Putting aside differences and working together was the theme for the Hualapai Tribal Council inauguration ceremony that was witnessed by some 200 tribal and community members on Friday, August 2, 2024, at the Hualapai Gym. Outgoing Vice-Chairman Scott Crozier took the podium first and said he was proud to have served with his fellow council members and noted that by working together, the tribe was able to secure its longawaited Water Rights Settlement and constructed over two dozen new homes to relieve overcrowded housing conditions in Peach Springs. Chairperson Sherry J. Parker followed with a passionate and heartfelt speech by noting the challenges she faced in leading the tribe and dealing with issues from how to solve alcoholism that afflicts the community to meeting with President Biden over her 12-plus years on tribal council, half of which serving as chairperson.

#### Decommissioning of Hualapai Veterans' Memorial Held August 5th

#### Decommissioning of Hualapai Veterans' Memorial

August 5, 2024

On a partly cloudy and calm morning, Hualapai Veterans, tribal council members and several dozen community members assembled at the Veterans' Memorial at Rodeo Circle to pay their respects before work on demolishing the structure begins latter in the week. Following the presentation of the colors by the honor guard and the opening prayer by Mr. Mike Whatoname (Army), Mr. Richard Walema (Army) led off the public addresses by thanking tribal council for paying respect to the Hualapai Veterans and for supporting their efforts to build a new memorial. In response, Chairman Clarke pledged to never forget the Hualapai Veterans. Council members Earlene Havatone and Cheyenne Majenty noted the value of discipline that military training provides and the debt we owe to our veterans that allows us all to raise our families in peace. Former Vice-Chairman Scott Crozier acknowledged his family' service from his great-grandfather Kate Crozier (Scout) to his father Arliss Crozier (Army), and thanked the veterans for their dedication and is looking forward to seeing them come and stand together from this moment forward.

Veterans George Bennett (Army), Rocky Imus (Marines), Robert Siyuja of the Havasupai Tribe (Army), Bryant Tapija (Army), Gerald Powsey (Marines), Milton Walker (Army) and Webster Mahone (Army) where presented blankets by tribal council members.

Mr. Whatoname recounted stories of Hualapai heroism and luck in battle from Port Darwin and Midway to the Normandy Invasion and then the Tet Offensive in Vietnam, with the names of Ralph Achee (Marines), Elden Cooney (Army), Sylvester Ma-

hone (Army), Monroe Beecher (Army), Joel Querta (Marines), George Bennett (Army) and Michael Jones (Army) being freshly remembered. Hualapai should be proud that they have had a higher percentage of participation in the armed forces than other Native American tribes. Mr. Whatoname also recognized the tireless efforts of Adeline Crozier in her support of the veterans, Lt. Colonel Ken Atkins, who is helping Public Works manage these projects, and also the tribe's new Chief Financial Officer, Mr. Auni Hariri whose kind support and passion is helping the Hualapai Veterans achieve their vision of a new memorial. Mr. Kent Whatoname (Army) followed next by remembering Richard Nish (Marines), Victor Suminimo (Army), Dwight Whatoname (Army) and George Whatoname (Army). Former Chairwoman Sherry J. Parker also spoke and said the freedoms we enjoy today are due to our veterans.

With speeches concluded, the Hualapai Color Guard fired a 15-gun salute and the last song was sung by Mr. Severio Cabrera.



#### **Tribal Member Names and Addresses**

Our office is the central tribal agency charged with maintaining current and accurate names and addresses of all tribal members; Hualapai Constitution, Article II. Our office has experienced delays in receiving name changes that may be the result of marriage, adoption or voluntarily changing one's name.

The process in changing your name with the Enrollment Office is as follows:

- 1. Provide a marriage license, adoption decree or court order of name change (Please complete the process of changing your name with Social Security and Vital Records);
- 2. Provide an updated Social Security Card with changed name;
- 3. Issuance of new tribal ID and CIB (first ID card is free per lifetime, thereafter a \$10 fee is required, this includes name changes);
- 4. Any other questions, please contact our office.

Addresses are important for tribal members to frequently update with our office. Enrollment Office supplies that information for tribal events like Election seasons and distributions. This will greatly establish a database of up-to-date tribal member data, this also includes minor addresses as well to ensure delivery of semiannual statements.

#### Tribal Member Death

Please notify our office so we may inactivate their profile and provide a copy of a death certificate to our office.





#### The Reality of Screen Time and Language Development

With so many TV shows and videos for kids, "screen time" has undoubtedly become a household topic. Screen time is the amount of time someone spends using devices with screens like TVs, computers, tablets and smartphones. For kids, this can include watching shows, playing games and using learning apps.

#### DO YOUNG KIDS LEARN LANGUAGE FROM WATCHING TV?

Screen time might be a quick way to entertain your child, especially when you're busy. And some shows and apps that appear to be educational often provide parents with a sense of relief about their child's language development. While some quality programs exist, little ones learn and develop language best through real-life interactions with parents and caregivers.

Everyday exchanges with your children have a greater impact than you might expect, even as early as birth. From babbling with your infant to narrating your toddler's environment, social exchanges like these form strong foundations for early language development. Young children need interactive, responsive communication to listen, mimic and respond. TV and videos provide only one-way communication, which lacks the stimulation they need.

#### OFF-SCREEN ACTIVITIES TO DEVELOP LANGUAGE AND EARLY LITERACY SKILLS WITHOUT SCREENS

**Read together every day.** Talk about the pictures, colors, and story. Ask questions like, "What do you think will happen next?" or "Can you find the red car?"

- 1. Create routines. Build routines into daily activities like mealtime, bedtime and chores.
- 2. **Make up rhymes and songs.** Sing and use rhyming words with your child. Use clapping, snapping and facial expressions to make it fun and interactive.
- 3. **Encourage play.** Find opportunities for supervised, independent play. Let your child play with toys like blocks or baby-safe mirrors while you cook or clean nearby. For example, "You are stacking the blocks so high!"

Research shows that these kinds of connections with caregivers allow young children to observe, mimic and gesture in their own ways—all important building blocks for their communication abilities. Talk, read and play with your little one as much as possible. It is the best way to help them connect the skills they'll need to be ready to talk and eventually learn to read.

#### WELCOME BACK!!!

Valentine Elementary School staff members have had a productive summer preparing for students to return. There have been a number of changes to room and staffing configurations, curriculum materials, and schedules to let you know about.

Mrs. Radcliffe's kindergartners have moved next door and will be sharing the room with Mrs. Clouse's 1<sup>st</sup> grade. Mrs. Valentine will assist both classes.

Ms. Picos and the 2<sup>nd</sup> grade have moved to the other half of Mrs. Blanton's room from last year. Mrs. Blanton will be teaching 3<sup>nd</sup> grade in that room as well. Mr. Kershaw will be the assistant for those classes.

Mr. Byrne is looping up with his students from last year and teaching 4th grade in his same room. In addition, we welcome Mr. Flohrschutz, who will be taking over 5th grade, and Mrs. Wheaton, who will be their new assistant.

Mr. and Mrs. Haas will continue to pilot 6th-8th grades in the same space, utilizing the *Into Math* curriculum for middle school. Ms. Rich has agreed to be our counselor. Mrs. Angle, Mr. Clouse, Mr. Jeans, Mrs. Labadie, Mr. Moore, Mrs. Nutt, Mr. Whisman, and Mr. Angle are also back to provide a quality learning environment for our students.

The new bus schedules and the August menus went out at our Back-to-School Night last Thursday. They will also be posted on our website, Facebook group, smartphone app, and our new display board next to the entrance gate, as well as sent home with students.

#### NEW ELECTRONICS PROCEDURES

In order to minimize distractions from learning, students will "turn off and turn in" <u>all</u> of their personal electronics (cell phones, smart watches, earbuds, tablets, game consoles, etc.) at the beginning of each day, and they will be returned to the students at the end of the day. This has become a common practice at schools across the country.

As part of this effort, teachers will be responding to emails and messages within the school app outside of scheduled instruction time within 24-48 hours. Teachers will not be responding to messages sent to their personal cell phones.

If there is an absolute need to get a message to a student or staff member, contact the office, and we will relay the message.



#### HOW CAN I HELP MY STUDENT?

- Stay Informed There are many platforms where families can find information about what we do at Valentine Elementary School. For example, if you do not have the free school smartphone app yet, scan the QR code above. The website address is also listed above. There is a Facebook group for Valentine families. We send emails and have public service announcements broadcast on KWLP, and we always send information home with students.
- Keep your contact information current Things can change over the summer (or anytime) – cell phone numbers, addresses, emergency contacts, etc. Make sure you let the school know when these changes occur, so we can keep you up to date.
- Support the House system We will be building on the amazing increases in student attendance and achievement that our House system helped generate last year.
   Download the free RCA House Points app so you can receive notifications when your student earns points for their House. Those can create positive conversation starters for you and your student.



#### **BUS MATTERS**

For the first two weeks, plan on about a 10-minute window on either side of the scheduled stop times, as we fine tune the schedule. We will publish revisions when needed.

Remind your students that bus riding is a privilege that is earned by following the procedures. Students MUST remain seated in their assigned seats and behave appropriately on the bus. Riding privileges will be suspended if they cannot.

Families must designate <u>ONE</u> bus stop for the afternoon route. If a change is necessary, a route change form must be completed at the school at least one day in advance of the change.

#### Providence Trust Fund Information for Hualapai Minors

On October 6, 2018, the Hualapai Tribal Council went on record with a motion "to have 100% of the children's per capita to go into Trust, until they are 21 years of age, unless they have obtained their high school diploma or GED at the age of 18 years of age. They need to attend a budget/financial class, and a Hualapai Cultural Class, before receiving their per capita."



Required documents needed to receive Trust fund, if graduated high school or GED program and is over the age of 18 years old:

- High School Diploma/or GED Diploma
- Budget/Finance Classes (offical high school transcripts with finance/budget class on them accepted)

-Hualapai Cultural Class

#### WHAT IS VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION (VR)?

The Vocational Rehabilitation program provides a variety of services to persons with disabilities, with the ultimate goal to prepare for, enter into, or retain employment.

If you have a disability, regardless of whether or not you are in Special Education, the VR program may be an important step as you begin planning your transition from school. Services may begin while you are still in school or after you exit school.



#### Referral

Your high school or another agency may refer you to VR, or you may refer yourself. Referral may occur at any point during your high school experience when you are ready to plan for your future career. The VR Counselor will work with the school to make sure all necessary paperwork has been provided to VR.



#### Application and Intake Interview

You will be contacted by the VR counselor to meet, complete an application, and participate in an intake interview. The interview will allow the counselor to get to know you and collect information to determine your eligibility for the VR program and your Order of Selection (OOS) Priority Category.



#### Eligibility Determination and Order of Selection (OOS)

Within 60 days of your application date, you will know if you are eligible for the VR program and if you are able to start receiving services. When resources are limited, the VR program may institute a waitlist for services called an Order of Selection. The law requires that individuals with the most significant disabilities be served first. Individuals on the waitlist are served as funds become available.



#### Planning and Development of Individualized Plan for Employment (IPE)

Planning an employment goal usually starts while you are still in school and is part of the school IEP. Your VR counselor and school will help you explore your career options and develop a plan with VR called an IPE. The IPE will state your employment goal and the VR services you might need in order to obtain your employment goal.





#### Participation in Services that lead to Successful Employment

Active participation in the services listed on your IPE will allow you to address your disability-related needs and prepare for employment.



#### Obtain and Maintain Employment

Once you have obtained employment, VR will monitor your situation to ensure you are adjusting well to your new job duties. Your case will then be closed.

#### **Common Questions**

#### Not sure if VR is right for you?

VR offers short-term job readiness services to students with disabilities. Utilize Pre-Employment Transition Services (Pre-ETS) to explore specific careers and job tools. Type 'Pre-ETS' in the search bar on **des.az.gov** to find more information.

#### What types of services does VR provide?

- Assistive Technology (AT)
- Vocational training and guidance
- Education and training
- Job coaching
- And more!

#### What is involved in IPE Planning?



- Understand how job wages may impact any benefits you receive
