Judge Extends Lithium Drilling Freeze

Judge extends lithium drilling freeze, a major win for Hualapai Tribe

A federal judge extended a temporary pause of exploratory drilling as part of a lithium mining project near the Hualapai Tribe's sacred site after the court found that irreparable harm from drilling is likely.

"Lithium exploration is an important public interest at a time when the United States is striving to transition to renewable sources of energy," Judge Diane Humetewa wrote in the decision. "However, this interest does not outweigh the potential damage the Phase 3 drilling project may cause to Ha'Kamwe', which is central to the Hualapai Tribe lifeway. "Nor does it permit a federal agency to short-cut its regulatory consultation obligations or reasoned evaluation of the effects of its undertaking," she added. "And this Court finds that irreparable harm from the Phase 3 drilling project is not just potential, it is likely."

The Big Sandy Valley Lithium Exploration Project allows a subsidiary of an Australian mining company to drill and test more than 100 sites across U.S. Bureau of Land Management land surrounding one of the Hualapai Tribe's cultural properties, among them Ha'Kamwe', a medicinal spring sacred to the tribe.

For years, the Hualapai Tribe tried to work with the BLM by actively voicing their concerns about a lithium exploration project near Wikieup, in northern Arizona, but the agency ultimately ruled that any disruptions to the tribe would be temporary, and thus weren't grounds to block the project.

"We're pleased with how everything turned out with this decision," said Ka-voka Jackson, the director of the Hualapai Department of Cultural Resources. "It was definitely worth the wait." Jackson said the judge's decision is reassuring, and it validates the tribe's long-voiced concerns. "It feels like we're being heard, and it also puts it into context that this is a very serious issue and the tribe is taking it very seriously," she said. "We want to protect these sacred places and protect the water and other resources in the area, not only for us but for the future."

The court issued a preliminary injunction on Nov. 5, halting all drilling activity as the Hualapai Tribe's lawsuit continues in court. The decision comes over a month after the tribe presented its argument for the extension in court. "This doesn't resolve the case," Laura Berglan, a senior Attorney for Earthjustice representing the tribe, told the Arizona Mirror. Berglan said they are pleased that the judge recognized that the drilling threatened the tribe's resources after hearing from witnesses during the September hearing, and they will continue to work on the case as it moves forward.

"We're glad the court rejected BLM's 19th-century mindset, that the company gets whatever they want at the expense of Indigenous communities," Berglan said in a press release. "BLM should have considered alternatives with less impact on Ha'Kamwe', like drilling fewer wells or moving them farther from the spring." In August, the judge granted the Hualapai Tribe's initial request for a temporary restraining order against BLM, temporarily freezing the exploratory drilling project. The restraining order was granted after the Hualapai Tribe filed a lawsuit, following years of the tribe actively voicing its concerns about the mining effort.

"I feel a huge sense of relief today, but we know this is not the end of the story," Hualapai Tribal Chairman Duane Clarke said in a written statement. "Our people have used Ha'Kamwe' for centuries for healing, prayer, and rites of passage. "We are absolutely determined to protect our sacred waters and our way of life from those who would destroy it to enrich themselves," he added. Jackson said they also feel fortunate because

"this isn't something that all tribes experience, having courts rule in their favor with issues like this, protecting sacred sites." "We feel very lucky, and we're gonna keep charging forward," she added.

Ha'Kamwe' is located within the Hualapai Tribe's property known as Cholla Canyon Ranch, and the boundaries of the Big Sandy Valley project nearly surround the entire property. Only one portion of the tribe's land does not border the drilling project. The spring is recognized as a traditional cultural property and is eligible to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The tribe's lawsuit claims the project's approval violates the National Environmental Protection Act and the National Historic Preservation Act.

The lawsuit asks for full compliance with the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) and the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), which includes having the BLM take a "hard look" at the exploration activity's environmental impacts and consider the implications of its actions on historic properties.

The lawsuit claims that BLM approved the mining project without appropriately considering a reasonable range of alternatives or taking a hard look at water resources under the NEPA and moved forward with the project without providing mitigation measures under the NHPA for Ha'Kamwe' and other resources essential to the tribe, thus violating both acts.

Out of concern for Ha'Kamwe', the tribe submitted multiple public comments, sent several letters of concern, and participated in tribal consultations with BLM throughout the Big Sandy Valley Lithium Exploration Project planning phase.

Big Sandy, Inc., a subsidiary of Australian mining company Arizona Lithium, leads the project and has sought approval since 2019. Arizona Lithium is not a direct party in the Hualapai Tribe's lawsuit, but it filed a motion to intervene. Humetewa granted the request in August, allowing the company to defend against the tribe's efforts to stop the project.

Tribal Member Names and Addresses

Our office is the central tribal agency charged with maintaining current and accurate names and addresses of all tribal members; Hualapai Constitution, Article II. Our office has experienced delays in receiving name changes that may be the result of marriage, adoption or voluntarily changing one's name.

The process in changing your name with the Enrollment Office is as follows:

- 1. Provide a marriage license, adoption decree or court order of name change (Please complete the process of changing your name with Social Security and Vital Records);
- 2. Provide an updated Social Security Card with changed name;
- 3. Issuance of new tribal ID and CIB (first ID card is free per lifetime, thereafter a \$10 fee is required, this includes name changes);
 - 4. Any other questions, please contact our office.

Addresses are important for tribal members to frequently update with our office. Enrollment Office supplies that information for tribal events like Election seasons and distributions. This will greatly establish a database of up-to-date tribal member data, this also includes minor addresses as well to ensure delivery of semiannual statements.

Tribal Member Death

Please notify our office so we may inactivate their profile and provide a copy of a death certificate to our office.

Four HIP Categories Available for Housing Assistance

Category (A)_Up to \$7,500 in housing repairs for health and safety threatening conditions


Category (B) Up to \$60,000 to raise the conditions of a house up to building code standards.

Category (C-1) Provides a modest replacement home when it is not possible to bring a home up to building code standards.

Category (C-2) Provides a modest new home for those who do not own a home. You may also be eligible for this type of aid if you are the owner of land suitable for housing or the leaseholder for land suitable for housing and the lease is for more than 25 years when assistance is received.

Category (D) Down Payment Assistance (DPA) helps tribal homebuyers with grants and lowinterest loans that reduce the amount they need to purchase a home and reduces the monthly mortgage payment amount.



Santa brings joy, but he can also cause stress

The stress young children may feel around Santa or others strangers is perfectly normal.

For many families, having their child's picture taken with Santa Claus is a holiday tradition. The jolly old elf makes himself available at shopping centers and stores, and folks line up for their turn.

Some young kids are thrilled by the chance to share their Christmas wish list with him, but for others, Santa is a scary dude. Being handed over to him, away from the comfort of a parent, can turn an Instagram moment into a freak out.

More and more, such set-ups involve side-by-side chairs or benches instead of Santa's lap, and that can reduce some of the situational stress for little ones. And that is what's behind the big emotions that some young children display with Santa — stress.

Stranger Distress

The stress young children may feel around Santa or other strangers is perfectly normal. It's related to the emotional attachment they form with their parents or primary caregivers. They naturally want to stay close to the ones who meet their needs and make them feel safe and secure. "I hate the terms stranger anxiety and separation anxiety," says Dr. Tracy Spinrad, who teaches infant and toddler development at Arizona State University, "because anxiety implies pathology, that something is abnormal. I prefer to call it distress or stranger wariness." Children may begin to show signs of distress around strangers, or when a trusted caregiver leaves the room, around crawling age, usually between 7 and 10 months. But not in all babies. Some babies are naturally more easy going, while others are more prone to experiencing stress from new things, places and people.

"Stranger distress can last quite a while, usually through age 2 or more," says Dr. Spinrad, "but these reactions are temporary and can even provide an opportunity for parents to teach their young children regulation skills."



Tips for Meeting Santa

- Stay close.
- Age matters, so you should probably have different expectations with a 12 month-old than with a 3- or 4-year old.
- Think ahead about how you'll respond in the moment if your baby flips out. Are you okay if they're not smiling in the photo?
- For older children, it can help to talk with them about the visit beforehand so they know what will happen and what to expect.
- Keep in mind that a little stress is okay for your child, and that how your child reacts to strangers, like Santa, is not a reflection on your parenting. It's more a sign of their age, maturation and natural temperament.

As part of the Hualapai SDPI team, I have found some recipes to share with you for the holidays. We had Pumpkin Pie making classes with the Elderly Program earlier this month and made our pumpkin puree out of fresh pumpkins. They were delicious. Also, last week I did a class on making a healthier version of fruit salad. Prep time was a little harder, so save some time and purchase pre-cut fruits, you can even find the pomegranate seeds sold ready to mix at most grocery stores. On the 26th of November, my class will be on macaroni & cheese versions in a crockpot and one-pot recipes, plus a twist on pasta salad. I will share these with you now. Have a safe and Happy Thanksgiving.

WINTER FRUIT SALAD

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1-inch piece ginger, peeled and thinly sliced
- 1 vanilla bean, split lengthwise and seeds scraped
 out
- 1 lemon
- 5 large navel or blood oranges

- 2 mangoes, peeled and diced
- 2 firm bananas, peeled and diced
- 5 kiwis, peeled and diced
- 12 kumquats, very thinly sliced crosswise, seeds removed
- 1 cup pomegranate seeds (from 1 pomegranate)

Directions:

- 1. Combine the sugar, 2 cups water, the ginger and vanilla seeds and pod in a saucepan. Use a vegetable peeler to remove wide strips of zest from the lemon and 1 orange, add to the saucepan and bring to a boil over medium-high heat. Reduce the heat and simmer 5 minutes. Refrigerate until cold.
- 2. Meanwhile, peel the remaining oranges with a paring knife, cutting along the natural curve of the fruit. Hold an orange over a large bowl and cut along both sides of each membrane to free the segments, letting them fall into the bowl. Squeeze each empty membrane to release the juices. Repeat with the remaining oranges. Add the mangoes, bananas, kiwis, kumquats and pomegranate seeds and gently toss. Pour the syrup over the fruit and chill overnight.
- 3. Before serving, remove the citrus zest, ginger and vanilla pod. Spoon the fruit and syrup into bowls.
- 4. To remove pomegranate seeds, cut the fruit into quarters, then break apart in a bowl of water. Skim off the pith that floats to the top and drain the seeds.

PUMPKIN PIE RECIPE

The BEST Pumpkin Pie recipe is perfect in every way, and you can choose to serve it with a simple homemade caramel pecan topping that takes it over the top!

Ingredients (For the Pumpkin Pie)

- 1 9-inch Homemade pie crust, or store-bought, deep dish, unbaked
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F.
- 2. In a large bowl beat the eggs and pumpkin together. In a separate bowl, combine the sugar, cinnamon, salt, ginger and cloves, and add to pumpkin mixture.
- 3. Gradually stir in the evaporated milk. Carefully pour mixture into unbaked pie shell.
- 4. Bake at 425 degrees F for 15 minutes. Reduce temperature to 350° F; bake for 40 to 50 minutes longer, or until the pie is set. Check for doneness by giving the pie a gentle wiggle. The center may jiggle just a tiny bit. It will continue to set up as it cools. Or, it is done when a sharp knife inserted in center comes out clean.
- Cool completely on a wire cooling rack. Serve immediately with whipped cream and caramel pecan topping, if desired.

Notes: Make Ahead Instructions: You can make the entire pie the day before and store it the refrigerator, or prepare the pie crust and filling the day before and store them separately in the refrigerator until ready to bake the next day.

Storage Instructions: Store-bought pumpkin pies can sit at room temperature because of the preservatives added, but homemade pumpkin pie should be refrigerated if not eaten within 2 hours of sitting out. Leftover pumpkin pie will keep in the refrigerator for 3-4 days. Be sure to allow pumpkin pie to cool completely and then cover it loosely with plastic wrap, for storing.

Freezing Instructions: Cooked pumpkin pie can be frozen for up to 3 months, covered well. You can also freeze the pie crust for up to 3 months. Thaw pumpkin pie overnight in the refrigerator before serving.

Caramel Pecan Topping:

- 1/2 cup light brown sugar, packed
- 2 tablespoons heavy whipping cream
- 1 tablespoon light corn syrup

- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

1/4 teaspoon ground cloves

15 ounce can canned pumpkin or fresh pumpkin puree

2 large eggs

Add brown sugar, cream, corn syrup, and butter to a small saucepan over medium high heat. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, for about 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Remove from heat and stir in chopped pecans and vanilla. The topping will thicken as it cools. Spoon topping over cooled pumpkin pie slices and top with whipped cream. *Pumpkin pie filling recipe is from Libby*.



- 3 cups whole wheat elbow macaroni uncooked
- 3 cups vegetable or chicken broth low sodium
- 1 cup whole milk
- 2 tbsp butter salted
- 1/4 tsp garlic powder

- 1/4 tsp mustard condiment
- 3/4 tsp salt
- Ground black pepper to taste
- 1 cup marble or cheddar cheese shredded
- 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese shredded

Instructions


- 1. In a medium pot, add broth, milk, butter, garlic powder, mustard, salt, ground black pepper and bring to a boil.
- 2. Add elbow macaroni and cook for 8-10 minutes, stirring every few minutes to prevent sticking. Cook until al dente or desired firmness and adding more milk or broth if you wish.
- 3. Turn off heat. Add marble cheese and Parmesan cheese in portions and stir between each until melted. That's it.
- 4. Serve immediately as mac and cheese tastes best fresh. Saucy, creamy and so comforting!
- 5. Top with your favorite hot sauce, everything bagel, Montreal steak spice, paprika, nutmeg, soy sauce and even honey. Or with leftover chopped baked bacon. I like to bake mine at 425 degrees F for 20 minutes. Way less mess.

Notes

- Store: Refrigerate leftovers for up to 1 day. Reheat gently on the stovetop with an extra splash of milk/broth to bring back the saucy consistency. Alternatively, you can use a microwave in 40-second increments.
- Freeze: Do not freeze as pasta and dairy do not freeze well.
- Pasta: Any short pasta, white or gluten free works. Cook gluten free pasta for shorter amount of time.
- Cheese: You can use marble cheese, white or yellow cheddar cheese. It is best to buy a block of cheese and grate yourself because it will melt better.
- Milk and butter: I recommend to use whole milk 3.25% for maximum creaminess. 2% will work as well but less creamy.
- Too much or little broth: If you notice your pasta is almost ready and there is still a lot of liquid, turn up the heat. Likewise, if you see pasta is not done and you are running out of liquid, add 1/4 cup at a time.
- Can I bake it? I don't recommend it because sauce will dry out. Baked versions need more cheese and sauce and seasonings respectively.

HEALTHIER SLOW COOKER MAC AND CHEESE

Ingredients

- 2½ c butternut squash puree (I used frozen, entirely thawed)
- 4 c unsweetened almond milk or milk of choice
- 16 oz whole wheat or high fiber pasta (small, such as shells or macaroni)
- 3 4 c reduced fat sharp cheddar, shredded
- 1½ tsp salt, to taste
- ¼ tsp pepper
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp dried parsley

Instructions

- 1. Spritz large slow cooker with nonstick spray.
- 2. In the slow cooker, whisk together butternut squash puree and almond milk until there are no chunks remaining. Add the pasta, cheese, and seasonings and mix until well combined.
- 3. Cover and cook on low for 3 4 hours. Do not stir. Serve when all liquid has been absorbed and noodles are cooked through.

Notes

- I have NOT tried this recipe with gluten free noodles and cannot vouch for the results please let me know if you try it.
- If you want to cut the recipe in half, reduce all ingredients by half. Cook in a smaller crock pot so that it fills at least ½ of the crockpot and cook for the full length of time. If cooking half of the recipe in a larger crock pot, time will be dramatically reduced to 2 hours or less.

Ingredients

- 6 ounces uncooked short pasta (like rotini)
- 10 ounces cherry tomatoes cut in half (about 2 cups
- 2/3 c jarred roasted red pepper diced (or 1 fresh red bell pepper)
- 1 large green bell pepper seeded and chopped
- 1/2 cup sliced olives
- 4 ounces turkey pepperoni sliced in quarters (use 1 can chickpeas to keep it vegetarian)
- 4 ounces fresh mini mozzarella cheese balls (I use the pearls)



For the Dressings

- 3 tbsp reserved pasta water
- 1 2/3 tbsp extra virgin olive oil (that's 1 tbsp + 2 tsp)
- 2 tbsp red wine vinegar
- 2 tsp dijon mustard

- 1 tsp Italian seasoning
- 1/2-1 tsp kosher salt*
- black pepper to taste
- 1/2 tsp red pepper flakes (optional if you like some heat)

Instructions

- 1. Boil pasta according to package directions. BEFORE draining the pasta, reserve 3 tablespoons of the pasta water.
- 2. In a small bowl or mason jar, thoroughly mix together dressing ingredients.
- 3. In a large bowl, add all remaining ingredients. Pour in dressing and mix until all ingredients are coated.
- 4. You can eat the salad right away, but it gets better as it sits in the refrigerator! I suggest making it the day before you want to serve.

Notes

*Go with 1/2 tsp first, then taste the salad and add more as needed. Different brands of pepperoni and olives have different salt levels, so it's better to start on the lower end and add more if you like.




