guidelines, and required supporting documentation necessary in order to qualify for eligibility. Complete applications and all supporting documentation is due by **November 29, 2023**.

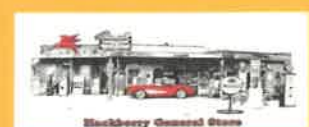
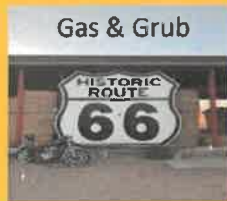

Individual Federally-recognized Indian tribe's participation is mandatory and their direct administration of the HIP is encouraged. The selection of eligible families or individuals for HIP services is done through a screening process by assigning points to specific ranking factors documented in the application.

Individuals wishing to apply for HIP assistance must complete this application and submit it to either their local BIA Agency office or designated Tribal HIP office, if operated under P.L. 93-638 contract or P.L. 103-413 Self-Governance compact.

PRIVACY ACT NOTICE: Pursuant to Section 3(e) (3) of the Privacy Act of 1975 (P.L. 93-579), individuals furnishing information on this application form are hereby advised:

1. The authority for solicitation of the information is 25 U. S. C. 13 and the Bureau of Indian Affairs HIP regulation at 25 CFR Part 256.
2. The information collected will be used to determine an applicant's eligibility and to set priority ranking for assistance under the HIP regulations.
3. The disclosure of this information is voluntary. Failure to provide the information required to support the verification process will result in the denial of the application. Incomplete applications will not be considered. The information provided in this application may be made available to authorized sources for verification purposes upon request.

USE OF SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER: The disclosure of your Social Security Number is not required in the completion of this application.

CERTIFICATION: Certification is made with the knowledge that the information will be used to determine eligibility to receive housing assistance. ITEM C - Income Information: Enter the total annual household income of all family members, including all earned and unearned income as defined in 25 CFR Part 20, Subpart C – Direct Assistance. The sections that are applicable to this application are: 20.307, 20.308, 20.309 and 20.310.

The following detailed definition of income is from the Bureau of Indian Affairs' Financial Assistance and Social Services Program Regulations, 25 CFR Part 20 Subpart C - Direct Assistance shall be applied to HIP applications.

Income from Indian gaming is not considered part of this statutory exclusion.

- (1) "Earned income" is cash or any in-kind payment earned in the form of wages, salary, commissions, or profit from activities by an employee or self-employed individual.
Earned income includes:
 - (a) Any one-time payment to an individual for activities which were sustained over a period of time (for examples, the sale of farm crops, livestock or professional artists producing act work);
 - (b) With regard to self-employment, total profit from business enterprise (i.e., gross receipts less expenses incurred in producing the goods and services). Business expenses do not include depreciation, personal business and entertainment expenses, personal transportation, capital equipment purchases, or principal payments on loans for capital assets or durable goods.
 - (2) "Unearned income" includes, but is not limited to:
 - (a) Income from interest; oil and gas and other mineral royalties; gaming income per capita distributions; rental property; cash contributions, such as child support and alimony, gaming winnings; retirement benefits;
 - (b) Annuities, veteran's disability, unemployment benefits, federal and state tax refunds;
 - (c) Per capita payments not excluded by federal statute;
 - (d) Income from sale of trust land and real or personal property that is set aside for reinvestment in trust land or a primary residence, but has not been reinvested in trust land or a primary residence at the end of one year from the date the income was received;
 - (e) In-kind contributions providing shelter at no cost to the individual or household, this must equal the amount for shelter included in the state standard, or 25 percent of the state standard, whichever is less; and

- (f) Financial assistance provided by a state, tribal, county, local or other federal agency.

(3) The Bureau shall prorate:

- (a) Recurring income received by individuals over a 12-month period for less than a full year's employment (for example, income earned by teachers who are not employed for a full year);
- (b) Income received by individuals employed on a contractual basis over the term of a contract; and
- (c) Intermittent income received quarterly, semiannually or yearly over the period covered by the income.

ITEM D - Housing Assistance: Housing assistance in the form of repairs to bring a housing unit to a standard condition is for the applicant(s) who are living in their own home. The applicant must sign a written agreement that if he/she sells the house within five years following the date of completion of the repairs, the full amount of the assistance must be repaid to the BIA at the time of settlement. [25 CFR Part 256.9(d)]

The applicant needing construction of a new standard house must have ownership of the land on which the house is to be built. In the case of a leasehold interest, it must be for not less than 25 years. The applicant must sign a written agreement that if he/she sells the house within the first ten years from the date of ownership, the grant is voided and the full amount of the HIP grant will be repaid to the BIA at the time of settlement. [25 CFR Part 256.10]
