Tribe wins \$23 million grant to improve safety and mobility

Diamond Creek Road overpass one of many projects advancing in 2025

Hualapai Moving Forward is kicking off the new year with great news. The tribe has been awarded a \$22.9 million grant from the Federal Railway Administration's (FRA) Rail Crossing Elimination (RCE) program for the BNSF Railroad Crossing project on Diamond Creek Road. This transformative funding will support the construction of a bridge over the railroad tracks, improving safety and mobility for all who travel through the area.

This incredible achievement is just one of the many impactful projects that are part of the Hualapai Moving Forward initiative, which continues to enhance the quality of life and infrastructure for our community.

With the turn of the New Year, we'd like to take a brief look back at some of the projects which are progressing and -- perhaps more importantly -- give the community an update on work needed to facilitate the design and construction of others.

As a reminder, the **Hualapai Moving Forward** program includes more than thirty projects. Each of them falls into one of the following five categories, each with a stated goal:



Hualapai Water Rights Pipeline

After decades of work to secure our rights to water from the Colorado River, attention has now turned to environmental compliance, design, and construction of the Hualapai Water

Rights Pipeline which will convey that water from the river to uses across our community.

Under the Hualapai Tribe Water Rights Settlement Act of 2022, the tribe is entitled to 4,000 acre feet of water from the river each year which is approximately one billion gallons.

As you can imagine, the pipeline that will carry that water from the river to where we need it will be significant. The steps we must take before construction are significant, too.

In 2024, with little fanfare, our attorneys and project delivery team kicked off the complicated process of preparing the necessary documentation as required by the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).

The requirements of NEPA must first be satisfied before design and construction can begin. This effort will continue in 2025 and 2026

Truxton Aquifer Well

Preliminary work on the Truxton Aquifer Well is also moving forward. This project is so important because, once it is complete, the well will be equipped to help guarantee sustainability into the future. It will provide an additional source to Peach Springs -- enhancing our current water supply and providing redundancy which makes our infrastructure more resilient and sustainable.

Youth Camp Road

Work is underway on a project to upgrade Youth Camp Road including replacing drainage pipes, grading, and stabilizing the roadway in preparation for paving which is scheduled to begin in 2025. These temporary repairs aim to support mobility and safety by improving the roadway.



The Youth Camp facility is a vital community asset, and these improvements will facilitate access for all community members, regardless of weather conditions.

Buck and Doe Road

The project team continues making headway on permitting and preliminary design for the project which will include paving and drainage improvements along a 16-mile stretch of the roadway. Other improvements include placing pavement markings, adding rumble strips, and replacing the guardrail where needed. All work will be confined to the existing right of way, ensuring minimal disruption to surrounding areas. The roadway improvements will provide enhanced access to the West Water Area.

What vou'll see in 2025

In addition to permanent paving of Youth Camp Road, improvements on **Nelson Road** are set to begin in 2025. It will extend the pavement approximately half a mile beyond the current paved section. This will improve access and reduce dust in the area.

Preparing for the Future

The team is also progressing on various planning and capacity building projects. One of them is a condition assessment of the roadways that will inform future investments.

Another is development of the Safe Streets for All (SS4A) Action Plan which aims to improve safety and accessibility in our community, making our streets safer for pedestrians, cyclists, and drivers alike. The SS4A study will provide a roadmap to reduce accidents and create a safer transportation network environment for all road users.

Developing and delivering impactful projects for a program this far-reaching takes time, and not all projects reach construction simultaneously. This means the sequencing of the projects and the order in which they are completed may change over time. The program delivery team is committed to remaining flexible to maximize scheduling efficiencies and available funding to deliver projects rapidly for the community.

The Hualapai Moving Forward program is part of an innovative federal pilot program that utilizes an efficient approach that brings together owners, designers, and contractors early in the project to foster collaboration in planning, design, and construction. By enhancing efficiency, it delivers high-quality results while saving time and money.

The program management team is comprised of seasoned experts with a track record in successfully delivering water, transportation, and infrastructure projects across eight tribes, including Gila River, Pueblo of Acoma, Pawnee, CSKT, Cahills, Seminole, Kawerak, and Eyak. Over the next five years, operational funds, low-interest loans, and grants will be utilized to finance each of these projects.

Subject: Implementing a 4-Day Work Week for Local Government

This letter is to inform after careful and extensive consideration, the Hualapai Tribal Council passed Resolution 72-2024; Amendment to the Hualapai Personnel Policy and Procedures Manual to Include a Four-Day Work Week, for the Hualapai Tribal Government Workforce. This 4-day work week is practiced by many tribal governments and has proven to be effective for their operations.

A 4-day work week, where employees work the same number of hours over four days instead of five, has gained significant attention in recent years. While this model may seem unconventional, it offers several potential advantages for both employees and our tribal government:

- Increased Employee Productivity: Studies have shown that a 4-day work week can lead to increased employee productivity and reduced burnout.
- Reduced Operating Costs
- Decreased employee absenteeism: Improved employee well-being can translate to fewer sick or annual leave days and improved overall attendance.
- Potential for reduced overtime: A more condensed work week may improve scheduling efficiency and reduce the need for overtime.

- Improved Employee Recruitment and Retention: Offering a 4-day work week can be a
 highly attractive benefit for prospective employees, making it easier to recruit and retain
 top talent.
- Enhanced Work-Life Balance: A 4-day work week can significantly improve the work-life balance of government employees, allowing them more time for family, personal pursuits, and community involvement.

Understanding implementing a 4-day work week has required careful planning and consideration. This involves:

• Exploring different scheduling models with each: Finding the most suitable approach for different departments and roles.

The 4-day work week will begin the week of February 09th, 2024. The Tribal Administration schedule will follow as opening at 7:30 am and close of business at 5:30pm, Monday thru Thursday.

I am writing to express my deep and alarming concern about the plight of the following:

- Housing and Homelessness
- Early Health Detection Prevention and Education
- Mental Health
- Law and Order

Each bullet point I have identified, my office, the Office of the Chairman hereby advocates for a comprehensive approach to address these critical issues. I believe that a multi-pronged strategy focused on protecting and elevating services in our community is essential.

Housing:

I strongly advocate for increased investment in permanent supportive housing programs. This includes programs to provide long-term housing, short-term housing, and emergent housing with wrap-around support services, which have proven highly effective in helping individuals experiencing chronic homelessness and overcrowding to achieve stability and improve their overall well-being.

Early Health Detection - Prevention and Education:

I urge our tribal government health programs in conjunction with our local Federal, State and County Health Officials work in a unified fashion with the purpose increased efforts of healthcare services that includes regular checkups, screenings for heart diseases, diabetes and cancer.

Mental Health:

I believe that readily available mental health counseling is crucial for individuals experiencing social problems. Many individuals experience struggles with mental health conditions such as depression, anxiety, and substance abuse disorders.

I urge our tribal government health programs in conjunction with our local Federal, State and County Health Officials work in a unified fashion with the purpose increased efforts of peer support programs where individuals have periodic access, guidance and support.

Law and Order:

Current ordinances enforced and prosecuted are outdated and have not been updated over twenty years.

I have delegated the Executive Team from the Office of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman to begin steps to solicit a recruitment of committee members to reestablish the Law and Order Committee to review current ordinances and work jointly with our law enforcement, judicial and legal team to revise and develop ordinance that protect our people, land, environment and animals.

I believe that by prioritizing these key areas, we can make a significant impact in addressing each area in our community. I am eager to collaborate with my colleagues, organizations and other stakeholders to develop and implement effective solutions.

Dear Hualapai Tribal Employees,

We are writing to inform you of a change to our Hualapai Policies and Procedures Manual regarding section 11.1 Normal Work Week which has become effective as of January Sunday 12th, 2025 per Resolution 72-2024.

What is Changing:

11.1 Normal Work Week will reflect the following:

Bullet A.) "Generally, employees shall work Monday through Thursday, ten (10) hours per day, totaling 40 hours of work per week, with a thirty-minute (30) paid lunch break. The daily work hours shall be from 7:30 am to 5:30 pm and will be scheduled by each Director/Program Manager for employees in his or her department.

Bullet D.) "Generally, employees working the ten hours per day shift will receive a one-half hour paid lunch break. All other employees working various schedules will receive a one-half hour to one-hour unpaid lunch break as scheduled by the Department Director or Program Manager."

Reason for the Change:

Our Hualapai Tribal Council requests and approves to amend our existing Hualapai Personnel Policy and Procedures Manual to accommodate innovative work schedules. This is mainly due to research that supports a four-day work week will improve work-life balance, increase in employee productivity, increase in higher employee morale, reduce burnout, increase employee

How it Impacts You:

No actions are required from employees at this time. Any schedule changes will be communicated from each department Director amongst their staff on if their employees may be having with their work schedules changed. Department Directors have been informed that they have the sole discretion on implementing this change or staying current with their staffing schedules and operating hours.

Implementation Timeline:

Tribal Administration has determined that the 4-day work week will begin the week of February 9th, 2025. The Tribal Administration schedule will follow as opening at 7:30 am and close of business at 5:30 pm, Monday thru Thursday.

All other departments have been advised to communicate with their employees what they plan to do with staff and operating schedules.

Further Information and Support:

We encourage employees to seek guidance from their immediate supervisors, managers, and/or directors. We appreciate your understanding and cooperation as we implement this new policy.

HUALAPAI TRIBAL COUNCIL RESOLUTION 72-2024 OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE HUALAPAI TRIBE OF THE HUALAPAI RESERVATION

Amendment to the Hualapai Personnel Policy and Procedures Manual to Include a Four-Day Work Week

- WHEREAS, the Hualapai Tribal Council is the legislative body of the Hualapai Tribe and is empowered by the Hualapai Constitution to represent the Tribe and act on all matters that concern the welfare of the Hualapai Tribe; and
- WHEREAS, the Hualapai Tribal Council, pursuant to Article V, section (bb) of the Hualapai
 Constitution has the authority to determine all terms and conditions of
 employment for all persons employed by the Hualapai Tribe though the adoption
 of appropriate ordinances and policies; and
- WHEREAS, the Hualapai Tribe's Personnel Policy and Procedures Manual has been updated since the adoption of the original document in 1985; and
- WHEREAS, Hualapai Tribal Council requests to amend the existing Hualapai Personnel Policy and Procedures Manual to accommodate innovative work schedules; and
- WHEREAS, Hualapai Human Resources has conducted research that found the following: A four-day work week will improve work-life balance, increase employee productivity, increase higher employee morale, reduce burnout, increase employee retention, and provide a positive impact on the environment for reduced commute; and
- NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Hualapai Tribal Council amends the Hualapai Personnel Policy and Procedures Manual, Chapter 11, Section 11. 1 Normal Work Week, to:
 - "Generally, employees shall work Monday through Thursday, ten (10) hours per day, totally 40 hours per week, with a thirty-minute paid lunch break. The daily work hours shall be from 7:30 am to 5:30 pm and will be scheduled by each Director/Program Manager for employees in his or her department. With no additional Admin leave, associated with holidays, and shall be effective January 13, 2025 and evaluated July 23, 2026."
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Hualapai Tribal Council wishes to execute the Amendment to the Hualapai Personnel Policy and Procedures Manual, effective this 13th day of January, 2025.

9 tips for healthy toddler eating habits

One day they'll eat broccoli and the next day they won't. It can seem strange and irrational, but it's normal.

Toddlers can be stubborn about food. (About anything, really, but especially food.) As parents, we know it's important for our kids to eat well, but feeding our little ones can be a daily struggle. Here's some advice—equal parts science, psychology and real-world experience—to guide you in forming healthy toddler eating habits.

It's a parent's job to provide healthy foods, and your work is done once you've served them. Your child may eat a lot or a little, and that's okay. Stick to your routine, serving three healthy meals and two or three snacks a day.they decide.

You can encourage them to eat, but don't force it. Let them decide how much they want to eat. The pressure of forcing your child to eat something or "clean your plate" can make mealtime an unhappy experience. Research shows that kids react negatively when pressed to eat.



Think long-term.

It can be hard, but try not to worry too much if they don't eat well each and every day. Studies show that young kids usually get enough of what they need over time as long as they're consistently given healthy food choices. That said,

check with your doctor or healthcare provider if you're concerned about your child's diet or overall development. You're a parent, not a short-order cook.

Try your best to not provide an alternative meal if your child refuses to eat what you've served. This can develop into a pattern in which they will only eat their three or four favorite foods and nothing else. Of course, it's a good idea to always include at least one healthy thing your child will usually eat.

Trust them to say when.

When your child says they're full, take their word for it. Children's hunger levels change constantly as their bodies grow and develop. It may be hard to believe that your toddler can be full after just five bites, but allowing your toddler to listen to their own hunger and fullness cues is helping them learn to not overeat and to let their body guide their choices in eating.

Think about their taste buds.

Vegetables have a hard time competing with candy, yogurt and juice because humans are hard-wired to love sweet things and mildly dislike bitter. That doesn't mean your child's taste can't be shaped. The more exposure your child gets to sugary, salty and fatty foods, the less they'll enjoy naturally flavored foods like veggies.

Things change.

Your little one is growing and changing all the time. One day they'll eat broccoli, the next day they won't. It can seem strange and irrational, but it's normal for their food likes and dislikes to change. Try to keep your expectations realistic and do your best to support your toddler with attention, love and understanding. That's the healthiest diet of all.

HOW CAN I HELP MY STUDENT?

- Ask your students questions that require longer answers— Instead of asking, "How was school today?" which many students often answer with a simple, "Fine," ask instead something like, "What was the most memorable part of the day today?" or "What are you finding the most challenging?" Questions like these can help to generate constructive conversations with your students
- Talk about why they attend school here (and what's expected of them in order to continue) Since our focus must be on teaching and learning, student behavior choices that negatively affect their teachers' abilities to teach and their fellow students' abilities to learn cannot be tolerated. We had several suspensions last semester due to poor behavior choices. The goal for the spring is to reduce that number to zero (0).






