Tribal Member Names and Addresses

Our office is charged with maintaining current and accurate names and addresses of all tribal members; Hualapai Constitution, Article II. Our office has experienced delays in receiving name changes that may be the result of marriage, adoption or voluntarily changing of one's name.

The process in changing your name with the Enrollment Office is as follows:

1. Provide a marriage license, adoption decree or court order of name change;
2. Provide an updated Social Security Card with changed name;
3. Issuance of new tribal ID and CIB;
4. Any other questions, please contact our office.

Addresses are important for tribal members to frequently update with our office. Enrollment Office supplies that information for tribal events like Election seasons and distributions. This will greatly establish a database of up-to-date tribal member data.

Tribal Member Death

In the event of a death of a tribal member, please notify our office so we may inactivate their profile and once a death certificate is received, provide a copy to our office so we may officially close their tribal member file.

Master Plan Update Committee Meeting • Thursday, February 22nd

Hualapai Master Plan Update Committee to hold tenth meeting on Thursday, February 22nd

The Hualapai Master Plan Update Committee is scheduled to complete its tenth meeting on Thursday, February 22, 2024, beginning 5:00 PM at the Multi-Purpose Building, located at 470 Hualapai Drive in Peach Springs.

The 18-member Committee was formed by Hualapai Tribal Council on March 6, 2023, with the task of updating the tribe's existing draft Master Plan. The Master Plan is a statement of community values and aspirations, written as goals and policies, and shown on maps and diagrams. This will be the primary tool for managing community change to achieve the desired quality of life for tribal members living on the reservation, trust lands and private property owned by the tribe.

You may be eligible for the Homeowner Assistance Fund (HAF)

QUALIFIED EXPENSES

HAF Program funds may only be used for the following types of qualified expenses to address delinquent accounts which threatens a homeowner's ability to sustain ownership of the property, additions to prevent overcrowding, HVAC and housing deficiencies to restore property to habitable conditions:

Payment Assistance for:

• Homeowner's arrears (<i>Peach Springs area</i>)	up to \$ 2,000
• Homeowner's Rehabilitation/Addition	\$40,000
• Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC)	\$20,000
• Mortgage Payment Assistance (<i>within the State of Arizona</i>)	\$ 2,000
• Property Tax Arrearages (<i>within the State of Arizona</i>)	\$ 5,000
• Insurance Payments (<i>within the State of Arizona</i>)	\$ 2,500
• Condo/HOA fees (<i>within the State of Arizona</i>)	\$ 500
• Delinquent Internet Payment Assistant	\$ 300

Eligibility:

1. Homeowner must attest to financial hardship
2. Household income equal to or less than 150% of the area median income
3. Hualapai Tribal Member residing within the State of Arizona

If you have had experienced financial hardship after January 21, 2020 due to the COVID Pandemic (*for example: job loss, reduction in income, increased costs due to healthcare or the need to care for a family member*) you may be eligible to receive assistance to help pay mortgage, house payments or other home expenses. Applications are available on the Hualapai Tribal website, the Gamyu or the Hualapai Housing Office. HUALAPAI MASTER PLAN MEETING #8, Part 2

Meeting Notes

Meeting Date: January 9, 2024, 5:00 PM

Multi-Purpose Building, Peach Springs, AZ Peach Springs, AZ

1. **DINNER** at 5:00 PM
2. **CALL TO ORDER:** Chairman Robert Bravo called the meeting to order at 5:55 PM.
3. **ROLL CALL:**

Present:

Absent:

Cheryle Beecher, Clay Bravo (excused), Gensean Havatone-Putesoy, Marilyn Vaughn, Loretta Jackson-Kelly (excused), Raelene Havatone.

Also in attendance were Nona Baheshone, Facilitator, Kevin Davidson of the Hualapai Planning & Economic Development Department and Hualapai Tribal members Duarte Cook, Aaron Gordon and Josh Gordon.

Chairman Robert Bravo requested a motion to approve the meeting agenda. Camille Nighthorse made a motion to approve the agenda and Nick Hunter seconded. The committee approved the agenda unanimously.

4. MINUTES:

Chairman Bravo requested a motion to approve the December 20, 2023, meeting minutes. Mr. Hunter made a motion to approve the minutes with a second by Joyce Powskey. Meeting minutes were approved unanimously.

Mr. Davidson began the presentation by noting this is the second part of committee's eighth meeting where we will continue to review the text of the Master Plan.

Before reviewing the remaining Master Plan Elements, Mr. Davidson briefed the Committee on his research into the question posed by Mr. Clay Bravo at the December 20, 2023, Committee meeting regarding the tribe's water rights in Clay Springs, namely in Section 15, T27N, R15W. From the 1947 Judgement in the case of the United States vs. the Santa Fe Pacific Railroad, the railroad has a water right to 6 gallons per minute (10-acre feet per year) from Clay Springs. The balance of the water right is for the tribe. Clay Springs falls in the Hualapai Valley Basin as designated by the Arizona Department of Water Resources.

5. Highlights from the Housing Element

Mr. Davidson stated that the Housing Element was first discussed in November but placed on hold until review by the Housing Board. Now that members of the Housing Board are in attendance, the updates to the Element can be vetted. The updates include: 1) Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) homes under construction in the Box Canyon and in Milkweed Springs subdivisions, 2) Need for alternative housing types such as tiny homes and co-living, 3) the growth inducing impacts of the Water Rights Settlement, 4) Truxton Triangle Master Plan from 2019, and 5) Earthquake hazards to un-reinforced masonry homes.

Mr. Hunter noted construction issues with the current LIHTC homes being built in Box Canyon and Milkweed Springs will likely push back the completion date a few months beyond the original deadline of September 30, 2024. In addition, the new homes will be subject to the more restrictive occupancy rules prescribed by the Arizona Department of Housing which will make it more difficult for tribal members to qualify for and then maintain residency in these units - the same clients that need this type of housing most. Several policies in the Housing Element should be retained to comply with the Indian Housing Plan prescribed by HUD as follows:

Policy 1.3 - Provide fencing to homes and HUD funded parks to reduce gang, trespassing, and intrusion related crimes.

Policy 2.5 - Provide continual information to tenants on lease compliance through public flyers and inserts with billing statements.

Ms. Dawley asked who will use the home financing information provided by the study that Policy 3.6 is requesting. Mr. Hunter replied Housing's procurement program will use this information. For purchasing and retrofitting privately-owned but un-occupied homes by the Housing Department as prescribed in Policy 4.2, Mr. Hunter said the Housing Board is reviewing this policy to see if they have the funds to do it.

Moving to street improvements around homes, Ms. Dawley commented that the has tribe has built many new homes that do not have the benefit of paved roads, sidewalks, street lights, etc. as you would expect to find in a typical subdivision. For example, the new modular home in Chinatown and the homes in Box Canyon do not have these amenities. Mr. Davidson said the homes in Box Canyon are programed to have paved roads as well as curb and gutter improvements. The HUD grant that provided funding for the new home in Chinatown does not have off-site improvements in its scope of work.

For housing objectives at Grand Canyon West, Mr. Hunter made a motion to remove "Low-income" from Objectives 5.1 and 5.2. Ms. Nighthorse offered a second. Motion carried unanimously with the revised objectives to read as follows:

Objective 5.1 - Assist in completing infrastructure at Grand Canyon West to support new housing.

Objective 5.2 - Obtain funding for new homes and create rental opportunities for workers at Grand Canyon West.

Even though this omission will likely prevent government subsidized housing from being built at GCW, it will help dispel the image of the tribe being poor and dependent upon government support.

Having come to the end of the Housing Element, Chairman Bravo asked if the Committee was comfortable with moving forward with the language as amended. Mr. Hunter made a motion to approve the Housing Element as amended. Ms. Powskey offered a second. Motion carried unanimously.

6. Highlights from the Infrastructure – Telecommunications

Mr. Davidson reviewed the new language in the Telecommunications section of the Infrastructure Element which summarizes the 75-page broadband feasibility study prepared by Kimley Horn in 2022. Even though the study has a set of recommendations to deploy broadband throughout the reservation, the Master Plan has not incorporated these as formal goals and objectives. To help the Committee with this effort, Mr. Davidson referenced language from the Hopi and the Oglala-Lakota Tribes as follows:

Hopi Tribal Consolidated Strategic Plan, 2011

Goal: To upgrade existing telecommunication system to the state-of-the-art standards for present and future needs.

Objective: Assess radio telecommunication system outside Hopi reservation, looking at sites on Navajo and working with them to see who can bring what to the table - cost sharing.

Oglala Lakota Plan, 2012

Goal: Expand community access to broadband internet

Goal: Expand fiber optic network to connect government and support businesses

Strategy: Create a database for volunteers and donations.

Ms. Dawley advised we ask the community about their internet usage and what additional service they need, if any. Mr. Cook added that increased broadband capacity may have the undesired effect of further isolating people from one another since they will be able to do more communication on their cell phones and computers instead of in person. Ms. Baheshone replied that the Hualapai Lodge needs more broadband capacity to conduct its operations. At present Wecom, Inc. is applying for construction permits to place a 96-strand fiber optic line from Truxton to Grey Mountain. This will provide tribal government with some 10 gigabits of broadband instead of the 0.2 gigabits which they currently share with GCRC. This represents a 100-fold increase in bandwidth for tribal government operations.

Speaking of telecommunications, Chairman Bravo asked how the special election for the Verizon communication sites is progressing. Mr. Hunter replied that tribal council has appointed a new Election Board of which he is a member. However, the Election Board must remain neutral and not advocate for or against the ballot measure. The tribe should publish a list of “pros” and “cons” on the measure to help educate the voters. One of the “cons” appears to be that the tribe is getting the standard dollar value offer from Verizon for the lease instead of a higher dollar amount. Mr. Davidson said if Verizon were to leave the reservation, the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority (HTUA) could bid out the sites to other cell phone companies or take up the challenge of providing cell phone coverage on the reservation on its own.

7. Highlights from the Infrastructure – Grand Canyon West

Mr. Davidson gave an overview of the modifications to the infrastructure specific to Grand Canyon West as follows: 1) Incorporation of the Hualapai Water Settlement Act which brings Colorado River water to Grand Canyon West, 2) the newly completed 885 KW solar array and 2,145 KWhr battery pack that is designed to provide 50% of GCW power needs over the course of year, 3) a proposed 36-mile, 69 KV power line & fiber optic line from Dolan Springs that would bring additional power and broadband to GCW to allow for additional growth and better internet service, and 4) reference to the 2015 GCW Master Plan which shows the development of hotels, a conference center at Eagle Point, an RV Park, a gas station and convenience store, and better accommodations for Hualapai vendors.

In regard to 2015 GCW Master Plan, the Committee is concerned that Eagle Point is becoming too commercialized. This is based on input from tourists as well as tribal members. Guano Point is seen as the more authentic experience.

By consensus, the Committee agreed to approve the updates to the Infrastructure Element.

8. Highlights from the Strategic Planning Element

Mr. Davidson touched on the modifications to the Strategic Planning Element as follows:

1) Explains value of the strategic planning process, 2) Adds the role of the Interdisciplinary Team (IDT) in the strategic planning process, and 3) Updates Goals and Policies including the creation of an annual report detailing tribal government activities in relation to land use and development activities with their associated financial performance measures including revenues and expenses. Ms. Dawley recommended more affirmative language to achieve the preferred future for tribe.

By consensus, the Committee agreed to approve the updates to the Strategic Planning Element.

9. Highlights from the Introduction

To sum up the Master Plan discussion, Mr. Davidson reviewed the introductory chapter as follows: 1) Streamlines the Vision and Values Statement, 2) Updates statistics, 3) Reviews Key Development Goals and Needs Assessments, 4) Updates Responses to Critical Situations, and 5) Adds Truxton Triangle Master Plan as well as other lands recently placed into Trust for the tribe, and private properties, including Truckee, into the Priority Projects category. Ms. Talieje noted that the RV Park proposed on Diamond Creek Road should be removed to align with the revisions to Land Use plan for Diamond Creek. With that correction, the Committee agreed to approve the updated Introduction chapter.

10. ADJOURNMENT

To prepare for the second community meeting, where the draft Master Plan will be presented, the Committee agreed to meet again on February 6, 2024, at 5 PM. The Committee decided to hold the community meeting on Wednesday, February 21, 2024, with a venue to be determined. A raffle should help encourage more community attendance. Chairman Bravo entertained a motion to adjourn the meeting. Ms. Powskey made a motion adjourn to with a second by Mr. Hunter, motion carried unanimously at 8:30 PM.

LGBTQIA+ relationships and dating violence

By Tara, a love is respect Advocate

One in three adolescents in the U.S. will be the victim of physical, sexual, emotional or verbal abuse from a dating partner. This figure is much higher than any other type of youth violence. And abuse isn't just happening in heterosexual relationships. It affects all types of people and relationships. It doesn't discriminate.

In the queer community, dating violence is often perceived as a heterosexual relationship problem, normal or not as severe because the individuals share the same gender expression or gender. This is not true!

Dating abuse is just as serious in LGBTQIA+ relationships as it is in heterosexual relationships. And less than 25% of those who experience dating violence in the LGBTQIA+ community ever report the abuse.

Whether it is being recognized or not, dating violence in the queer community is something that needs to be talked about!

Individuals experiencing dating abuse in LGBTQIA+ relationships may:

- Feel embarrassed about the abuse going on.
- Feel like their partner will try to turn the community against them if they do something their partner disagrees with or if they decide to end the relationship.
- Be worried their partner will "out" them to family and friends if they're not out already or their partner may threaten to "out" them as a way to gain power and control over them.
- Be in their first LGBTQIA+ relationship and their partner may be isolating them from the rest of the queer community as a form of power and control.
- Be made to feel ashamed about their sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression by their partner.
- Feel like their partner is the only person that will ever love them because of their sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression.
- Be worried that they won't be able to get help because of their sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression if they reach out.

Everyone, regardless of gender, sexual orientation or gender expression deserves a healthy relationship where they are treated with respect and valued for who they are.

Remember, you're worth it!

However unique the challenge, if you or someone you know is experiencing dating violence in an LGBTQIA+ relationship, there is hope! You have the right to reach out when you are in need of help, regardless of how you identify or who you date.
