WEST WATER CONNECTION PROJECT

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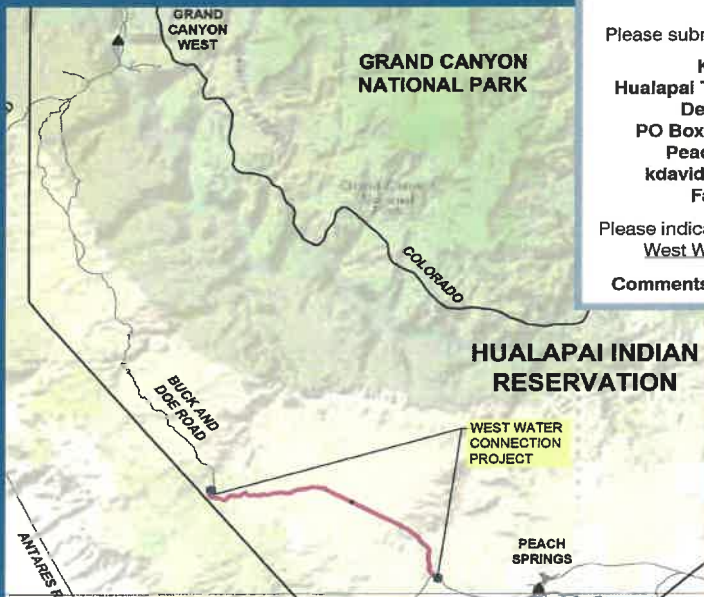
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The Hualapai Tribe, in cooperation with the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is seeking public comment on a proposal to install a new, potable water transmission line along Buck and Doe Road between the Peach Springs Water System and the water tanks at West Water. Currently, a water truck is used to fill the existing potable water tanks, making six trips per day between West Water and a fire hydrant on Buck and Doe Road. The project is needed to supply Grand Canyon West with a reliable, potable water source.

The new, potable water transmission line would impact a 16-mile corridor along Buck and Doe Road, between the Peach Springs Water System and West Water tanks. The new line would be installed primarily within the existing right-of-way and would include a new pump station and a vault to control water flow. Approximately 100 gallons of potable water would be delivered to the West Water tanks every minute.

Construction is anticipated to start in 2024. An Environmental Assessment would be prepared for the project as part of the BIA and USDA National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requirements, and Hualapai Tribal Environmental Review Commission procedures.

The Hualapai Tribe has prepared a Tribal Transportation Plan (TTP) to present to the BIA for the 2024-2028 transportation funding. FHWA/BIA Tribal Transportation Program funds will be used for salaries, roads maintenance, equipment purchases, supplies for road maintenance, and several capital projects that include a railroad bypass, a facility for transit and roads, road construction for box canyon residential area and youth camp, walking trail in Peach Springs from HEW to Route 66 park, safety improvements for Diamond Bar Road and Peach Springs Roads, Long Range Transportation Plan development, Road Inventory update, and PS&E for Buck and Doe Road.

The Hualapai Master Plan Update Committee is scheduled to complete its ninth meeting on Tuesday, February 6, 2024, beginning 5:00 PM at the Multi-Purpose Building, located at 470 Hualapai Drive in Peach Springs.

The 18-member Committee was formed by Hualapai Tribal Council on March 6, 2023, with the task of updating the tribe’s existing draft Master Plan. The Master Plan is a statement of community values and aspirations, written as goals and policies, and shown on maps and diagrams. This will be the primary tool for managing community change to achieve the desired quality of life for tribal members living on the reservation, trust lands and private property owned by the tribe.



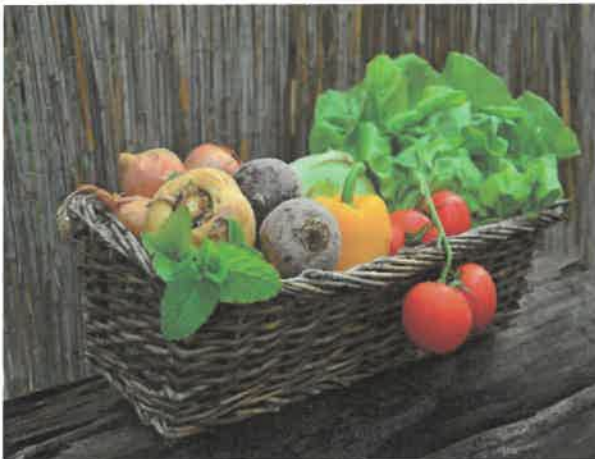

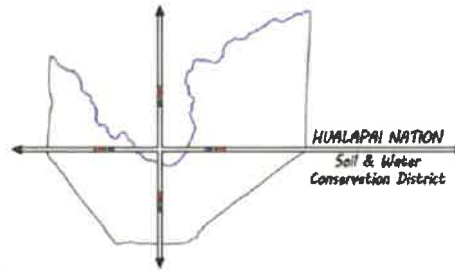

- Clothing receipts must be turned in 2 months from the date of the check
- Individuals who do not turn in receipts will not be eligible for any other benefits listed on the guidelines.

Utility Assistance (Household assistance):

*7-10 working day processing time for any utility bill.

\$850.00 - One applicant per household or head of household. *Phone card reimbursements are a utility/household assistance and are only processed for the primary applicant/head of household.

\$1,000.00 - Elderly Utility Assistance, one applicant per household or head of household.

\$1,000.00 - Disability Utility Assistance, one applicant per household or head of household.

\$1,000.00 - Elderly Social Service/home improvement 62 years and older. Paid to authorized stores: Home Depot, Sears Hometown, Lowes, Boyd's Sleep Center, and Aaron's.

Medical Assistance (Individual assistance):

*3-5 working days processing time per appointment. ABSOLUTELY NO EXCEPTIONS!

Travel - \$500.00 per Tribal member, per year. Room quotes are required for overnight stays to be included in travel amount. All receipts for travel assistance need to be turned in before another travel can be processed. Failure to comply will have any future assistance denied.

*Processing is depending on state of emergency (2-72 hours of admittance)

Hospitalization - \$2,000.00 per hospital stay. Patient is an enrolled tribal member. Only "immediate family" will qualify for this assistance. Hospital verification needs to be included by hospital or IHS case workers in order to receive the assistance for travel. Common law couples do not qualify for assistance. Receipts are due upon return of travel. Failure to comply will have future assistances denied.

*5-7 working day processing.

Vision - \$275.00 paid to Mountainview (Riverview) or Nationwide in Kingman, AZ. Reimbursements are available with original receipts attached to application.

Education Assistance (individual assistance):

Receipts from prior year(s) must be current/paid to receive assistance.

School clothing assistance - Include report card for previous semester/quarter and proof of current enrollment for each child.

Computer assistance - Include report card for previous semester/quarter and proof of current enrollment for each child. A family of 6 or more children can qualify for 2 computers per 4 year term, while 5 or less children in home can qualify for 1 computer per 4 year term.

Dental:

Braces - \$2,000.00 per tribal member, per lifetime; paid directly to dentistry.

Denture - \$2,000.00 per tribal member, per lifetime; paid directly to dentistry. This is to be used for traditional denture. This is not to be confused with routine dental work or emergency dental work. No bridge work or implants are to be used for this assistance.

THERE WILL BE NO EXPEDITED CHECKS. ALL REIMBURSEMENTS ARE MAILED OUT. ONCE ASSISTANCE IS PROCESSED, THERE IS A MAIL WAIT TIME OF 7-10 DAYS. ALL MAILING ADDRESSES NEED TO BE UPDATED WITH ENROLLMENT STAFF.

Chairman Robert Bravo requested a motion to approve the meeting agenda. Clay Bravo made a motion to approve the agenda and Raelene Havatone seconded. The committee approved the agenda unanimously.

Chairman Bravo requested a motion to approve the November 28, 2023, meeting minutes. Nick Hunter made a motion to approve the minutes with a second by Clay Bravo. Meeting minutes were approved unanimously.

Mr. Davidson began the presentation by noting this is the committee's tenth meeting (Meeting No. 5 was held in three parts) where the committee will continue to review the text of the Master Plan.

5. Highlights from the Land Use Element

The updated element includes, 1) revised land use diagrams and recommends revisions to existing land use plans for Grand Canyon West and Truxton Triangle, 2) added the Truxton Triangle, other lands recently placed into Trust for the tribe, and private properties, including Truckee, into the Priority Projects category, and 3) modified language for Goals and Policies.

Ms. Talieje noted it had been over a decade since the tribe requested commercial use on its 203-acre property in Truckee so we should approach the new town council and planning and zoning commission with a new development proposal. Chairman Bravo said he was part the tribe's 2007 effort to rezone the property and said the town set up a series of meetings with the tribal delegation to determine what the tribe was seeking. Mr. Bravo reviewed the tribe's efforts to deal with the Truckee property while he was on tribal council and noted little success. Future development proposals for Truckee should be voted on by the tribal membership. Martina Dawley requested the question of Truckee's development be posed at the next public meeting. Raelene Havatone advised that we educate younger members about Truckee.

Mr. Bravo advised the tribe to focus its efforts on purchasing Truxton, the community adjoining the reservation's southern boundary. This will help preserve the tribe's water supply in Hatch Valley, part of the Peach Springs Drainage Basin, which is largely outside of the reservation and beyond the tribe's control. Speaking of Truxton, Ms. Nighthorse said she had come across written documentation from 1881 showing that the reservation's southern boundary should have included Truxton. In addition, Clay Springs, Grass Springs, and Pine Springs were also left outside of the surveyed boundary of the reservation in 1883. Mr. Bravo said he has seen the rock cairns set by the US Army marking the original boundary and said Diamond Bar Ranch should also have been part of the reservation. Ms. Nighthorse said when she was a member of the Grand Canyon Resort Corporation (GCRC) Board, the tribe was considering purchasing the ranch which was located some four miles west of the reservation's western boundary.

Returning to the water issue, Cherlye Beecher asked if the tribe's Clay Springs water deal with the Neal and Grounds Families was still in effect. Mr. Bravo said the deal is between the tribe and AT&SF where the water right is divided equally between the tribe and the ranchers. Mr. Davidson noted Arizona's 1980 Inter-basin Transfer Law which will likely not allow water from Clay Springs to be pumped up to the main body of the reservation. Clay Bravo requested Planning research the water deal.¹ Ms. Talieje noted a few minor grammatical corrections to the Sections on Peach Springs (2.5.5) and Hunt Ranch (2.5.9).

Moving to Section 2.5.10, Ms. Bravo asked about the tribe's plans for Cholla Canyon Ranch. Should the tribe declare the hot springs at Cholla Canyon Ranch a living body akin to the designation given to the Colorado River? Ms. Dawley noted the tribe seems unwilling to challenge the supposed expertise of the federal government's officials when it comes to natural resource-related issues, namely the impact of lithium mining adjacent to the Cholla Canyon Ranch. This commodification of tribal lands is also apparent along the Colorado River such as the Whitmore Wash area where non-tribal helicopter tours operate with no apparent oversight from the tribe. Mr. Bravo noted no landing fees are paid to the tribe nor do rafting tours pay the tribe camping fees when they stay overnight along the tribe's side of the River. This lack of tribal control over its own land is likely due to the National Park Service claiming management up to the historic high water on both sides of the River.

With the Committee focused on commercial land uses along the River, Mr. Davidson referred to the proposed land use plan for Diamond Creek (Section 2.5.2) which includes a campground, RV Park and other uses one would expect to find at a state park or a national park. The tribe's preferred route for the new water pipeline, made possible by the Water Right's Settlement, also starts at this point on the River with an intake structure located just upstream from the River Runners' rafting launch point. Does the Committee believe this level of commercial activity appropriate? Mr. Bravo advised Planning follow-up with the Hualapai Department of Natural Resources' on their interpretation of the 2001 Colorado River Management Plan which the tribe also administers with the aid of its Core Team.² Ms. Talieje suggested the plan for Diamond Creek focus on trail development and other such non-motorized activities vs. having a full service RV park at this location that would require the improvement of Diamond Creek Road. Mr. Bravo opined that an area near Diamond Creek launch point as well as Milkweed Springs could support helipads to provide aerial tours to Grand Canyon West. Ms. Dawley suggested tribal entrepreneurs could also utilize Diamond Creek Road for their own rafting trips, horseback riding adventures, jeep tours, etc. In addition, tribal members could support over-night visitors by having their own bed and breakfast operations in Peach Springs. Mr. Bravo added such proposals, namely horseback riding, have been attempted by tribal members but failed to get approval from the tribal council.

¹ In the matter USA vs. Santa Fe Pacific Railroad, et. al. heard in US District Court (Prescott Division) on March 13, 1947, to quiet the title of disputed lands within the Hualapai Reservation. Santa Fe shall retain all water rights to the Lower Tunnel and up to six gallons per minute from the Middle Tunnel at Clay Springs (Section 15, T27N, R15W) and have the ability to maintain the pipelines to both. These rights may be assigned by Santa Fe.

² Planning interviewed Mr. Richard Powskey, Director of HDNR, on December 21, 2023, who noted the tribe's Core Team consisting of tribal council members, Cultural Department staff and GCRC employees operating the River Runners generally follow the 2001 CRMP with some contention on the jurisdictional boundaries. The plan has not been updated.

Also related to recreational development along Diamond Creek is the abandoned pond at the Peach Springs pump house some five miles north of the end of pavement. Mr. Bravo said former Hualapai Tribal Chairman Delbert Havatone was instrumental in creating places for tribal members to recreate including Twenty Pines, Milkweed Springs and the Diamond Creek Pond. Ms. Beecher added that a person died on-site. This event and the change of tribal leadership likely caused the pond to fall into disrepair over the years. Mr. Davidson said the tribe has recently hired Southwest Business Development Consultants, a third-party consultant, to draft a tribal tourism plan with the aim of incorporating its recommendations into the master plan's Economic Development Element. SWBDC is working with two Committee members as well as staff from Planning, Game and Fish and GCRC to fashion the plan.

Mr. Davidson said he would update Section 2.5.2 to remove the RV Park from one of the proposed land uses at Diamond Creek and also update Section 2.5.13 to recommend the land use for Truckee be determined by a tribal special election. The Committee approved these modifications by consensus.

6. Highlights from the Housing Element

The Committee decided not to un-table the Housing Element given that only one member of the Housing Board was in attendance.

7. Highlights from the Economic Development Element

The updated element does the following: 1) Replaces old regional economic studies with more recent ones, 2) Updates Census statistics, 3) Removes references to the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), 4) Removes sections on utility-scale renewable energy development, 5) Reserves space for recommendations pending the creation of the Tribal Tourism Plan, and 6) Updates and clarifies Goals and Policies.

Mr. Bravo asked if removing NAFTA from the Master Plan would prevent tribal members from making deals with foreign companies. Mr. Davidson said NAFTA was repealed by the Trump Administration in 2020 and replaced by United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) which supports American companies.³ Mr. Davidson said he would do additional research on this topic.

Returning to the creation of the tribal tourism plan, both Mr. Bravo and Ms. Dawley touted the expertise of tribal staff working at HDNR and the Cultural Department, many of whom are tribal members. Their voices of experience should be used to write the tourism plan with the help of a meeting facilitator which would produce a better plan than that created by a third-party consultant. Mr. Davidson noted SWBDC is being paid from a grant awarded by BIA's Division of Economic Development which expects the tribe to spend these funds on third-party consultants. Mr. Bravo advised tribal members seek appointment to Adaptive Management Work Group so they can gain the appropriate knowledge to improve River management operations.⁴ In addition, the Master Plan's policies should ensure that tribal members do not pay the TERO tax. Mr. Davidson advised a new tax policy can be added after Policy No. 2.2 (page 5.14) to read as follows:

Encourage tribal entrepreneurship by exempting such entrepreneurs from paying TERO taxes.

³ A few highlights of USMCA are, 1) allows the US auto industry to remain globally competitive, 2) strengthens the enforcement of labor rules, creating a more level playing field for American workers, 3) opens up the Canadian market to US dairy, poultry and eggs, 4) strengthens environmental compliance for factories in Canada and Mexico, 5) adds copyright safe harbor for internet companies, meaning they can't be held liable for copyright infringements of their users if they make good faith efforts to stop infringement. ⁴ The Adaptive Management Work Group is a Federal Advisory Committee for Glen Canyon Dam operations that includes representatives from the stakeholder tribes, organizations, and institutions. To finish up the review of the Economic Development Element, Ms. Bravo noted that Hualapai Wildlife Conservation be replaced with Hualapai Game and Fish on page 5.7. The Committee agreed to the changes to the element.

8. Highlights from the Infrastructure Element

The updated element addresses six major areas as follows: 1) Removes utility-scale renewable energy development goals, 2) Includes discussion on a community-scale solar array for Peach Springs, 3) Adds a new section highlighting the 2022 broadband feasibility study, 4) Adds Western Area Power Administration's 2019 analysis to bring additional power to the reservation 5), reviews potential buy-out of Mohave Electric Cooperative's assets on the reservation with the aim of the HTUA taking them over, and 6) Incorporates the Hualapai Water Settlement Act of 2022. Mr. Bravo asked for the development of surface water resources at Milkweed Springs adjacent to West Water to help augment the existing water source that supplies GCW and ranching operations. Mr. Davidson said this request could be added to Policy 1.3 (p. 6.6) to read as follows:

The Hualapai Departments of Natural Resources and Public Services will work cooperatively to identify and improve non-potable water systems to become potable water systems when public consumption is anticipated including the development of Milkweed Springs to support West Water.

Developing the Frazier Wells water resource should also be pursued.

Mr. Davidson next reviewed the Wastewater section of the Infrastructure Element and advised that Policy 2.2 (page 6.7) discussing the re-use of effluent be added to the community survey. The Committee agreed. Mr. Davidson reviewed the Solid Waste section. The Committee had no further comment except that Public Services should better maintain the Solid Waste Transfer Station.

After touching on the 2017 Cost of Electric Service study which concluded that the tribe's acquisition of MEC grid on the reservation would not be feasible until the tribe served larger electrical loads, Mr. Davidson gave an overview of the new section on Telecommunications. The 11 pages summarize the 2022 Broadband feasibility study performed by Kimley Horn. This new section has a set of recommendations and implementation strategies which may be fashioned into goals and policies. Mr. Bravo said he would like to see the HTUA be in charge of all telecommunication projects on the reservation. Mr. Davidson replied the HTUA's Governing Ordinance gives them this responsibility; however, placing this intent in the Master Plan will help keep them on track to do so.

9. ADJOURNMENT

With the 10 o'clock hour approaching, Chairman Bravo requested the balance of the meeting be continued to January. The Committee agreed to meet again on January 9th. Chairman Bravo entertained a motion to adjourn the meeting. Ms. Talieje made a motion to adjourn with a second by Ms. Havatone, motion carried unanimously at 9:50 PM.

**HUALAPAI HOUSING DEPARTMENT COVID-19
HOMEOWNER ASSISTANCE FUND POLICY****SECTION I. PURPOSE**

- A. This Homeowner Assistance Fund Policy ("Policy") shall govern the Hualapai Housing Department ("HHD") Homeowner Assistance Fund ("HAF Program") and the expenditure and management of the Homeowner Assistance Funds ("HAF Program Funds") received from the U.S. Treasury pursuant to Section 3206 of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, P.L. No. 117-2 (March 11, 2021).**
- B. The first case of COVID-19 was detected in the United States on January 21, 2020. The Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services declared the public health emergency for COVID-19 on January 31, 2020. An emergency declaration was issued on March 13, 2020, pursuant to section 501(b) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. 5191(b).**
- C. Notwithstanding any provision set forth in any other HHD Policy, receipt of assistance from the HAF Program established under this Policy shall not make the Recipient or Recipient family eligible or ineligible for assistance under any of the regular HHD policies.**
- D. Nothing in this Policy shall be construed to invalidate any otherwise legitimate grounds for eviction.**
- E. Assistance to be provided under the HAF Program is subject to availability of funds. No applicant or household determined to be eligible is entitled to or has a property right to receive funding under the HAF Program. When funding for the HAF Program is fully expended, the HAF Program will terminate. HHD may terminate this Program at any time.**
- F. This Policy is based, and the HAF Program will be carried out, in reliance upon the April 14, 2021, guidance document from the Department of Treasury (entitled "Homeowner Assistance Fund Guidance"), along with any future modification, clarification, or supplementation which Treasury may provide. This Policy and the administration of the HAF Program will be subject to change if and when additional guidance is provided.**

SECTION II. DEFINITIONS

General: The following definitions shall apply to this HAF Program Policy.

A. **"100% of the area median income"** for a household means two times the income limit for very low-income families, for the relevant household size, as published by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in accordance with 42 U.S.C. 1437a(b)(2) for purposes of the HAF Program.

B. **"100% of the median income for the United States"** means the median income of the United States, as published by HUD.

C. **"150% of the area median income"** for a household means three times the income limit for very low-income families, for the relevant household size, as published by HUD in accordance with 42 U.S.C. 1437a(b)(2) for purposes of the HAF Program.

D. **"Applicant"** means a homeowner who applies for financial assistance pursuant to this HAF Program Policy.

E. **"HHD"** means the Hualapai Housing Department.

F. **"Conforming loan limit"** means the applicable limitation governing the maximum original principal obligation of a mortgage secured by a single-family residence, a mortgage by a 2-family residence, a mortgage secured by a 3-family residence, or a mortgage secured by a 4-family residence, as determined and adjusted annually under section 302(b)(2) of the Federal Mortgage Association Charter Act (12 U.S.C. § 1717(b)(2) and section 305(a)(2) of the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation Act (12 U.S.C. § 1454(a)(2)).

G. **"COVID-19"** refers to the viral disease caused by the novel coronavirus known as SARS-CoV-2.

H. **"Dwelling"** means any building, structure, or portion thereof that is occupied as, or designed or intended for occupancy as, a residence by one or more individuals.

I. **"Eligible entity"** means (1) a state, (2), the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, (3) each Indian tribe (or, if applicable, the tribally designated housing entity of an Indian tribe) that was eligible for a grant under Title I of the Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Act of 1996 (25 U.S.C. § 4111 *et seq.*) for fiscal year 2020, and (4) any Indian tribe that opted out of receiving a grant allocation under the Native American Housing Block Grants program formula in fiscal year 2020.

J. **"Eligible Homeowner"** means a homeowner that meets the eligibility requirements provided for in this Policy.

K. **"Financial hardship"** means a material reduction in income or material increase in living expenses associated with the coronavirus pandemic that has created or increased a risk of homeowner delinquency or default, foreclosure, loss of utilities or home energy services or displacement for a homeowner.

L. **"Indian Tribe"** means a tribe that is a federally recognized tribe or a "State recognized tribe" as those terms are defined in NAHASDA, 25 U.S.C. 4103(13).

M. **"NAHASDA"** means the Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Act passed by the U.S. Congress in 1996.

N. **"Secretary"** means the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Treasury, except where otherwise indicated.

O. **"Socially Disadvantaged Individuals"** means those who have been subject to racial or ethnic prejudice or cultural bias because of their identity as a member of a group without regard to their individual qualities. The social disadvantage must stem from circumstances beyond their control. There is a rebuttable presumption that the following individuals are socially disadvantaged: Black Americans, Hispanic Americans, Native Americans, and Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders. In addition, an individual may be determined to be a socially disadvantaged individual in accordance with the procedures set forth in 13 C.F.R. § 124.103(c) or (d).

P. **"Treasury"** means the U.S. Department of Treasury.

Q. **"Tribal Member"** means a member of the Hualapai Tribal member.

R. **"Tribe"** means the Hualapai Tribe.

SECTION III. HOMEOWNER ASSISTANCE OVERVIEW

A. HHD shall only use the HAF Program Funds to provide financial assistance to Eligible Homeowners to use for qualified expenses for the uses set forth herein and in accordance with the terms of this Policy.

1. **Application.** To participate in the HAF Program, a Homeowner must first submit a complete, written Application to HHD. This Application must include all information required by HHD, as described herein.

2. **Participation.** If an Applicant is approved for participation in the HAF Program, they must then submit information and supporting documentation each month for which they seek continued HAF Program Funds, unless such payments are to be provided for a 3-month period, for which the Applicant must provide such information for the 3-month period.

B. Qualified Expenses

1. HAF Program Funds may only be used for the following types of qualified expenses that are for the purpose of Homeowners Rehabilitation/Addition to prevent overcrowding and Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) after January 21, 2020:

a. Payment assistance for:

1. Homeowner's arrears
2. Homeowner's Rehabilitation/Addition
3. Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC)
4. Mortgage Payment Assistance.
 - a) Homeowners Insurance.
 - b) Hoa Fees or Liens.
 - c) Delinquent Property Taxes.
5. Homeowner's Internet Payment Assistance

b. Counseling or educational efforts by housing counseling agencies approved by HUD, or legal services, targeted to households eligible to be served with funding from the HAF Program related to foreclosure prevention or displacement, in an aggregate amount up to 5% of the funding from the HAF Program received by HHD;

2. Duplication of Assistance. An Eligible Homeowner that occupies a Dwelling for which that Homeowner is receiving or has already received other federal assistance may receive HAF Program assistance, provided that HAF Program Funds are not applied to costs that have been or will be reimbursed under any other federal assistance. To the extent feasible, HHD will ensure that any financial assistance provided to an Eligible Homeowner pursuant to the HAF Program Funds is not duplicative of any other Federally funded assistance provided to such Homeowner.

a. If an Eligible Homeowner receives homeowner assistance other than through the HAF Program, the HAF Program Funds may only be used to pay for costs that are not paid for by the other homeowner assistance. When providing HAF Program Funds, HHD must review the Eligible Homeowner's income and sources of assistance to confirm that the HAF Program Funds do not duplicate any other assistance, including federal, state, and local assistance provided for the same costs.

SECTION IV. ELIGIBILITY

A. Eligibility Requirements. In order to be eligible to apply for the HAF Program, at the time the Applicant applies to the HAF Program, the Applicant must meet the following eligibility requirements:

1. The Applicant is a homeowner who has experienced a financial hardship after January 21, 2020 and have an income equal to or less than 150% of the area median income.

2. The Applicant attests to the nature of the financial hardship experienced after January 21, 2020. The attestation must describe the nature of the financial hardship (for example, job loss, reduction in income, or increased costs due to healthcare or the need to care for a family member).

3. Hualapai Tribal members must be residing on or off the Hualapai Indian Reservation or off the reservation within the state of Arizona. A homeowners home must be primary home and occupied residence of Arizona.

B. HAF Program Funds received by an Applicant must only be used for qualified expenses set forth in this Policy that are related to the Dwelling that is used as the homeowner's primary residence.

C. Income Determination. In determining the Income of a household for purposes of determining such household's eligibility for assistance from the HAF Program Funds, HHD may use HUD's definition of "annual income" in 24 C.F.R. § 5.609 or use adjusted gross income as defined for purposes of reporting on Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Form 1040 series for individual federal annual income tax purposes.

1. **Documentation of Income Determination:** Applicant must provide sufficient information to HHD to enable HHD to have a reasonable basis under the circumstances for purposes of determining if the income eligibility requirements in (A) above are met. Two approaches for income verification are permissible: (1) the household may provide a written attestation as to household income together with supporting documentation such as paystubs, W-2s or other wage statements, IRS Form 1099s, tax filings, depository institution statements demonstrating regular income, or an attestation from an employer; or (2) the household may provide a written attestation as to household income and HHD may use a reasonable fact-specific proxy for household income, such as reliance on data regarding average incomes in the household's geographic area. In implementing the HAF Program, HHD will avoid establishing documentation requirements that are likely to be barriers to participation for eligible households, including those with irregular incomes such as from a small business.

2. **Waiver or Exception to Documentation Requirement:** HHD may provide a waiver or exception to documentation of income requirement as reasonably necessary to accommodate extenuating circumstances, such as disabilities, practical challenges related to the pandemic, or a lack of technological access by homeowners; in these cases, HHD is still responsible for making the required determination regarding household income and documenting that determination.

SECTION V. APPLICATIONS FOR HAF PROGRAM

A. Participation Applications: To participate in the HAF Program, an Applicant must first submit a complete, written Application on the forms provided by HHD, which are attached as Exhibits to this Policy. All information required to be on the forms must be completed, or the Application will be returned. Applications for the HAF Program must be submitted to HHD by mailing or dropping off the Applications to the following address:

The Application must include the following information and supporting documentation:

- 1. Applicant and Household Information.** Homeowners must submit applicant and household information as included in the Application Form. This form is attached as an Exhibit.
- 2. Financial Hardship.** Homeowners must attest that they experienced financial hardship after January 21, 2020. The attestation must describe the nature of the financial hardship (for example, job loss, reduction in income, or increased costs due to healthcare or the need to care for a family member). This form is attached as an Exhibit.
- 3. Income.** Homeowners must have incomes equal to or less than 150% of the area median income.
- 4. Release of Information.** This form is attached as an Exhibit.

B. Notification of Change of Eligibility. Applicants are required to notify HHD in writing immediately whenever any determining factor of eligibility changes. This includes, but is not limited to:

- 1. No longer experiencing a financial hardship; or**
- 2. Have an income that is equal to or less than 150% of the area median income.**

C. Falsification and Investigation

1. If it is discovered that an Applicant has falsified his or her Application, or otherwise abused the HAF Program, or if an Eligible Homeowner fails to notify HHD of changes to eligibility, the homeowner will be subject to penalties. Penalties will include ineligibility for continued participation in the HAF Program and repayment of the value of any benefit for which they were not eligible to receive. HHD shall have the right to seek such repayment through garnishment of the Recipient's per capita distribution or wages, if any.
2. HHD shall retain the right to conduct a follow-up investigation into any self-attestations submitted or regarding any other documentation, at its own discretion, if it determines that the reliability or accuracy of the information provided is in doubt.

D. Application Review

1. The HHD staff member receiving the Application shall sign and date the Application when it is received at the HHD office.
2. **Preferences and Priorities.** Applications will be reviewed and processed as they are received. However, in anticipation of HHD receiving a substantial number of applications within a short period of time, with a finite amount of funding available, HHD shall review and process Applications for HAF Program Funds under this Policy according to the following order of preferences, and in accordance with the HAF Plan submitted to, and approved by, the Secretary.
 - A. Not less than 60% of amounts made available to HHD must be used for qualified expenses that assist Eligible Homeowners having incomes equal to or less than 100% of the area median income or equal to or less than 100% of the median income for the United States, whichever is greater, utilizing the following preferences:
 1. First preference will be given to socially disadvantaged Eligible Homeowners that have at least one family member (regardless of whether that member is an adult or head of household) who is a Tribal Member.
 - B. The remaining 40% of amounts made available to HHD will be prioritized to socially disadvantaged individuals utilizing the same preferences as set out in subsection (a), above.
3. **Approval of Applications.** HHD will notify Applicants in writing, within fourteen (14) days of HHD's receipt of the Application, of HHD's decision of whether the Applicant has been approved to receive HAF Program Funds.
4. **Denial of Application.** If upon initial review, HHD determines that the Applicant is not eligible or the request is outside of this Policy, or there are no longer any HAF Program

Funds available, HHD will notify the Applicant in writing of this determination, the applicable policies which support the determination, and the process of appeal (if allowed).

a. **Process of Appeal.** Any Applicant who is dissatisfied with a decision of HHD concerning eligibility of assistance, the level of benefit approved, or the type of services available, can appeal that decision to the Executive Director of HHD.

b. **No Appeal.** If the reason for the denial of the Application is that there are no longer any HAF Program Funds remaining, such denial is not subject to appeal.

Program Services:

1. Homeowners House Payment (Arrearages):

Brief Description : HAF will provide full or partial payment to homeowners unable to make full payments, owing to a continuing financial hardship resulting from the coronavirus pandemic. HAF funds may be used to reduce a homeowner's monthly loan payments for a period starting on 01-01-2020. HAF funds will only be used to supplement other loss-mitigation measures offered by the servicer or where HAF funds are necessary for the homeowner to qualify for other such loss-mitigation measures.

Maximum amount of assistance per homeowner: Each Homeowner will be eligible for up to \$2,000 through this program, apply only to the homeowner's primary residence. (The maximum amount of all combined program assistance granted by HHD through the HAF program elements will not exceed \$72,300 per homeowner.)

Homeowner eligibility criteria and documentation requirements: Same as General Eligibility Requirements, plus: HHD will make all funds for assistance available to households with annual household income that is at or below 150% of the Area Median Income, and 60% of these funds will be reserved and targeted for households that are at or below 100% of the Area Median Income. The following must apply:

- The HTM must be listed on the lease agreement/deed, and copies of these documents must be submitted.
- The HTM must provide a Tribal ID or verification of Hualapai Tribal enrollment.
- The HTM must provide copies of documents showing household income for all household members.
- The HTM must provide a statement of their present inability to resume homeownership payments, owing to unemployment, underemployment or other continuing hardship. Loan eligibility criteria specific to the program The HTM must provide a homeowner statement indicating delinquency and must be at least one month in arrearage.

2. Home Rehabilitation/Addition Assistance:

Brief Description : Provide funds to cover renovation, repairs or additions to the homeowner's primary residence as necessary to restore the property to habitable condition or to prevent overcrowding.

HAF funds may be used to pay the cost of renovation, repairs or additions to address property conditions or overcrowding, including pre-development costs, necessary architectural or engineering fees, construction oversight, or other costs incidental but necessary to the completion of the eligible scope of work.

Grantee may utilize HAF administrative funds to provide technical assistance to the homeowner (e.g. identifying necessary repair work).

Maximum amount of assistance per homeowner: Each Homeowner will be eligible for up to \$40,000 through this program, apply only to the homeowner's primary residence. (The maximum amount of all combined program assistance granted by HHD through the HAF program elements will not exceed \$72,300 per homeowner.)

Homeowner eligibility criteria and documentation requirements: Same as General Property Eligibility Criteria Across All Programs plus:

- Property will continue to be the applicant's owner-occupied primary residence once the repairs are made.
- Properties that have outstanding violations may receive assistance if corrections are addressed before funding or are included in the scope of work funded by the program.

Eligible Property Conditions:

- Housing deficiencies or conditions exist which may be hazardous to occupants/residents,
- Property has a code violation or other citation, or is in danger of being cited or condemned, without the necessary repair,
- Property is uninhabitable or condemned and the repair is necessary to make the home habitable, OR
- Home improvements are necessary to improve accessibility and help senior residents age in place.

The following must apply:

- The HTM must be listed on the mortgage and deed, and copies of these documents must be submitted.
- The HTM must provide a Tribal ID or verification of Hualapai Tribal enrollment.
- The HTM Member must provide copies of documents showing household income for all household members.

Form of assistance: Assistance will be structured as a non-recourse grant.

Payment requirements: Payments may be made directly to the lender or servicer, as appropriate.

3. Homeownership Expense Assistance, (Property Taxes, Insurance Costs, HOA, Condominium Fees and escrow shortages.

Brief Description: The program will provide funds to resolve any property-charge default that threatens a homeowner's ability to sustain ownership of the property, whether concurrent with other-loss mitigation options offered by the loan servicer or in conjunction with other assistance programs. HAF funds may be used to pay past due property taxes, insurance premiums, HOA fees, condominium fees, or cooperative-maintenance or common charges that threaten sustained ownership of the property. These must be brought current by program assistance or resolved concurrent with the program providing assistance. Funds may also be used to pay property charges coming due in the 90 days following program approval.

Maximum amount of assistance per homeowner: Each homeowner will be eligible for the amounts listed below, for this program regarding the applicant's primary residence, including a dwelling to be made habitable so that it may serve as the homeowner's primary residence:

- Tax Arrearages--\$5,000.
- Insurance Payments--\$2,500.
- Condo / HOA fees--\$500.00
- Mortgage payment assistance --\$2,000.00

(The maximum amount of all combined program assistance granted by HHD through the HAF program elements will not exceed \$72,300 per homeowner.)

Homeowner eligibility criteria and documentation requirements: Same as General Eligibility Requirements, plus: HHD will make all funds for assistance available to households with annual household income that is at or below 150% of the Area Median Income, and 60% of these funds will be reserved and targeted for households that are at or below 100% of the Area Median Income. The following conditions must apply:

- The HTM must be the head of household.
- The HTM must certify that the home is owned by the tribal member.
- The Hualapai Tribal Member must provide a Tribal ID or verification of Hualapai Tribal enrollment.
- HTM Member must provide copies of household income for all household members.
- The homeowner must be at least one installment payment in arrears on one or more property charges including:

- Property taxes.
- Insurance: hazard, flood, wind premiums.
- HOA fees, condominium fees, cooperative-maintenance or common charges.
- The homeowner must provide current copies of statements or bills for each of the assistance items being requested.

Loan eligibility criteria specific to the program: N/A

Form of assistance: Assistance will be structured as a non-recourse grant.

Payment requirements: Payments may be made directly to the lender or servicer, as appropriate

4. HVAC Assistance:

Brief Description: Provide funds to cover cost of Heating Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) or replace swamp cooler to the homeowner's primary residence as necessary to restore the property to habitable condition. Grantee may utilize HAF administrative funds to provide technical assistance to the homeowner (e.g. identifying necessary repair work).

HAF funds will only be used to supplement other loss mitigation measures offered by the servicer or where HAF funds are necessary for the homeowner to qualify for other such loss mitigation measures

Maximum amount of assistance per homeowner: Each Homeowner will be eligible for up to \$20,000 through this program with respect to the applicant's primary residence, including a dwelling to be made habitable so it may serve as the homeowner's primary residence. (The maximum amount of all combined program assistance granted by HHD through the HAF program elements will not exceed \$72,300 .)

Homeowner eligibility criteria and documentation requirements: Same as General Eligibility Requirements plus At the time HVAC replacement begins, homeowner is current on other secured home payment obligations, on an active payment plan or forbearance, and/or getting related HAF assistance for those obligations; Homeowner will be able to afford applicable payment necessary to sustain homeownership after replacement or repair is completed, based on a financial analysis established at the reasonable discretion of Grantee and Homeowner does not qualify for or has not been able to access affordable home repair financing (self-attestation of applicant's efforts will satisfy). Grantees may determine, based on reasonable analysis of homeowner needs data, that homeowners meeting certain criteria (e.g. income at or below a percentage of AMI) are presumed to meet this requirement without requiring homeowner attestation or documentation.

Indicate documentation requirements:

Form of assistance: The assistance will be structured as a non-recourse grant.

Payment requirements: Payments may be made directly to the lender or servicer, as appropriate.

5. Homeowner's Internet Payment Assistance

Brief Description: Provide funds to resolve delinquent payments for internet access services. HAF funds may be used to pay delinquent amounts in full, including interest or reasonably required legal fees, under circumstances in which a delinquency threatens access to internet services. The provided assistance must bring the homeowner's account current. Funds may be used to pay prospective charges for up to the first 90 days following approval if the homeowner is unable to make such payments and (i) funds are not available from other utility assistance programs to cover these amounts and (ii) the homeowner indicates the financial ability to resume making such payments after the initial 90 day period. **Maximum amount of assistance per homeowner:** Each Homeowner will be eligible for up to \$300 through this program with respect to the applicant's primary residence.

Homeowner eligibility criteria and documentation requirements: Same as General Eligibility Requirements plus; Homeowner is at least one installment payment in arrears for internet service, including broadband access service; Assistance sufficient to resolve the delinquency is not available from other assistance programs and, without HAF assistance, the homeowner is likely to lose service.

Indicate documentation requirements: plus: HTM must be listed on mortgage and deed and these documents must be submitted

- Hualapai Tribal ID or Verification of Hualapai Tribal Enrollment
- HTM Member must provide copies of household income for all household members.

Form of assistance: Assistance will be structured as a non-recourse grant.

Payment requirements: Payments may be made directly to the lender or servicer, as appropriate.

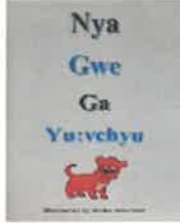

Is your child drinking too much juice?

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recently announced new recommendations on fruit juice for children birth to 18

Most kids love juice. But many parents don't know the answer to one of the most commonly asked questions for pediatricians, "How much juice should I give my child?"

In one word, the answer is less. Even if the label promises 100 percent fruit juice, offering your kids a nice cold glass might not be the sweetest idea.

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recently announced new recommendations on fruit juice for children birth to 18. The guidelines include a significant change from the last update made 16 years ago: **No juice for kids under 12 months.** While whole fruit is still recommended as part of a daily diet, parents are cautioned to not give babies juice unless otherwise recommended by a doctor.



Some of pediatricians' top concerns include children developing tooth decay and poor nutrition due to the high sugar content in juice. "We know that excessive fruit juice can lead to excessive weight gain and tooth decay," said Steven A. Abrams, MD, FAAP, co-author of the [AAP's policy statement](#). And juice's lack of fiber and protein makes for empty calories that can fill up a little one and not leave room for more nutritious food.

"Parents may perceive fruit juice as healthy, but it is not a good substitute for fresh fruit and just packs in more sugar and calories," said co-author Melvin B. Heyman, MD, FAAP. "Small

amounts in moderation are fine for older kids, but are absolutely unnecessary for children under 1."

Remember, you don't have to cut out fruit completely from your child's diet. Instead, try serving them whole fruit for the added fiber

- Have your student read to you – Whether it is an article in the Gam'yu newsletter or the preparation instructions off a box of macaroni and cheese, reading everyday matters. The more students practice the skill, the better they will become at it.

For our 3rd grade students, reading aloud is even more critical because there is an oral reading component as part of this year's state test.
- Have conversations about what they want to be when they grow up – Many of our students give us a shoulder shrug or an "I dunno" when asked that question. By starting the conversations early, students can see that there is a literal world of possibilities available to them.

LGBTQIA+ relationships and dating violence

One in three adolescents in the U.S. will be the victim of physical, sexual, emotional or verbal abuse from a dating partner. This figure is much higher than any other type of youth violence. And abuse isn't just happening in heterosexual relationships. It affects all types of people and relationships. It doesn't discriminate.

In the queer community, dating violence is often perceived as a heterosexual relationship problem, normal or not as severe because the individuals share the same gender expression or gender. This is not true!

Dating abuse is just as serious in LGBTQIA+ relationships as it is in heterosexual relationships. And less than 25% of those who experience dating violence in the LGBTQIA+ community ever report the abuse.

Whether it is being recognized or not, dating violence in the queer community is something that needs to be talked about!

Individuals experiencing dating abuse in LGBTQIA+ relationships may:

- Feel embarrassed about the abuse going on.
- Feel like their partner will try to turn the community against them if they do something their partner disagrees with or if they decide to end the relationship.
- Be worried their partner will "out" them to family and friends if they're not out already or their partner may threaten to "out" them as a way to gain power and control over them.
- Be in their first LGBTQIA+ relationship and their partner may be isolating them from the rest of the queer community as a form of power and control.
- Be made to feel ashamed about their sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression by their partner.
- Feel like their partner is the only person that will ever love them because of their sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression.
- Be worried that they won't be able to get help because of their sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression if they reach out.

Everyone, regardless of gender, sexual orientation or gender expression deserves a healthy relationship where they are treated with respect and valued for who they are.

Remember, you're worth it!

However unique the challenge, if you or someone you know is experiencing dating violence in an LGBTQIA+ relationship, there is hope! You have the right to reach out when you are in need of help, regardless of how you identify or who you date.

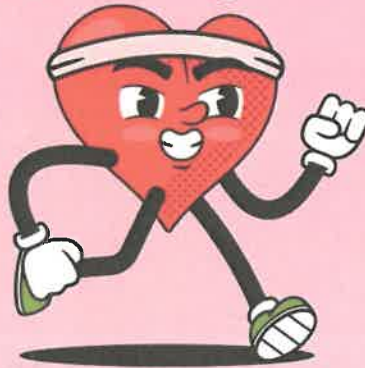

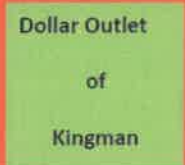
